No. 17 Sun Devil Baseball To Take On Texas Tech In First Round of NCAA Regional in ASU's 25th Appearance in Postseason Play



What's On Tap:

The Arizona State Baseball team finished the 2001 regular season with a 36-18-1 overall record and with seven wins in their last eight Pac-10 games, improved to take possession of third place in the league with a 14-10 overall record. The Devils have been a mainstay in the polls this year, not leaving the top 20 and spending 10 weeks inside the top 10. ASU closed out the regular season by taking two of three from the UCLA Bruins. The Sun Devils will take on No. 3 seed Texas Tech to open their 25 appearance in postseason play. Cal State Fullerton and Temple are also in the regional bracket that will be played Friday through Sunday at Cal State Fullerton's Goodwin Field. ASU will head into the postseason playing their best baseball of the year, finishing strong with 14 wins in its last 20 games. The 36

wins marks the 39th consecutive year a Sun Devil squad has reached at least 30 wins and the ninth straight year with at least 35 wins. ASU will be playing in familiar territory when they open Regional play with Texas Tech, having split a pair of games already this season at Goodwin Field. ASU and Cal State Fullerton were to play a three-game series in late February, but rains washed out all but one of those games. The Sun Devils carry an all-time 121-47 record in postseason play into the 2001 regional and will be aiming for a 19th trip to the College World Series. An interesting note about the Fullertion Regional, which features National No. 1 Seed Cal State Fullerton, is that it is the only one of the 16 regionals that feature three teams that are represented in at least two of the three national polls.

Arizona State in Postseason Play:

The Sun Devil baseball program has created a dynasty in college baseball that has been matched by few. With 18 appearances in the College World Series, ASU ranks fourth for the most trips to Omaha. Arizona State has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 24 of the program's 42 seasons, amassing an incredible 116-43 (.730) record. ASU's five National Championships rank as the second most of any NCAA school. In addition to ASU's five national championships, the Sun Devils have also turned in five second-place teams and three third-place finishes. Pat Murphy is 21-14 in his career in postseason play, including an amazing 19-12 on the road during regional action. He has coached one team to a College World Series (1998).

The Record Is In The Books. ASU Has Scored In 372 Straight Games:

The Arizona State baseball program made history on April 7 when they scored at least one run in its 350th consecutive game. The Devils broke the 12-year-old record in a 5-1 loss to USC exactly six years to the day when they were last shut out. ASU was shut out 9-0 on April 7, 1995 at Dedeaux Field. The one run scored in the 3-1 loss to UCLA last Saturday marked only the 10th time during the streak that ASU has scored only one run. The record is still in tact at 372 straight games after scoring in each of ASU's four games on the road last week. ASU was neck-in-neck with Wichita State who was not shutout in 332 games, but when the Shockers fell 1-0 vs. Louisiana-Lafayette ASU took over the national lead. Coastal Carolina held the record at 349 games set from 1983-1989. ASU also had a stretch of 278 games without being shut out from 1990 to 1994, meaning the program has not scored a run in a game only three times dating back to 1990.

The National Rankings And RPI:

The Devils enter postseason play with a national ranking of No. 17 in the country by Baseball America. ASUis ranked 19th by Baseball Weekly and 16th by Collegiate Baseball. The Sun Devils have spent 30 consecutive weeks in the top 20, dating back to the start of the 2000 season. The Devils have not left the top 20 this year and were a mainstay in the top 10 for the first half of the season. The Devils finished with a project RPI of 18 and a schedule that was rated as the 11th toughest in the nation by www.boydsworld.com. Texas Tech heads into the postseason ranked 22nd by Baseball Weekly and Collegiate Baseball. They are not ranked by Baseball America. Cal State Fullerton is ranked fourth by Baseball America, sixth by Baseball Weekly and fifth by Collegiate Baseball. ASU is 5-8-1 vs. ranked opponents in 2001 and played 13 games against teams that are currently ranked in at least one of the national polls.

