No. 3/5 Sun Devil Baseball Continues Pac-10 Slate On The Road With Three-Game Series at Oregon State.

What's On Tap:

The No. 3/5 Sun Devil baseball team will continue its six-game roadtrip this weekend with a three-game series at Oregon State. ASU enters the weekend with a 19-5-1 record after taking two of three from the California Golden Bears last weekend to open the Pac-10 season. ASU was the 2000 Pac-10 champions with a 17-7 record, also starting the league slate 2-1 at Cal. The Sun Devils opened with a 7-4 win Friday behind strong relief pitching from Drew Friedberg and Bryce Kartler. Friedberg remains the talk of the pitching staff, drawing rave reviews with his 3-0 record and stellar 0.83 ERA. Kartler has two saves and a 1.98 ERA in 13.2 innings of work. The Beavers enter the weekend with a 16-9 record, having won five straight. They are coming off a series sweep of Minnesota and a midweek sweep of Gonzaga. The Sun Devils are 17-10 overall in the all-time series vs. the Beavers and 2-1 all-time in Corvallis. ASU has gone 2-1 vs. the Beavers in each of the last two seasons since the Pac-10 combined the North and South divisions. After traveling to Corvallis this weekend to take on the Beavers, ASU will take on two nationally ranked teams in consecutive weeks. No. 1 Stanford visits Packard Stadium for a three-game set (March 30-April 1) and then ASU takes back to the road to face preseason No. 1 USC.

Sun Devils Scoring Streak Longest Active In NCAA At 342 Games:

The Arizona State baseball program has scored in a Pac-10 record 342 straight games, not having been shutout since a 9-0 setback to USC on April 7, 1995. The streak is currently the longest in NCAA Division I and the second longest in NCAA history. ASU was neck-in-neck with Wichita State who was not shutout in 332 games, but when the Shockers fell 1-0 vs. Louisiana-Lafayette ASU took over the national lead. Coastal Carolina holds the record at 349 games set from 1983-1989. If ASU were to break the record of 349 games without being shutout, they would have to score at least one run in the next 11 games, with the record-breaker possibly coming against nationally ranked USC on April 7 in Los Angeles. That's right, the record breaker (Game 350) could come exactly five years after the last time ASU was shutout. During the streak ASU has scored one run in only five games, ironically last coming in a 1-0 win last year vs. Oregon State.

Streiking Devils:

Rod Allen and Chris Duffy are two of the hottest Sun Devil hitters, both carrying long hitting streaks into this weekend's action vs. Oregon State. Ironically, Allen and Duffy have hits in every game they have played in at ASU, with the exception of both their debuts. Duffy went 0-for-1 in a pinch-hitting appearance vs. New Mexico State, but has since gone 24-for-59 (.407) in extending his hitting streak to 15 games. Allen, a freshman from Desert Vista High School in Phoenix, has ASU's longest hitting streak of the year at 17 games. With the exception of a 0-for-1 debut vs. Southern Utah, Allen has hits in 17 straight games while hitting .450 (27x60) over that stretch. Junior infielder Brooks Conrad had ASU's longest hitting streak in 2000 at 21 games.

The National Rankings:

With a 2-1 record vs. California last weekend, the Sun Devils still managed to move up one spot in each of the three national college baseball polls. With South Carolina dropping two of three to Tennessee, ASU moved up to No. 3 in both the Collegiate Baseball and Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches Poll. ASU also moved up from No. 6 to No. 5 in the Baseball America poll. The Sun Devils are in the midst of a tough where they will face Oregon State (received votes), Stanford (No. 1), USC (No. 9) and Cal State Fullerton (No. 24). Every Pac-10 team, save Washington State who is coming off an impressive series sweep at Oral Roberts, is ranked or at least received votes in the most recent poll.

Around The Horn With ASU Baseball:

The Sun Devils went 2-1 over the weekend with California, winning its fifth series of the year... ASU has now won all but one Pac-10 series in the last year (USC last year, 4/28-30)... senior LHP Drew Friedberg continues to dominate out of the bullpen with four more shutout innings over the weekend... Friedberg is now 3-0 on the year with a 0.83 ERA in 21.2 innings pitched... another lefty out of the bullpen, Bryce Kartler, has also turned it on as of late lowering his ERA to 1.98 with three no-hit innings Friday vs. Cal... Kartler recorded his second save of the year in that game to lock down ASU's 7-4 win... senior All-American catcher Casey Myers opened the series with a bang going 3-for-3, but struggled the rest of the series going 0-for-7 over the last two games... ASU's 4-2 come-from-behind win Saturday marked the second win the Sun Devils have recorded in their last at-bat... Nick Walsh came up with the game-winning, two-run single with two outs to give ASU the victory... Walsh was the hero in his hometown, growing up in nearby Alamo... junior second baseman/shortstop Brooks Conrad has been turning it up a notch at the plate lately, going 5-for-12 with two doubles in the Cal series and hitting .350 over his last five games to raise his season average to its current mark of .340... besides Allen's 17-game hitting streak, junior center fielder Chris Duffy also has a long streak currently in-tact... the product of South Mountain CC has hits in 15 consecutive games, going 24-for-59 (.407) over that stretch... Duffy is also making good on the preseason predictions by *Baseball America*... named the Pac-10's best defensive outfielder and best speed, Duffy has three outfield assists and is 6-for-6 in stolen bases... Duffy, who is listed as a switch-hitter, has begun experiencing as a full-time left-handed hitter... he was 2-for-5 Sunday vs. Cal batting left-handed vs. LHP Jason Dennis... Andy Torres' bid to become the nation's leader in wins fell to the wayside Sunday... Torres stands at 7-2 on the year after recording the loss in Sunday's series finale vs. Cal... the Sun Devils own the longest active streak of not having been shutout... ASU was last shutout 342 games ago on April 7, 1995 at Dedeaux Field in Los Angeles vs. USC... the national record is 349 set by Coastal Carolina... ASU is ironically on pace to break the record on April 7, 2001 vs. the same USC Trojans at Dedeaux Field... they game a scare to the record, not scoring a run until the sixth inning in Saturday's game vs. Cal... ASU has scored one run five times during the steak, ironically last against this weekend's opponent, Oregon State, on April 7 of last year.

Casey At Bat:

One of the best hitters in college baseball, Casey Myers, has not disappointed in living up to that title this year. Myers is hitting at a .427 clip (44x103) with eight doubles, four home runs and 42 RBI. Myers is 11 for his last 26 with nine RBI over that stretch. The senior catcher has hits in 19 of ASU's 25 games this year, 18 of which have been multi-hit games. With an average of nearly 2.0 RBI per game in 2001, Myers already has 42 this year and is quickly approaching the school and Pac-10 career record. With 248 in his four-year career, he is just 36 short of breaking both records set by former Sun Devil Andrew Beinbrink. Dating back to the start of 2000, Myers is hitting .416 (142x341) with 139 RBI and 22 home runs in 84 combined games.

