WINNING TRADITION



Frank Kush (above) is the winningest coach in Arizona State history. A College Football Hall of Fame inductee, Kush led his Sun Devils to winning seasons in 19 of his 22 years at the helm, nine conference championships and a 6-1 bowl record.



(Above) ASU has made 23 bowl appearances in its storied history, including eight in the last 11 seasons. (Right) In the annual battle for the Territorial Cup, the Sun Devils have dominated of late, having taken six of the last eight meetings with in-state rival Arizona.



In one of the greatest games in the history of the Sun Devil program, Arizona State shut out then top-ranked and two-time defending national champion Nebraska 19-0 on Sept. 21, 1996. The Sun Devils turned in a perfect 11-0 regular season in 1996, capturing the Pac-10 title and earning a berth in the 1997 Rose Bowl.



Arizona State has won 16 conference football championships, including Pac-10 Conference titles in 1986 and 1996.

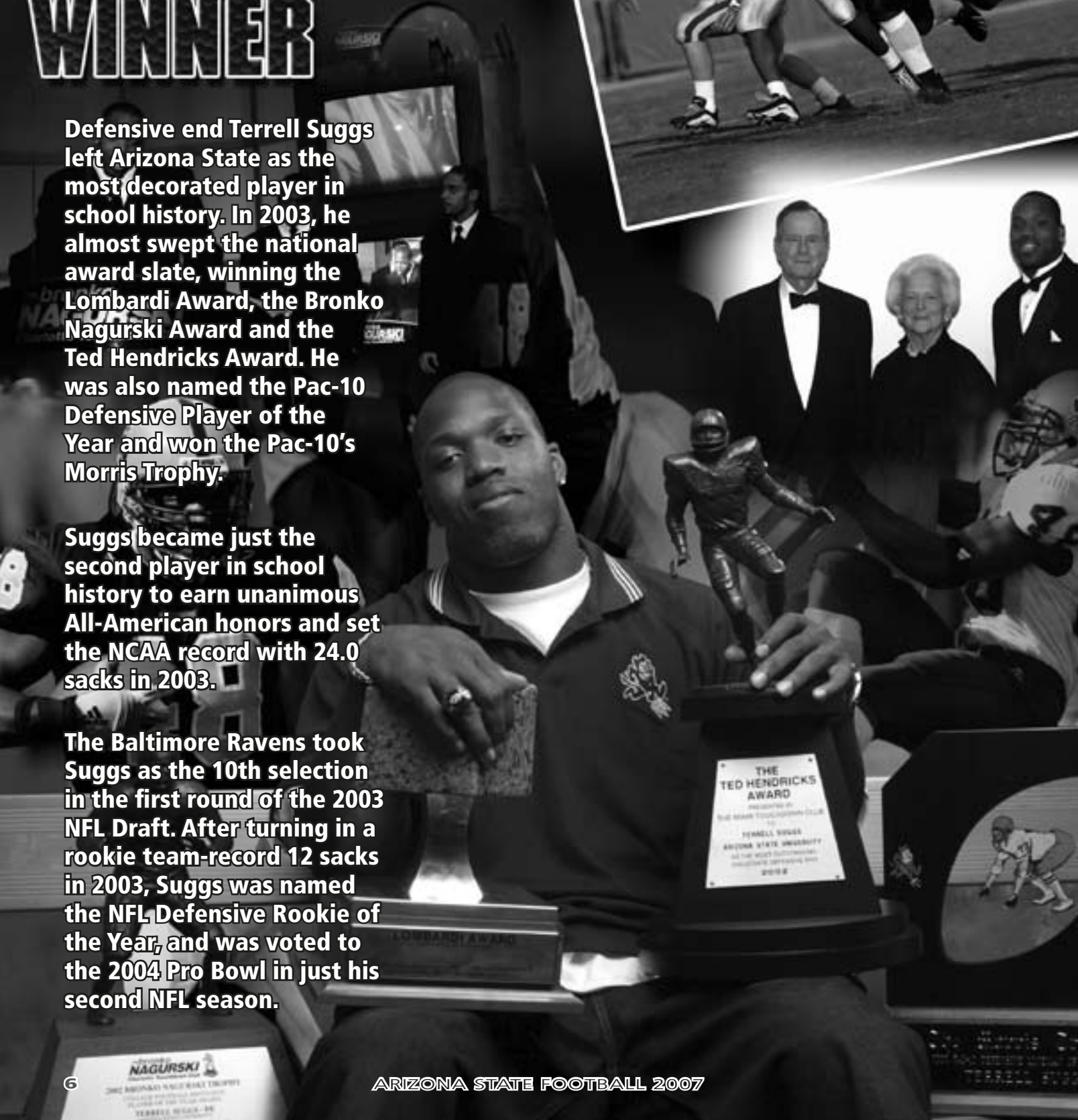


TERRELL SUGGS NATIONAL AWARD WINNER

Defensive end Terrell Suggs left Arizona State as the most decorated player in school history. In 2003, he almost swept the national award slate, winning the Lombardi Award, the Bronko Nagurski Award and the Ted Hendricks Award. He was also named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year and won the Pac-10's Morris Trophy.

Suggs became just the second player in school history to earn unanimous All-American honors and set the NCAA record with 24.0 sacks in 2003.

The Baltimore Ravens took Suggs as the 10th selection in the first round of the 2003 NFL Draft. After turning in a rookie team-record 12 sacks in 2003, Suggs was named the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, and was voted to the 2004 Pro Bowl in just his second NFL season.