Casev Myers Reached 300. Now Eyes 283 Career RBI:

One of the best hitters in college baseball and making a name for himself as one of the best Sun Devils to ever wear the Maroon and Gold, Casey Myers recently became only the third Sun Devil in history to pass 300 hits in a career. With 308, he is now just has 14 hits short of the school record of 322 set by Clay Westlake (1973-76). Myers is a career .382 hitter in Tempe (308x807) in 216 career games. Myers recorded his 300th career hit in his 200th career start two weeks ago vs. Tennessee. The senior All-American catcher is also chasing the Pac-10 and ASU career RBI record of 283 set by former Sun Devil Andrew Beinbrink (1996-99). Myers is now just 11 short of the record with 272 in his career and 66 this year. He passed former Stanford Cardinal standout John Gall (263) to move into second place in Pac-10 history. Myers is also ranked sixth with 38 career home runs, eighth with a .384 career batting average, fourth with 485 total bases, fourth with 63 doubles and fifth with 807 career at-bats. Myers has recorded 28 multi-hit games in 2001 and has 94 in his career. For the first time since Feb. 13, Myers batting average has dipped below the .400 mark.

Myers, Phelps, Switzer Named Academic All-Americans:

Casey Myers, Jon Switzer and Jeff Phelps were named to the 2001 Verizon Academic All-District VII Baseball Team when it was announced Thursday. Myers is a three-time selection to the team and was last year's Academic All-American in the University Division. He holds an impressive 3.98 GPA in Math/Economics. He graduated with honors this week. Teammates Switzer and Phelps were also announced to the team. Phelps, a senior infielder for ASU, is a two-time selection, carrying a 3.40 GPA in Communications. Switzer, a junior majoring in Marketing, earned his first academic honor with a 3.44 GPA in his major. The ASU baseball program has now produced seven Academic All-Americans in the last three years.

Rod Allen Is "DANGER"ous:

Rod Allen has proven to be one of the best freshmen hitters in the nation and he is almost assured to be a freshman All-American when the teams are announced in the next month. Allen was only one of two freshman to be named to the All-Pac-10 team. Batting .387 heading into postseason play, Allen leads the team and is fifth in the Pac-10. in hitting and sixth in the Pac-10. Allen is hitting .380 in Pac-10 play and finished with a .393 in non-conference games. He has recorded

a hit in 38 of 47 games played this year and his 47 RBI rank third on the team behind seniors Casey Myers and Mike Lopez. During the recent four-game road trip at Washington and Nevada, Allen was 5-for-16 with five runs scored and four RBI. He was 5-for-13 vs. UCLA to close out the regular season. He is currently riding a seven-game hitting streak (.345). He started his ASU career with a bang, tabbing hits in 17 consecutive games. During his 17-game streak Allen was a .450 hitter (27x60). A reserve designated hitter to begin the season, Allen moved into a starting role during his 17-game hitting streak and started 13 games at designated hitter. He has since made the transition as ASU's everyday left fielder and has faired well with five outfield assists. In addition to his .387 average, Allen has fivehome runs, 12 doubles and one triple.

Myers Repeats As Pac-10 Player Of The Year:

Casey Myers became only the third player in Pac-10 history to be named Pac-10 Player of the Year two times. The senior All-American catcher joins former Stanford catcher A.J. Hinch and UCLA slugger Torey Lovullo who also were repeat winners of the award. Since the Pac-10 North and Pac-10 South joined in 1999, ASU has won all three POW awards with Willie Bloomquist in 1999 and Myers in 2000. Myers is ASU's 10th

all-time Player of the Year Award. He is also candidate for National and Pac-10 Player of the Year, has been named a semifinalist for the Dick Howser National Player of the Year Award, Rotary Smith National Player of the Year Award and the Johnny Bench National Catcher of the Year Award. Myers is currently ranked sixth in the Pac-10 in hitting and second in the Pac-10 in RBI.

Murphy Picks Up Pac-10 Wins No. 100, 101 and 102 At Washington. Adds More vs. UCLA:

ASU head coach Pat Murphy needed one win in the Pacific Northwest to gain his 100th Pac-10 victory. Instead he picked up three, left Seattle with 102 career wins in league play, and even more importantly assured his 2001 squad at least a .500 finish in the Pac-10 this year. Murphy's squads have picked up at least 12 wins in Pac-10 play in each of his seven seasons at the helm of the Sun Devils. Murphy added two more wins vs. rival UCLA to finish the 2001 regular season.

