NATIONAL RANKINGS

Arizona State (31-3) is ranked in all four national polls and is the No. 1 team in the nation by Sports Weekly/ ESPN and Collegiate Baseball. ASU is also No. 3 in the Baseball America. The **Sun Devils** have now been ranked in the national polls for <u>66</u> consecutive polls. The last time ASU was No. 1 was heading into the CWS in 1993. Stanford (14-7) is ranked as high as No. 6 in the nation by USA Today and No. 7 by Baseball America.

All three games vs. Stanford will be broadcast live on the Sun Devil Sports Network on NBC 1190 AM. Longtime ASU Baseball PA announcer and the current courtside voice of the Arizona Diamondbacks and Phoenix Suns, Jeff Munn, will fill in this weekend with Bob Eger to call all the action from the Packard Stadium press box. Saturday's and Sunday's games will also be broadcast live on KAZ-TV with George Allen and Doug Gerlach handling the playby-play duties. THE STORYLINE

Two of the nation's premier college baseball programs will square off this weekend in a three-game series to open the 2003 Pac-10 season. Stanford (14-7) and Arizona State (31-3) are both ranked in the top 10 in each of the four national polls. The all-time series between the schools is also tied at 76-76. The Sun Devils lead the Pac-10 in nearly every offensive category, featuring the league's top two hitters in Jeff Larish (.420-11-58) and Dustin Pedroia (.433-2-26). ASU has also been stellar on the mound with a staff ERA of 3.06.

Ouick Hits:

- The 31-3 start is the best by an ASU squad, surpassing the old record of 23-1 set in 1972.
- Head Coach Pat Murphy recorded his 700th career victory with Sunday's 14-8 win over Notre Dame (2/23).
- ASU had its 19-game win streak snapped Friday vs. Oklahoma, but have won 22 of its last 24 games.
- ASU has scored 10 or more runs in 19 games this year, including a string of 12 of its last 16 games.
- The offense leads the Pac-10 in hitting at .355 with three players hitting over .400 and all but one regular over .300.
- ASU has scored in a NCAA record 467 consecutive games dating back to April 7, 1995. The old NCAA record was 349.
- ASU's roster consists of 18 upper classmen (juniors and seniors) and 18 lower classmen (freshman and sophomores). ASU has outscored its opponent 362-123 this year with its biggest scoring inning coming with 59 runs in the fifth inning.
- The Devils have recorded 86 big innings (2 or more runs) this year, including 21 innings of five or more runs.
- The Jan. 16 season-opener was the second earliest start in ASU history and was the first collegiate game in 2003.
- ASU will play 40 of its 62 games in 2003 in the state of Arizona, including 37 at Packard Stadium.
- The No. 1 national ranking marks the first time ASU has been No. 1 since entering the 1993 College World Series.
- ASU is averaging 10.64 runs, 12.44 hits, 4.26 extra base hits and 6.38 walks per game this year.
- The starting pitching staff is a combined 17-1 with a 2.72 ERA. Overall the pitchers have a 3.06 ERA in 294.0 IP.
- The bullpen has been impressive going 14-2 with six saves and a 3.41 ERA. The bullpen has a 0.91 ERA in the last 9 games.
- ASU has won 24 of its last 26 games at Packard Stadium dating back to the end of the 2001 season. (808-230-1 overall)
- Sophomore SS Dustin Pedroia leads the Pac-10 with 61 hits, including 22 multi-hit games and 21 doubles.
- Junior closer Ryan Schroyer is 3-0 with six saves and a 0.00 ERA in 14 games. He has struck out 24 in 17.1 IP.
- Jeff Larish already has 58 RBI (1.87 per game) and 43 walks (1.39 per game) this year. He had 9 RBI vs. SDSU (1/26).
- Larish has recorded a hit in 26 of 31 games (.420 Avg.), but has sat out three games last weekend with back spasms.
- ASU has 40 home runs by 12 different players this year. ASU had only 38 total home runs in 58 games in 2002. Of the 40 HR, eight are grand slams, with three by Jeff Larish (ties school record). ASU had only one GS all of last year.
- Freshmen Travis Buck and Ryan Bosch, both starters in the outfield, are rated among the top 50 freshman by Baseball America.