In Honor of Pat Tillman (1976-2004)

Cpl. Pat Tillman was killed in the line of duty in April of 2004 in Afghanistan. The 1997 Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year and a three-time all-league honoree, Tillman played linebacker at ASU from 1994-97. After a successful five-year NFL career with the Arizona Cardinals, Tillman and his brother, Kevin, a former ASU baseball player, enlisted in the U.S. Army and became members of the elite U.S. Rangers unit.

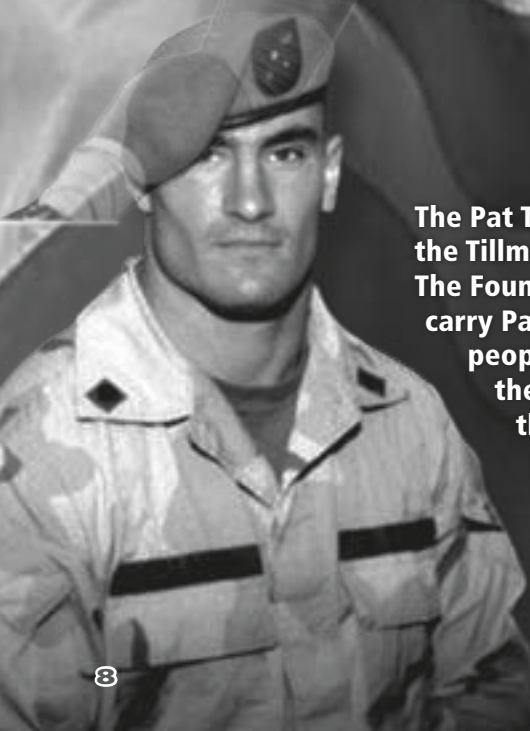


An Academic All-American and three-time Pac-10 All-Academic selection, Tillman graduated summa cum laude from Arizona State University's W.P. Carey School of Business with a B.S. in marketing on Dec. 19, 1997.

Tillman's No. 42 jersey was retired at halftime of the Washington State game in 2004 and Pat Tillman Sr. visited the locker room after the game.

In 2006, Tillman was posthumously awarded the Distinguished American Award by the National Football Foundation and the College Football Hall of Fame.

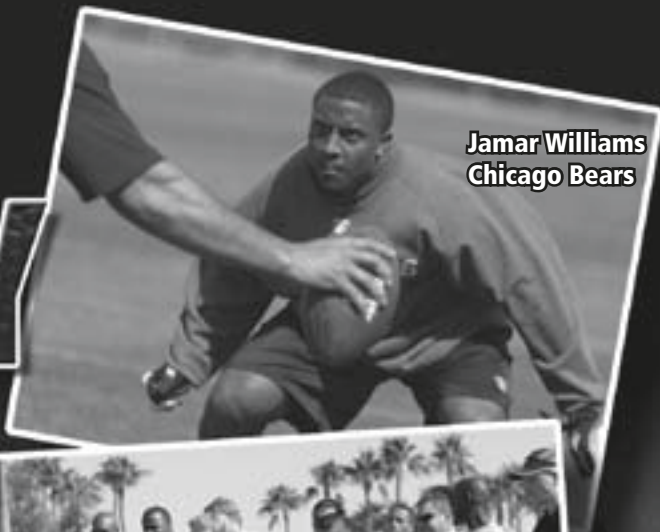

Arizona State has had 25 players drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft, the third-highest total in Pac-10 history.



