NATIONAL RANKINGS

Arizona State (24-13, 8-4) kept very steady in the national polls after going 2-1 at UCLA. ASU improved two spots to No. 14 by Baseball Weekly/ESPN. ASU is also ranked No. 23 by Baseball America and No. 22 by Collegiate Baseball. The **Sun Devils** have now been ranked in the national polls for 50 consecutive weeks. **Cal** is not ranked in any of the national polls.

MEDIA EXPOSURE

All three games of Sun Devil baseball games vs. Cal this weekend will be broadcast over the internet (www.TheSunDevils.com) and in the Phoenix area on XTRA 910 AM. Tim Healey and Bob Eger will bring you all the action from Hohokam Stadium, including pregame and postgame radio shows. The LiveStats will return after a two-week absence on the road. The Sun Devils are 11-8 this year when games are broadcast on the radio.

SETTING UP THE SERIES

The Sun Devils (24-13, 8-4) are in first place in the Pac-10 by a half game over USC with the first half of the 2002 Pac-10 schedule completed. ASU has won seven of the last nine games against the Cal Golden Bears and will be playing them for the first time in Arizona since a sweep in 1999. The Sun Devils have won eight straight Pac-10 series dating back to last year after taking two of three at UCLA last weekend. The Golden Bears enter weekend play with a 24-18 record overall and a 6-6 mark in conference play. Cal is 5-5 in its last five games and are coming off a midweek 9-2 win over Fresno State. Sophomore first baseman Connor Jackson is second in the league with a .396 batting average.

What's On Tap:

The 14th-ranked Sun Devils finally return home to spacious Hohokam Stadium after seven straight games on the road. Currently leading the Pac-10 by a half game over USC with a 8-4 record in league play, the Devils take on the Cal Golden Bears (24-18, 6-6) in a three-game set this weekend starting Friday at 6 p.m. The Devils have won seven of the last nine in the series with the Golden Bears, including a convincing sweep in 1999 when Cal last visited the Valley of the Sun. After the three-game series with Cal, ASU will take to the road for a single game with Oklahoma (Apr. 24) at Bricktown Ballpark in Oklahoma City, then travel to South Bend, Ind., for a two-game series with Notre Dame (Apr. 26-27).

Quick Hits:

- Pat Murphy recorded his 600th career Division 1 victory vs. UNLV (3/8). He is seven short for 300 in his ASU career.
- Senior Jon Sheaffer leads the team in batting at .377 and has at least one hit in 25 of his last 30 games.
- Dustin Pedroia is hitting .418 in Pac-10 play and .404 over his last 10 games to raise his season average to .342.
- The Sun Devils have won eight consecutive Pac-10 series dating back to the WSU series in Tempe last year.
- Andre Ethier and Dustin Pedroia are the only Devils to play and start in all 37 games this year.
- Jeremy West has hit five of his team-leading 11 home runs in the last nine games.
- Starting catcher Cesar Castillo is hitting .714 (5x7) with two doubles and five RBI in the last two Sunday games.
- West is leading the league in slugging percentage (.745) and doubles (15). He is also second with his 46 RBI.
- Robbie McClellan is 5-0 as a starter this year and is second in the Pac-10 with his 67 strikeouts.
- Through 37 games, ASU has four complete games. The Devils had only one all of last year (Jon Switzer).
- The Devils have scored in the first inning in 21 of their 37 games (57%). ASU is 16-5 when scoring in the first.
- The Sun Devils have used 29 different lineups this year, including a string of 21 straight different batting orders.
- ASU has scored in a NCAA record 412 consecutive games dating back to April 7, 1995. The old record was 349.
- In his 12 appearances out of the bullpen (18.2 IP), sophomore Ryan Schroyer has struck out 29 batters (0.48 ERA).
- ASU has combined for 50 runs and 55 hits in the last three Pac-10 series finales to earn a series win.

More Quick Hits:

- Andre Ethier is second on the team in hitting at .376 and has 15 multi-hit games. He has at least one hit in 29 of 37 games this year.
- Ryan McKenna hit his first career home run in the loss to UNLV (4/1). McKenna is hitting .412 over his last six games.
- Freshman Nick Cadena blasted his first career home run in ASU's 22-4 win over Washington State.
- Sophomore Mike Esposito is 4-2 with a 2.30 ERA in his last seven starts. He is second on ASU and third in the Pac-10 with a 2.96 ERA.
- ASU's 26 home runs is only seven short of the entire total from last year with 18 regular season games remaining.
- After 37 games, ASU was 20-14 in 1998, 24-10 in 1999, 26-8 in 2000 and 22-11-1 last year.
- Led by Ryan McKenna (4x8, 2 2B, 1 HR), the Sun Devils pinch-hitters are a combined 18-for-61 (.295) this year.
- ASU is hitting .320 with runners in scoring position. Andre Ethier is an amazing 19-for-41 (.463) with RISP.
- ASU is 5-5 against ranked opponents this year and have played 19 of their 37 games against teams appearing in the polls.
- ASU has already had four players earn Pac-10 Player of the Week honors and two players earn National Pitcher of the Week.
- Cesar Castillo has started eight consecutive games at catcher, adding to his two previous career starts. He is hitting .243.
- The Devils ended their seven-game road trip with a 4-3 record, hitting .312 as a team and pitching for a 5.08 ERA.
- In first place in the Pac-10, ASU is hitting .330 in league games. The Devils have out-scored opponents 99-67 in Pac-10 games.