Leadoff Man Walking; Nick Walsh:

Redshirt Freshman Nick Walsh has proven to be a key sparkplug for the Sun Devils at the of the order this season. ASU 12-4-1 this year when Walsh starts and hits leadoff. For the season the Alamo, Calif., native is hitting .287 with one home run and 15 RBI. The most amazing of Walsh's statistics is his 29 walks and .496 on-base percentage. He has recorded 14 walks in the last seven games, including four in the Saturday game vs. UCLA. Walsh has also proven to be a clutch hitter for ASU this year, tabbing three game-winning hits in 2001, including one at Cal State Fullerton, and is hitting .345 with runners in scoring position.

More Pac-10 Awards:

In addition to Myers Pac-10 Player of the Year Award, several other Devils received accolades from the conference office when they were handed out Monday. Freshman Rod Allen was not the recipient of the Freshman of the Year Award, but was only one of two freshman to be named to the All-Pac-10 team. Junior second baseman Brooks Conrad repeated as the leagues best second baseman and junior center fielder Chris Duffy was named to the first-team after hitting .374 with three home runs and 25 multi-hit games in 45 starts. Mike Esposito, Drew Friedberg, Aaron Klusman, Mike Lopez, Jon Switzer, Andy Torres and Dennis Wyrick were all named to the All-Pac-10 Honorable Mention team.

ASU Team Banquet Awards:

Monday was a day of awards for the ASU baseball team. In addition to finding out where the team would be playing in the NCAA Tournament, the team held its annual banquet on Bobby Winkles Field. Ryan McKenna was awardd the Development MVP award, Rod Allen and Chris Duffy shared the Newcomer of the Year Award, Drew Friedberg and Aaron Klusman split the Mr. Fireman Relief Pitcher Award, Mike Esposito received the Jim Henderson Courage Award, Nick Walsh won the Bobby Winkles Award, Andy Torres and Jon Switzer received the Pitcher of the Year Award, Dennis Wyrick was named the Defensive Player of the Year and Casey Myers was named the Offensive MVP.

Torres Still Ranks High in NCAA With 12 Wins

Junior college transfer Andy Torres not only leads ASU with 12 wins, but is also among the national leaders in the NCAA. Tied for eighth in the NCAA, Torres is 12-4 on the year with one save. Posting an impressive 4.16 overall ERA, Torres has really shined for ASU since moving to the bullpen. As a relief pitcher this year the crafty right-hander is 6-1 with a 3.46 ERA in 16 appearances out of the bullpen. He has struck out 40 in 39.0 innings out of the bullpen. Overall Torres has made a team-high 25 appearances, with nine coming as starts, and has struck out 72 batters in 84.1 innings. He picked up wins in both of ASU's extra inning games at Oklahoma and Oral Roberts. He was named to the Pac-10 Honorable Mention team this week. Torres came to Arizona State from East Los Angeles Junior College where he was 11-3 with a 2.19 ERA.

Esposito Named Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week:

Arizona State freshman starting pitcher Mike Esposito has been named the Pac-10 Baseball Pitcher of the Week for April 30-May 7, Commissioner Tom Hansen announced today from Walnut Creek, Calif. Esposito, a redshirt freshman from Las Vegas, earned the win in ASU's 15-1 route of then No. 19 Tennessee. The hard-throwing right-hander threw six shutout innings at the Volunteers, striking out six and allowing only two infield singles. The start for Esposito vs. Tennessee, who is coming off Tommy John surgery last March, was his 10th in 2001, but it was ironically scheduled to be his initial return from the arm injury. The fifth round draft choice of the Cincinnati Reds in 1999 is now 5-2 on the year with a 4.10 ERA. In his 12 starts this year Esposito has a 3.99 ERA with opposing hitters batting only .259 off of him. He has struck out six batters in seven of his 12 starts this year.

42 Years of Sun Devil Baseball Tradition:

While the history of baseball at Arizona State University goes back all the way to the early 1900's, the school officially began sponsoring varsity baseball in 1959. In 42-plus years of varsity baseball at Arizona State, the program has built a legacy matched by few in the college baseball world. With a 1,893-754-1 alltime record, Arizona State has recorded winning seasons in all but one year, advanced to the College World Series 18 times, won five national championships, won six Pac-10 titles, produced 13 Players of the Year and three Golden Spikes Award winners, and has gone to the NCAA Tournament 24 times. Under current head coach Pat Murphy, the Sun Devils have finished in the top 12 in three of the last four years and finished second in the nation in 1998. They have been ranked in the top 20 since the start of the 2000 season.