Offensive Powerhouse ASU Tops In Scoring in NCAA Last Two Years:

Arizona State has led the NCAA in scoring each of the last two years, averaging 11.32 runs per game in 1999 and 10.97 runs per game last year. ASU also led the nation in batting average with a team total of .356 in 1999. The Sun Devils .346 average in 2000 fell just percentage points shy of matching that feat a second year in a row, trailing Stony Brook by one point. ASU out-hit Stony Brook 738-500. During Pat Murphy's seven seasons in Tempe, the Sun Devils have been a scoring machine with 3,629 runs, averaging 9.55 runs per game. 2001 has been no different scoring 10.36 runs per game and hitting .361 as a team.

More Sun Devil Tidbits:

ASU played its 1,000th career game at Packard Stadium on March 11 in a 12-4 win over South Florida... the Sun Devils are 776-223-1 all-time at the home of ASU baseball... ironically, the first game played at Packard Stadium was April 7, 1974 vs. USC (yes, something weird about April 7 here)... the team is hitting .361 and is averaging 10.36 runs per game... ASU has scored double-digits in runs 14 times and given up 10 or more runs three times... while the squad has lots of veteran leadership, 13 of the 25 players on last week's travel squad all made their Pac-10 debut... with a .387 career batting average, Myers is seventh in ASU history... he is within two RBI of second place in the ASU record books for career RBI with 248... Clay Westlake (1973-76) had 250 in his career as a Sun Devil slugger... Myers is now just 35 RBI short of the school and Pac-10 career RBI record set by former ASU third baseman Andrew Beinbrink (1996-99)... ASU is 16-3-1 in 2001 playing after a win... senior 1B/DH Jeff Phelps has been inserted back into the lineup after being sidelined with a hamstring injury... Phelps was 3-for-14 in the Cal series and is hitting .338 on the year... after going 8-for-12 in the South Florida series, raising his average to a team-high .452, freshman first baseman Jeremy West struggled vs. Cal, going 1-for-11 to drop to a still very respectable .397 on the year... he still leads the team with five home runs... while ASU didn't sweep Cal, losing 17-5 Sunday, it was not uncommon for a Sun Devil not to open a Pac-10 season with a series sweep... the last time ASU swept a Pac-10 series to open the league schedule was back in 1989 vs. UCLA... the last time ASU visited Corvallis was in 1999 when the Sun Devils took two of three from the Beavers at Coleman Field at Goss Stadium... the last time ASU faced Oregon State before 1999 was back in 1985 when Jim Brock's Sun Devils were crushed by the Beavers 13-2... redshirt Skyler Fulton is currently taking part in spring football practice.

All three of the ASU-Oregon State games can be heard over the airwaves on XTRA 910 AM. All games will air live from Coleman Field at Goss Stadium on the Oregon State campus with all three games starting at 2 p.m. MST. The series can be heard over the internet as well on the official site of ASU Athletics at www.TheSunDevils.com. The voice of Arizona State Sun Devil athletics, Tim Healey, will bring you the play-by-play with longtime Arizona sportswriter Bob Eger providing the color analysis.

Blame It On The Rain:

Rain in Arizona, yeah, that's right, and it has put a damper on the 2001 baseball season so far. Record amounts of rain in the Southwest have forced three cancellations at Packard Stadium, with two more being cancelled when ASU traveled to Fullerton to play the Titans. ASU has already made up one game with St. Mary's (6-4, L) and have a make-up game with Cal State Fullerton scheduled for April 9. The Sun Devils have also added a game with Nevada in Reno on May 16 at 3 p.m. ASU switched the game with New Mexico State from April 19 to April 17 so they can play Oral Roberts in Tulsa after the Oklahoma game. The Sun Devils will play three games in three different cities during that stretch of games with New Mexico State, Oklahoma and Oral Roberts.

The Comeback Kids:

Call them the comeback kids on the road. In three of ASU's four road games this year, the Sun Devils have come from behind to gain victories. ASU first came back against Cal State Fullerton, trailing late in the game before Nick Walsh delivered a two-run single in the seventh to give ASU a 4-3 lead en rout to a 5-3 win over the then No. 18 ranked Titans. The comeback kids struck again in the Pac-10 opener vs. Cal, overcoming three different run deficits to gain a 7-4 victory over the Golden Bears. ASU's biggest and best comeback of the year came Saturday vs. Cal when the Sun Devils were down to its last out and trailing 2-1. Mike Lopez was hit with a pitch and consecutive singles by Steve Garabrants and Chris Duffy tied the game at 2-2. Walsh was made the hero again in his hometown, knocking in two runs to give ASU a 4-2 win. Walsh's two-run single was his second game-winning hit of the year, with this one coming in front of friends and family. The left-handed swinger grew up in nearby Alamo, Calif., and grew up watching games at Evans Diamond. His two-run single game off Matt Brown, a childhood friend who Walsh had faced numerous times before.

Espo Is Back:

Possibly the best news of the season for the Sun Devils is the fact the RHP Mike Esposito (Las Vegas) is back in the starting rotation. A reliever on strict pitch counts through much of the early season, Esposito made his return as a starter vs. LSU. Leaving the game with a lead against the Tigers, Esposito made good in his second start of the year, picking up the win against South Florida with 3.1 solid innings. Only 11 months from successful Tommy John surgery, Esposito turned in possibly ASU's most impressive pitching performance of the season.. Despite picking up the no-decision, the hard-throwing right-hander allowed only four hits and two runs in seven innings against California. He struck out six and did not walk a better in his start. Esposito has thrown 17.1 innings for ASU, striking out 16 and posting an ERA of 4.67. Esposito was a fifth-round draft pick by the Cincinnati Reds in 1999 and was ASU's opening day starter in 2000 before going down with the injury. He is slated to start Saturday vs. Cal.

- Casey Myers has been a run-producing machine in 2001 with 42 on the year, and with 248 in his career needs just 35 RBI to match the ASU and Pac-10 career record of 283. He also needs just two RBI to reach second place in the ASU record books. Myers has hits in 19 of ASU's 25 games, including 18 multi-hit affairs.
- The Sun Devil baseball program has finished ranked in the top 12 in the nation in three of the past four seasons; a feat matched by only six other college programs during that time.
- ASU has had four Academic All-Americans in the last two years, more than any other college baseball program in the nation.
- ASU is averaging 10.36 runs per game this year and is hitting .361 as a team. The Devils have scored 10 or more runs 14 times.
- ASU's 10 stolen bases vs. Southern Utah (2/1) set a school record breaking the old record of nine set in 1982. Mel Stocker had four that game to tie a school record. On the year ASU has 68 stolen bases.
- Switzer's eight (8) consecutive strikeouts vs. Southern Utah was the second most in school history, as was ASU's 21 combined K's that same game. Switzer now has 63 combined K's in 43.2 innings.
- Freshman LF/DH Rod Allen currently has a 17-game hitting streak in which he has gone 27-for-60.

