# BASEBALL FUNDRAISING

The ASU baseball program is very proactive and creative in our fundraising efforts. Money raised by the program annually is used to offset operational expenses not included in the program's regular budget. All donations to the program are used to provide new or improve existing student-athlete resources.

## ON DECK CIRCLE

The On Deck Circle, or ODC, is considered the "baseball arm" of the Sun Angel Foundation. Any annual contribution of \$150 or more grants a person membership to the ODC and the various membership benefits included based on giving level. Contributions to the ODC are tax deductible and count with other Sun Angel Foundation gifts to determine a donor's annual benefit level.

The ODC also hosts the annual team awards banquet following the regular season. Money raised at the banquet is donated back to the program and also allows the student-athletes to have a first class event to recognize the season's accomplishments and pay tribute to our senior student-athletes.

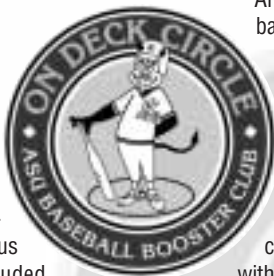
## 50/50 RAFFLE

A staple at home games each season, the 50/50 raffle has become a fan favorite since its inception in 2002. At each home game, fans have the opportunity to purchase raffle tickets. During the 7th inning

stretch, a winner is drawn and the pot is split between the baseball program and a lucky individual. The raffle is approved by the Arizona Attorney General prior to each season.

## SHIRT OFF OUR BACKS

Another favorite event for Sun Devil baseball fans is the annual "Shirt Off Our Backs" day. Each season, the current Sun Devil baseball team will wear a uniform from a previous season and allow fans the chance to win an actual game worn uniform. Raffle tickets are sold several weeks preceding the event and the winning fans get the chance to meet the player corresponding with their winning ticket on the field after the game for photos and autographs.



## LOCKER SPONSORSHIP

When the new baseball clubhouse was completed in 2005, former baseball letter-winners were provided with a unique opportunity to sponsor a locker and help offset the costs of construction. Each of the 40 player lockers and 12 staff lockers have a space held to showcase a plaque recognizing the baseball alum responsible for sponsoring the locker. Over half of the 52 lockers have been sponsored at this time.



## FUTURE CONSTRUCTION

Plans are currently being designed to complete the overall renovation of Winkles Field-Packard Stadium at Brock Ballpark. The final phase of renovations will be geared at improving overall fan comfort at games and provide areas that will galvanize the rich tradition of Sun Devil Baseball. Along with various alumni tributes areas spread across the facility, the renovation will include the installation of green chair back seating throughout the stadium grandstand, press box expansion and addition of a shade canopy over the grandstand area. Early artist renditions are located on the previous page. A capital campaign to secure funding for the project will be launched in 2007.

# THE 2006 SEASON IN REVIEW





# THE 2006 SEASON

The Sun Devils finished out the 2006 baseball season with a 37-21 final record, going 1-2 at the NCAA Tournament Houston Regional...ASU finished in second place in the Pac-10 with a record of 14-10...Arizona State finished 26-6 at Winkles Field-Packard Stadium at Brock Ballpark...ASU finished ranked #23 in the USA Today Coaches Poll and #28 in the NCBWA poll...This was the 44th straight season with 30+ victories and the 46th overall...The Devils once again played one of the toughest schedules in the nation, facing nine teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament and two teams (Rice and Oregon State) that advanced to the College World Series...ASU had the 11th toughest schedule in the nation, as rated by *Boyd'sWorld.com*...Of their 58 games played in 2006, 33 of them came against opponents who were ranked at some point throughout the season...Arizona State advanced to their seventh straight NCAA Tournament and 30th overall...The Devils won the inaugural Whataburger College Classic in Corpus Christi, Texas, defeating Texas A&M Corpus Christi, #1 Rice and TCU to claim the crown...Brett Wallace earned All-Houston Regional honors after hitting .417 with a home run in the three games...Freshman Ike Davis was named the Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, the first Sun Devil to win the award. Davis led the Pac-10 in RBI during the regular season, the first freshman to ever accomplish that feat...Davis set a new ASU freshman record with his 65 RBI...Four Sun Devils earned First Team All-Pac-10 Honors (Curtis, Davis, Paramore, Sogard), while four others (Arreola, Barnette, Bordes, Wallace) earned Honorable Mentions...Joe Persichina and Willy Fox both earned Academic All-Pac-10 Second Team honors...Eric Sogard earned All-American recognition from the NCBWA (2nd Team), Collegiate Baseball (Third Team) and *Rivals.com* (HM)...Ike Davis and Preston Paramore were each named Freshmen All-Americans by Collegiate Baseball and Second Team Freshman All-Americans by Baseball America...Davis also earned First Team All-West Region honors from the ABCA...Sophomore Sogard turned in a stellar offensive season, batting .353 with nine homers and 50 RBI, including 27 extra base hits...Freshman Brett Wallace came on at the end of the year to lead the team in hitting with a .371 average...Ike Davis led the team with his 65 RBI and his 31 extra base hits while batting .329...Colin Curtis led the team with 80 hits and also had a team-leading 21 game hitting streak early in the season...Senior Brett Bordes closed out his ASU career in style, leading the team with a 7-1 record with four saves...Bordes became the school's all-time leader in pitching appearances, throwing in 109 career games...Tony Barnette was the team's ace when the season ended, finishing with a 6-1 mark and a team leading 70 strikeouts...ASU led the Pac-10 with a .319 batting

average...Five Sun Devils were drafted in the 2006 Draft, with three more signing pro contracts days after the draft...Colin Curtis was selected by the New York Yankees in the 4th round, Pat Bresnehan was selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 5th round, Zechry Zinicola was a 6th round choice of the Washington Nationals, Brett Bordes was picked by the Baltimore Orioles in the 9th round and Tony Barnette was the 10th round selection of the Arizona Diamondbacks...Seth Dhaenens signed a contract with the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, while Brady Martinez agreed to terms with the New York Yankees and Daryl Arreola signed with Arizona Diamondbacks...ASU spent all 17 weeks of the regular season ranked in at least one of the four major polls...The Devils spent 13 straight weeks in the Top 20, rising to as high as #10...Prior to the season, the baseball program dedicated Brock Ballpark to the late Dr. Jim Brock as part of the 25th anniversary of the 1981 National Championship team...The program completed their celebration on May 14th when Alvin Davis and Kevin Romine had their numbers retired in a pre-game ceremony...Pat Murphy picked up his 850th career win against California on May 26th.