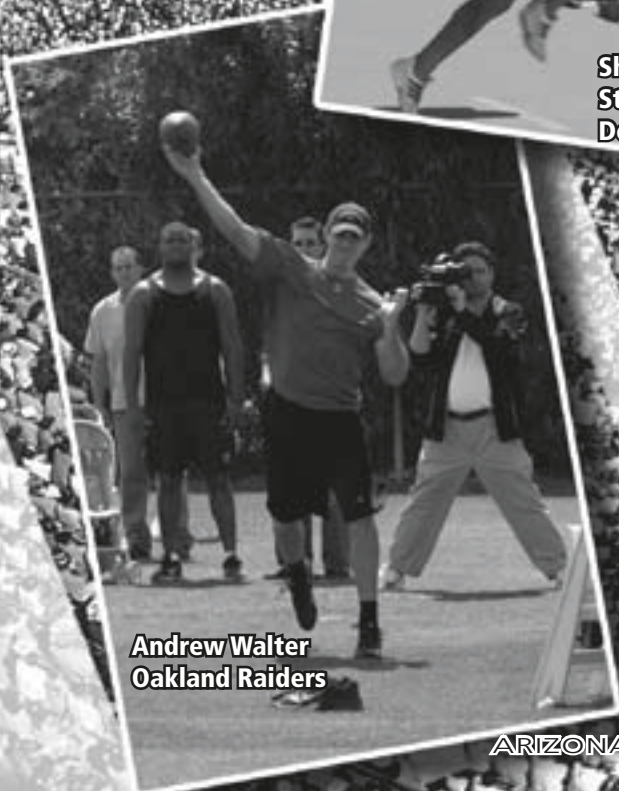

ACADEMICS AND LIFE SKILLS AT ASU



Former Sun Devil Grayling Love was a finalist for the 2005 Draddy Award, which is often referred to as the "Academic Heisman." 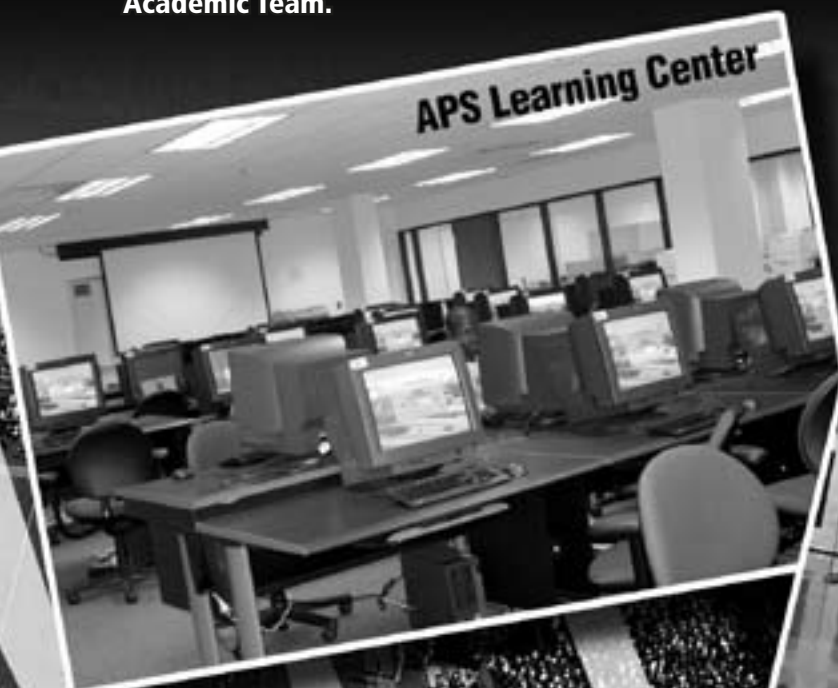
ASU's graduation rate in 2006 was the second highest in the Pac-10 Conference.

Nearly 50 Sun Devil football players have graduated in the last five years. In fact, eight players on this year's squad have already earned their degree and will be taking graduate level courses in the fall.



Over the last six years, Arizona State's football team is third in the Pacific-10 Conference in the number of players who have made the league's All-Academic Team.

ASU was the first school in the nation to honor its student-athletes for academic performance with patches on the players' jerseys. Last year, 24 student-athletes were named "Scholar Ballers" for turning in GPA's of 3.0 or higher.



Arizona State has some of the finest academic facilities in the country with numerous study and tutoring rooms on the second floor of the Carson Center. The APS Learning Center features 44 computers for student athletes to use, and the Norris Quiet Study, provides space for intense study in a library-like setting.

In addition to being a student and athlete, Sun Devils also engage in several hours of community outreach each semester. Past projects have included community clean-up days, book and food drives, speaking at schools, and volunteering at the MS Walk on the Wild Side in 2002 and 2003.

Boyd works closely with the football program, helping football student-athletes develop critical academic and life skills, in addition to overseeing the academic and life skill development of all student-athletes.

Boyd spent the previous two years as the Manager of Football Academic Development. Boyd was also the manager of ASU's Champs/Life Skills program for two years, an NCAA-sanctioned program that focuses on the holistic growth and development of student-athletes including community service, career and personal development. He started working in the ASU athletic department in the fall of 1995 as an intern and has worked in various capacities in his tenure at Arizona State.

Boyd earned his bachelor's degree in history from Arizona State in 1994. He played safety on the Sun Devil football team during the 1991-93 seasons and spent time with the New England Patriots of the NFL and the London Monarchs

of NFL Europe. He earned his master's degree from ASU in 1998 in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies, focusing on Higher Education Administration.

The Student Athlete Development office focuses first on transition into the university and building a strong academic foundation while instilling critical life skills.

COMPONENTS OF ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT:

First Year Experience (FYE): Directed by Brian Richardson – Assistant Director, OSAD.

- Assessment of individual academic profile and needs
- Freshman Student-Athlete Orientation
- UNI 194 – Student-Athlete Success Course (time management, decision making, etc.)
- Football Learning Center-Structured Study (minimum requirement of 8 hours per week):
 - Discipline, accountability, study skills
 - Academic Mentoring for student-athletes who require more structure
 - Individual and Group subject tutoring for all student-athletes as needed

Academic Coaching: Football Academic Coaching/Development team consists of Jean Boyd (Head Football Academic Coach), Corinne Corte (Football Academic Coach and Learning Specialist) Brady Rourke (Football Academic Coach) and Sabrina Thomas (Football Academic Coach). These individuals:

- Monitor progress towards graduation
- Provide structure and accountability with all first-year and returning “at-risk” football student-athletes (communicate with instructors and coaches)
- Instill Scholar Baller Paradigm
- Coordinate football learning center
- Serve as liaison to campus faculty and staff
- Assist with course selection and adherence to NCAA, Pac-10 and ASU academic eligibility rules. Additionally, at least one member of the football academic staff travels on every road trip to ensure that the academic needs of football student-athletes are met even while traveling.

Degree Completion Opportunities

- Summer School Enrichment program
- Scholarship student-athletes take up to 12 hours in summer to move ahead toward degree completion.
- Post-Eligibility Aid: For student-athletes who have completed their eligibility but have not yet graduated
- NCAA Degree Completion Program: NCAA stipend that allows student-athletes whose eligibility and financial aid have expired. Recent graduates through this program include Paul Justin, Shaun McDonald, and Nijrell Eason, and current enrollees include Abrey Battle (Arizona Rattlers), Terrell Suggs (Baltimore Ravens), and Jason Simmons (Houston Texans).

THE SCHOLAR BALLER PARADIGM

At Arizona State University, our football student-athletes are being challenged to tap into the same competitive fire that makes them great athletes, in their endeavors as students through the Scholar Baller concept.