Recapping The UCLA Series:

For the third straight weekend, the Devils pulled out a series win on the road with a strong performance in the series finale. After taking the opening game 4-3 in extra innings, ASU lost 10-2 Saturday before unleashing for a 15-2 victory Sunday. Rod Allen plated the game-winning hit in the 11th inning Friday to give the Devils their first extra-inning victory this year. After a disappointing effort Saturday, the Devils used several key hits from the bottom of the order and scored 12 two-out runs en route to the series clinching 15-2 win over the Bruins. Sophomore Steve Garrabrants led the team at the plate going 5-for-13 with six RBI in the series. Reliever Ryan Schroyer and Sunday starter Robbie McClellan picked up the wins on the mound for the Sun Devils.

Schroyer + Bullpen = Dominating:

Arizona State sophomore pitcher Ryan Schroyer opened his 2002 season in style by being named the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association and *Collegiate Baseball* National Pitcher of the Week after his 11-strikeout performance against Southern Utah on Feb. 1. Schroyer has since been moved into the closer role where he has recorded an amazing 28 strikeouts in just 18.2 innings of work as a reliever. For the season he is 3-1 with three saves and a team best 2.35 ERA. He has struck out 54 batters in just 38.1 innings of work. In 18.2 bullpen innings, Schroyer is 2-0 with three saves and an amazing 0.48 ERA, allowing only one earned run and eight hits. He is ranked second in the Pac-10 with his 2.35 ERA, 7th with 54 strikeouts, fifth with three saves and third with 12 games finished. His 12.8 K's per nine innings is ranked seventh in the NCAA. Schroyer picked up the win in Friday's 11-inning victory over UCLA with four solid innings out of the bullpen.

Devils Take Pac-10 Lead Into Weekend Series:

The Sun Devils take a half game lead in the Pac-10 standings into this weekend's three-game set with the Cal Golden Bears. Already half through their 2002 conference slate, ASU won all four series by 2-1 margins. With three of their four road series already completed, the Devils will be looking for a strong finish against four of the top teams in the conference. ASU was a combined 5-7 vs. teams last year that remain on ASU's Pac-10 schedule this year (Cal, Stanford, USC, Oregon State).

Looking Ahead To Next Weekend:

Heading into this weekend the Devils have 18 games remaining on their 2002 regular season schedule. After the weekend set with Cal, the Devils will take a two-week break from Pac-10 play, next traveling to Stanford after the completion of final exams (May 10-12). After the Cal series, ASU will play seven of its next 10 games against non-conference opponents. The Devils travel to Oklahoma City for a single game next Wednesday vs. Oklahoma (21-15) at Bricktown Ballpark, the Triple-A home of the Oklahoma Redhaws. ASU will then continue on to South Bend, Ind., for a two-game series with the Notre Dame Fighting Irish. The series at Notre Dame will mark the first time since his coaching days at ND that head coach Pat Murphy will return to the program he built into a national power.

When Murph Returns To Notre Dame...

When ASU head coach Pat Murphy returns to Notre Dame next weekend, it will mark the first time he will step foot in South Bend since leaving for the head job at ASU in 1994. In seven seasons at Notre Dame, Murphy turned the program into a national power, going 318-116-1 during his tenure. He led the Irish to its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 19 years in 1989 and averaged over 46 wins per season. ASU assistant coach Mike Rooney also played for Murphy at Notre Dame.

Devils Prove To Be Clutch With Two Outs:

Arizona State scored 12 of its 15 runs vs. UCLA last Sunday with two outs. Looking back at all 37 games this year, ASU has scored just about half of their runs with two outs. The Sun Devils have tabbed 62 runs with no outs, 85 with one out and a remarkable 146 of 293 with two outs. As a team the Sun Devils are hitting .304 (122x401).

West Continues Season Trend By Being Named Pac-10 Player of the Week:

Jeremy West became the fourth ASU player to earn a Pac-10 Player of the Week honor when he earned the award after the Washington State series. West, from Las Vegas, helped lead ASU to a series win over WSU by hitting a home run in each game against the Cougars. Despite going only 1-for-12 in the UCLA series, West leads the team with 29 extra base hits (15 2B/3 3B/11 HR), 46 RBI and is fourth on the team in hitting at .350 (48x137). West has started 36 of ASU's 37 games this year, recording hits in 27 of those games. He has also tabbed 17 multi-hit games and 11 multi-RBI games. The Player of the Week honor is the first for West in his career. It is the 65th selection all-time for Arizona State. ASU has now had two Pac-10 Player of the Week awards this year in addition to two Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week awards. Andre Ethier has also been named the Pac-10 Player of the Week this year (Mar. 26), while Mike Esposito (Apr. 1) and Robbie McClellan (Mar. 12) have been named Pac-10 Pitcher's of the Week.

Hail Cesar:

The Sun Devils have been through four catchers this year, but seems as if they have found their match in senior Cesar Castillo. The senior backstop from Yuma, Ariz., has started the last eight games and now has 10 career starts under his belt. While hitting .243 (9x37) on the year, Castillo has been stellar in the last two Sunday series finales vs. Washington State and UCLA. Castillo, who is 11-for-44 in his two-year career as a Sun Devil, has combined to go 5-for-7 (.714) with five RBI and two doubles in the last two Sunday games.

29 Flavors:

Looking to find the perfect starting lineup as the Sun Devils play their final 18 regular season games, head coach Pat Murphy has used a different starting lineup in 21 consecutive games and 29 different lineups in the 2002 season. Mixing and matching with a number of players earning starts, not one starting batting order has remained the same since back-to-back games vs. Loyola Marymount (3/3) and New Mexico State (3/5). ASU has also mixed and matched for 22 different starting lineups by position.