## BORDES LEAVES HIS MARK

Left handed pitcher Brett Bordes completed his stellar Sun Devil career with an outstanding senior season. The rubber-armed leader of the ASU bullpen was second on the team with 31 appearances, on his way to setting a school record with 109 career appearances. He led the team with a 7-1 mark, turning in a 3.15 ERA in 54.1 innings. He struck out 47 batters on his way to four saves. Over his four years in Tempe, Bordes compiled a 16-10

record with nine saves, registering a 4.54 ERA. He struck out 166 batters while allowing opposing hitters to bat only .242 against him. He was a 9th round pick of the Baltimore Orioles, having an excellent debut season in pro ball with the Aberdeen IronBirds.

## THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT

The theme of the 2006 ASU season was youth, as four freshmen were major contributors to the success of the squad. Add them to the talented mix of sophomores, and the Sun Devils should have a lot success over the next few years. Ike Davis led the way for the sterling freshman class, earning Pac-10 Freshman of the Year honors on his way to setting a new ASU freshman record with 65 RBI. He earned First Team ABCA All-West Region honors and was joined by fellow freshman Preston Paramore on the All-Pac-10 First Team. Davis and Paramore also each earned Freshman All-American status by Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America (Second Team). Freshman Brett Wallace was named to the All-Houston Regional Team and led the Sun Devils in batting with a .371 average. Freshman Matt Hall was as solid defensively as any Devil, playing shortstop, second and third during the year. Sophomore Eric Sogard had a breakout season, earning All-American and All-Pac-10 honors thanks to his .353 average with 50 RBI and nine home runs.

## DOWN BUT NOT OUT

Sophomore shortstop Andrew Romine had a rough off-season leading up to 2006. After a blood clot forced him to have rib removal surgery, it was thought the 2005 Honorable Mention All-Pac-10 selection would be forced to sit out the entire 2006 season. But thanks to rehab and a strong determination, Romine was able to make it back to the Sun Devil lineup in time for the opening of Pac-10 play. He made his return memorable, as he recorded seven hits and seven RBI in his first four games back to be named the Pac-10 Player of the Week. Romine missed 36 games, but still managed to hit .375 and contribute to several Sun Devil victories.

## MR. VERSATILITY

No one knew what to expect out of CJ Retherford, the transfer from South Mountain CC, at the beginning of the season. By the end of the year, they expected the unexpected from the versatile junior. Retherford played five different positions for the Sun Devils in 2006, including second base, short stop, third base, catcher and pitcher. He hit .305 with three home runs, including two against Arizona on May 2nd. He also pulled a rare feat in the NCAA Tournament, as he caught and pitched in the same inning of a game against Prairie View A&M.

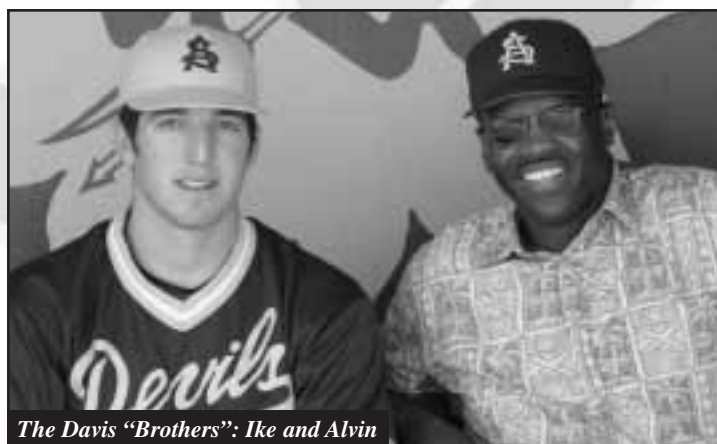

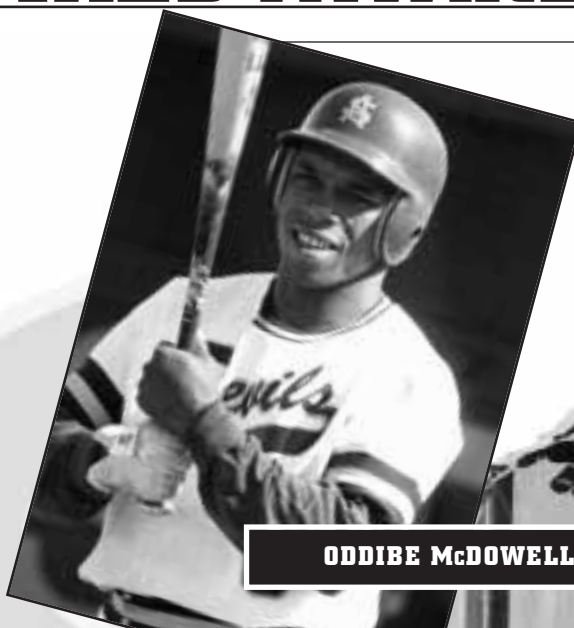
# GOLDEN SPIKES AWARD

Past winners of this prestigious award include current Major League Baseball stars J. D. Drew, Pat Burrell, Jason Varitek, Jason Jennings and Mark Prior.