Consecutive Games Scoring Streak Reaches 467:

The Arizona State baseball program has now scored in an NCAA record 467 consecutive games dating back to the 1995 season. The Devils made history on April 7, 2001 when they scored at least one run in their 350th consecutive game. The Devils broke the 12-year-old NCAA record in a 5-1 loss to USC exactly six years to the day when they were last shut out. ASU was shut out 9-0 in that game on April 7, 1995 at Dedeaux Field. The one run scored in the 3-1 loss to Stanford (4/12/02) marked only the 13th time during the streak that ASU has scored only one run. Coastal Carolina previously held the NCAA record at 349 games set from 1983-1989. ASU also had a stretch of 278



games without being shut out from 1990 to 1994, meaning the program has only been shutout in three games dating back to the 1990 season. ASU is a combined 310-156-1 during the streak. Notable pitchers the Devils have faced during the streak include Jeremy Guthrie (Stanford), Barry Zito (USC), Kirk Saarloos (CS Fullerton), Jason Young (Stanford), Ben Diggins (Arizona), Adam Johnson (CS Fullerton), Ryan Drese (Cal), Jeff Weaver (Fresno State), Chad Hutchinson (Stanford), Abe Alvarez and Adam Pettyjohn (Fresno State).

Sun Devils Remain No. 1 in National Polls:


Already past the midway point in the 2003 season with a blistering 31-3 record and winners of 22 of its last 24 games, the Arizona State Sun Devils remained No. 1 in the Collegiate Baseball and Sports Weekly/ESPN national polls this week. ASU received 995 votes and 21 first-place votes in the poll to retain the No. I position in the coaches poll after going 2-1 vs. Oklahoma. Baseball America and NCBWA rank ASU No. 3. ASU was last ranked No. I heading into the 1993 College World Series. ASU has been ranked for 65 consecutive national polls dating back to the start of the 2000 season. The Sun Devils entered the 2003 season ranked as high as No. 8 in the nation by Baseball America in the preseason collegiate polls. Arizona State also earned a preseason No. 9 ranking by Sports Weekly/ESPN, No .10 by NCBWA and No. 12 ranking by Collegiate Baseball. The No. 8 preseason ranking is the highest by an ASU squad since opening the 2001 season as the consensus No. 6 team in the nation.

Scouting Stanford:

Stanford (14-7, 0-0) returns to the field for the first time after taking 12 days off for final exams ... The Cardinal ended its pre-break schedule on a five-game win streak and has won 11 of its last 13 games overall ... The Cardinal has also won four straight series versus Fresno State (sweep), Texas (2-of-3), USC (2-of-3) and California (sweep) after dropping back-to-back series versus Cal State Fullerton (sweep) and Florida State (2-of-3) ... Stanford is ranked No. 7 in the latest *Baseball America* poll ... Stanford is also among the nation's top seven teams in each of the other three major collegiate baseball polls (No. 6 Sports Weekly/ESPN; No. 7 NCBWA; No. 7 Collegiate Baseball) ... Stanford has raised its team batting average to .314 (#3 Pac-10) by reaching double figures in hits in each of its last five games ... Stanford has also posted a 3.96 ERA (#3 Pac-10) and has a .968 fielding percentage (#4 Pac-10) through its first 21 contests ... The Stanford pitching staff has held its opponents to a Pac-10 low .235 batting average and 103 runs (tied for the least in the Pac-10, while recording nine saves... Stanford is looking to extend its school record of consecutive appearances at the College World Series to five.

Last Year vs. Stanford:

Stanford took two of three from the Sun Devils at Sunken Diamond last year (5/10-12) to even the all-time series at 76-76. The Cardinal won both games by two runs, with future first-round draft choice Jeremy Guthrie leading Stanford to a 5-3 win in the series opener. ASU rebounded with a 10-2 in Saturday's game, but then fell 3-1 in the finale. Senior infielder Sergio Garcia went 3-for-5 with a solo home run to preserve ASU's NCAA consecutive games scoring streak. Jeff Larish also had a solid series hitting .417 (5-for-12) with a triple and home run.

Last Time vs. Stanford at Packard Stadium:

The Sun Devils hosted Stanford in back-to-back years in 2000 and 2001 at Packard Stadium. ASU won the Pac-10 series against the Cardinal en route to the Pac-10 Championship in 2000 by taking two of three in 2000. Stanford won the opener 5-1, before ASU took the next two against the No. 2 Cardinal 10-6 and 11-6. Stanford returned the favor in 2001 winning two of three while ranked No. 1 in the country. They won the first two games of the series (6-2, 5-2) before ASU picked up the finale (6-5).

Home Run Notes:

Through 34 games of the 2003 season the Sun Devils have already surpassed their entire season total from 2002 with 40 home runs. ASU has hit 28 of those home runs at Packard Stadium and 12 in its 12 road or neutral site games. Of the 22 games played at Packard Stadium the Devils have hit at least one home run in 15 games. A total of 12 different players have hit at least one home run (Mike Guerrero added to list vs. Penn State) and seven players have two or more home runs. Sophomore Jeff Larish leads the way with 11 round-trippers, including three grand slams. The Devils have homered in 22 of their 34 games, including 12 multi-home run games. The Devils also have eight grand slams on the season with Larish (3), Steve Garrabrants (2), Jeremy West and freshmen Ryan Bosch and Travis Buck all leaving the yard with the bases loaded. ASU had only one grand slam in 2002 and four in 2001.