Recruiting Class Draws Rave Reviews:

The recruiting class that makes up the freshman class on the diamond this spring was rated as the top class of recruits in the nation by Baseball America. Highlighted by seven players who were selected in the annual Major League Draft, the group includes several players who are expected to contribute immediately. The recruiting class was also ranked third in the nation by *Collegiate Baseball*. The class has definitely lived up to its large billing, having several players in contention for Freshman All-America honors.

The All-Time Series With Fullerton and Texas Tech:

The Sun Devils are 20-13 vs. Cal State Fullerton in the all-time series after splitting a pair of games with the Titans at Goodwin Field earlier this year. ASU won the first game 5-3, but lost the second game 13-6. The second meeting fell on a Monday after ASU had just completed a hard-fought three-game series with USC at Dedeaux Field. ASU and Texas Tech have met 14 prior times, with ASU holding a commanding 12-2 lead in the series. ASU and the Red Raiders have not met since 1995 (Murphy's first year at ASU), when the Devils took two off three in a series held at Packard Stadium in early February.

Casey Myers An All-American On The Field And In The Classroom:

One of the best hitters in college baseball, Casey Myers, has not disappointed in living up to that title this year. Recording hits in 41 of his 55 games this year, plus 28 multi-hit games, Myers is second on the team with a .386 batting average... He has 16 doubles, six home runs and 62 RBI. Myers hit .330 in Pac-10 play and was a .425 hitter in non-conference games. He became only the third player in Pac-10 history to earn Player of the Year twice.... Myers has 62 RBI on the year to place second in the Pac-10 and is quickly approaching the school and Pac-10 career record. With 272 in his four-year career, he is just 11 short of breaking both records set by former Sun Devil Andrew Beinbrink. He moved into second place in the Pac-10 record books last week vs.



Tennessee, passing former Stanford standout John Gall who had 263 RBI from 1997-2000. In addition to Pac-10 Player of the Year honors, he is a semifinalist for the Rotary Smith Player of the Year Award, Dick Howser Player of the Year Award and for the Johnny Bench Catcher of the Year Award. Myers is quickly reminding players why he is one of the best players in all of college baseball. A legitimate candidate for Player of the Year honors. Myers, who hit .412 last year and was a finalist for the National Player of the Year award, is now within one of second place in the ASU record books for career RBI. Behind the plate Myers has been instrumental in the success of the ASU pitching staff, calling all the pitches. Myers will end his career less than 25 RBI short of ranking among the top seven run-producers in college baseball history; a list that includes Robin Ventura, Joe Carter and Pete Incaviglia. Defensively, the 2000 Collegiate Baseball Defensive Player of the Year has also been solid, carrying a .991 fielding percentage into this weekend's action. In addition to his 28 multi-hit games this year, he has 94 in his career, including 38, three-hit games. He hit 18 home runs (second on the team) behind teammate Mitch Jones last year and now has 38 in his career to tie for sixth in school history. The school record is 56 set by Bob Horner. Myers has also done an excellent job behind the plate as well, calling the pitches himself and making the pitching staff step up to the next level. For the second year in a row is on the Johnny Bench Cather of the Year Watch List. He has been named conference player of the week three times during his career at ASU. He reached base safely (hit, walk, HBP) in 54 of 59 games in '00. Myers led the squad in multiple-hit games (31) and multi-RBI games (29). His multi-hit games included three, four-hit affairs. He hit safely in 50 of 59 games. Myers was clutch with 26 two-out RBI and hit .417 with the bases loaded. He hit .466 (48x103) with runners in scoring position and .459 with runners on base. Myers finished his junior campaign ranked 30th in the nation in batting average (.412), third in RBI (97), and 35th in home runs (.31 per game). Myers recently became only the third Sun Devil in history to surpass 300 hits in a career and is now just 16 off the school record of 322.