In the urban vernacular, a “baller” is an individual who excels in a given activity. Within the ASU football culture, the term “Scholar Baller” refers to someone who competes at a high level and is successful in the classroom with a 3.0 GPA or above. Scholar Baller is a national “movement” that was first implemented at ASU and has spread

to over 25 university institutions, and has been highlighted on ASU uniforms through ESPN the Magazine, ESPN, The Athletic Business Journal, etc. The Scholar Baller paradigm teaches that performing well in school and earning a bachelor’s degree are victories that last a lifetime.

Student-athletes are challenged to be Scholar Ballers (earn a 3.0 or above in the classroom) and are rewarded for their academic success in some of the following ways:

- Scholar Baller Awards at Camp Tontozona each year (T-shirts, backpacks, etc.) recognizing 3.0 and above student-athletes;
- Scholar Baller Dinner;
- A patch on the front of each Scholar Baller’s game jersey (ASU is the first Division I school in the country to acknowledge football student-athlete academic success on its jerseys).

This cutting edge concept continues to produce significant results in football academic achievement!

- 8 Sun Devil football players will participate during the 2007 season as college graduates
- Since 2001, an average of 40 football student-athletes each year have been acknowledged as Scholar Ballers (3.0 fall / spring or cum gpa).
- The Sun Devils reported a 68 percent graduation rate in 2006, 2nd in the Pac-10 conference.
- ASU is third in the Pac-10 Conference over the past 6 years for most Academic All Pac 10 selections
- There has been a substantial increase in freshman and team GPAs over the last five years.
- Only 2 out of the approximately 120 football student-athletes entering ASU over the past 6 years have been declared academically ineligible.

While winning on the football field is most closely scrutinized and is absolutely necessary to be successful as a Pac-10 Conference, Division I football program, preparing young men for life is just as important in the broader scheme of society. Promoting the Scholar Baller image does just that; prepares ASU football student-athletes for the greatest competition of all: LIFE!

Foundations of Success

Former Sun Devils returning for unfinished business

One of the trademarks of the Sun Devil football program is the emphasis it puts on education. This continues even after a student-athlete leaves the program. Three former Sun Devils who have come back to school to fulfill their goal of getting a degree are Paul Justin (QB, 1987-90), Shaun McDonald (WR, 2000-02) and Terrell Suggs (DE, 2000-02).

Justin, who played for three different teams during a seven-year NFL career, returned in 2005, 15 years after he left ASU, to take the final three classes he needed to earn his degree in Interdisciplinary Studies.



While completing his degree, Justin also did an internship with ASU's Sports Performance coaching staff.

McDonald, who is No. 3 on ASU's all-time list

with 2,867 yards receiving, needed one more semester of classes when he left ASU after being drafted by the St. Louis Rams in the fourth round of the 2003 NFL Draft. Currently a member of the Detroit Lions, McDonald said that getting his degree is important because he has to be ready for life after football.

"I'm not financially set right now. It'd help to be, but everything doesn't really work out like that in the league," McDonald said. "You've got to be ready to go out into the real world."

Suggs, who left ASU with one year of eligibility remaining, was drafted by the Baltimore Ravens with



the 10th overall pick of the 2003 NFL Draft. Despite signing a multi-million dollar contract with the Ravens, Suggs said it was important to return to school to fulfill a promise he made to his parents that he'd get that degree. Suggs said that one of the important keys to his success in the classroom, both when he played for ASU and now, was the assistance of ASU's academic support staff, particularly academic coach Corrine Corte.

"If it wasn't for Corinne, I wouldn't know how to write my first paper," Suggs said. "Some kids need more attention in school than others and she gave me the extra attention and made sure I got it."

Suggs is hoping to graduate within the next year.



Lamar Baker: "Arizona State made me realize the importance of education"

Student-athletes who study and compete at Arizona State are guided by one of the top academic support staffs in the country. It is a team that emphasizes that the victories in the classroom matter just as much as those on the field. One recent Sun Devil who was aided by this philosophy is Lamar Baker.

Baker came from a large family and was raised in what he calls a "tough, low-income neighborhood" where the odds of going to college are "not great". After a successful high school career at Agua Fria, where he was listed as the No. 39 recruit in the nation, Baker went on to continue his football career at Arizona State as a linebacker and safety. According to Baker, it was virtually unheard of for a man from his neighborhood to get a scholarship or even go to college. He was the first in his family to go on and receive a higher education.

"What I believe I overcame the most was doubt," Baker recalled. "People did not think I was going to go to college; they did not think I was going to get my degree; they did not think I was going to continue and get my master's. All this did was motivate me to prove them wrong. It was a challenge to myself."

While at ASU, Baker was able to get the resources he needed to excel in academics. The program provided him with tutors, peer labs, and all the help he needed to be able to succeed as the "student" part of student-athlete. Not only did Baker graduate in three and a half years with a B.I.S. degree in education and sociology, he also went on to get his masters in secondary education in 2006. Baker owned both degrees within a five-year span. He is currently teaching and coaching at his alma mater, Agua Fria High School.

"Arizona State made me realize the importance of education," Baker said. "The football program taught me that we were there to be students first, then athletes. Now as a teacher and coach, I want to try to reach out to other kids and show them that there's more to life than football. I want to convince these kids to go to college and be the best they can be."

Arizona State's Sports Medicine Department strives to provide student-athletes with the highest quality medical health care possible throughout their collegiate careers.