Pedroia On Fire at the Plate and in the Field:

Sophomore shortstop Dustin Pedroia (Woodland, Calif.) has been the spark plug to ASU's early season success and an integral part to ASU's 31-3 record. ASU's only player to play and start in all 34 games, Pedroia leads the Pac-10 in hitting at .433 (61x141) with 21 doubles and 26 RBI. He has also recorded 22 multi-hit games to pace the ASU offense and has ignited several ASU scoring rallies as is evident by his .540 (34x63) average as a leadoff hitter (inning and game). In a rare performance, Pedroia went 0-for-5 with two strikeouts in ASU's 4-2 win over LBSU (2/2) to have his career-long 22-game hitting streak come to a halt. The streak, which spanned 11 games each at the end of 2002 and 11 games to begin 2003, fell just two games off the top six in ASU Baseball history. It is the longest streak in combined to hit .390 (41x105). Dating back to the end of the 2002 season, He also recently had another 17-game hitting streak come to an end. Pedroia now has a hit in 43 of his last 45 games, including hits in all but two games this year (32 of 34). In his two years as a Sun Devil he already has 143 hits, 34 of which are doubles, and has never missed a start in 92 consecutive games. In the field Pedroia has also been the rock to ASU's solid .972 team fielding percentage. The slick fielding shortstop has committed only four errors in 155 total chances for a .974 fielding percentage.

The Jeff Larish Watch:

Sophomore first baseman Jeff Larish has quickly put his name atop the list of as a top candidate for national player of the year and the Golden Spikes Award in 2003. Although he missed three games in the last week with back spasms, Larish is expected back in the lineup this weekend for the Stanford series. Larish has recorded at least one hit in 26 of 32 games and one RBI in 25 of 31 games this year and leads the Pac-10 in several offensive categories. He is hitting .420 (42x100) with 11 home runs and eight doubles. He has a Pac-10 best 58 RBI (1.87 per game average) and his 11 home runs are tied for the league lead with USC freshman slugger Jeff Clement. He also leads the conference with 43 walks (1.39 per game) and has an unbelievable on-base percentage of .584. Despite his injury over the weekend Larish still hit .333 (2-for-6) in limited action vs. Oklahoma and Wichita State. For the season he is slugging .870 and is second on the team with 21 extra base hits. He had connected on three grand slams this year, already tying the single-season school record set by Dave Hudgens in 1977. In addition, he is batting .769 (10x13) with the bases loaded and leads the team with 22 two-out RBI. Larish, who was supposed to redshirt in 2002 but played midway through the season, has already surpassed his entire total of doubles, home runs and RBI from last year when he played in 34 games. Drafted in the 32nd round in 2001 by the Chicago Cubs, Larish etched his named in the ASU record books with a memorable game in the series finale vs. San Diego State (1/26). In what turned out to be a 24-9 ASU route, Larish was 3-for-4 and tied the school single-game record with nine RBI. He had a two-run single in the first inning, a two-run home run in the third, a grand slam homer in the fourth and then tied the 13-year-old school record (Tommy Adams) by walking with the bases loaded in the eighth. He also has a current seven-game hitting streak in which he is hitting .417 (10x24) with 10 RBI.



ASU HEAD COACH Pat Murphy



Since inheriting the Sun Devil program in August of 1994, Arizona State Baseball Head Coach Pat Murphy has carefully nurtured the tradition of excellence in Tempe, at the same

time establishing himself as one of the top collegiate head coaches in the nation. He has guided Arizona State to top-12 national rankings in three of the past five years, including an appearance in the 1998 College World Series national championship game. Murphy is 337-167-1 in his ninth season in Tempe and posts an all-time 24-18 record in NCAA Tournament action. With a career 710-338-4 record in 19 seasons as a head coach, Murphy is the winningest active baseball coach under the age of 45 at any collegiate level. Murphy recorded his 600th career Division 1 victory in 2002 and recorded his 700th career coaching victory (all levels) with a 14-8 come-from-behind win over No. 11 Notre Dame (2/23). ASU has been in 65 straight national polls under Murphy.

The Sun Devils have been torrid at the plate this year leading the Pac-10 in hitting with a .355 team batting average. Three players are hitting over .400 and only one regular player (45 or more at-bats) is hitting below .300. The team has recorded 10 or more hits in 26 of 34 games and has scored in double digits in 19 games. Overall the offense is averaging 10.65 runs, 12.44 hits and 4.26 extra base hits per game. The team also has a .464 on-base percentage and a .554 slugging percentage.