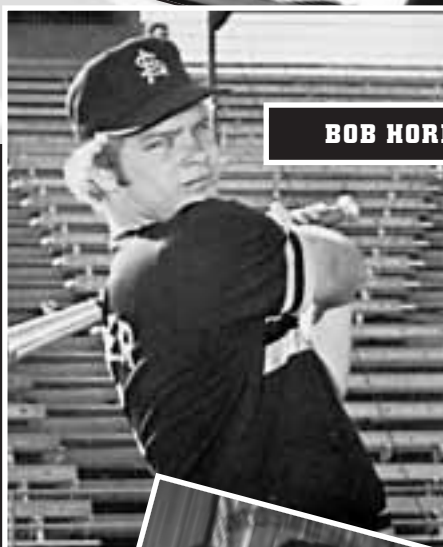
• Arizona State's Bob Horner won the inaugural award in 1978 after hitting .412 with 20 doubles and 25 RBI. Oddibe McDowell (1984) and Mike Kelly (1991) also won the award.

• Dustin Pedroia was named one of five finalists for the 2004 Golden Spikes Award. He became the seventh all-time finalist from ASU, including Horner (1978), McDowell (1984), Kelly (1990), Kelly (1991), Paul Lo Duca (1993) and Jacob Cruz (1994).

• With three Golden Spikes winners, ASU ranks tied for first with Florida State and Cal State Fullerton as the schools with the most players to have earned college baseball's top honor.



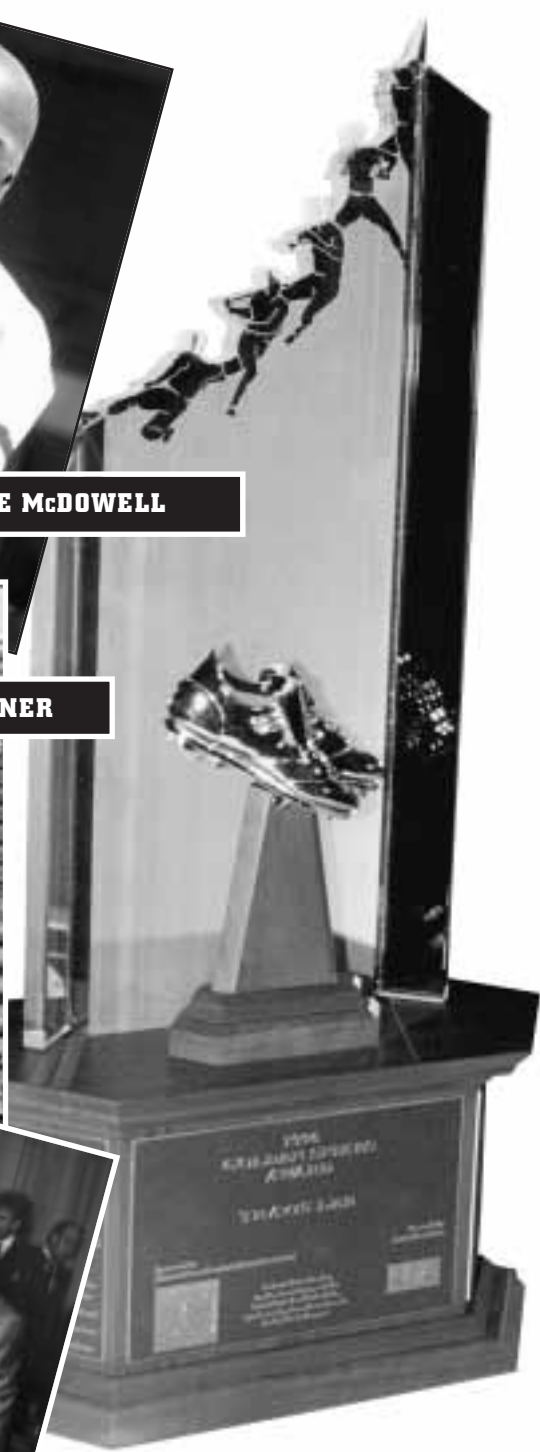

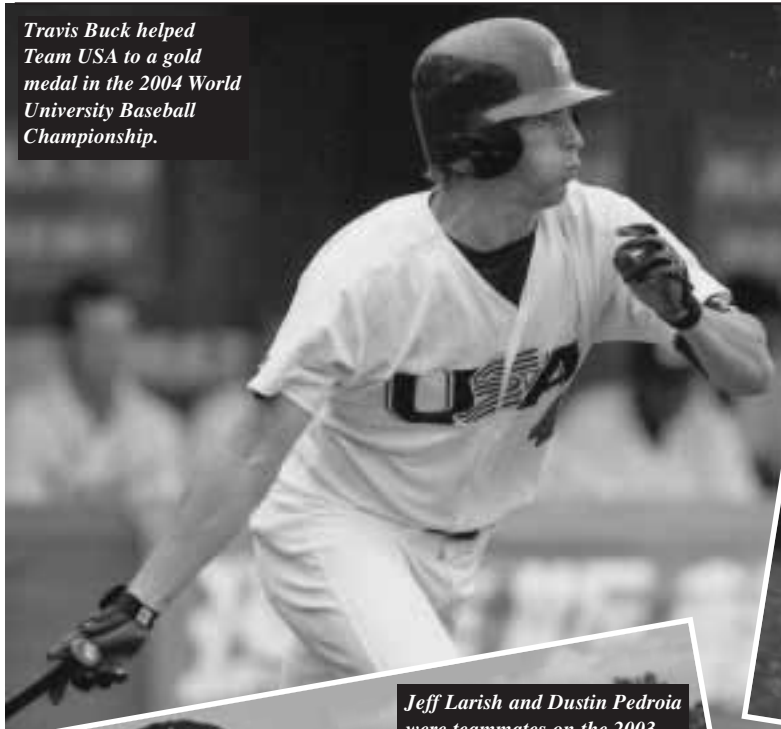

- The Arizona State Baseball program ranks as one of the top collegiate programs in the nation to produce players for the USA Baseball National Team. Since USA Baseball began selecting players and operating an official National Team to represent the United States in 1984, ASU has had at least one player on the team in nine different years. A total of 10 different ASU players have combined for 11 selections to the National Team.