Beavers Bites:

The Oregon State Beavers enter the series with Arizona State riding a five-game winning streak and have won eight of their last nine overall... OSU swept NCAA Regional host Minnesota last week to improve to 16-9 on the year... the Beavers also recorded two midweek wins over Northwest rival Gonzaga... startint pitcher Scott Nicholson threw a complete-game, four-hit shutout at the Golden Gophers in a 2-0 win... first baseman Andy Jarvis leads the team with nine home runs, including three in one game vs. Washington State in a non-conference contest... The Wild, Wild West: Jeremy West:

Jeremy West and the Stock Market have a lot in common. At one point it is up, the other it is going down. Entering the week with a .452 batting average, West had a rough time at the plate in his Pac-10 debut going 1-for-11. West was coming off a torrid weekend at the plate the week before in which he was 8-for-12 in the South Florida series. The product of Silverado High School in Las Vegas, Nev., West has recorded a hit in 18 of 24 games this year and is hitting .397 (29x73). West also leads the team with five home runs, three of which have come over the last nine games, and is averaging one homer every 14.6 at-bats this year. The sweet-swinging West was hot prior to the Cal series, hitting .667 (10x15) in the four games prior to visiting Berkeley with two doubles, two triples and two home runs. In the South Florida series West was 8-for-12, including a career high four hits in the series opener. West was 4-for-5 with two RBI that night, falling just a double short of the elusive cycle.

Danger...Rod Allen On Deck:

One of the hottest hitters in the Sun Devil lineup as of late has been freshman designated hitter Rod Allen. The product of Desert Vista High School in Phoenix, Allen has been on a tear with a 17-game hitting streak in which he is 27-for-60. Allen is hitting at a team-leading .443 clip on the season with seven doubles, one triple and two home runs. Ten (10) of his 27 hits in 2001 have gone for extra bases. His two-run blast vs. Creighton (2/17) cleared both fences in left field and landed on Rio Salado Drive. He added a two-run homer vs. South Florida. The son of former major leaguer Rod Allen, Sr., who is also a broadcaster for the Arizona Diamondbacks, Allen hit .419 his senior year at Desert Vista while leading them to a state championship. With seven multi-hit games, Allen has started 13 games with 10 coming at designated hitter and three in left field. Allen has also been clutch, hitting .481 (13x27) with runners in scoring position and is 2-for-4 with the bases loaded.

Chris Duffy Makes An Immediate Impact:

Junior Chris Duffy started the season with some bad news by spraining his right MCL before the Alumni game. After a month of intense rehab, the highly touted JC transfer from South Mountain CC saw his first action of his ASU career in the Creighton series and fared well going 5-for-15 at the plate with a double and three RBI. Duffy has been consistent ever since joining the ASU lineup, racking up a 15-game hitting streak. Over those stretch of games, Duffy is 24-for-59 and is hitting an even .400 on the season. Six of his 24 hits have been infield hits, demonstrating his tremendous speed. In the Oral Roberts game Duffy knocked in a career high four runs and tabbed his first triple as a Sun Devil. Duffy, who was the nation's top base stealer at the JC level last year with 59, is described as a five-tool player and will play center field for ASU. Duffy is rated as one of the top 100 prospects in the nation by *Baseball America* (62) and earned the distinction of having the best outfield arm and best speed in the Pac-10's preseason outlook by *Baseball America*. Duffy hit .409 at South Mountain last year and was a 43rd round draft choice of the Boston Red Sox. Duffy also has three outfield assists, cutting down runners at home plate each time, and has recorded at least one hit in each of his 15 starts. The junior who is listed as a switch hitter, is also experimenting to become a full-time left-handed hitter. In his first game batting all lefty vs. Cal (3/18), Duffy was 2-for-5.

Pat Murphy at ASU:

Arizona's State has had only three coaches in its illustrious history. The latest to join the legacy is Pat Murphy who has enjoyed great success since arriving in Tempe six years ago in 1995. Murphy has guided ASU to a 251-128-1 (.662) and posted an impressive 92-78 record in the tough Pac-10. ASU has advanced to postseason play in three of the six years under Murphy, including a 2nd place finish at the College World Series in 1998. With his 245 wins at ASU, Murphy has the third best winning percentage of Pac-10 coaches. Murphy is eight wins shy of 100 career Pac-10 victories. Of all active Division I coaches, Murphy entered 2001 ranked 14th with a career .675 winning percentage.

As Cool As Friedberg:

Senior LHP Drew Friedberg has quietly gotten the job done out of the bullpen. Part of a trio of three solid left-handed pitchers out of the ASU bullpen (Friedberg, Pezely, Kartler), Friedberg has been stellar out of the bullpen with a 0.83 ERA in 21.2 innings on the mound. Allowing only 10 hits and two runs this year, Friedberg has struck out 25 in his nine outings. Friedberg turned in a stellar performance vs. South Florida, coming out of the bullpen in relief of starter Jon Switzer. He inherited a bases loaded, no-out situation and got out of the jam. He allowed only one hit and did not allow a run to score vs. the Bulls to pick up his second win of the season. He also has a solid outing vs. Cal State Fullerton (2/23), coming out of the bullpen to throw three shutout innings in picking up his first win in over a year. His latest impressive outing came vs. Cal (3/16) in which he threw 2.0 shutout innings to pick up the win and move to 3-0 on the season. Friedberg combined for four shutout innings in the Cal series to run his scoreless innings streak to 9.0 innings. The Middleton, Wisc., native has bounced between being a starter and reliever in his four-year ASU career, peaking when he threw a complete-game one hitter vs. Hawaii-Hilo to open his 1999 season. As a junior he was 1-0 with a respectable 4.00 ERA in 27.0 innings. He has been drafted twice in his career, most recently last year by the Milwaukee Brewers in the 29th round.



Sun Devil Baseball 2001

Bobby Winkles Field:

The Baseball Field at Packard Stadium was officially named Bobby Winkles Field last Saturday as part of a special weekend honoring ASU's first varsity baseball coach. Winkles Field was officially named during a special ceremony before Saturday's game with LSU. Around 90 of Winkles former players joined a sellout crowd at Packard Stadium to honor Winkles and his tremendous strides to put ASU baseball on the map. Winkles was ASU's first varsity coach, compiling an impeccable 524-173 record during his 13-year career at ASU. He guided the Sun Devils to three national championships (1965, 67, 69) and tutored future major league greats Rick Monday, Reggie Jackson and Sal Bando. ASU is 4-1-1 on Winkles Field.