Travis Buck Hits For The Cycle:

Freshman outfielder Travis Buck went 5-for-5 with even RBI and hit for the cycle in ASU's 19-0 win over Southern Utah (3/7). He became only the seventh Sun Devil in recorded history to record the elusive cycle and became the first freshman in Pac-10 history to hit for the cycle. Buck capped his perfect night with a grand slam home run as part of an eight-run sixth inning to become ASU's first player to hit for the cycle since Mitch Jones on May 21, 2000 at Arizona. Buck, ASU's normal starting left fielder who was making only his second start in right field, had a single in the first, a double in the third and a triple in the fifth before connecting on his second home run of the year for the cycle. He also added a run-scoring single in the fourth and tied a career high with two stolen bases. Below is a list of ASU player who have hit for the cycle:

Senior Dennis Wyrick Lights Up Pac-10 Pitching:

Senior 3B Dennis Wyrick has been ASU's starting third baseman against left-handed pitchers this year and has had been one of ASU's hottest hitters as of late. Wyrick is hitting .394 (26-for-66) on the year with four doubles, one home run and 14 RBI. Wyrick has a hit in seven of his last eight games and is hitting .462 (12-for-26). About to enter his fourth season of Pac-10 play, Wyrick has had great success at the plate in league play. Wyrick is a career .371 (56-for-151) hitter in Pac-10 play dating back to his freshman season of 2000.

Averill and Liebeck Lead Pac-10 With Six Wins Each:

Freshman left-hander Erik Averill and senior right-hander Jered Liebeck are tied for the Pac-10 lead with six wins each. Averill, who will start Saturday to open the Stanford series, is 6-0 with a 1.98 ERA and 30 strikeouts in 41.0 innings. Liebeck, who is scheduled to start Sunday vs. the Cardinal, is also 6-0 with a 2.40 ERA.

Schroyer Ranks Sixth in ASU History With 14 Career Saves:

Junior closer Ryan Schroyer has been all but unstoppable in 2003 out of the bullpen. The hard-throwing right-hander is 3-0 with six saves this year and has a 0.00 ERA not allowing an earned run to score in his 17.1 innings pitched. The preseason All-American has scattered 12 hits (11 singles and one double) in his 14 outings and has struck out 24 batters (12.50 per game 9.0 IP). His longest outing of the year came with a three-innings save against Notre Dame (2/23) where he allowed only three hits and struck out three. He added his sixth save of the year by striking out the side in the ninth vs. Utah (3/8) to preserve ASU's 6-4 come-from-behind win. The save moved him into fifth place in the ASU career record books with his 14th career save. Including his summer All-American season with the NBC World Series Champion Alaska Goldpanners, Schroyer is 4-0 with 13 saves and a 0.00 ERA in his last 35.1 IP (59 K's). After recording eight (8) as the league's top pitcher (2.37 ERA) in 2002, Schroyer is looking to continue to move up the charts. Here is a look at ASU's top save leaders in school history:

Pitching To Near Perfection:

A big reason behind ASU's stellar 31-3 start is because of the Chris Sinacori led pitching staff. Through 34 games the pitchers have combined for a Pac-10 best 3.06 ERA while striking out 284 and walking 108. On 18 different occasions the staff has combined to walk three or less batters, including not allowing a walk in two games. ASU's pitchers have also combined to strike out eight or more batters in 20 games, including a season-high 16 vs. Utah (3/8). The starters have been especially hot, combining to go 17-1 with a 2.72 ERA, while the relievers are 14-2 with six saves and a 3.41 ERA. Seniors Jered Liebeck and freshman lefty Erik Averill lead the team with six wins each.

Bullpen Tears Up The Competition:

The ASU bullpen has been nearly unstoppable as of late combining to allow only four earned runs in the last nine outings and 39.2 innings (0.91 ERA). Junior closer Ryan Schroyer leads the team with a 0.00 ERA in 17.1 innings, while Beau Vaughan and Robbie McClellan each have three wins out of the bullpen. The relievers have also been clutch when inheriting runners, allowing only 27 of 68 to score (40%).

Double Vision:

Led by the six doubles from shortstop Dustin Pedroia and five from second baseman Steve Garrabrants, the Sun Devils hit 19 doubles in the four games of the Bob Schaefer Classic. With 17 more in the last five games, ASU now has a Pac-10 best 94 on the year (2.76 per game average). Pedroia leads the team with 21 and Steve Garrabrants is second with 13. The team record for doubles in a season is 185 set in 1988, while the individual season record is 30 set by Chris Bando in 1978.

Dueling Catchers:

If there is one thing better than a hot hitting catcher, then it is two hot hitting catchers. A year after exhausting efforts landed ASU with a fourth-string catcher who turned out to be a future professional baseball player (Cesar Castillo), the Devils have only one tough decision to make... which catcher to go with. Sophomores Tuffy Gosewisch and Joel Bocchi have combined to hit .358 (44-for-123) with 36 RBI. Bocchi has started 20 games and is hitting .369 with two home runs. Gosewisch has started the remaining 14 games and is hitting .345 with 16 RBI.