More On Myers: As asset for the program throughout his career in Tempe, Myers has also been stellar in the classroom. The math whiz that scored a perfect 800 on the math portion of the SAT out of high school, Myers has maintained a near-perfect GPA as a math/accounting major at ASU. He was an Academic All-American in 1999, 2000 and became a three-time recipient of the award this yar. He received college baseball's highest academic honor last year when he was named the GTE/CoSida Academic All-American of the Year. In addition to being

named the Academic All-American of the Year, All-American and Pac-10 Player of the Year in 2000, Myers was also named the Collegiate Baseball National Defensive Player of the Year with a .996 fielding percentage. In November, Myers was named the top amateur athlete in the state of Arizona by the March of Dimes. Myers is once again a candidate for Pac-10 Player of the Year and has been nominated for Academic All-America honors.

Jon Switzer Is Firing On All Cylinders:

His 5-5 record does not show how well he has pitched this year, but his 3.75 ERA is the lowest of any of his three years at ASU and his 124 strikeouts are second best behind Mark Prior in the Pac-10... Switzer has also been a victim of hard luck, with the Devils scoring only one run in four of his five loses... a master of the strikeout, Switzer has tallied six games with more than 10 strikeouts, including a career high vs. Southern Utah (2/2)... Switzer also had 12 strikeouts in a pair of loses to Washington State (2-1) and UCLA (3-1)... he pitched his only complete game of the year and the third of his career at Oregon State in a 10-2 win over the Beavers... he pitched for Team USA over the summer and maintained a 2.41 ERA before leaving the team because of illness... he is the only native Texan on the roster for ASU when they matchup with the Red Raiders.

On the Road Again in the NCAA Tournament:

The road and the NCAA Tournament are two familiar sites for a club coached by ASU head coach Pat Murphy. Of his nine career postseason appearances, Murphy's squads have hosted only once, and have been sent to a National No. 1 Seed six other times, including this year. Of those five prior trips to the National No. 1 seed, Murphy's clubs have fared well, winning games at Clemson, Florida State, Miami twice and advancing to the College World Series after winning Wichita State's regional in 1998. Murphy has a career 21-14 record in postseason play, including a 9-4 record over the past three appearances in the NCAA Tournament.

Pat Murphy at ASU:

Arizona State has had only three coaches in its illustrious history. The latest to join the legacy is Pat Murphy who has enjoyed great success since arriving in Tempe six years ago in 1995. Murphy has guided ASU to a 263-139-1 (.654) and posted an impressive 104-87 record in the tough Pac-10. ASU has advanced to postseason play in four of the seven years under Murphy, including a 2nd place finish at the College World Series in 1998. With his 268 wins at ASU, Murphy has the third best winning percentage of Pac-10 coaches. Murphy is picked up his 100th Pac-10 win vs. Washington (5/12). Of all active Division I coaches, Murphy entered 2001 ranked 14th with a career .675 winning percentage.

Bobby Winkles Field:

The Baseball Field at Packard Stadium was officially named Bobby Winkles Field April 3 as part of a special weekend honoring ASU's first varsity baseball coach. Winkles Field was officially named during a special ceremony before Saturday's game with LSU. Around 90 of Winkles former players joined a sellout crowd at Packard Stadium to honor Winkles and his tremendous strides to put ASU baseball on the map. Winkles was ASU's first varsity coach, compiling an impeccable 524-173 record during his 13-year career at ASU. He guided the Sun Devils to three national championships (1965, 67,69) and tutored future major league greats Rick Monday, Reggie Jackson and Sal Bando. ASU is 13-6-1 on the newly named Bobby Winkles Field. ASU recently played its 1,000th career game at Packard Stadium, posting an all-time 785-228-1 record at the home of Sun Devil baseball dating back to April 7, 1972.

Success in the Classroom As Well As On The Field:

ASU has long enjoyed much success on the diamond, and with 18 College World Series appearances, it is known as one of the gems of college baseball. But lately academics, as well as on-field talent, have shown its true colors in the storied program. Pat Murphy's Sun Devil squads have produced four Academic All-Americans over the past two years (Willie Bloomquist, Mark Ernster, Jeff Phelps, Casey Myers), including Myers being named the Academic All-American for college baseball in 2000. The four players honored as National Academic All-Americans is the most by any college baseball program in the nation over the last two years. The 2001 squad also features two players, Ty Johnson and Mike Lopez, who have already received their undergraduate degrees and are pursuing their master's. Myers, Phelps, Eric Doble and Jonah Martin all graduated last week during commencement. Myers was named the ASU Academic Athlete of the Year.