All-American Myers On An RBI Tear At The Plate:

Senior All-American catcher Casey Myers is quickly reminding players why he is one of the best players in all of college baseball. A legitimate candidate for Player of the Year honors, Myers is hitting .427 with hits in 19 of ASU's 25 games. Remarkably, 18 of those games have been multi-hit affairs. Myers, who hit .412 last year and was a finalist for the National Player of the Year award. Behind the plate Myers has been instrumental in the success of the ASU pitching staff, calling all the pitches. With 42 RBI in 2001 and 248 for his career, Myers is steadily climbing the ASU and Pac-10 career record list. Now just 35 short of tying both records set by former Sun Devil Andrew Beinbrink (1996-1999), Myers is third in the Pac-10 and ASU record books. He is just 15 short of second place in the Pac-10 books (John Gall, Stanford) and two (2) RBI short of second place in the ASU books (250, Clay Westlake). Myers needs 53 more RBI to rank among the top seven run-producers in college baseball history; a list that includes Robin Ventura, Joe Carter and Pete Incaviglia. Defensively, the 2000 *Collegiate Baseball* Defensive Player of the Year has also been solid, carrying a .996 fielding percentage into this weekend's action. Myers was 3-for-10 (.300) in the Cal series and is hitting .333 over the last five games.

Myers Passes Horner On Career Record List:

His numbers rank up there with the best of the numerous Arizona State greats, but with 248 RBI and a .387 batting average in his career, senior Casey Myers recently passed one of the greatest former Sun Devils, Bob Horner. Horner, who hit .277 over the course of 10 MLB seasons and hit 218 career home runs, played at ASU from 1976-78. Myers passed Horner's third-place mark of 228 RBI's and now is within 37 of the school record of 283. Myers has also passed for career batting average and is currently seventh at .387. Horner hit .384 with a school record 56 home runs. Horner was the first overall pick in the 1978 draft by the Atlanta Braves and jumped right to the Major Leagues that year hitting 23 home runs to be named the National League Rookie of the Year.

Sun Devils Offensive Powerhouse Under Murphy:

The Sun Devils have been an offensive powerhouse under head coach Pat Murphy. Leading the nation in scoring the last two years and in the top two in batting average, Murphy's teams have flat out put the bat on the ball. Compiling an impressive 251-128-1 record since taking the program over, his teams have averaged 9.58 runs per game and collectively hit .334. Senior Casey Myers was recently named to the preseason Street & Smith's College Baseball All-Americans list. Myers, who was also a preseason All-American as selected by Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball, has been one of the hottest hitters in all of college baseball with a .418 batting average (124x297) dating back to the beginning of last year. Casey Myers An All-American On The Field And In The Classroom:

Senior team captain Casey Myers (Casa Grande) is listed as a preseason All-American by nearly every publication in 2001, but that doesn't even scratch the surface as to what Myers brings to the ASU program. He was named Pac-10 Player of the Year in 2000; becoming the second straight season an ASU player has earned the honor (Willie Bloomquist, 1999). The catcher and team leader was among a handful of players vying for *Baseball America's* National Player of the Year award and was named a semi-finalist for the Johnny Bench Collegiate Catcher of the Year. Myers certainly put up impressive numbers in 2000, leading the team in batting average (.412), hits (98), doubles (19) and on-base percentage (.502), as well as RBI (97). His 97 RBI rank fourth in the ASU single-season record book. With 42 already this year, Myers now has 248 career RBI and needs 36 over the course of his senior year to break the Pac-10 and ASU career record. His current mark of 248 RBI places him third in the Pac-10 and ASU record books. He hit 18 home runs (second on the team) behind teammate Mitch Jones and now has 36 in his career to tie for seventh in school history. The school record is 56 set by Bob Horner. Myers has quietly done an excellent job behind the plate as well, calling the pitches himself and making the pitching staff step up to the next level. He has been named conference player of the week three times during his career at ASU. He reached base safely (hit, walk, HBP) in 54 of 59 games in '00. Myers led the squad in multiple-hit games (31) and multi-RBI games (29). His multi-hit games included three, four-hit affairs. He hit safely in 50 of 59 games. Myers was clutch with 26 two-out RBI and hit .417 with the bases loaded. He hit .466 (48x103) with runners in scoring position and .459 with runners on base. Myers finished his junior campaign ranked 30th in the nation in batting average (.412), third in RBI (97), and 35th in home runs (.31 per game). So far in 2001, Myers has not disappointed with a .427 average, four home runs, 42 RBI, eight doubles and has recorded 18 multi-hit games and 14 multi-RBI games.



More On Myers: As asset for the program throughout his career in Tempe, Myers has also been stellar in the classroom. The math whiz that scored a perfect 800 on the math portion of the SAT out of high school, Myers has maintained a near-perfect GPA as a math/accounting major at ASU. He was an Academic All-American in 1999 and 2000, and received college baseball's highest academic honor last year when he was named the GTE/CoSida Academic All-American of the Year. In addition to being named the Academic All-American of the Year, All-American and Pac-10 Player of the Year in 2000, Myers was also named the *Collegiate Baseball* National Defensive Player of the Year with a .996 fielding percentage. In November, Myers was named the top amateur athlete in the state of Arizona by the March of Dimes.

Sun Devil Baseball 2001

The Franchise, Jon Switzer:

After going 11-3 last year and having a successful summer with Team USA, junior lefty Jon Switzer (Houston, Texas) is off to a great start in what is expected to be a stellar junior campaign. The junior has not disappointed earning the *Collegiate Baseball* National Player of the Week award (2/5). He earned the honor by striking out 13 of the 16 batters he faced against Southern Utah (2/2). At one point he struck out eight in a row to rank second in the ASU record books. Switzer was named a preseason All-American by *Collegiate Baseball* (2nd Team) and *Baseball America* (3rd team). Despite back-to-back rough outings vs. LSU and South Florida and a fourth consecutive no-decision vs. Cal, Switzer is still perfect for the season with a 3-0 record and 4.12 ERA. Switzer is averaging 12.98 strikeouts per nine innings of work and has 63 for the year in 43.2 innings. Switzer has recorded double-digits in strikeouts in three starts this year. For his career, the hard-throwing lefty has struck out 262 in 246.2 innings and is 21-7 with a 4.01 ERA. He was named an honorable mention on the 2000 Pac-10 All-Conference team. Switzer picked up win No. 11 vs. Arizona May 21 in a relief appearance, making him the first ASU pitcher to reach 11 wins since 1993. Switzer finished with an impressive 5-2 record in conference play with a 4.47 ERA. He was honored as Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week three times in '00 (tying UCLA's Rob Henkel for the most honors). He led the team with 121 strikeouts and held opposing batters to a .228 average at the plate. He ranked seventh in the conference in ERA (3.89), third in opposing batting average (.228), sixth in strikeouts (121) and third in wins (11). Drafted in the 26th round out of high school by the Pittsburgh Pirates, Switzer is listed as one of the top lefties for the 2001 draft. He was 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA with Team USA this past summer before leaving the team early after having an emergency appendectomy surgery. Switzer is labeled by Baseball America as the 25th prospect in the nation for the 2001 draft and is the 14th college prospect in the nation for the June draft.