Battle At the Hot Corner:

Sophomore Frank Mesa and senior Dennis Wyrick are locked in a battle for the starting third base spot. Currently the duo platoon at the hot corner with Mesa (left-handed hitter) starting vs. RHP and Wyrick starting vs. LHP. Mesa, a sophomore transfer from Arizona Western in Yuma, is hitting .391 (27x69) with one home run and 14 RBI. Wyrick, a four-year player for ASU, is hitting .394 (26x66) with four doubles and 14 RBI. The hot corner has proved to be one of ASU's most productive positions with the duo combining to hit .393 (53-for-135).

Not a Bad Replacement:

When Jeff Larish went down last weekend with back spasms, inserting Mike Guerrero into the lineup was not a hard decision to make. Guerrero, a junior who transferred to ASU in 2001 and redshirted last year, responded by hitting .375 (6-for-16) with six doubles with Larish out of the lineup. For the season Guerrero leads the team in batting at .447 (21-for-47) with 11 doubles, two triples, one home run and 18 RBI.

The Big Inning:

The Sun Devils have been a scoring machine this year averaging 10.65 runs and 12.44 hits per game this year. ASU has also proven to be an explosive team at the plate, recording 86 big innings (2 or more runs). The team has also recorded 21 innings when they score five or more runs. ASU's biggest run production in a single frame has been nine runs on two different occasions, most recently with a two-out rally in the 14-8 win over Notre Dame (2/23).

Attendance Marks Impressive at Packard Stadium:

Arizona State is always in the national top 10 for attendance marks when playing at Packard Stadium and once again fans keep coming through the turnstile in 2003. In ASU's 22 home games this year, the Devils are averaging a home crowd of just under 3,000 (2,878) with a total of 63,320 fans attending the games. ASU's largest single-game crowd was the series opener vs. Oklahoma (4,155). The home season opener vs. San Diego State also had a good crowd drawing 3,972 fabs. ASU also had 10,043 attend the three-game series against San Diego State and 7,008 attend the two games against Notre Dame. The Oklahoma three-game series had a total of 10,861 fans for the three-game set.

The Grand Salami:

After hitting only one grand slam all of last year, the Sun Devils have gone on a binge this year hitting eight in their first 34 games. Sophomore first baseman Jeff Larish has already tied the single-season school record with three slams (Dave Hudgens, 1977) and junior second baseman Steve Garrabrants has two. Ryan Bosch, Travis Buck and Jeremy West each have one. The NCAA record for grand slams in a season by a team is 12 set by Oklahoma State in 1995. ASU has been clutch in 2003 with the bases loaded hitting at a combined clip of .427 (38-for-89). Larish leads the team hitting .769 (10-for-13) with the sacks full.

Two Out Rallies:

Over the last two years the Sun Devils have had a flare for scoring runs with two outs. In 2002 the Devils scored 232 of their 450 total runs (52%) with two outs. ASU is back at it again in 2003 scoring 156 of their 362 runs (43%) after two outs have been recorded. During the season-high nine-run sixth inning that led to ASU's 14-8 come-from-behind victory over Notre Dame (2/23), all nine runs came with two outs after a full-count walk to Jeff Larish. Larish leads the team with 22 two-out RBI, while catcher Tuffy Gosewisch leads the team hitting .500 (9x18) with two outs. As a team the Devils are batting .324 (122x377) after two outs have been recorded.

Murphy Records Milestone Win No. 700:

Arizona State head coach Pat Murphy notched his 700th career coaching victory with a 14-8 win over Notre Dame (2/23). In his 19 years in college baseball, Murphy now has a 710-338-4 overall record and a career 337-167-1 record in his nine years at Arizona State. The 1998 *Baseball America* Coach of the Year has led ASU to the NCAA tournament in five of the last six years. ASU's 12-2 win over CS Northridge (3/9) was Murphy's 500th career game at Arizona State.



Home Sweet Home:

ASU returns to Packard Stadium in 2003 after playing in Mesa (Hohokam Park) in 2002. The Devils recorded their 800th career victory at Packard Stadium (3/1 vs. PSU) and have an all-time 805-228-1 dating back to 1974. ASU will play 40 of its 62 games in the state of Arizona and 37 at Packard Stadium this year. After playing nine of its first 12 games on the road, the Devils will spend the entire months of February and March in the state of Arizona with only three games away from Packard Stadium at the new spring training facility of the Texas Rangers/Kansas City Royals in Surprise. The Devils have played their last 15 games at Packard Stadium, ending the longest home stand of the year this week with a Pac-10 opening series against nationally ranked Stanford (Mar. 22-24). After going 29-10 in designated home games last year, the Devils now have a combined 153-45-1 (.771) home record in the last five years dating back to 1998. Off to a 20-2 start at Packard Stadium this year, ASU is hitting .351 with 28 home runs in 22 home games and pitching for a 3.21 team ERA on the mound.