Eight Pac-10 Series Wins and Counting:

The Sun Devils will be looking to extend an impressive streak this weekend with eight straight Pac-10 series wins under their belt. Starting last Apr. 12-14 with a 2-1 series win over Washington State, the Devils have since rattled off series wins against Arizona (2-1), Washington (3-0), UCLA (2-1), at Arizona (2-1), Washington (2-1), at Washington State (2-1) and at UCLA (2-1).

Series Finales All of a Sudden Worth Watching:

The Devils have won three straight series finales to help them into a half game lead over USC in the Pac-10 standings. While they dropped several key Sunday games early in the season (at Florida State, CS Fullerton, Oklahoma), ASU has rebounded to earn three straight series wins in impressive fashion. Starting with the 13-6 win over Washington (3/30), the Devils have scored 50 runs behind 55 hits in the last three series finales. ASU earned its most impressive victory of the year with a 22-4 win over Washington State (4/7) and are coming off a 15-2 win over UCLA on Sunday.

The All-Time Series vs. the Cal Golden Bears:

Arizona State leads the all-time series against the Cal Golden Bears by a margin of 87-48. ASU has won seven of the last nine in the series, with the last two series played at Evans Diamond in Berkeley. ASU swept Cal in a three-game series at Packard Stadium in 1999 when the Bears last visited Arizona to face the Sun Devils. ASU head coach Pat Murphy is 23-9 vs. Cal since 1995.

ASU HEAD COACH

Pat Murphy



Since inheriting the Sun Devil program in August of 1994, Arizona State Baseball Head Coach Pat Murphy has carefully nurtured the tradition of excellence in Tempe, at the same time establishing himself as one of the top collegiate head coaches in the nation. He has guided Arizona State to top-12 national rankings in three of the past five years, including an appearance in the 1998 College World Series national championship game. Murphy is 293-156-1 in his eight seasons in Tempe and posts an all-time 22-16 record in NCAA Tournament action. With a career 666-327-4 record in 17 seasons as a head coach, Murphy is the winningest active baseball coach under the age of 43 at any collegiate level. He also became the youngest collegiate coach to reach 500 career victories (with 75 percent of the wins at the Division I level) on March 22, 1998, with a 7-6 victory over California. Murphy recently recorded his 600th career Division I victory.

Last Year vs. The Golden Bears:

Arizona State took two of three from the Golden Bears last year to open conference play in a three-game conference series at Evans Diamond. Rod Allen was key in the two wins, going 5-for-9 (.556) in the series. ASU won the opening game 7-4 and then won 4-2 in come-from-behind fashion with Nick Walsh scoring two on a single in the ninth inning.

The Last Time Facing Cal In Arizona:

The Sun Devils have not faced Cal in their home stadium since the 1999 season when ASU swept the three-game Pac-10 series (Mar. 26-28) at Packard Stadium. ASU out-scored the Golden Bears 56-21 in the series, including a 25-0 thumping in the middle game of the series. ASU also earned wins of 12-10 in the opener and 19-11 in the series finale.

The Wild, Wild West:

Sophomore first baseman Jeremy West leads the Sun Devils in nearly every offensive category and is two weeks removed from being named the Pac-10 Player of the Week. West hit a home run in each of ASU's three games at Washington State and now has a team-leading 11 home runs on the year. He has five of his 11 home runs in the last 10 games. Despite going only 1-for-12 last weekend vs. UCLA, West still leads the Pac-10 in doubles (15), slugging percentage (.745) and is second in RBI (46) and total bases (102). He is second with 11 home runs and is fourth on the team with a .350 batting average. He also leads the team with 29 extra base hits, 17 multi-hit games and 11 multi-RBI games. He has tabbed at least one RBI in 23 of his 36 games played this year (64%). Below is a list of how West ranks with his 17 home runs combined between his freshman and sophomore years:

The Streak Continues. ASU Enters Weekend With Scoring Streak at 412:

The Arizona State baseball program made history on April 7, 2001 when they scored at least one run in its 350th consecutive game. The Devils broke the 12-year-old NCAA record in a 5-1 loss to USC exactly six years to the day when they were last shut out. ASU was shut out 9-0 in that game on April 7, 1995 at Dedeaux Field. The one run scored in the 11-1 loss to Arizona (3/24) marked only the 12th time during the streak that ASU has scored only one run. The streak continues at 412 consecutive games with ASU scoring in each of the 37 games this year. The Devils have extended the streak early in a majority of its games, with a run in the first inning 21 times in 2002. ASU was neck-in-neck for the record with Wichita State, which had not been shutout in 332 games, but had its streak ended with a 1-0 loss to Louisiana-Lafayette in the middle of the 2001 season. Coastal Carolina previously held the NCAA record at 349 games set from 1983-1989. ASU also had a stretch of 278 games without being shut out from 1990 to 1994, meaning the program has only been shutout in three games dating back to 1990. ASU celebrated its 7th anniversary of the streak with a 22-4 win over WSU on Apr. 7, 2002.