Since the success of ASU's teams depends on the well-being of its student-athletes, ASU's sports medicine department is dedicated to the care, prevention and rehabilitation of injuries. Located on the lower level of the Carson Student-Athlete Center in a state-of-the-art training room, the sports medicine department is staffed by eight full-time athletic trainers and 10 graduate assistants. All of Arizona State's athletic trainers are certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association and licensed by the state of Arizona. In addition to the main athletic training room in the Carson Center, the sports medicine department operates six other training rooms throughout all of ASU's athletic facilities to accommodate its student-athletes' schedules and needs.

Arizona State employs two full time and three part time team physicians who provide comprehensive medical care to our student athletes. The newly remodeled team physician's office is located across the hall from the athletic training room. The ASU Sports Medicine Department is also home to an accredited primary care sports medicine fellowship that provides exceptional graduate medical education to team physicians in training.

In addition, the sports medicine department relies on a group of 40 local physicians who serve on the Sports Medicine Advisory Team. This team features doctors who specialize in areas such as optometry, cardiology and various orthopedic sub-specialties. They act as consultants to the team physicians providing efficient first-class medical care for any medical or orthopedic problem encountered by the student-athletes. Dr. P. Dean Cummings who is a fellowship trained sports medicine specialist serves as the chief orthopedic consultant/team physician who provides the majority of the orthopedic care required by our teams.

From the time that a student-athlete begins his career at ASU, the sports medicine department is actively involved in ensuring his success on the playing field. That process begins with a thorough physical exam prior to their participation in any activity. The sports medicine staff strives to be proactive in any health or medical issues student-athletes have when they arrive.

A major emphasis of the sports medicine department is on the prevention of injuries such as taping, protective equipment, preventive exercises, flexibility training and other activities that can help keep student-athletes healthy. Preventive measures are constantly being studied by ASU's sports medicine department.

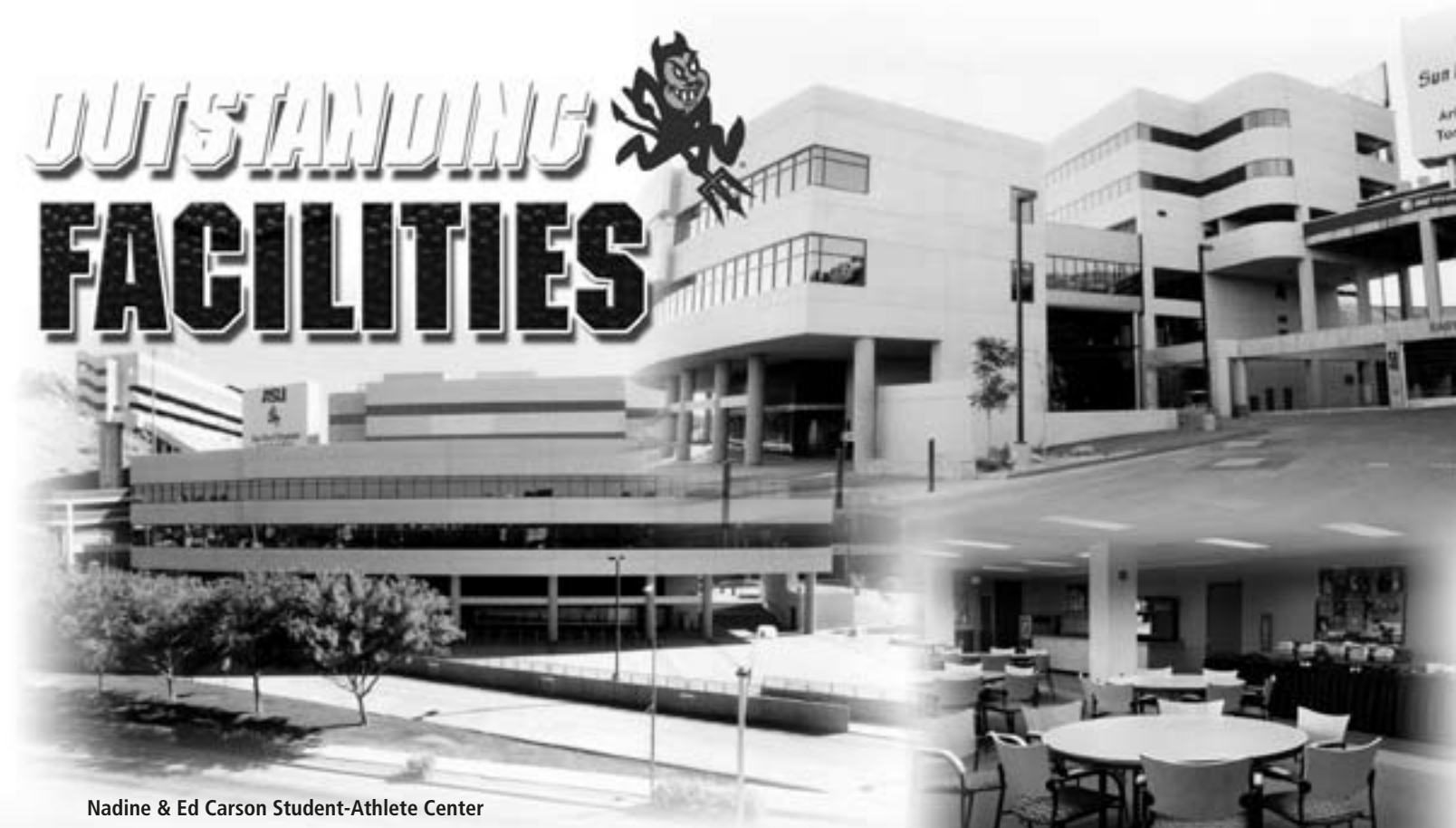

Student-athletes and coaches can also watch game film in every meeting room through a closed intranet set system.