The Espo Report:

Possibly the best news of the season for the Sun Devils is the fact the RHP Mike Esposito (Las Vegas) is back in the starting rotation. A reliever on strict pitch counts through much of the early season, Esposito made his return as a starter vs. LSU. Leaving the game with a lead against the Tigers, Esposito made good in his second start of the year, picking up the win against South Florida with 3.1 solid innings. Only 11 months from successful Tommy John surgery, Esposito turned in possibly ASU's most impressive pitching performance of the season. Despite picking up the no-decision vs. Cal, the hard-throwing right-hander allowed only four hits and two runs in seven innings against California. He struck out six and did not walk a better in his start. Esposito is 5-2 on the year with a 4.10 ERA. He is 3-0 in his last four starts and is coming off a two-hit, shutout performance over six innings at Tennessee (5/2) that earned him Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week honors. His start vs. Stanford (3/30) came exactly one year to the day after his Tommy John surgery. Esposito was a fifth-round draft pick by the Cincinnati Reds in 1999 and was ASU's opening day starter in 2000 before going down with the injury. Esposito was named All-Pac-10 Honorable Mention this year and was the awarded the Courage Award by ASU.

Chris Duffy Makes An Immediate Impact:

The hype came with Chris Duffy, and so far he has not let it down. Gaining All-Pac-10 honors in his first year of Division I baseball, Duffy has come a long ways since starting the season with some bad news by spraining his right MCL before the Alumni game. After a month of intense rehab, the highly touted JC transfer from South Mountain CC saw his first action of his ASU career in the Creighton series and fared well, starting a 2001 teamhigh 19-game hitting streak. During the streak, Duffy hit .378 (28x74) with 19 runs scored, 16 RBI, four doubles and a triple. Duffy, who was the nation's top base stealer at the JC level last year with 59, is described as a five-tool player and has been solid in center field for ASU. Duffy is rated as one of the top 100 prospects in the nation by Baseball America (62) and earned the distinction of having the best outfield arm and best speed in the Pac-10's preseason outlook by Baseball America. Duffy hit .409 at South Mountain last year and was a 43rd round draft choice of the Boston Red Sox. Duffy also has three outfield assists, cutting down runners at home plate each time, and has recorded at least one hit in 39 of his 46 games played. Duffy also has 25 multi-hit games in only 45 starts and five multi-RBI affairs. He clubbed his first collegiate home run vs. Gonzaga (4/24) and has added two dramatic grand slams in the last week. His first came in the 10th inning in a 11-6 win over Washington (5/12) and he also hit one in the second inning to spark an early lead that turned into a 12-9 win. For the season he is third on the team with a .374 batting average (70x187) with 42 runs, four doubles, two triples and 34 RBI. Duffy has also stolen 19 bases this year to lead the Devils and currently has a five-game hitting streak in which he is batting .417 (10x24) with six RBI. During the UCLA series Duffy was 8-for-15.

Klusman Equals K:

Redshirt freshman Aaron Klusman has earned the nickname "Special K." Through ASU's first 55 games, he may be the biggest surprise of any Sun Devil. Klusman has relished as a short-reliever and has maintained stellar 3.34 ERA. Klusman is averaging 12.6 strikeouts per nine innings pitched and in 35.0 innings on the mound has fanned 49 batters. Opponents are hitting only .212 off him and he has scattered only 28 hits in his 24 appearances. Klusman registered a career day on the mound vs. Washington State (4/14). He pitched his longest career outing by going six strong, and struck out a career-high 10 batters. Yes, he struck out 10 out of the bullpen, and in doing so picked up his first career collegiate victory.

Drew Friedberg Having Stellar Senior Season:

Senior left-handed relief pitcher Drew Friedberg (Middleton, Wisc.) continued his dominance on the mound with two more impressive outings vs. Gonzaga and Arizona... he pitched only one third of an inning vs. Tennessee, but dropped his ERA one percentage point from 2.09 to 2.08... his ERA is now down to 1.88 after 55 games and his 23 appearances... Friedberg improved to 4-1 on the year with three innings of one-run ball vs. Gonzaga (4/23)... he added an impressive five-inning, shutout performance in ASU's 3-1 loss to Arizona (4/28)... the senior LHP leads the team with a 1.88 ERA and in 52.2 innings pitched this year, opponents are hitting only .203 off him... in Pac-10 play this year Friedberg had a commanding1.33 ERA with only four earned runs allowed in 27.0 innings.