Buck and Bosch Among Fab 50 Freshmen:

ASU's freshman outfield tandem of Travis Buck and Ryan Bosch has both been tabbed as part of Baseball America's Freshman Fab 50. Buck, a 23rd round draft choice of the Seattle Mariners last June, is ranked No. 25 on the list. Buck has started 32 of ASU's 34 games and is hitting .368 with two home runs and 24 RBI. Bosch, ranked No. 41, has started 20 games in center field and is hitting .221 with 17 hits, two home runs and 18 RBI.

ASU Continuing To Mix Things Up:

After mixing and matching for 41 different starting batting lineups in 58 games last year, head coach Pat Murphy continues to keep the lineup fresh in 2003. Through the first 34 games of the season the Devils have mixed and matched for 30 different batting lineups and 18 different positional lineups.

Larish. Pedroia and Schrover on Player of the Year Watch List.

Sophomores Jeff Larish and Dustin Pedroia, and junior Ryan Schroyer have been named to the Rotary Smith Award's preliminary watch list for the annual player of the year award. Amongst the 130 Division 1 college baseball players to be selected to the initial list, the ASU trio is in contention for the prestigious award that is celebrating its 16th year of honoring the nation's finest collegiate baseball player. The only Sun Devil to ever win the Smith Award was Mike Kelly in 1990. The Smith Award is conducted by the Rotary Club of Houston and benefits several charities, including the Texas Children's Hospital and the Karl Young League.

Liebeck Sweeps Pac-10 and National Pitcher of the Week Honors:

Senior RHP Jered Liebeck swept the national and Pac-10 awards (Feb. 4) after throwing a complete-game, three-hit shutout against the No. 13 Long Beach State 49ers. Liebeck struck out two and did not allow a hit past the fifth inning to improve to 2-0. He allowed only one runner reach second base and until issuing his first walk of the game in the ninth inning, had retired 10 straight LBSU batters down the stretch. The complete-game shutout (9.0 IP) was the first by a Sun Devil since Drew Friedberg one-hit Hawaii-Hilo in 1999. He was named the Collegiate Baseball and NCBWA National Pitcher of the Week and became the 45th ASU pitcher to earn Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week acclaim. For the season Liebeck is tied for the team lead with a 6-0 record with a 2.40 ERA in his Pac-10 high nine starts. He recorded his 11th career win over Oklahoma last Saturday.

West and Schroyer Sweep Pac-10 Weekly Awards:

ASU juniors Ryan Schroyer and Jeremy West swept the Pac-10 Weekly Player of the Week honors (2/24) after helping lead the Sun Devils to four wins vs. Gonzaga, Dayton and Notre Dame. West hit .556 (5-for-9) with six runs scored, three home runs and 10 RBI. He broke out versus the 11th-ranked Irish on Feb. 22, with three hits, six RBI, two home runs, including a grand slam, to help ASU defeat Notre Dame 16-3. Schroyer pitched four scoreless innings out of the bullpen and recorded his fourth save of the year in ASU's 14-8 win over Notre Dame on Feb. 23. The Player of the Week honor is the third for West in his career and the 67th selection all-time for ASU. The Pitcher of the Week is the first such honor for Schroyer, the 46th Sun Devil to earn the weekly recognition. Senior pitcher Jered Liebeck earned the honor earlier in the year after his complete-game, three-hit shutout of nationally ranked Long Beach State.

ASU Traditionally Hot in January and February:

As tradition would have it, the Devils are usually a fast-starting team. Dating back to the start of varsity baseball in 1959, ASU is a combined 67-7 in the month of January (9-1 in 2003) and 378-139 in the month of February (13-0 in 2003). ASU head coach Pat Murphy has also enjoyed great success in the early months of the season, combining to go 40-4 in January and 88-32 in February in his nine seasons at the helm of the Sun Devil program.



A Tough Schedule For ASU Baseball:

The Sun Devils 2003 schedule is once again be one of the toughest in the nation, which includes 11 teams that were listed on Baseball America's Preseason Top 50. The 62-game regular-season schedule also features 25 games against nine teams that advance to the NCAA Tournament a year ago. In the current stretch of 25 straight games in the state of Arizona (started with BYU series), ASU has hosted Oklahoma State, Oklahoma, Wichita State, Notre Dame and will host Stanford this weekend. ASU has already gone 12-3 against teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament last year and is 7-3 against ranked (at least one poll) opponents. ASU currently has a No. 5 rating on Boydworld.com's ISR and a pseudo RPI of No. 18.