Under the direction of 2002 National Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year Joe Kenn, the mission of Arizona State's Sports Performance program is to produce a successful training regimen that will significantly improve both the mental and physical demands of athletic performance. We do this by developing an Athletic Based Training program. We are developing football players; not "lifters." ASU's Athletic Based Training program is geared toward developing the football player by utilizing complex and athletic-related movements for improving athleticism.

Components of the Athletic-Based Strength Training Program:

- closed chain/ground-based movements
- multiple joint actions
- hip extension
- multiple planes of movement
- single limb development
- variety of exercises
- tempo

Components of an Athletic-Based Running Program:

- Flexibility
- Plyometric Training
- Speed Development
- Agility
- Interval Training
- Metabolic Conditioning
- Pattern Running

EVALUATION

Each student-athlete will be evaluated in numerous performance indicators throughout the annual plan. These results will allow us to determine the strengths and weaknesses of each student-athlete and help to establish individualized blitz programs. Each student-athlete will be evaluated a minimum of two to four times per year and individual and team progress will help us refine and improve the program on a regular basis. Athletes' initial assessments include Gray Cook's Functional Movement Screen and the Max Jones Quadrathlon.



INJURED STUDENT-ATHLETES

It's important that an injured student-athlete understand that he may have an injured body part, but he does not have an injured body. Research has found that by training an uninjured limb, there will be a carryover effect when you are able to train the injured limb and that it helps to decrease recovery time. With the direction of our team physicians and sports medicine staff, we will develop a sound reconditioning program to get our athletes back on the field in the shortest time possible.

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

The importance of proper nutrition and its carryover to improved athletic performance cannot be emphasized enough. As a member of the sports medicine staff, team nutritionist Karla Wright provides a nutrition program that supports the goals of the ASU football team as a whole in addition to tailoring plans suited for individual dietary needs. Wright works closely with the food services staff to make sure nutritious foods are offered that are in line with the team's performance goals. At training table, foods are labeled to assist any athlete with making the best choices. Wright is also available for questions during training table meals.



The state-of-the-art Nap and Barbara Lawrence Strength and Conditioning Center features 16,000 square feet of weight equipment, cardio machines and a 40-yard track in addition to a nutrition area. It includes \$650,000 in equipment, including 20 POWER LIFT multi-purpose station units, 32 pieces of HAMMER STRENGTH, and 10 pieces of training equipment from ELITE FITNESS SYSTEMS.

Sports Performance Senior Assistant Coach

Ben Hilgart was named Sports Performance Senior Assistant Coach in November 2006 after spending a little more than a year as an assistant coach in the ASU Sports Performance program. In his role, Hilgart serves as the lead assistant to Head Sports Performance Coach Joe Kenn in the physical development of the football team. In addition to his football duties, Hilgart also serves as the lead Sports Performance Coach for the men's and women's track and field and cross country programs and wrestling team.

Prior to arriving in Tempe, Hilgart was at Ohio State University for two seasons where he was eventually promoted to associate strength and conditioning coach after originally starting as an assistant coach when he began in 2003.

In 2001-03, Hilgart served as the graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of Texas at El Paso. Hilgart's other coaching positions have included head strength and conditioning coach and Assistant Defensive Line Coach Western Illinois (2001) and head strength and conditioning coach at Deer Valley High School in Glendale, Ariz., (2000-01).

Hilgart earned a Bachelors of Science degree in Physical Education from Western Illinois University (2000), where he was two-time letterwinner as a member of the football team. He would go on to earn his Masters of Science degree in Kinesiology from the University of Texas El Paso in 2003.

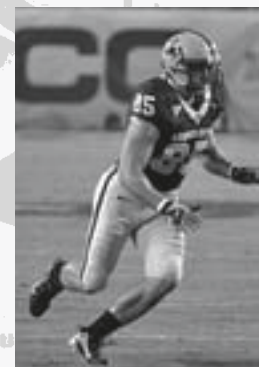
Hard Hat Players

The Sun Devil Hard Hat Program was created to reward those individuals who do what's right even when no one's looking. We want our teams to be known for their tremendous work ethic on and off the field. A Hard Hat Player is someone who is self-motivated, a competitor, committed to personal and team excellence, dependable, accountable, disciplined, and most importantly, puts the team first. To become a Hard Hat Player, an athlete has to achieve a certain point total during our Winter Developmental Program. An athlete earns points based on a championship effort for strength training, speed development and conditioning sessions. They are also awarded points for competitive events and performing extra workouts in our Blitz Package Program. An athlete could lose points for having unexcused absences from workouts. Each athlete is evaluated after every workout by the Sports Performance staff with input from an athlete's position coach when applicable.