- ASU's most recent selection to the National Team, Travis Buck, helped the USA Baseball National Team to a gold medal in the 2004 FISU World University Baseball Championship in Tainan City, Taiwan. Buck was named a first-team Summer All-American by *Baseball America* after hitting .412 (28-for-68) with two home runs and 14 RBI.

# ARIZONA FALL LEAGUE



Major League Baseball created the Arizona Fall League in 1992 to serve as an off-season "graduate school" for top prospects. The AFL often is known as a showcase league because its players have the opportunity to display their skills for baseball scouts, general managers, and minor-league farm directors. For baseball fans, it's a 40-day Valley homestand featuring baseball's elite prospects.

Longtime baseball executive and Valley resident Roland Hemond is considered the "Architect of the Fall

League." His dream to create a six-week off-season league from baseball's top prospects in Arizona each fall became a reality when the Arizona Fall League began plan in 1992 after two years of selling the concept to baseball's hierarchy — first general managers, the owners.

Major League Baseball owns and operates the Arizona Fall League. Each major-league organization is required to provide seven players to the league each fall, while games are played at the Valley's outstanding spring-training stadiums.

Arizona State University has had twenty-two former players participate in the prestigious Arizona Fall League since its inception in 1992. Former Sun Devils Jeff Pentland and Pat Listach have also managed in the AFL.

## FUTURES GAME



The All-Star Futures Game debuted at Fenway Park in 1999 and has grown into the marquee showcase for the top talent in minor league baseball. Played each summer at the site of the Major

League Baseball All-Star Game, the Futures Game provides 50 of the best minor league players in the world a venue to display their talents for baseball fans and executives alike. The rosters are selected by Major League Baseball and Baseball America in conjunction with the 30 major league clubs. In eight short years, the Futures Game has already produced over 140 players to Major League Baseball — and the list will only continue to grow.

In July of 2006, Travis Buck became the first player from ASU to ever play in this prestigious showcase. Buck was selected for the game after getting off to one of the hottest first-halves in all of minor league baseball as a member of the Oakland A's AA affiliate, the Midland Rockhounds.

# THE PROFESSIONAL DRAFT

No school has played a bigger role in Major League Baseball's amateur free agent draft than Arizona State University.

Since the inception of the draft in 1965, ASU has had more players chosen (344), more first-round selections (22) and more No. 1 picks (3) than any other school in the nation.

During the Pat Murphy era (1995-P), 90 players have been selected during the draft, averaging nearly eight players per draft since Murphy took over the program.

A modern-record 12 players were selected in the 2003 draft, most among all college baseball programs in the nation. The number of draft picks from ASU do not even reflect the recruited players who were drafted out of high school.

That's a marvelous testimony to Arizona State's reputation among major league scouts and top baseball executives. It also makes quite a statement about the school's tradition and its amazing consistency.

In 1990 and most recently in 2003, the staff of Baseball America compiled a pair of books on the history of the draft, complete with trends, lists and features, along with the names (all 45,000 of them) of every player drafted since '65.

Naturally, Arizona State and its alumni received plenty of coverage in the publication. The information on this page was taken from that book, *The Baseball Draft: The First 25 Years*.

Not surprisingly, the first player ever drafted was from ASU — Rick Monday, who went to Charles O. Finley and the Kansas City A's as the No. 1 overall pick in 1965.

Names like Jackson, Bane, Bannister, Horner, Bonds and Kelly — just to name a few — have produced their own fascinating draft stories. Without question, many more will follow.

Here's a sampling of news, notes and numbers, as they relate to the Devils and the Draft:

- A total of 344 Arizona State players have been drafted since the inception of the MLB Draft in 1965. No other school comes even close to that number.

- The Sun Devils' three No. 1 overall picks were Rick Monday (1965 to Kansas City), Floyd Bannister (1976 to Houston) and Bob Horner (1978 to Atlanta). No other school has more than one No. 1 selection. Mike Kelly narrowly missed joining this elite club, as he was chosen second by the Atlanta Braves in 1991.

- In 1976, Arizona State had a record 13 players drafted. They included Bannister, Horner, Ken Landreaux, Ken Phelps, Chris Bando and Ricky Peters. Of the 27 players on the roster, 26 were drafted at some point in their careers. A whopping 13 of them would eventually reach the big leagues. Baseball America says "it may have been the greatest collection of college talent ever assembled."

- Only 19 drafted players have ever gone directly to the major leagues. Two were Sun Devils: Bane in '73 and Horner in '78.

- Louie Medina, who played at Arizona State in 1984 and '85, was drafted a total of seven times, beginning in 1981. That makes him one of six players who share the all-time lead for number of selections.

- Here's an impressive partial list of players who originally signed national letters of intent with Arizona State but never made it to the Tempe campus, instead opting for the draft's signing bonus: Jim Palmer, Dontrelle Willis, Andrew Good, Dale Murphy, Robin Yount, Lee Mazzilli, Billy Hatcher, Jeff Burroughs, Warren Cromartie, Gary Templeton, Rick Sutcliffe, Ryan Klesko, Kerry Woodson, Lenny Dykstra, Johnny LeMaster, J.D. Durbin, Duane Ward, Mike Jones, Prince Fielder, Dale Sveum, Paul Konerko, Ben Petrick and Jimmy Rollins.