A Very Young Team Indeed:

The Sun Devils feature a very young team in 2002, with 22 of the 33 players on the roster listed as underclassman. Losing seven of its top position players from the 2001 team and several top pitchers, a very young team Sun Devil team will take the field this year. The normal starting lineup has five sophomores, two true freshman and at least one senior on the field. When the Devils made the cross country trek to Tallahassee for the FSU series, 13 of the 27 on the travel roster were making their first road trip as a Sun Devil. The starting lineup this weekend figures to have three freshman, five sophomores and one senior. The starting rotation figures to have one sophomore and two juniors, one of which is a newcomer after transferring from a junior college. To show how young ASU really is, when ASU played at UCLA last weekend, no player on the roster had ever played at Jackie Robinson Stadium. The starting lineup vs. Washington State (4/7) also exemplified how young the Devils are this year, with no starter having full-time Pac-10 experience.

McKenna Comes Up Clutch:

Sophomore Ryan McKenna has been the clutch hitter for ASU as of late. In his 80th career at-bat he belted his first career home run vs. UNLV (4/1) and hit a bases clearing three-run double vs. Washington State (4/6) to help lift ASU to a 13-7 victory. For the season McKenna is now hitting .298, much in part to his .412 batting average in his last six games (four starts). He is hitting .500 (4x8) as a pinch-hitter and is 3-for-4 (.750) with the bases loaded this year.

You're The Best; Mike Esposito:

While not claiming to be the best, sophomore Mike Esposito comes out to the song from the Karate Kid sound track labeled, "You're the best," before each of his starts. A song held special to his heart because the man singing the song is his father, Joe Esposito, who is currently a lounge singer at Paris Casino in Las Vegas as part of a group called Cat Daddy. "Espo", a fifth-round pick by the Cincinnati Reds out of high school, has been solid for ASU on the mound this year with a 6-4 record and a 2.96 ERA. Esposito had one of the best pitching performances in Sun Devil baseball history when he struck out 17 batters in a complete-game victory over the University of Washington (3/29) at Hohokam Stadium. He allowed only three runs (two earned) and eight hits in his second complete-game of the year. Esposito, a redshirt sophomore from Las Vegas, Nev. (Cimarron-Memorial High School) registered the sixth most K's in a single game in ASU history and the most since 1997. Over his last seven starts he is 4-2 with a 2.30 ERA. Over that same stretch has registered 55 strikeouts in 47.0 innings pitched. The preseason All-American and 2001 Team USA member is now 12-6 in his two-years at ASU.

A Night to Remember; Esposito Strikes Out 17 vs. Washington:

Here is how Esposito's 17-strikeout game ranks among the top performances in ASU school history. It is the most by a Sun Devil pitcher since Ryan Mills struck out 17 vs. Southern Illinois in 1997 and no one has had more in a Sun Devil uniform since the 1973 season.

McClellan Still A Perfect 5-0 as a Starter:

Robbie McClellan is tied for the Pac-10 lead and listed seventh in the current NCAA rankings with his 7-2 record. He improved to 7-2 on the year with Sunday's victory over UCLA (8.0 IP) and is now a perfect 5-0 as a starter this year. He is currently ranked second in the Pac-10 with 67 strikeouts and is fourth with opposing batters hitting only .235 off him. McClellan, from Liberal, Kan., became the first Sun Devil to notch back-to-back complete games since 1999, striking out a career-high 10 batters in a seven-inning win against UNLV (3/8). He allowed just four hits and did not allow a run in the 10-0 win over the Rebels. He also went all nine innings in a 7-2 win over Loyola Marymount (3/2). McClellan has an overall 4.10 ERA in 68.0 innings pitched, a mark that is third best among ASU's everyday pitchers. He became the 43rd selection all-time for Arizona State as Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week after his performance vs. UNLV. McClellan is nicknamed "The Child" by his teammates for his boyish looks. He transferred to ASU from Seward County CC in Liberal, Kan., where he set school records for strikeouts and was 16-4 in his two years.

Home Sweet Home:

The Devils finally return to Hohokam Park after a seven-game road trip and a stretch of 10 of the last 13 games on the road. After gaining two wins at UCLA last weekend, the Devils are now 6-8 this year on the road, enduring a three-game sweep at Florida State and losing a pair of non-conference games at New Mexico State and UNLV. The two wins at Washington State marked the first wins this year outside of the state of Arizona. ASU is 18-6 at home this year, going 15-5 at Hohokam Stadium in Mesa and 3-0 at Packard Stadium on the ASU campus. The Devils are hitting .314 at home (13 HR), compared to a .298 mark (13 HR) on the road. The pitching has varied with a 3.16 ERA at home and a 6.04 mark in ASU's 14 road games this year. ASU was 25-9-1 at home last year and 11-9 on the road in 2001.

Road Warriors Finally Return Home:

The Sun Devils ended their seven-game road trip with a 4-3 record and gained two valuable Pac-10 road series wins. The Devils return home to play Cal this weekend, but will be right back on the road for six of their next seven games. ASU leaves Tuesday for a non-conference road trip for a single game at Oklahoma (Apr. 24) and two games at Notre Dame (Apr. 26-27). ASU finished the seven-game road trip hitting .312 as a team and pitching for a 5.08 ERA.

Sun Devil Baseball Successful in April:

The Sun Devil baseball program now has an all-time 518-220 record in the month of April dating back to the 1959 season when varsity baseball started. The Devils are 4-3 to start the month and have the busiest portion of their schedule ahead of them with seven games left to play in April. ASU was 10-6 last year in April and have a 23-11 record dating back to 2000 in the month of April. ASU head coach Pat Murphy is a combined 74-43 in the month of April in his eight years in Tempe.