Beau Vaughan Is No Ricky "Wild Thing" Vaughan:

Senior transfer Beau Vaughan (New Orleans) comes out to the song "Wild Thing" in home games, but has proven he is anything but wild in his 14 appearances thus far as a Sun Devil. He wasted little time putting his name in the ASU record books during his opening weekend as a Sun Devil. Vaughan struck out the side in his first appearance in a 9-0 win over UHH (1/16) and then came back the next day to strike out nine batters in 4.2 innings to pick up his first win (1/17). During his nine-strikeout effort, Vaughan struck out eight consecutive batters from the third through fifth innings to ranks as the second most consecutive K's in ASU single-game history. In 39.2 innings of work Vaughan has struck out at team-high 49 batters and is 5-1 with a 3.63 ERA. Vaughan also set a high for ASU's starting pitchers when he struck out eight in five innings against Oklahoma State (2/15) in his first start as a Sun Devil. In his two starts, Vaughan is 2-0 with a 1.69 ERA. He recently added his fifth win of the year by striking out seven in four innings vs. Wichita State (3/18). Vaughan transferred from New Orleans after playing in the Phoenix area at a pair of JC's (Phoenix College and South Mountain CC).

Murphy's Teams Know How To Score:

A true icon of the Pat Murphy system is scoring runs. The Sun Devils have done plenty of that since he arrived in 1995. ASU has led the NCAA in scoring in two of the last five years, averaging 11.32 runs per game in 1999 and 10.97 runs per game in 2000. The Devils paced the Pac-10 in 2001, hitting at a .327 clip and averaging 8.26 runs per game to rank 17th in the nation. ASU also led the nation in batting average with a team total of .356 in 1999 and fell just percentage points shy of matching that feat a second year in a row in 2000 with a .346 mark, trailing Stony Brook by one point. During Pat Murphy's nine seasons at ASU, the Sun Devils have been a scoring machine with 4,661 runs in 505 games, averaging 9.35 runs per game and hitting at an overall .330 clip. Below is an offensive team breakdown of Murphy's ASU teams:

ASU And Team USA Connections:

Arizona State baseball has had a long-standing tradition of sending players to play for the USA National team during the summers. In a recent poll distributed by USA Baseball, ASU ranked No. 11 as a supplier to the National Team. ASU has had eight players don the Red, White and Blue for Team USA since 1984, with the first being Oddibe McDowell in the 1984 Olympics played at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles. Jim Austin played for Team USA in 1990 and ASU has had five more players play with Team USA in the last five years. 1999 Pac-10 Player of the Year Willie Bloomquist played in the summer of 1998, 2000-2001 Pac-10 Player of the Year Casey Myers played in the summer of 2000 and was also a member of the Team USA Junior National Team before arriving at ASU in 1998. Current Tampa Bay Devil Ray prospect Jon Switzer was also a member of the 2000 National Team and Mike Esposito was 3-1 with a 1.56 ERA in the summer of 2001. Sophomore Dustin Pedroia played for the National Team last summer and was the starting shortstop until getting hurt near the end of the season. Current Sun Devils Dennis Wyrick and Ryan Schroyer played for the Team USA Junior teams during their respective prep careers.

Golden Spikes Common At Arizona State:

While Khalil Greene of Clemson was the recipient of the 2002 Golden Spikes award as the nation's top amateur baseball player, it should be noted that three Arizona State players have won the award. In addition to ASU, only Cal State Fullerton and Texas have won three Golden Spikes Awards. Bob Horner, who was a standout at ASU from 1976-78, won the inaugural award in 1978. Oddibê McDowell, who was a member of the first Team USA baseball team to compete in an Olympics, won the award in 1984. Mike Kelly, who ranks second in ASU history with 46 home runs from 1989-91, won the award in 1991. In all, 12 players that have worn the Maroon and Gold have been named a Player of the Year for college baseball.

ASU Leader of the Pac When It Comes to Player of the Week:

Arizona State has amassed 46 Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week and 67 Players of the Week since 1981. That total leads all Pac-10 member schools. Senior RHP Jered Liebeck became the first Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week after his complete-game, three-hit shutout of Long Beach State (2/1) and Ryan Schroyer earned his first award on Feb. 25. Junior Jeremy West joined Schroyer as ASU swept the weekly awards on Feb. 25. Andre Etheir and West (twice) were named Pac-10 Players of the Week in 2002, while Robbie McClellan and Mike Esposito earned Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week honors last year.