- The Sun Devils added another first round selection in 2005 when Travis Buck went to the Oakland A's with the 36th pick in the first round. He is the 22nd Sun Devil to be selected in the first round.

# IMPROVE YOUR DRAFT STATUS

Since 1995, Arizona State has had 90 players selected during the annual June First-Year Player Draft. ASU is the top collegiate program in the nation for producing an average of nearly eight draft picks a year since the inception of the draft in 1965. In addition, since Murphy took over the program in 1995, 36 of the 90 drafted players had never been drafted out of high school or junior college and all but two players improved their draft status. Under the two circumstances (pitchers Phill Lowery and

Mike Esposito) in which a player fell in the draft, an arm injury had occurred during their college career. However, despite being selected in the 12th round of the 2002 draft, Esposito demonstrated that he had fully recovered from elbow surgery and signed for second-round money (\$750,000). Another interesting fact is that ten players have gone from being previously undrafted to being selected in the Top 10 rounds. Five more Sun Devils were selected in the 2006 draft — all five in the Top 10 rounds.

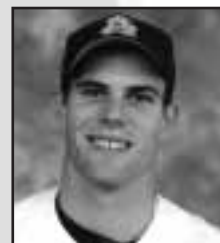

# Final collegiate baseball poll listed from 1959 to 1980 (1960 is AP poll)



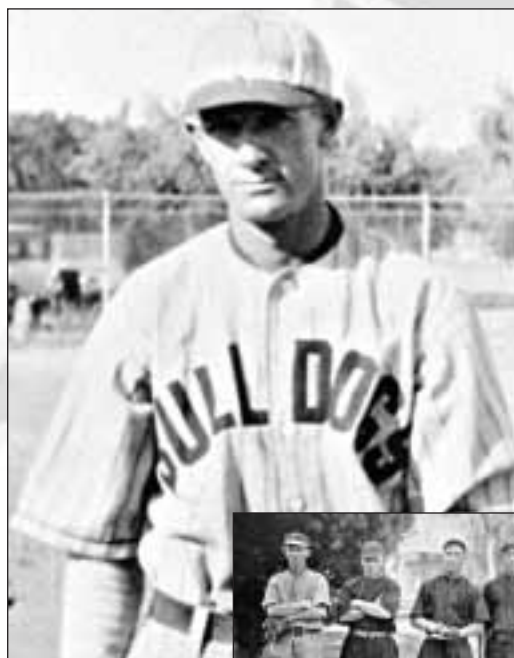

# RETIRED NUMBERS



## **0 / ODDIBE MCDOWELL 1983-1984**

The first Sun Devil baseball player to have his number retired, McDowell hit a combined .380 with 30 home runs and 31 doubles in his two years in Tempe. His 1984 season, in which he hit .405 with 23 home runs and 117 hits, remains one of the best offensive performances in school history and earned him a spot on the US Olympic team as well as the Golden Spikes Award. Oddibe had his number 0 retired, but legend has it that the digit on his back was actually the letter "O", making him the only player to have a letter retired. McDowell played seven seasons in the Major Leagues after being a First Round pick of the Texas Rangers in 1984.



## **1 / BOBBY WINKLES 1959-1971**

The first varsity baseball coach at ASU, Winkles had his number retired February 25, 1972. Winkles guided the Sun Devils to a 524-173 mark from 1959 to '71, including four College World Series appearances. He captured three national championships and was inducted into both the American Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame and the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He went on to manage in the Major Leagues, leading both the California Angels and the Oakland Athletics. Winkles was honored for his numerous coaching milestones at ASU when the field at Packard Stadium was dedicated as Bobby Winkles Field in 2001.



## **5 / BOB HORNER 1976-1978**

On February 11, 1996, Bob Horner saw his number retired by Arizona State. The first Golden Spikes Award winner in 1978, Horner hit 56 home runs over his three seasons in Tempe. He was the MVP of the 1977 College World Series, the 1978 National Player of the Year and the top pick in the 1978 MLB Draft. He hit .412 during his senior season and led the Devils to Omaha all three years he was played for ASU. Horner was the first pick of the 1978 MLB Draft, going to the Atlanta Braves. He spent ten years in the Majors, winning the 1978 National League Rookie of the Year Award and playing in the 1982 All-Star Game.



## **6 / SAL BANDO 1964-1965**

February 23, 1996 saw Sal Bando's number retired by the Sun Devils. The MVP of the 1965 College World Series, Bando helped lead Arizona State to Omaha in both of his seasons in Tempe. Bando hit .319 over his Sun Devil career, including .364 in 1964. He played 16 seasons in the Majors, appearing in four All Star Games and winning three World Series' with the Oakland Athletics. Bando spent eight years as the General Manager of the Milwaukee Brewers after retiring as a player.



## **7 / ALAN BANNISTER 1970-1972**

A two-time First Team All-American, Alan Bannister had his number retired by the Sun Devils on January 9, 1999. A .355 career hitter, Bannister helped lead the Sun Devils to the 1972 College World Series with his .380 average, 13 home runs and 90 RBI. He rapped out 225 hits during his three seasons in Tempe and went on to play 12 seasons in the Major Leagues. He was the #1 overall pick of the 1973 MLB Draft, going to the Philadelphia Phillies.