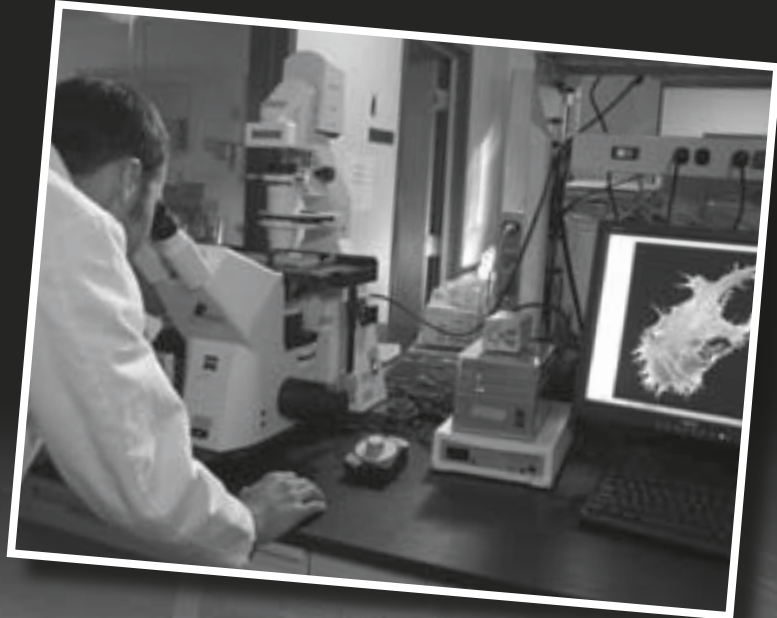

With a record 188 National Merit Scholars in this year's freshman class, ASU ranks third among public universities and eighth among all schools.



The Barrett Honors College is recognized as one of the nation's best. Its 2006-2007 freshmen class had an average SAT score of 1340, an ACT score of 30 and 188 National Merit Scholars. Almost 100 percent of students in the college who apply to medical and law school are accepted. The college was named one of the nation's top honors colleges in Reader's Digest's 100 Best Issue in 2006.

Concerts and block parties are just part of the bustling nightlife of Mill Avenue, a restaurant district that is the center of activity in downtown Tempe.

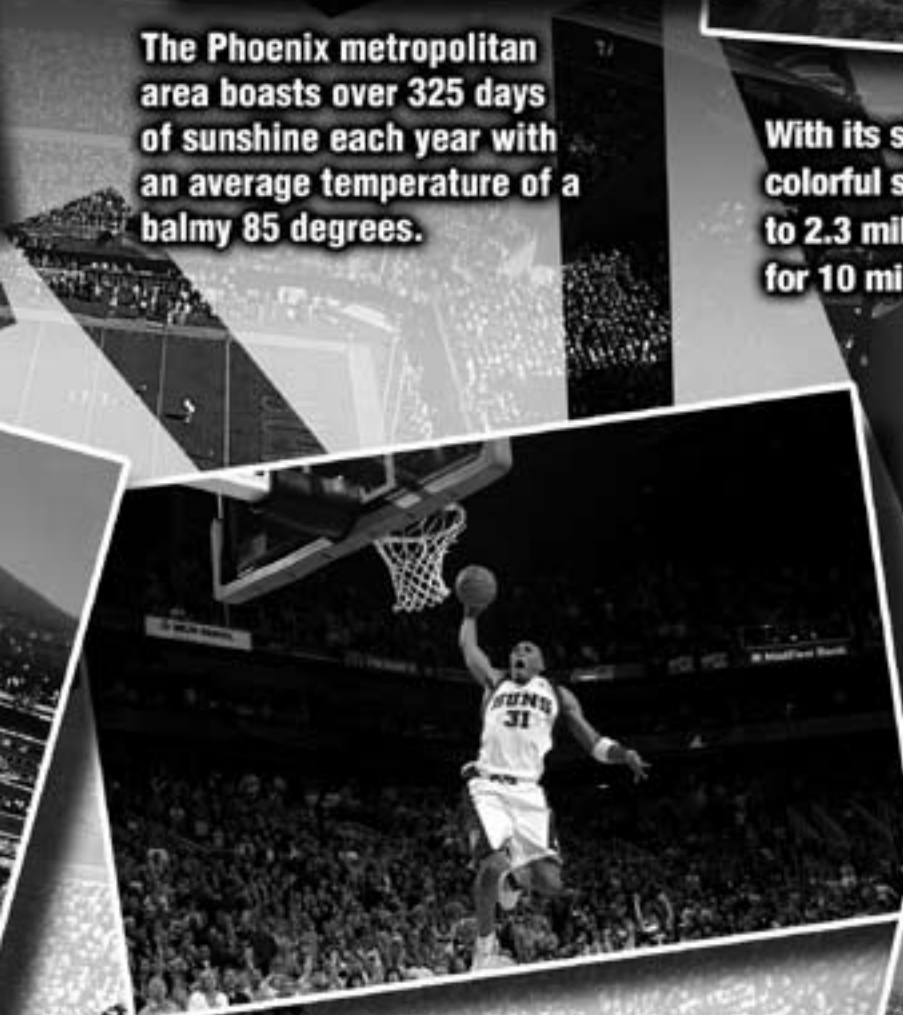




The Phoenix metropolitan area boasts over 325 days of sunshine each year with an average temperature of a balmy 85 degrees.

Sun Devil Success

Arizona State finished 10th in final 2006-07 Directors' Cup standings. The Directors' Cup is presented annually to the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country.



In 2006-07 the ASU women's track and field team became only the third women's program ever to sweep the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships in the same season.



Led by the Pac-10 Coach (Pat Murphy) and Player of the Year (Brett Wallace), the ASU baseball team returned to the College World Series for the second time in three seasons and finished No. 5 in the country.



The ASU women's basketball team set the single-season school record for wins (31) and advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history.



For the first time in program history the Sun Devil softball team made consecutive trips to the Women's College World Series and finished No. 7 in the country.

The weekly Dennis Erickson press conferences will be held on Monday (12 noon) of game weeks in the Dutson Theater at The Carson Student-Athlete Center (third floor) on ASU's campus.