Arizona State in Postseason Play:

The Sun Devil baseball program has created a dynasty in college baseball that has been matched by few. With 18 appearances in the College World Series, ASU ranks fifth for the most trips to Omaha. Arizona State has now advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 26 of the program's 44 varsity seasons (dating back to 1959), amassing an incredible 124-51 (.709) record. ASU's five National Championships rank as the second most of any NCAA school. In addition to ASU's five national championships, the Sun Devils have also turned in five second-place teams and three third-place finishes. Arizona State is 15-10 in the NCAA Tournament under ninth-year head coach Pat Murphy. In addition to advancing three straight years, ASU has been left out of the tournament only once (1999) in the last six years and played for the national championship in 1998.

An Early Season Opener:

The Jan. 16 season opener at Hawai'i-Hilo was the second earliest start in ASU Baseball history and the earliest start by any collegiate team in 2003. The Devils opened the 1999 season at home with a game at Packard Stadium against the University of Utah on Jan. 15. Arizona State's previous earliest start before 1999 was a Jan. 19 home contest against Grand Canyon (W, 12-2) in 1990. With the 9-0 blanking of UHH on 1/16, ASU is now 25-2 in season-opening games (dating back to 1977) and head coach Pat Murphy is 8-1 in season-openers at ASU (15-1 at D1).

How They Have Finished:

Success in the Classroom As Well As On The Field:

ASU has long enjoyed much success on the diamond, and with 18 College World Series appearances, it is known as one of the gems of college baseball. But lately academics, as well as on-field talent, has shown its true colors in the storied program. Pat Murphy's Sun Devil squads have produced four Academic All-Americans over the past four years (Willie Bloomquist, Mark Ernster, Jeff Phelps, Casey Myers), including Myers being named the Academic All-American for college baseball in 2000 and 2001. The four players honored as First-Team Academic All-Americans is the most by any college baseball program in the nation since 1995. Ryan McKenna, Aaron Klusman, Cesar Castillo, Nick Walsh and Mike Esposito all earned Pac-10 Academic Awards in 2002.

ASU Owns Pac-10 Player of the Year Award:

Since the old Pac-10 North (formerly Washington State, Washington, Oregon State, Portland State) and the Six-Pac joined to form the unified Pac-10 baseball conference in 1999, Arizona State has enjoyed much success with a combined 58-38 record in league play. Even more impressive is that besides last season (2002) no other player besides a Sun Devil has won the annual Pac-10 Player of the Year award. Willie Bloomquist won the inaugural award in 1999, while Casey Myers took home the hardware in 2000 and 2001 to become only fourth player in Pac-10 history to win the award twice in a career. In all, ASU has won nine (9) Pac-10 Player of the Year Awards dating back to 1978 (Myers (2), Bloomquist, Jacob Cruz, Paul Lo Duca, Linty Ingram, Oddibe McDowell, Alvin Davis, Mike Sodders) and two Pac-10 Pitchers of the Year (Noah Peery and Marc Barcelo).

Schroyer Named Baseball America Summer All-American:

Junior right-handed pitcher Ryan Schroyer was named a second-team Summer All-American by *Baseball America* after he helped lead the Alaska Goldpanners to the NBC World Series Championship. Schroyer joined the Goldpanners in the Alaskan League after not making the final Team USA roster. Ranked as the No. 3 prospect from the league by BA, Schroyer tamed the league with a 1-0 record, six saves and a 0.00 ERA.

Pedroia Becomes Eighth Devil to Play for Team USA:

Sophomore shortstop Dustin Pedroia became the eighth Sun Devil since 1984 to play for the USA Baseball National Team. After hitting .347 and setting an ASU freshman record with 82 hits in his freshman season, Pedroia made Team USA after being invited to the trials in Tucson, Ariz. Pedroia spent most of the summer as the team's starting shortstop before having to leave after suffering a broken cheek bone in the Harlem Honkball Tournament in The Netherlands.

Hitting For The Cycle... in the First Inning:

In what may be one of the rarest feats of Arizona State baseball history, the Devils led off the Feb. 9, 2002 game vs. Tennessee in grand fashion with the first four hitters combining to hit for the cycle in the first inning. Leadoff hitter Steve Garrabrants led off the game with a first-pitch home run, then Dustin Pedroia followed with a double, then Rod Allen singled and to cap off the amazing event, Jeremy West tripled to give ASU the early 2-0 lead.

Why Not #9 Murphy:

Most who are close to the ASU Baseball program know what the No. 9 means to head coach Pat Murphy. Often his slogan to "Play all 9 Innings", Murphy and No. 9 are synonymous with each other... until last year. In a preseason meeting with team, Murphy gave a speech on how you have to be able to give up anything for the team. In this case, he even offered up his prize No. 9, knowing no one would take it. That is, until ASU's Steve Garrabrants raised his hand and said, I'll take it, and with that, the leader of the Devils is willing to give up *anything* for the team and will wear No. 7 again this year.