## **7 / HUBIE BROOKS 1977-1978**

One of the greatest hitters in Sun Devil history, Hubie Brooks saw his #7 retired by ASU on March 3, 2000. Brooks hit .396 during his career, including .432 in 1978. A member of the 1977 National Champions, Brooks went to Omaha both seasons he wore the Maroon and Gold. Hubie played 15 seasons in the Majors, twice being named to the All-Star Team. He was the third overall pick of the 1978 draft, selected by the New York Mets.



## **9 / ALVIN DAVIS 1979-1982**

Alvin Davis had his Sun Devil #9 retired on May 14, 2006. A four-year player, Davis hit .362 as a Sun Devil, including .395 during the National Championship year of 1981. Davis knocked in 200 runs during his tenure in Tempe and was a sixth round pick of the Seattle Mariners in the 1982 MLB Draft. Davis went on to win the 1984 American League Rookie of the Year Award. He played nine seasons in the Majors and was an All-Star in 1984.



## 12 / KEVIN ROMINE 1981-1982

On May 14, 2006, Kevin Romine had his number retired by Arizona State. They only person in school history to ever hit over .400 twice, Romine closed out his ASU career with a .408 average. A National Champion in 1981, Romine totaled 176 in his two seasons in Tempe. He was a second round pick of the Boston Red Sox in the 1982 MLB Draft and went on to play seven big league seasons.



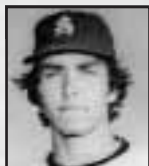
## 14 / LARRY GURA 1967-1969

January 18, 1998 saw one of the most dominant Sun Devil pitchers ever have his number retired. Larry Gura compiled a 25-6 career record for ASU, including the 1969 season that saw him go 19-2 with a 1.01 ERA. A two-time National Champion, Gura was a First Team All-American in 1969. He was selected by the Chicago Cubs in the second round of the 1969 Draft and went on to play 16 seasons of big league ball, including his All-Star season of 1980.



## 16 / PAUL LO DUCA 1993

On January 28, 2005, Paul Lo Duca's #16 was retired by ASU Baseball. Lo Duca spent only one season in Tempe, but it was a memorable one. His .446 batting average in 1993 set the school's single season mark, helping him be named the National Player of the Year by *The Sporting News*. A hitting-machine, Lo Duca totaled 129 hits, 14 home runs and 88 RBI on his way to earning Co-Pac-10 Player of the Year honors. Lo Duca is currently in his 10th Major League season and is a four-time All-Star, including a starter in the 2006 game.



## 19 / FLOYD BANNISTER 1974-1976

January 18, 1997 was the day Floyd Bannister, one of the greatest pitchers in Sun Devil history, had his number retired by ASU. Bannister earned 38 wins during his ASU career, including a school record-tying 19 in 1976. He had a career ERA of 1.88 and is second in school history with his 478 career strikeouts. He was a member of two College World Series teams and was a First Team All-American in 1975 and 1976. The first overall pick in the 1976 MLB Draft by the Houston Astros, Bannister played 15 seasons and was named an All-Star in 1982.



## 21 / EDDIE BANE 1971-1973

Eddie Bane had his #21 retired by ASU on February 16, 2000. Bane is ASU's all-time strikeout leader, fanning 535 batters during his career. He is third all-time in school history with 40 wins, and his 11 career shut outs helped him record a career ERA of 1.64. Bane is the only Sun Devil to ever throw a perfect game, turning the trick against Cal State-Northridge on March 2, 1973. A two-time All-American, Bane pitched in two College World Series. Bane was a First Round pick of the Minnesota Twins in 1973 and played three seasons in the Majors. He is currently the Director of Scouting for the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim.



## 24 / BARRY BONDS 1983-1985

On March 19, 1993, one of the greatest sluggers of all-time had his number retired by Arizona State. Barry Bonds hit 45 home runs during his Sun Devil career, fourth most in school history. An All-American in 1985, Bonds played in two College World Series, setting a record with hits in seven consecutive CWS at-bats. The seven-time National League MVP is 22 home runs shy of passing Hank Aaron for the most in Major League history.



## 27 / RICK MONDAY 1965

Rick Monday's number 27 was retired by ASU on January 25, 1997. Monday made the most of his one varsity season in Tempe, earning National Player of the Year honors from *The Sporting News* for the 1965 National Champions. He hit .359 that year and blasted two home runs during the College World Series. Monday became the first ever player drafted by Major League Baseball, as he went #1 overall to the Kansas City A's in the first MLB Amateur Draft in 1965. He pitched 19 seasons in the Majors, twice earning All-Star Game appearances and winning a World Series in 1981 with the Los Angeles Dodgers.



## 33 / JIM BROCK 1972-1994

The winningest coach in ASU baseball history, Brock had his number retired posthumously on January 21, 1995. Brock, who passed away in 1994 after leading ASU to the College World Series, amassed 1,100 victories in his 23 seasons as head coach. He was a four-time National Coach of the Year and led the Sun Devils to Omaha 13 times, capturing National Titles in 1977 and 1981. Brock coached 15 First Round picks and had his name added to the baseball facilities (Winkles Field - Packard Stadium at Brock Ballpark) in 2006.



## 44 / REGGIE JACKSON 1966

Perhaps the most clutch playoff performer in baseball history saw his number retired on January 13, 1990, as Mr. October Reggie Jackson was honored by the Sun Devils. Jackson came to ASU on a football scholarship and decided to walk-on to the 1966 baseball team. Reggie went on to win National Player of the Year honors, thanks to his .327 average and 15 home runs. He led the team in hits, runs and RBI and was drafted #2 overall by the Kansas City A's in the 1966 MLB Draft. He went on to become a Hall-of-Fame player, hitting 10 World Series home runs, picking up two World Series MVP trophies and the 1973 AL MVP Award. He was inducted into the baseball Hall of Fame in 1993.