Recruiting Class Draws Rave Reviews:

The recruiting class that makes up the freshman class on the diamond this spring was rated as the top class of recruits in the nation by *Baseball America*. Highlighted by seven players who were selected in the annual Major League Draft, the group includes several players who are expected to contribute immediately. The recruiting class was also ranked third in the nation by *Collegiate Baseball*.

On The Road Again:

With two consecutive road series to start the 2001 Pac-10 season, ASU will be hoping to improve upon its luck since the last time they started a league schedule with two consecutive road series. The Sun Devils opened the 1999 season with road series at Arizona and Stanford. During that stretch ASU went 2-4. The Sun Devils also went 2-4 in 1993 under Jim Brock when they opened with UCLA and Cal on the road. So far ASU is 2-1 to open its 2001 Pac-10 road schedule that will also see the Devils tour Los Angeles (USC) Corvallis (Oregon State) and Seattle (Washington).

42 Years of Sun Devil Baseball:

While the history of baseball at Arizona State University goes back all the way to the early 1900's, the school officially began sponsoring varsity baseball in 1959. In 42-plus years of varsity baseball at Arizona State, the program has built a legacy matched by few in the college baseball world. With a 1,876-741-1 all-time record, Arizona State has recorded winning seasons in all but one year, advanced to the College World Series 18 times, won five national championships, won six Pac-10 titles, produced 13 Players of the Year and three Golden Spikes Award winners, and has gone to the NCAA Tournament 24 times. Under current head coach Pat Murphy, the Sun Devils have finished in the top 12 in three of the last four years and finished second in the nation in 1998.

El Torrito; Andy Torres:

He doesn't look like much and he doesn't dazzle you with fancy stuff, he just gets you out. ASU's latest addition to the roster is junior college transfer RHP Andy Torres. Torres, who came to ASU from East Los Angeles CC, had a stellar career on the mound at the JC level, capping his career with a 12-3 record, 2.11 ERA, one save and 113 strikeouts in 119.1 innings pitched. The 6-0, 165 Torres recorded a win in his ASU debut and has since tacked on six more to enter this weekend with a 7-2 record. He is coming off his roughest start of the year at Cal in which he gave up five runs in 1.2 innings. With a fast and fluid motion, the quick-worker has managed a 4.46 ERA in his nine outings, with eight coming as starts. He has struck out 30 and walked only 12 this year. Torres went 2-0 vs. Oral Roberts and South Florida with a combined 3.38 ERA in 13.1 innings. Torres is currently among the national leaders in wins, with New Mexico State's Dan Bivian at 7-1 and BYU's Nate Fernley at 7-1. He is scheduled to start Sunday vs. Oregon State.

Filling the Stands:

Through 21 home games of the 2001 season, ASU has drawn 55,378 fans to Packard Stadium to see the nationally ranked Sun Devils get off to a fast 17-4-1 start. Averaging 2,768 fans per date at home, ASU is among the nations best so far this year in attendance for college baseball. ASU finished 11th in the nation and second on the west coast in 2000. The 18,465 fans that showed up for the LSU series was the largest draw for at three-game series since 1989 when 20,095 came out to see ASU and Arizona play. The attendance of 6,457 that came out for Bobby Winkles Day (3/3) on the Saturday game of the LSU series was the biggest single-game crowd since April 27, 1996 when 6,969 attended the USC-ASU game at Packard Stadium.

Speed Kills:

Speed on the base paths is a weapon that never goes in a slump. For ASU, the 2001 season provides plenty of speed on the bench and in the lineup. The Sun Devils have stolen 68 bases so far, led by Mel Stocker's 15, and are already more than half past their entire 2000 season total of 92. After coming off a knee sprain, speedster Chris Duffy has started to add to the Devils stolen base threat with six (6) in 15 starts this year. Duffy led the nation at the junior college level last year with 59 stolen bases. Freshman Steve Garrabrants set an Arizona State record last spring with 51 stolen bases at Moon Valley High School and already has 11 this year. Junior Brooks Conrad also has 13 in 2001.

Last Year In Pac-10 Play:

ASU won the Pac-10 Championship last year with a 17-7 record. Leading the way for ASU in conference play was a handful of players that helped lead the Sun Devils to its sixth league record since joining the Pac-10 in 1979. Senior third baseman Mike Lopez hit .373 (25x67) in Pac-10 play, while Casey Myers followed him with a .366 average and eight of his 18 home runs. As a team the Sun Devils hit .329 with 32 home runs and a stellar .973 fielding percentage. On the mound ASU hurlers combined for a 5.48 staff ERA in Pac-10 game only. Eric Doble showed why he was an All-Pac-10 performer with a 2-0 record with six saves and a 2.66 ERA. Franco Pezely was perfect at 5-0 with a 2.70 ERA in league play, while ace lefty Jon Switzer was 5-2 with a 4.47 ERA in his eight Pac-10 starts.

Mr. Clutch: Mike Lopez:

Senior third baseman Mike Lopez is the heart of the 2001 Sun Devils, and you don't need to go far to realize how much he means to this team. Holding down the hot corner with steady defense and manning the plate as a clutch hitter, Lopez is currently hitting .378 with 12 doubles, a home run and 31 RBI. A defining moment of his clutch hitting was when ASU was down one in the bottom of the eighth to Southern Utah (2/4) and Lopez delivered ASU's first home run of the season to tie the game. Lopez caught fire back in the Creighton series when he combined to go 9-for-13 with 10 RBI in the three games vs. the Bluejays. Lopez leads the Sun Devils with 12 doubles, equaling his season total from 2000. The third baseman has been very clutch, hitting .436 (17x39) with runners in scoring position. His best game of the season came 2/18 vs. Creighton when he had a career day at the plate. Lopez went 4-for-5 with three doubles and seven RBI. He has hits in 16 of 24 games this season, and dating back to last year has recorded at least one base hit in 39 of his last 49 games. During that stretch dating back to March 14, 2000, Lopez is hitting .390 (67x172) with 59 RBI and 22 doubles in 50 combined games.