Practices and Interviews

Contact the media relations office for the most up-to-date practice schedule. Electronic media and still photographers wishing to shoot practice may do so for the first 30 minutes of each practice. **TEAM DRILLS MAY NOT BE PHOTOGRAPHED AT ANY TIME.** ASU head coach Dennis Erickson asks that all interview requests with coaches and student-athletes be channeled through the media relations office for the convenience of all.

All interviews at practice will be held after workouts. Coach Erickson will be available for interviews after the Tuesday and Wednesday practices. Also, assistant coaches will be available for interviews after practices on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. No interviews will be conducted on Fridays.

Sun Devil Stadium Press Box

In its 15th season of use, the Sun Devil Stadium press box is one of the premier press facilities in the nation. The fully air-conditioned box is located atop the upper deck of the west side of the stadium. The press box is one level, with the exception of an open photography deck on the roof. The main writer's area is located at midfield and to the right of the elevator. Booth space flanks the large central working area. A separate eating area is to the right of the elevator, directly behind the working press area. Rest rooms are to the left of the elevator. Direct-dial telephones are located at approximately every other seat.

Will Call

"Will Call" for Sun Devil home football games is located at the south end zone ticket office. It opens an hour and a half before kickoff.

Press Box Services

Olson Statistical Services will again provide all statistical information in the Sun Devil Stadium press box. The play-by-play account, halftime statistics, final statistics, game notes and coaches' quotes will be distributed. Also, a play-by-play account of down and distance will be provided verbally over the press box public address system and over a hard line for radio and television. Scores of other games are also available.

Wireless Internet service is available in the main press box.

Snacks and soft drinks and a meal are available to media members beginning an hour and a half before kickoff.

Photographers

Sideline access is restricted to working photographers from media outlets according to NCAA rules. On game day, photographers must show their credential to the attendant at the southwest end zone in order to secure a second credential. Both credentials must be worn for sideline access.

Postgame Interviews

The Dutson Theater (located on the third floor of the Carson Center) is utilized for post-game interviews for ASU players and coaches. Head coach Dennis Erickson and requested student-athletes will be available to the media following a brief "cooling off" period. ASU's locker room is closed.

Those desiring interviews with the opposing coach and players should proceed to the north end of Sun Devil Stadium to the visitor's locker room.

Press Access

The press gate is located at the southwest corner of Sun Devil Stadium. The elevator to the press box is situated on the west side of the stadium at the main concourse level.

Telephones


Approximately 15 telephones are available to the media in the seating area of the press box. All telephones are for credit card or collect calls only. In addition, three pay telephones are located in the rear of the press box for private telephone calls. To install telephones in the Sun Devil Stadium press box, contact Qwest at 1-800-603-6000. Radio stations installing phones for broadcasts should specify the usage by indicating the need for a radio loop for broadcasting and should use Doug Tammaro's name as the contact.

2007-08 Pac-10 Bowl Game Arrangements/Selection Procedures

The Pacific-10 Conference has agreements with six bowl partners. The lineup is led by the Rose Bowl, which is the destination for the Pac-10 champion, unless said champion is ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final Bowl Championship Series rankings. If that were the case, the Pac-10 champion would play in the BCS National Championship Game which this year will be played in New Orleans following the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Regardless of the disposition of the Pac-10 champion, a second Pac-10 team may be selected for an at-large berth in the Bowl Championship Series in any given year and other Pac-10 bowl partner arrangements provide for that occurrence.

In addition to the Rose Bowl, Pac-10 bowl partners include the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl, Brut Sun Bowl, Emerald Bowl, Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl, and Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. Following is a summary of the Pac-10 bowl arrangements for the 2007-08 season:

Don't Be Sidelined: Ask Before You Act

As an athletic representative of Arizona State University, you, too, must abide by all NCAA rules and regulations, as Arizona State University is held responsible for all actions related to its prospective student-athletes and/or enrolled student-athletes.

We thank you for your continued support in our effort to succeed both academically and athletically. While this information does not contain all the applicable NCAA rules and regulations, it should serve as a guide. Remember to always ask before you act, as your action may jeopardize the eligibility of a prospective or enrolled student-athlete.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR REPRESENTATIVES OF ASU ATHLETICS INTEREST REGARDING NCAA RULES & REGULATIONS

You are a Representative of ASU Athletics Interest if you have:

- participated in or are a member of an organization promoting ASU athletics' program;
- contributed to the athletics department or any of its booster clubs;
- assisted or have been requested by the athletics staff to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes;
- assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families; or
- been involved in otherwise promoting the ASU athletics program.

***ONCE AN INDIVIDUAL IS IDENTIFIED AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE INSTITUTION'S ATHLETICS INTEREST, THE PERSON RETAINS THAT IDENTITY INDEFINITELY.**

Prospective Student-Athlete is one who:

- has started ninth grade;
- is enrolled in a two-year college;
- has officially withdrawn from a four-year college; or
- has not started ninth grade but has received financial assistance from the institution.



Representatives of ASU Athletics Interest MAY NOT:

- get involved in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes (i.e., telephone or write them or their parents, legal guardian(s) or relatives);
- provide extra benefits (i.e., discounts, gifts, transportation) to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends; and
- provide any financial assistance to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends.

Representatives of ASU Athletics Interest MAY:

- send newspaper clippings and other information about prospective student-athletes to coaches;
- continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors that have prospective student-athlete aged children;
- offer summer employment to prospective student-athletes who have signed a National Letter of Intent and to enrolled student-athletes after contacting the Office of Compliance; and
- offer an occasional meal on a special occasion to a student-athlete or team at your home with prior approval from the Head Coach and Office of Compliance.