# COLLEGE BASEBALL HALL OF FAME



Sun Devil legends Bobby Winkles and Bob Horner were part of the first-ever 10 member induction class in the new College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas in July of 2006. Winkles was the first ever varsity baseball coach at Arizona State, leading the Sun Devils to three national championships. Horner was the first ever Golden Spikes Award winner and was the MVP of 1977 College World Series.

Over 300 candidates were originally submitted for consideration by universities and CBF members. Players are eligible for the College Baseball Hall of Fame ballot five years after the student-athlete's final collegiate season, not to include any active player or coach on a professional baseball team roster. Former players must have made an All-American team or an All-League team during at least one year at a four-year institution. Coaches are eligible after ending their collegiate career, not to include an active coach on a professional baseball team. They must have achieved 300 career wins, or have won at least 65% of their games.

## ASU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON 1965



The Sun Devils were hungry entering the 1965 season after making their first College World Series appearance the previous year. Though they made an early exit with two losses in three games in 1964, their journey to Omaha, Nebraska, had given them a taste of the good life.

There was no stopping Coach Bobby Winkles' team in '65. They stormed through the regular season with a 47-7 record, won the Western Athletic Conference title at 9-3 and swept two

games from Colorado State in the District 7 playoffs in Phoenix to earn another trip to Omaha sporting a No.-1 national ranking from *Collegiate Baseball*.

Slugging center fielder Rick Monday was the backbone of that team. He batted .359 with a school-record 11 home runs and became the first of 13 Sun Devils to be named National Player of the Year. He was the first player chosen (by the Kansas City Athletics) in Major League Baseball's initial amateur draft. John Pavlik (12-0), Jim Merrick (13-2) and Ron Lea (11-3) headed the pitching staff.



#### ASU VS. LAFAYETTE—JUNE 7

ASU entered the tourney ranked first in the final national poll prior to the CWS, and lived up to the billing. The Devils blasted three Lafayette pitchers for a 14-1 win. Top Sun Devil sluggers included starting pitcher John Pavlik (2-for-3, 1 RBI), Sal Bando (3-for-5 with a double, a homer and 3 RBI), Jim Armstrong (3-for-4, 2 RBI and 3 runs scored) and Glenn Smith, with a 3-for-4 performance. Pavlik limited Lafayette to just three singles in getting the win, and was helped by Alan Schmelz in the ninth. Pavlik had a no-hitter for six innings before a run scored on three singles in the seventh.

Sophomore reliever Doug Nurnberg was the man of the hour for the Devils, as he pitched his way out of a bases-loaded, no-out situation in the seventh, then stranded two runners in the top of the ninth. Nurnberg relieved starter Jim Merrick and came through with three innings of hitless ball while striking out four. ASU took the lead on a homer by Rick Monday in the first frame. What proved to be the winning run came for ASU after Sal Bando tripled in the sixth and then scored on Luis Lagunas' fly out to center. The championship victory was ASU's 54th win in the 62-game season, a national record at that time.

## ASU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON 1967



The 1967 Sun Devils did not have an easy path to Omaha, where they captured their second national championship in three years. The Devils lost four of their first five Western Athletic Conference games before rallying to capture the Southern Division title and earn a spot against Brigham Young University in the WAC playoffs.

In a game still considered by many the greatest in school history, the 11th-ranked Sun Devils beat 9th-ranked Arizona, 3-2, in a one-game Southern

Division playoff in front of 8,314 fans at Phoenix Municipal Stadium. Sun Devil pitcher Gary Gentry, who had shut out the Wildcats, 3-0, in the final regular-season game, pitched all 15 innings of the four-hour, 17-minute marathon. Working on just two days' rest, Gentry scattered nine hits, walked five and struck out 18. He threw 208 pitches.

After disposing of BYU in the WAC championship series, the Sun Devils won two of three from Air Force in the District 7 playoffs in Phoenix to earn a spot in Omaha, where they won five of six games to claim National Title No. 2.



#### ASU VS. OKLAHOMA STATE—JUNE 12

Arizona State defeated Oklahoma State by a 7-2 margin, using a five-run seventh frame and the superb pitching of Gary Gentry to forge the win. The Devils fell behind, 2-0, in the top half of the first, but rebounded with a solo homer by Scott Reid in the third and an RBI triple by Jack Lind that scored Dave Grangaard in the fourth to tie the score. In the seventh, the Devils' main artillery was a three-run homer by Scott Reid. Gentry struck out at least one man every inning. From the fifth inning on, he did not allow a base runner and struck out seven.

Following ASU's loss to Houston, three teams remained in the CWS, each with one defeat. Houston drew a bye into the finals, and ASU and Stanford fought for the right to move to the final game against Houston. What resulted was a classic battle of two evenly matched squads, as ASU and Stanford struggled 14 innings before A-State won a 4-3 decision. ASU starter Gary Gentry and Stanford starter Rod Poteete locked horns in a pitcher's duel that lasted over three and one-half hours. Gentry allowed nine hits, walked six, struck out 15 and allowed no Stanford runners past first base after the sixth inning. Gentry was the man who eventually scored the winning run, after singling in the 14th frame. One out later, Scott Reid sent a fly ball deep to center that Stanford center fielder Jeff Rohlfing misjudged and was unable to recover and field. Reid's hit dropped in and Stanford dropped out of the tournament.

## ASU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON 1969



After failing to return to Omaha in 1968, the Sun Devils put it all together with a monster season in 1969. They zipped through the WAC with a 15-3 conference record in the first year that league play was expanded from 12 to 18 games. After beating Idaho twice in the District 7 playoff in Phoenix, Coach Bobby Winkles' Devils stormed into Omaha with a 51-10 record and No.-1 national ranking.