The Fantastic Freshmen:

Dubbed as the best recruiting class in the nation, the newcomers of the 2001 Sun Devil baseball team has not disappointed. Rod Allen (.443/2 HR/21 RBI) and Jeremy West (.397/5 HR/23 RBI) have not disappointed while becoming mainstays in the ASU lineup. West has seen more action at first base with the injury to Jeff Phelps. Steve Garrabrants has stepped up at second base and left field like he has been playing the college game for four years. Garrabrants is hitting .326 with four doubles, a team-leading four triples and 17 RBI. Ryan McKenna is hitting .250 off the bench with five hits and three RBI. Throw Eric Keefner in that bunch and you have an offensive powerhouse for the future and the present. On the mound, RHP starter Ryan Schroyer is 2-1 with a 4.96 ERA. J.J. Jackson is also a freshman in the mix out of the bullpen and has posted a 6.14 ERA with 10 strikeouts.

Kartler Coming Into His Own:

A role player through much of the early part of the season, redshirt freshman LHP Bryce Kartler has come into his own as of late and is one of the go-to guys out of the bullpen. Kartler, who is 0-0 with two saves in 2001, has combined for a 1.98 ERA in 10.2 innings out of the bullpen. Kartler has pitched 12.0 of his 13.2 innings in his last five outings, throwing 3.0 innings vs. LSU (3/4), 3.1 innings vs. South Florida (3/10) and picked up his second save of the year with 3.0 no-hit innings at Cal (3/16) to lock down a 7-4 ASU win. His best outing of the year came by way of only nine pitches, but with runners on second and third base and up by two, he struck out the final two batters of the game to gain his first save of the year in helping seal ASU's 5-3 win over Cal State Fullerton (2/23). Coming out of the bullpen Kartler has inherited 14 runners on base, allowing only five to score.

Nothing Special, Just Gets It Done: Brooks Conrad:

A smooth fielder and a pure switch-hitter, junior second baseman Brooks Conrad will turn some heads during the 2001 season. Nothing flashy and nothing overwhelming, Conrad just gets the job done. The junior is putting up solid numbers once again in 2001 with a .340 batting average, including seven doubles, three triples, a home run and 19 RBI. Conrad is coming off a solid weekend vs. Cal, going 5-for-12 with two double and two RBI to open his Pac-10 season. He has recorded a hit in 22 of 25 games in 2001. He had a 15-game hitting streak snapped against Cal State Fullerton, but has a hit in eight of his last 10 games, including a 3-for-4 game vs. Cal (3/16). Conrad is among the team leaders with 28 runs scored. Conrad was named to the 2000 Pac-10 All-Conference team when he hit at a .336 clip and finished second on the team in runs (72). He hit .351 in league play with 15 of his 33 hits going for extra bases. He became only the 18th player to hit a homer over the green monster at Packard Stadium vs. Washington (5/14). Conrad hit .392 with runners in scoring position and .500 when he led off an inning. The Spring Valley, Calif., native notched 19 multi-hit games as well as 15 multi-RBI games during the '00 season. The switch hitter was named Pac-10 Player of the Week twice in 2000. For his career at ASU, Conrad is a .338 hitter with 140 hits and 27 doubles. He has started 15 games at second base in '01 and nine games at shortstop.

Drafted Devils:

A total of 17 players on the 2001 Arizona State squad have been taken in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Since the inception of the draft in 1965, ASU has had more players chosen (289), more first-round draft picks (21) and more No. 1 picks (3) than any other school in the nation. Eight (8) players from the 2000 Pac-10 Championship team were drafted last June. ASU's three No. 1 picks were Rick Monday (1965), Floyd Bannister (1976) and Bob Horner (1978, Atlanta).

Horner Ranks Second As Player of the Century:

Former Sun Devil greats Bob Horner and Eddie Bane were honored by *Baseball America* by being placed on the publications' "Team of the Century." Horner, an ASU great under Jim Brock from 1976-78, hit .383 for his career and belted a school record 56 home runs. Horner was listed second on the team behind Oklahoma State slugger Pete Incaviglia (1983-85). Bane, a top pitcher for the Sun Devils from 1971-72, posted a career 40-4 record and a 1.64 ERA. Bloomquist Earns Minor League All-Star Award:

Willie Bloomquist (1997-1999) showed signs he would be a great professional ball player during his time at ASU. After his first full season of professional ball, the 1999 Pac-10 Player of the Year turned in a banner season split between Single-A Lancaster and Triple-A Tacoma in the Seattle Mariners organization. The second basemen hit a blistering .379 at Lancaster to earn Single-A all-star status and was overall a second-team Minor League All-Star as selected by the writers at *Baseball America*. After having a great spring training last year with the M's, Bloomquist has reported to the Big League camp with the M's in Peoria, and has a shot at making the opening day roster.

Preseason Awards Plenty for Sun Devils:

Several Sun Devils received honors from various preseason college baseball publications. Casey Myers was a unanimous Preseason All-American as the Devils cracked the polls at No. 6 in the nation. Eric Doble was named a third-team preseason All-American by the NCBWA and Jon Switzer was also coveted as a preseason All-American. In Baseball America's annual Pac-10 review, five players received all-conference recognition. Myers, Doble, Switzer, in addition to Chris Duffy and Jeff Phelps were named to the team.

ASU And Team USA:

Junior lefty Jon Switzer (Houston, Texas) was among 20 invitees to the 2000 USA Baseball Team Trials and was one of two ASU players to represent the Red, White and Blue last summer. Switzer was joined by three other Pac-10 players: USC's Mark Prior, UCLA's Josh Karp and Stanford's Brian Sager at the trials, and junior catcher Casey Myers was also selected to play for the team. Myers (Casa Grande, Ariz.) was a member of the junior national team in '96 and was a '98 national team invitee. Myers ended up hitting .310 with Team USA and Switzer was 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA.

Arizona State Claims Pac-10 Championship in 2000:

For the first time in league history, three teams finished in a tie for first place in the conference standings in 2000. ASU, Stanford and UCLA all notched a 17-7 record in Pac-10 play. By virtue of a tie breaker (ASU won both conference series against Stanford and UCLA), the Sun Devils received the Pac-10's automatic bid to postseason play. It was their first conference championship since 1993 and sixth since joining the Pac-10 in 1978. Stanford and Pac-10 runner-up USC advanced through the NCAA Tournament and made appearances at the College World Series in Omaha. Stanford was the eventual runner-up.

Two Sport Stars:

If you think you heard the names of a couple of ASU baseball players' names being called over the Sun Devil Stadium loudspeaker during football season, that wasn't a joke. Three players, Skyler Fulton, Jon Sheaffer and Eric Keefner all double as players on the ASU football team. Sheaffer (WR) and Fulton (RB) saw action on special teams, while Keefner (LB) was named the Scout Team MVP. Kevin Tommasini (1996-97) and Jason Verdugo (1994-97) were the last Devils to double as a player on the diamond and on the gridiron.