Drafted Devils:

A total of 17 players on the 2001 Arizona State squad have been taken in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Since the inception of the draft in 1965, ASU has had more players chosen (289), more first-round draft picks (21) and more No. 1 picks (3) than any other school in the nation. Eight (8) players from the 2000 Pac-10 Championship team were drafted last June. ASU's three No. 1 picks were Rick Monday (1965), Floyd Bannister (1976) and Bob Horner (1978, Atlanta).

Horner Ranks Second As Player of the Century:

Former Sun Devil greats Bob Horner and Eddie Bane were honored by *Baseball America* by being placed on the publications' "Team of the Century." Horner, an ASU great under Jim Brock from 1976-78, hit .383 for his career and belted a school record 56 home runs. Horner was listed second on the team behind Oklahoma State slugger Pete Incaviglia (1983-85). Bane, a top pitcher for the Sun Devils from 1971-72, posted a career 40-4 record and a 1.64 ERA. Bloomquist Earns Minor League All-Star Award:

Willie Bloomquist (1997-1999) showed signs he would be a great professional ball player during his time at ASU. After his first full season of professional ball, the 1999 Pac-10 Player of the Year turned in a banner season split between Single-A Lancaster and Triple-A Tacoma in the Seattle Mariners organization. The second basemen hit a blistering .379 at Lancaster to earn Single-A all-star status and was overall a second-team Minor League All-Star as selected by the writers at *Baseball America*. After having a great spring training last year with the M's, Bloomquist played for the Mariners briefly in Spring Training and has reported to Double-A San Antonio to play second base and shortstop. In 26 games in 2001 (through 5/08), Bloomquist was batting .247 with five doubles and seven RBI.

Preseason Awards Plenty for Sun Devils:

Several Sun Devils received honors from various preseason college baseball publications. Casey Myers was a unanimous Preseason All-American as the Devils cracked the polls at No. 6 in the nation. Eric Doble was named a third-team preseason All-American by the NCBWA and Jon Switzer was also coveted as a preseason All-American. In Baseball America's annual Pac-10 review, five players received all-conference recognition. Myers, Doble, Switzer, in addition to Chris Duffy and Jeff Phelps were named to the team.

ASU And Team USA:

Junior lefty Jon Switzer (Houston, Texas) was among 20 invitees to the 2000 USA Baseball Team Trials and was one of two ASU players to represent the Red, White and Blue last summer. Switzer was joined by three other Pac-10 players: USC's Mark Prior, UCLA's Josh Karp and Stanford's Brian Sager at the trials, and junior catcher Casey Myers was also selected to play for the team. Myers (Casa Grande, Ariz.) was a member of the junior national team in '96 and was a '98 national team invitee. Myers ended up hitting .310 with Team USA and Switzer was 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA.

Arizona State Claims Pac-10 Championship in 2000:

For the first time in league history, three teams finished in a tie for first place in the conference standings in 2000. ASU, Stanford and UCLA all notched a 17-7 record in Pac-10 play. By virtue of a tie breaker (ASU won both conference series against Stanford and UCLA), the Sun Devils received the Pac-10's automatic bid to postseason play. It was their first conference championship since 1993 and sixth since joining the Pac-10 in 1978. Stanford and Pac-10 runner-up USC advanced through the NCAA Tournament and made appearances at the College World Series in Omaha. Stanford was the eventual runner-up.

Two Sport Stars:

If you think you heard the names of a couple of ASU baseball players' names being called over the Sun Devil Stadium loudspeaker during football season, that wasn't a joke. Three players, Skyler Fulton, Jon Sheaffer and Eric Keefner all double as players on the ASU football team. Sheaffer (WR) and Fulton (RB) saw action on special teams, while Keefner (LB) was named the Scout Team MVP. Kevin Tommasini (1996-97) and Jason Verdugo (1994-97) were the last Devils to double as a player on the diamond and on the gridiron.

Murphy Garners Pac-10 Coach of the Year Award In 2000:

Head coach Pat Murphy was voted the Pac-10 Coach of the Year by his peers for the 2000 season. The Sun Devils skipper led his squad to its sixth Pac-10 Conference title and first since 1993. ASU was picked to finish sixth in the league in the preseason coaches' poll. Murphy led the Devils to their third postseason appearance in the last four years.