Outfielder Paul Ray Powell led the Sun Devils in batting (.366), home runs (11) and RBI (73) and was named College Player of the Year by The Sporting News. Powell was

a first-round pick of the Minnesota Twins in the 1969 June amateur draft, the seventh player drafted overall. Powell also played safety on the football team and led the nation in kick scoring in 1968.

Left-hander Larry Gura was the pitching star of the 1969 Sun Devils. He put together a season that still ranks as one of the best in college history. Gura set a NCAA record for pitching victories with a 19-2 record and established a school record with a sparkling 1.01 ERA. He struck out 196 batters in 169 innings. He made four pitching appearances — two as a starter and two in relief — as the Sun Devils shook off a first-round loss to Texas to win their third national title in Omaha.

## ASU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON 1977



The 1977 Sun Devils were a determined bunch after compiling a 65-10 overall record and 17-1 WAC mark in 1976 but falling short in their quest for the school's fourth national title. Their 1977 record (57-12, 15-3) wasn't quite as impressive and they were down a bit in most statistical categories, but this time they got it right at Omaha.

Coach Jim Brock's Devils hit their stride in mid April, rolling up 19 consecutive victories in a streak that continued into the post season. They swept BYU in

the WAC playoffs and stormed through a NCAA Regional tournament in Tempe with one victory over Cal State Fullerton and two over Washington State, taking a No. 1 national ranking into the College World Series.

Though they lacked the dominant pitching of some earlier ASU clubs, the Devils bludgeoned opponents with an attack that featured the likes of Bob Horner, Hubie Brooks, Chris Bando, Dave Hudgens and Jamie Allen. Horner won virtually every major college baseball award after leading the nation in hits (102), home runs (22), RBI (87) and total bases (191).



### ASU VS. CLEMSON—JUNE 10

Sun Devil bats blistered Clemson early, and ASU then hung on for a 10-7 win. The Devils knocked undefeated Clemson hurler Ron Musselman out of the game early with one run in the first and a three-run third inning. In the fifth, Jamie Allen led off with a homer and Steve Michael doubled in a run to give ASU a 6-0 lead, but ASU starter Jerry Vasquez faltered and allowed the Tigers five runs in the bottom of the inning. ASU rebounded with four runs in the sixth on Chris Nyman's leadoff homer, a two-run single by Bob Horner and Michael's run-scoring infield single. Mitch Dean took the win in relief, but not without the help of Jamie Allen, who came on to retire Clemson in the ninth.

ASU avenged the earlier CWS loss to Southern Illinois with a 10-0 lambasting of the Salukis. ASU totaled 19 hits during its barrage on SIU pitchers, including 13 hits off Saluki starter Dewey Robinson in the first four innings. ASU starter Darrell Jackson performed to the other extreme, allowing just three singles and only one Saluki runner to progress as far as third base. Main contributors to the Devil offense were Brandt Humphry, with four hits (three RBI with one homer), Chris Nyman (two RBI), and Bob Horner and Jamie Allen, who each had two RBI. The Devils came up just two hits short of the CWS record.

### ASU VS. SOUTH CAROLINA—JUNE 18

Arizona State earned its fourth NCAA championship with a superbly played 2-1 victory over a feisty South Carolina squad. The Devils went ahead early when Rick Peters scored after Mike Henderson singled. South Carolina countered with a solo homer by Steve King in the seventh to knot the score and provide a dramatic background for the eventual Devil victory. In the Sun Devil half of the inning, catcher Chris Bando rocked a one-out homer to right to provide the Devils with the winning margin. ASU starter Jerry Vasquez capped one of the most memorable years ever for a Devil pitcher with this victory—Vasquez went the distance for his 12th win of the year after joining the Devils earlier in the season as a walk-on player. ASU's Bob Horner was the MVP of the series, hitting .444 with two homers and nine RBI. The win boosted the Sun Devils' final season record to 57-12.

## ASU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON 1981



The 1981 Sun Devils launched the 1981 season with the slogan "Omaha and Fun in '81." They enjoyed themselves thoroughly, frolicking through the tough Pac-10 Southern Division with a 26-4 record, taking a No. 1-national ranking into the College World Series.

About the only blip was a three-game sweep at the hands of Stanford in a late-season road series, but the Devils rebounded to sweep rival Arizona in the final regular-season series to take some momentum into the post season. They beat Gonzaga once and Cal State Fullerton

twice to sweep the NCAA West Regional in Tempe and earn a trip to Omaha.

A devastating offense led by Mike Soddors (.424, 22 HR, 100 RBI), Kevin Romine (.410, 81 R, 27 SB) and Stan Holmes (.366, 14 HR, 82 RBI) set school records for team batting average (.356), home runs (110) and runs (694). Other big contributors were Donnie Hill (.378, 81 R, 22 SB), Ricky Nelson (.345, 18 HR, 68 RBI) and Alvin Davis (.396, 72 R). The bullpen was the strength of the pitching staff. Kendall Carter led the nation in victories with a 19-1 record, mostly in relief. Kevin Dukes, who beat Oklahoma State in the national title game, was 8-2 with 12 saves.



## ASU VS. TEXAS—MAY 30

The Sun Devils' explosive offense scored early and often as ASU defeated Texas, 11-2, on the first day of competition. Left fielder Stan Holmes went a perfect 5-for-5 with six RBI and three runs scored as Arizona State scored in six of the nine innings played. First baseman Alvin Davis chipped in a 4-for-5 effort as well. A-State starter Kendall Carter pitched five and two-thirds innings of five-hit ball, allowing only two unearned runs in the fifth to pick up the win. Kevin Dukes came in and shut the Longhorns down over the next 3.1 innings, recording six strikeouts.

The potent Sun Devil offense batted .325 for the tournament with nine home runs in six games.