Murphy Picks Up Career Division 1 Victory #600:

With a convincing 10-0 win over UNLV in seven innings March 8, Sun Devil Head Coach Pat Murphy reached the 600 plateau for Division I victories in his 15 years of coaching at the top level of collegiate baseball. Murphy has now fashioned a career 664-326-4 record in his 18 seasons as a head coach, with 55 of those wins came at Maryville (Tenn.) College and Claremont-Mudd Scripps. In his 15 years at the D1 level, Murphy has averaged nearly 40 wins per year and is 291-155-1 in his eight-year ASU career. He will coach in his 1,000th career game April 21, 2002 in the series finale against Cal. He is also only seven wins short of the 300 mark in his eight-year ASU career.

Ethier is Tearing It Up at the Plate:

Andre Ethier had an interesting journey en route to becoming ASU's leading hitter this year. He came to ASU in the fall of 2000, left ASU to play at Chandler-Gilbert CC, and now is back as the starting right fielder for the Sun Devils. The sweet-swinging Ethier is currently second on the team in hitting through 37 games with a .376 (53x141) batting average. He is ranked 10th in the Pac-10 in batting, sixth in hits (53), fifth with his .458 on-base percentage and is tied for fourth with 12 doubles. Ethier has 15 multi-hit games on the year, six of which have been three-hit affairs and one a four-hit game. He also has recorded at least one hit in 29 of his 37 games played this year and is second on the team with 18 extra base hits. He is coming off a career game at the in the series final at Washington State. Ethier was 3-for-4 with five runs scored, five RBI and two home runs. After earning All-State honors at St. Mary's High School as a senior in 2000, Sun Devil right fielder Andre Ethier followed his dreams and came to Arizona State University to play baseball. With playing time not working out, Ethier decided to play his freshman year at Chandler-Gilbert CC. Making a name for himself by hitting .468 at the JC level last year, Ethier spurned an offer from the Oakland Athletics after being drafted in the 37th round and came back to Arizona State. He is one of only two Devils to start all 37 games for the Sun Devils, with 33 coming in right field and one start each coming at first base and center field.

Three-Position Pedroia:

Freshman Dustin Pedroia (Woodland, Calif.) has been ASU's hottest hitters as of late and is coming off a weekend series against UCLA in which he was 5-for-14 (.357) with three runs scored. In 12 Pac-10 games this year the freshman is hitting .418, going 23-for-55. He has started the last 15 games at shortstop (his third position started at this year) and has played nearly flawless defense this year with only two errors in 139 total chances (.986 FLD %). For the year Pedroia is fifth on the team while hitting at a .342 clip (51x149) and has managed at least one hit in 28 of his 37 games played. Over the last 18 games Pedroia has had his batting average rise from .286 to .342. Pedroia played the UCLA series in front a lot of his friends and family being from Northern California, including his uncle, UCLA defensive coordinator and former ASU assistant coach Phil Snow.

A Tough Schedule in 2002 For ASU:

The Sun Devils face a tough schedule in 2002, with 12 combined games against teams that participated in the 2001 College World Series (3 - Tennessee, 3 - USC, 3 - Stanford, 3 - Cal State Fullerton). ASU will play 22 of its 55 (40%) scheduled games against teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament last year. The Devils schedule includes road contests against Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Florida State, Stanford and UCLA. Arizona State is listed as having the ninth toughest schedule in the nation on www.Boydsworld.com. So far this year the Devils are 5-5 against teams ranked in at least one of the national polls at the time they played. ASU's 5-5 record against ranked teams does not include playing Oklahoma, which moved from unranked to No. 18/22 in the polls after taking two of three from the Devils.

One, Two and Three-Run Misery:

Playing one of the nation's toughest schedules this year, Arizona State has had a handful of close games that haven't gone their way. In fact, of the squad's 13 losses this year, eight have come by three or less runs. ASU is 3-2 in one-run games and 2-4 in two run games this year.

Making the Most of his Senior Year: Jon Sheaffer:

Senior center fielder Jon Sheaffer is making the most of his final year as a college student-athlete. Sheaffer, who played football and baseball for ASU in 2001 after transferring from South Mountain CC, played in only 30 games last year, making three starts. This year is a different story though, as Sheaffer has started 30 of ASU's 37 games in center field and is currently leading the team in hitting with a .377 batting average with six doubles, 19 RBI and 29 runs scored. He has recorded a hit in 27 of his 34 games this year, including a streak of 25 of his last 30 games. Earlier in the year he had a career-high 13-game hitting streak snapped in which he combined to go 17-for-40 (.425) with 11 runs scored and 10 RBI. He has been clutch this year hitting .379 (11x29) with runners in scoring position and an even more amazing .417 (5x12) with runners in scoring position with two outs. He hit .375 (3x8) with three runs scored in the three-game series at UCLA. He is currently ranked ninth in the Pac-10 in batting (.377) and 9th with a .452 on-base percentage. The senior has been battling a number of leg injuries this year.

Why Not #9 Murphy:

Most who are close to the ASU Baseball program know what the No. 9 means to head coach Pat Murphy. Often his slogan to "Play all 9 Innings", Murphy and No. 9 are synonymous with each other... until this year. In a preseason meeting with team, Murphy gave a speech on how you have to be able to give up anything for the team. In this case, he even offered up his prize No. 9, knowing no one would take it. That is, until ASU's sophomore Steve Garrabrants raised his hand and said, I'll take it, and with that, the leader of the Devils is willing to give up *anything* for the team and will wear No. 7 this year.