Murphy Garners Pac-10 Coach of the Year Award in 2000:

Head coach Pat Murphy was voted the Pac-10 Coach of the Year by his peers for the 2000 season. The Sun Devils skipper led his squad to its sixth Pac-10 Conference title and first since 1993. ASU was picked to finish sixth in the league in the preseason coaches' poll. Murphy led the Devils to their third postseason appearance in the last four years.

Success in the Classroom As Well As On The Field:

ASU has long enjoyed much success on the diamond, and with 18 College World Series appearances, it is known as one of the gems of college baseball. But lately academics, as well as on-field talent, have shown its true colors in the storied program. Pat Murphy's Sun Devil squads have produced four Academic All-Americans over the past two years (Willie Bloomquist, Mark Ernster, Jeff Phelps, Casey Myers), including Myers being named the Academic All-American for college baseball in 2000. The four players honored as National Academic All-Americans is the most by any college baseball program in the nation over the last two years. The 2001 squad also features two players, Ty Johnson and Mike Lopez, who have already received their undergraduate degrees and are pursuing their master's. Myers, Phelps, Eric Doble and Jonah Martin are all scheduled to graduate in May.

The Assistant Coaches:

Coach Murphy has long been regarded for his winning programs and the development of college players into top pro talent. Perhaps the most forgotten skill Murphy should be praised for is his development of assistant coaches into head coaches. Four of his former assistants, Nino Giarratano (San Francisco), John Pawlowski (Charleston), Doug Schreiber (Purdue) and Brian Cleary (Cincinnati) have all moved onto the head coaching ranks. His current staff that he has assembled over the years is one of the best in all of college baseball. Jay Sferra is in his sixth year in association with the ASU baseball program and his third as an assistant coach. Sferra helps with the pitching staff and is the recruiting coordinator. Mike Rooney is regarded as one of the best assistants in the country and his on-field leadership and teaching skills make him a coveted coaching prospect for the future. Billy Jones is in his first year as a volunteer assistant coach and will head up the Sun Devil outfielders this spring. Jones was recently named the head coach for the Brewster Whitecaps in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

Golden Spikes Common At Arizona State:

While Kip Bouknight of South Carolina was the recipient of the 2000 Golden Spikes award as the nation's top amateur baseball player, it should be noted that three Arizona State players have won the award. Bob Horner, who was a standout at ASU from 1976-78, won the inaugural award in 1978. Oddibe McDowell, who was a member of the first Team USA baseball team to compete in an Olympics, won the award in 1984. Mike Kelly, who ranks second in ASU history with 46 home runs from 1989-91, won the award in 1991. In all, 13 players that have worn the Maroon and Gold have been named a Player of the Year for college baseball.

ASU Leader of the Pac When It Comes to Player of the Week:

Arizona State has amassed 41 Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week and 62 Players of the Week since 1981. That total leads all Pac-10 member schools. The Sun Devils had four players honored as Pac-10 POW last year (Mitch Jones -2, Brooks Conrad -2) and Jon Switzer was a three-time recipient of the award in 2000.

Arizona State in Postseason Play:

The Sun Devil baseball program has created a dynasty in college baseball that has been matched by few. With 18 appearances in the College World Series, ASU ranks fourth for the most trips to Omaha. Arizona State has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 24 of the program's 42 seasons, amassing an incredible 116-43 (.730) record. ASU's five National Championships rank as the second most of any NCAA school. In addition to ASU's five national championships, the Sun Devils have also turned in five second-place teams and three third-place finishes.

ASU Stellar In Pac-10 Play:

While Arizona and Arizona State both joined the Pacific-10 Conference in 1979 as the newest additions to the "Conference of Champions," ASU has quickly made quick gains to place its name among the top two in winning percentage of all Pac-10 schools. With a career 440-302 record combined when apart of the old Six-Pac or the combined Pac-10, ASU's .593 winning percentage falls behind just behind USC's .642 winning percentage in 77 years being affiliated with the Pac-10.

ASU Is Now 22-2 In Season Openers Since 1979:

If you think ASU's Jan. 26th game vs. Texas-Arlington was a late start for the season, well it is. In fact, it is the latest ASU has started a season since opening Feb. 2 in 1996. Despite the loss to UTA, the Sun Devil baseball program has maintained an impressive 22-2 record in season openers dating back to 1979, while head coach Pat Murphy is 6-1 in Tempe having recorded a season-opening win in six of his seven years at the helm of the Sun Devils. Murphy's teams have also greatly outscored their opponents since 1995 in season openers, 71-23. In his 13+ years as a head coach at the Division I level (Now 7 at ASU, 7 at Notre Dame), Murphy has lost only one game (UTA). One of his season openers actually came against ASU when the Irish defeated the Sun Devils 11-4 in 1993. The last time ASU lost a season opener before this year was a 9-4 setback to Hawai'i in 1993, and ASU advanced to the CWS that year.

While ASU started the new millennium with a bang winning the Pac-10 Championship with a 44-15 record, the decade of the 1990's was one that marked great success for the ASU program. The Sun Devils compiled a 398-213 (.651) record during the decade and made three trips to Omaha for the College World Series. The 398 wins were third-best of all conference schools.

Where ASU Ranked In The Nation in 2000:

ASU had a year that will go down in the NCAA record books. The Sun Devils finished second in hitting with a .346 team batting average, trailing only Stony Brook which posted a .347 average. The team went a collective 738-for-2134. The Sun Devils, however, were the most productive team in the nation in '00, leading the NCAA in scoring, while averaging 10.97 runs per game. Varsity Squad Dominates Alumni In Annual Contest Held Jan. 20:

Led by a strong pitching performance from converted catcher Ty Johnson (Englewood, Colo.), the 2001 varsity squad defeated the Alumni 8-3 on Jan. 20 at Packard Stadium. The Alumni squad, which featured 15 players who are currently playing in the minor leagues and one former Major Leaguer (Ken Phelps) were easily handled by Johnson and lefty ace Jon Switzer (Houston, Texas). Johnson and Switzer combined to allow only three hits and one run in five innings. At the player the 2001 Devils pounded out 13 hits and were led by catcher Casey Myers who finished the day 2-for-4 with two RBI. Third baseman Mike Lopez and reserve infielder Lucas Weber (Tucson, Ariz.) also recorded two hits apiece in the winning effort. Both teams used wood bats in the game. For the Alumni, Montreal Expos product Dan McKinley was the only player to record more than one hit. Willie Bloomquist (1997-99), Mitch Jones (1999-2000) and Andrew Beinbrink (1996-99) were just a few of the past Sun Devil greats who played in the game.