Golden Spikes Common At Arizona State:

While Kip Bouknight of South Carolina was the recipient of the 2000 Golden Spikes award as the nation's top amateur baseball player, it should be noted that three Arizona State players have won the award. Bob Horner, who was a standout at ASU from 1976-78, won the inaugural award in 1978. Oddibe McDowell, who was a member of the first Team USA baseball team to compete in an Olympics, won the award in 1984. Mike Kelly, who ranks second in ASU history with 46 home runs from 1989-91, won the award in 1991. In all, 13 players that have worn the Maroon and Gold have been named a Player of the Year for college baseball.

The Assistant Coaches:

Coach Murphy has long been regarded for his winning programs and the development of college players into top pro talent. Perhaps the most forgotten skill Murphy should be praised for is his development of assistant coaches into head coaches. Four of his former assistants, Nino Giarratano (San Francisco), John Pawlowski (Charleston), Doug Schreiber (Purdue) and Brian Cleary (Cincinnati) have all moved onto the head coaching ranks. His current staff that he has assembled over the years is one of the best in all of college baseball. Jay Sferra is in his sixth year in association with the ASU baseball program and his third as an assistant coach. Sferra helps with the pitching staff and is the recruiting coordinator. Mike Rooney is regarded as one of the best assistants in the country and his on-field leadership and teaching skills make him a coveted coaching prospect for the future. The newest addition to the Sun Devil coaching staff is volunteer assistant coach Bill Mosiello. Mosiello, who is a top ranked assistant coach by Baseball America and a veteran summer league coach in the Cape Cod and Alaskan Summer League, came from Oklahoma where he was an assistant coach since 1996. Baseball Operations Director Billy Jones will coach this summer in the Cape Cod League for the Brewster Whitecaps.



Sun Devil Baseball Postseason Notes

- Pat Murphy has had a flair for taking his teams on the road for the NCAA Tournament. Posting an all-time 21-14 record in NCAA tournament play, Murphy has played all but four of his games on the road. Last year, 2000, was the first time on of his team had ever hosted a regional. Having advanced to the postseason now eight times in his career and fourth in his last five years at ASU, Murphy always seems to have his teams playing well at the end of the season heading into postseason play. This is the sixth time a Murphycoached team has been sent to play the No. 1 National Seed. Each time his squads have picked up at least one win over the No. 1 team in the country.
- No host, no worries. That should be the motto of the 2001 ASU baseball team. Despite being snubbed by the committe to host a regional for the second straight year, ASU may be better on the road. ASU was sent to No. 1 seed and national No. 1 Miami in 1997 and came within one win of advancing to the College World Series. ASU was faced with the same challenge in 1998, beating No. 1 Wichita State, Georgia Tech, Oklahoma State and Arkansas to advance to the College World Series. Murphy also faced similar challengest at Notre Dame, sending his Irish squads to a No. 1 seed three times, gaining a win each time.
- The Sun Devils have 12 players that have played in postseason and four players (Casey Myers, Jeff Phelps, Drew Friedberg, Ty Johnson) have played in a College World Series. Myers is a career .371 hitter in postseason play (13x35) with three home runs and 12 RBI.
- ASU finished the 2001 regular season with a 36-18-1 record and are currently ranked 17th in the nation by Baseball America. The Devils have been ranked in the top 20 all season and spent eight weeks in the top 10. The Devils have now been ranked inside the top 20 for 29 consecutive weeks, dating back to the start of the 2000 season. ASU is one of only seven schools who have finished in the top 12 in the nation in three of the past four years.
- The Sun Devils have played an extremely challenging schedule in 2001 that has been ranked as one of the top 15 in the nation. Playing 13 combined games against teams that have appeared in the top 10 at some time this year, ASU is 4-8-1 in those games. ASU is just three runs from being 7-6 in those games. In addition, the Sun Devils picked up road wins at USC, at Cal State Fullerton and at Tennessee. The Sun Devils also beat Oral Roberts (#25 at the time) on their home field against All-American hurler Michael Rogers. The Sun Devils also swept both South Florida and Creighton at home. ASU has played five of the schools who will be hosting a regional this year (LSU, Tennessee, USC, Stanford, Cal State Fullerton) and picked up road wins against three of those teams.