Now That's The Way to Start the Game.... And An Inning:

The Sun Devil leadoff hitter in the game is off to a great start in 2002, and a main reason why the Devils have scored at least one run in the first inning in 21 of their 37 (57%) games this year. The Sun Devil leadoff hitter, 29 times being Steve Garrabrants, four times being Dustin Pedroia and two times being Doug Schutt, has recorded a hit or walked in the first at-bat of the game in 20 of ASU's 37 games. Garrabrants is 11-for-24 (.458) with six singles, four doubles, three walks and a home run to his credit, while Pedroia is 3-for-4 and Schutt is 1-for-1 with a single and a walk.

Jeff Larish Makes Strong Sun Devil Debut:

Freshman infielder Jeff Larish had not dressed for a game this year and was in the stands as a redshirt candidate before finding out he would be the starting third baseman in ASU's Mar. 16 game vs. Oklahoma. Larish made the most of the opportunity, going 3-for-4 with a triple and run scored in his ASU debut vs. the Sooners. For the season he is sixth on the team in hitting at .340 (17x50) with a double, two triples, one home run and seven RBI. He was 4-for-5 with a big two-run home run vs. UCLA (4/12) to help lead the Devils to a 4-3 win in 11 innings. The freshman starred at Tempe McClintock High School last year and was a 32nd-round draft choice of the Chicago Cubs last June.

Garrabrants Proves To Be a Sparkplug:

Sophomore Steve Garrabrants has been a sparkplug for ASU all year, with the team going 20-9 when he hits in the leadoff spot. Garrabrants missed seven games with an injury that occurred Mar. 9 (neck/shoulder). The Devils went 3-4 in those games, but with Garrabrants back in the lineup are back to their winnings ways. For the season Garrabrants is third on the team with a .356 batting average. He is currently fifth in the Pac-10 with 10 stolen bases has 13 extra base hits.

Wyrick Comes Up Clutch in Pac-10 Play:

Junior Dennis Wyrick is ASU's most veteran play with 406 career at-bats. While battling for playing time this year and learning a new position at catcher and third base, Wyrick has still maintained a solid .315 (23x73) batting average in 25 games this year. A career .335 hitter, Wyrick has been even more amazing in Pac-10 play. After going 8-for-21 in the first three league series, Wyrick is now hitting .371 (56x151) in his Pac-10 career.

Devils Better Score Early and Often:

The Sun Devils have had good success this year when scoring before their opponent, going 17-7 in those games. Even more importantly, when ASU scores in the first inning they are 16-5. Five runs or more seem to be the magic number for the Devils, as ASU is 23-5 in games when scoring five or more runs. The Devils are also 18-3 when leading after six innings and 22-1 when leading after eight innings.

Allen Starting To Put It Together:

Sophomore Rod Allen has had a rough start to the 2002 season after being named a first-team preseason All-American by Collegiate Baseball. Through 37 games Allen is hitting .271 (35x129) with eight doubles, five home runs and 33 RBI. He is starting to turn it around though, with four hits in his last four games, including the game-winner in the top of the 11th vs. UCLA (4/12). Allen has not hit a home run since the New Mexico State game (3/12), but has still been productive with 33 RBI on the season that ranks just out of the Pac-10 top 10. Allen has started 35 games this year (all in left field) and is 2-for-2 with two, two-run doubles as a pinch-hitter. Allen hit an ASU freshman record .389 in 2001 and became ASU's first freshman to be named to the All-Pac-10 team.

Murphy's Teams Know How To Score:

A true icon of the Pat Murphy system is scoring runs. The Sun Devils have done plenty of that since he arrived in 1995. ASU has led the NCAA in scoring in two of the last three years, averaging 11.32 runs per game in 1999 and 10.97 runs per game in 2000. The Devils paced the Pac-10 in 2001, hitting at a .327 clip and averaging 8.26 runs per game to rank 17th in the nation. ASU also led the nation in batting average with a team total of .356 in 1999 and fell just percentage points shy of matching that feat a second year in a row in 2000 with a .346 mark, trailing Stony Brook by one point. During Pat Murphy's eight seasons at ASU, the Sun Devils have been a scoring machine with 4,142 runs, averaging 9.20 runs per game and hitting at an overall .329 clip. Hohokam is ASU's Home Away From Home in 2002:

While a \$2 million renovation will begin in late March to Packard Stadium, the Sun Devils will call Hohokam Stadium in Mesa home for the 2002 season for all but three home games. Hohokam Park is also the spring training home of the Chicago Cubs and the Arizona Fall League home of the Mesa Solar Sox. The facility will provide ASU with a first-class facility while Packard Stadium undergoes renovation. Hohokam Park, which opened in 1997, has a seating capacity of 12,623, with 8,000 theater-style seats.

Is it HoHoKam or Hohokam... Stadium... or Park:

While it can be up for debate on the actual spelling of Hohokam Stadium, the City of Mesa has recognized the official spelling of Hohokam Park to be without the capital H and capital K in the middle of the word. The group that call themselves the HoHoKam's use the capital letters, but the actual group of Native Americans that the park is named after is spelled 'Hohokam.' To extend the debate, is it Hohokam Park or Hohokam Stadium. While both are acceptable, the games are played in Hohokam Stadium, which is located in Hohokam Park.

Hitting For The Cycle... in the First Inning:

In what may be one of the rarest feats of Arizona State baseball history, the Devils led off the Feb. 9 game vs. Tennessee in grand fashion with the first four hitters combining to hit for the cycle in the first inning. Leadoff hitter Steve Garrabrants led off the game with a first-pitch home run, then Dustin Pedroia followed with a double, then Rod Allen singled and to cap off the amazing event, Jeremy West tripled to give ASU the early 2-0 lead.