Reviewing the 2000 Pac-10 Championship Season:

ASU won its sixth Pac-10 title (all since 1981) and first since 1993, after being picked sixth in the preseason poll... ASU hit the 40-win plateau for the fourth time since 1993... The 17 league wins were a five-game improvement from 1999 and it was the fifth time since 1990 with 17 or more wins in Pac-10 play... ASU was 2nd in the nation in batting, 5th in fielding percentage, and 1st in scoring in 2000... ASU led the Conference in batting average (.346), runs per game (11.0), slugging percentage (.561), on base percentage (.454), RBI (588), triples (37), walks (336), and stolen bases (92)... Sr. OF Mitch Jones broke Bob Horner's (1978) 22-year-old school record for home runs when he hit No. 26 vs. Arizona May 21. Jones finished with 27, becoming just the ninth player in Pac-10 history to hit at least 27 in a season, and seventh to do so since 1990... ASU had an extra-base hit in all but two games in 2000... ASU batters were hit by a pitch 115 times in 2000, breaking the Pac-10 record (101, UW, 1998). The mark ranks in the top-four all-time in the NCAA record books (125, Nevada in 1997)... Pac-10 Player of the Year Casey Myers finished '00 with 97 RBI, second-best in Pac-10 history, and 206 for his career, fifth-best. Myers led the Sun Devils with 98 hits, 19 doubles, 97 RBI, and a .502 on-base percentage. Myers led the Pac-10 in RBI and on-base percentage. He also ranked among the Conference leaders in hits (3rd), slugging percentage (.718, t3rd), total bases (171, 7th), runs scored (71, 9th), home runs (18, t8th), and doubles (19, t9th). Myers batted .412 for the season, second in the Pac-10 tied for 22nd-best average in single season Pac-10 history... Myers and Jones (92) ranked first and second in the Conference in RBI; third and fifth in the nation... The Sun Devils scored 10 or more runs in 31 games last season, and 20 runs nine times.

Sun Devil Baseball on the Tube:

Heading into the season, the Sun Devils are tentatively scheduled to play 11 televised games in 2001 on Cox Communications Channel 9. ASU is also guaranteed at least one game to be televised by Fox Sports Net as part of the Pac-10's agreement. With longtime ASU broadcaster George Allen and former Arizona State Assistant Sports Information Director Doug Gerlach calling the play-by-play, schedule highlights for TV games include the entire series vs. LSU (March 2-4). ASU and Arizona will play the Pac-10 Game of the Week on Fox Sports Net April 28. The tentative Cox schedule for ASU baseball is as follows:

Arizona State Sun Devil Baseball

Head Coach Pat Murphy

Arizona State baseball head coach Pat Murphy has continued the storied tradition of Sun Devil baseball. After taking a Notre Dame program from rags to riches and a perennial national power, Murphy arrived at ASU in 1995 and has since left his mark on collegiate baseball as one of the top coaches in the nation. The 1998 *Baseball America* Coach of the Year and 2000 Pac-10 Coach of the Year, Murphy has won 66% of his games in Tempe (251-128-1). A mastermind and teacher on the field, Murphy has also turned ASU baseball into a academic powerhouse with four Academic All-Americans in the last two years. Add to that the fact ASU has finished in the top 12 in the nation in three of the last four years and you have a Murphy led program that stands as one of the top programs in the nation.

He has guided Arizona State to top-12 national rankings in three of the last four years, including an appearance in the 1998 College World Series national championship game. With a 625-299-4 career record in 16 seasons, he is the winningest active baseball coach under the age of 43 at any collegiate level. Heading into the 2001 season, Murphy was the 15th winningest coach by percentage in Division I. He also entered 2001 as one of the top 41 coaches all-time with his .672 winning percentage. He also became the youngest collegiate coach to reach 500 career victories (with 75 percent of the wins at the Division I level) on March 22, 1998, with a 7-6 victory over California.

Throughout his illustrious career, Murphy has earned accolades in the international ranks as well, as led the Dutch Olympic Baseball Team in the Sydney 2000 Games this past September. In the 2000 Olympics, Murphy led the Dutch National team to their best showing in international competition with a 3-4 record in the Sydney games. The Netherlands placed fifth with wins over Australia, Cuba and their rival Italy. The Dutch's 4-2 victory over Cuba was the first loss in Olympic play at the time for the international power, a span that covered 21 games. The win by Murphy's squad was noted by nbcolympics.com as one of the top four upsets in Olympic team competition. The Dutch went on to finish fifth in the Olympic tournament. In a pre-Olympic tournament, Murphy beat Team USA and its famous manager Tommy Lasorda.

Most recently at the college ranks, Murphy led the 2000 edition of Arizona State baseball to a 44-15 record, its third postseason appearance in four years and a final top-15 national ranking. The Sun Devils also captured their first Pac-10 Championship since 1993 with a 17-7 conference record, earning the league's automatic bid by virtue of tie breakers against both Stanford and UCLA. Adding to his credentials as the 1998 *Baseball America* National Coach of the Year, Murphy was voted the 2000 Pac-10 Coach of the Year by his peers.

Getting to Know The Leader of the Devils

- Led the Sun Devils to top 12 rankings in three of the past four years. A feat matched only by only six other college programs.
- Named the 1998 *Baseball America* National Coach of the Year and the 2000 Pac-10 Coach of the Year.
- Brought in the best recruiting class in the nation this year, which includes two high school All-Americans and eight players who have been drafted.
- Has a 251-128-1 career record at Arizona State, winning over 66% of his games. He is 92-78 in his Pac-10 career as well.
- Coached the Dutch Olympic team to three wins in the Sydney 2000 Olympics, including a win over international power Cuba.
- Has coached four academic All-Americans in the last two years, and numerous All-Americans since 1995.

- Led ASU to the College World Series in 1998, marking the fastest return to the CWS for a Pac-10 team after a coaching change was made.

Notes On The Series:

The Beavers and Sun Devils have only met 27 times in the all-time series, with ASU holding a 17-10 advantage. ASU has taken four of the last six games in 1999 and 2000, with all games being played in Pac-10 play. ASU and Oregon State last met before those games in 1989 at a neutral site. ASU has played in Corvallis only three times, all in 1999, winning two of three. The Beavers are 16-9 on the year and received three votes in the Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches Poll last week. They are coming off a series sweep of Minnesota and have won five in a row. In the six games dating back to 1999, ASU has hit .291 as a team, with Casey Myers going 8-for-24 combined in those six games. On the mound Jon Switzer will take a perfect 0.00 ERA to the mound Saturday vs. the Beavers. The junior LHP was stellar last year, lasting eight innings while not allowing a run to cross the plate. No other current Sun Devil has a career batting average about .300 besides Myers.