This Sergio Garcia Doesn't Golf:

Senior infielder Sergio Garcia has a familiar name, but this Sergio Garcia is not a golfer. Garcia will fill in the role as ASU's valued utility man, able to play third, second and his most familiar position, shortstop. Garcia transferred from Oklahoma where he hit .311 for the Sooners last year and was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection. For the season Garcia is hitting at a .294 clip (15x51) with two doubles and seven RBI. He is also a perfect 9-for-9 in stolen bases.

Frequent Flyers... and Drivers:

With the three-game series at Florida State in Tallahassee, ASU embarked on its first of many roadtrips this season. The Devils traveled a total of 3,572 miles last weekend, flying from Phoenix to Atlanta and then on to Tallahassee. For the season ASU will log 10,192 miles in the air, with flights to Oklahoma City, Chicago, Spokane, Wash., Las Vegas and San Jose, Calif. In addition, ASU plans to make two big bus trips this year to Las Cruces, N.M. (770 miles round trip) for the Mar. 12 game at New Mexico State and to UCLA (792 miles round trip) for the three-game Pac-10 series in April. In all, ASU will drive 2,136 miles on a bus this year to get to games.

Calling All Lettermen

Prior to the 2002 baseball season, the Arizona State Baseball Media Guide, the official source of ASU Baseball information, only referred to records and lettermen dating back to 1959. Although 1959 is the year Bobby Winkles officially took over the program, making the sport have varsity recognition at ASU, baseball in Tempe dates back to 1907. Integrating the research of Barry Sollenberger from his book, "Bulldog Baseball," lettermen and records prior to 1959 have been added to the ASU Baseball Media Guide. The list of letterman is ever evolving, so if you know of any name that should be on the list of a player that played in at least one *VARSITY* game, please contact the ASU Media Relations office at jeff.evans@asu.edu.

Success in the Classroom As Well As On The Field:

ASU has long enjoyed much success on the diamond, and with 18 College World Series appearances, it is known as one of the gems of college baseball. But lately academics, as well as on-field talent, has shown its true colors in the storied program. Pat Murphy's Sun Devil squads have produced four Academic All-Americans over the past three years (Willie Bloomquist, Mark Ernster, Jeff Phelps, Casey Myers), including Myers being named the Academic All-American for college baseball in 2000 and 2001. The four players honored as National Academic All-Americans is the most by any college baseball program in the nation over the last three years.

ASU Owns Pac-10 Player of the Year Award:

Since the old Pac-10 North (formerly Washington State, Washington, Oregon State, Portland State) and the Six-Pac joined to form the unified Pac-10 baseball conference in 1999, Arizona State has enjoyed much success with a combined 43-29 record in league play. Even more impressive is that no one other than an ASU player has won the annual Pac-10 Player of the Year award. Willie Bloomquist won the inaugural award in 1999, while Casey Myers took home the hardware in 2000 and 2001 to become only fourth player in Pac-10 history to win the award twice in a career. In all, ASU has won nine (9) Pac-10 Player of the Year Awards dating back to 1978 (Myers (2), Bloomquist, Jacob Cruz, Paul Lo Duca, Linty Ingram, Oddibe McDowell, Alvin Davis, Mike Soddors) and two Pac-10 Pitchers of the Year (Noah Perry and Marc Barcelo).

2002 Newcomers Highly Touted By National Publications:

The group of 17 players that make up the newcomers for the 2002 season have been highly touted as the No. 8 recruiting class in the nation by *Collegiate Baseball* and the No. 11 class by *Baseball America*. The group includes Ian Kinsler (Central Arizona CC), Andre Ethier (Chandler-Gilbert CC), Dustin Pedroia (Woodland, Calif.), (Horizon HS) and Robbie McClellan (Seward County CC).

The Apollo Connection:

Arizona State and Apollo High School in Glendale has formed quiet a relationship. Former Sun Devil All-American and Major Leaguer Bob Horner started the tradition back in the late 1970's and still holds the ASU career record for home runs with 56. Current Los Angeles Dodger Paul Lo Duca, who was the *Sporting News* College Player of the Year in 1993 and holds the ASU single-season batting average record at .446 was also a prep standout at Apollo High School. The latest in the line of ASU players to come from Apollo High School is freshman infielder Nick Cadena. Cadena broke the school and state home run records for a career set by Horner and also bettered several of Lo Duca's long-standing records. Cadena belted his first career home run (3-Run HR) vs. Washington State (4/7). To add to the connection, ASU Baseball beat writer Paul Coro of the Arizona Republic is also an Apollo graduate.

Monday's With Murphy at Boston's:

New for the 2002 baseball season is a weekly coaches radio show for ASU head coach Pat Murphy. Held every Monday from 6-6:30 p.m. on XTRA 910 AM, Murphy and the voice of ASU Baseball, Tim Healey, will preview upcoming ASU Baseball games and talk Sun Devil baseball. A roundtable discussion on ASU and College Baseball is held from 5:30-6 p.m. and is open to the public and all media. Selected players and ASU assistant coach Mike Rooney will also be present at the weekly event.

ASU And Team USA Connections:

Arizona State baseball has had a long-standing tradition of sending players to play for the USA National team during the summers. ASU has had six players don the Red, White and Blue for Team USA since 1984, with the first being Oddibe McDowell in the 1984 Olympics played at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles. Jim Austin played for Team USA in 1990 and ASU has had four players play with Team USA in the last four years. 1999 Pac-10 Player of the Year Willie Bloomquist played in the summer of 1998, 2000-2001 Pac-10 Player of the Year Casey Myers played in the summer of 2000 and was also a member of the Team USA Junior National Team before arriving at ASU in 1998. Current Tampa Bay Devil Ray prospect Jon Switzer was also a member of the 2000 National Team and current pitcher Mike Esposito was 3-1 with a 1.56 ERA last summer. Current Sun Devils Dennis Wyrick and Ryan Schroyer also played for the Team USA Junior teams during their respective prep careers.

Homegrown Devils:

A total of 20 of ASU's 33 players hail from the state of Arizona. Rod Allen (Phoenix), Joel Bocchi (Phoenix), Nick Cadena (Glendale), Cesar Castillo (Yuma), Andre Ethier (Phoenix), Steve Garabrants (Phoenix), Tuffy Gosewisch (Scottsdale), Mike Guerrero (Mesa), J.J. Jackson (Chandler), Bryce Kartler (Phoenix), Ian Kinsler (Tucson), Aaron Klusman (Phoenix), Jeff Larish (Tempe), Matt Leaf (Peoria), Jered Liebeck (Glendale), Josh Perrault (Mesa), Ryan Schroyer (Casa Grande), Doug Schutt (Gilbert) and Josh Smith (Lake Havasu) are all native Arizonans. The team is also represented by players from Alaska (1), California (5), Colorado (1), Illinois (2), Kansas (1), Nevada (2) and New Mexico (1).

Allen and Esposito Named Summer All-Americans:

Sun Devil sophomores Rod Allen and Mike Esposito were named to *Baseball America's* second-team Summer All-America team. Allen was ranked as the No. 8 prospect out of the Alaskan League after hitting .314 with 24 stolen bases to help lead the Anchorage Glacier Pilots to the National Baseball Congress (NBC) World Series Championship in Wichita, Kan. Esposito was 3-1 with a 1.56 ERA for Team USA. Junior pitcher Robbie McClellan also had great summer success, helping lead the Liberal BeeJays (Kansas) to the NBC World Series. McClellan was named an NBC All-American after going 2-0 with a 0.52 ERA in the 2001 World Series.

Golden Spikes Common At Arizona State:

While Mark Prior of USC was the recipient of the 2001 Golden Spikes award as the nation's top amateur baseball player, it should be noted that three Arizona State players have won the award. Bob Horner, who was a standout at ASU from 1976-78, won the inaugural award in 1978. Oddibe McDowell, who was a member of the first Team USA baseball team to compete in an Olympics, won the award in 1984. Mike Kelly, who ranks second in ASU history with 46 home runs from 1989-91, won the award in 1991. In all, 13 players that have worn the Maroon and Gold have been named a Player of the Year for college baseball.

ASU Leader of the Pac When It Comes to Player of the Week:

Arizona State has amassed 44 Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week and 65 Players of the Week since 1981. That total leads all Pac-10 member schools. The Sun Devils had two players honored as Pac-10 POW last year with Mike Esposito taking home the Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week honor on May 5 and Mike Lopez won the Pac-10 Player of the Week on April 28. The 2002 season has already seen four Sun Devils earn Pac-10 POW honors. Andre Ethier and Jeremy West have been named Pac-10 Players of the Week, while Robbie McClellan and Mike Esposito have been named Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week.

Arizona State in Postseason Play:

The Sun Devil baseball program has created a dynasty in college baseball that has been matched by few. With 18 appearances in the College World Series, ASU ranks fifth for the most trips to Omaha. Arizona State has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 25 of the program's 42 varsity seasons (dating back to 1959), amassing an incredible 122-49 (.730) record. ASU's five National Championships rank as the second most of any NCAA school. In addition to ASU's five national championships, the Sun Devils have also turned in five second-place teams and three third-place finishes.

Horner Ranks Second As Player of the Century:

Former Sun Devil greats Bob Horner and Eddie Bane were honored by *Baseball America* by being placed on the publication's "Team of the Century." Horner, an ASU great under Jim Brock from 1976-78, hit .383 for his career and belted a school record 56 home runs. Horner was listed second on the team behind Oklahoma State slugger Pete Incaviglia (1983-85). Bane, a top pitcher for the Sun Devils from 1971-72, posted a career 40-4 record and a 1.64 ERA. Bane was listed as the ninth best player of the 20th Century by *Baseball America*. The top 10 players of the century were voted on by fans, coaches and baseball writers and are listed below:

91 Years of Sun Devil Baseball Tradition:

While the history of baseball at Arizona State University goes back all the way to the early 1900's, the school officially began sponsoring varsity baseball in 1959. Prior to 2002, the ASU Baseball Media Guide referred only to those players that played from 1959 to present. ASU now officially recognizes those players, coaches and seasons from 1907-1950. In 90-plus years of baseball at Arizona State, the program has built a legacy matched by few in the college baseball world. With a 2,230-1,094-6 all-time record, Arizona State has advanced to the College World Series 18 times, won five national championships, won six Pac-10 titles, produced 12 Players of the Year and three Golden Spikes Award winners, and has gone to the NCAA Tournament 25 times. Under current head coach Pat Murphy, the Sun Devils have finished in the top 12 in three of the last five years and finished second in the nation in 1998. They have been ranked in the top 20 for 40 consecutive national polls.

Seven Devils Earn Freshman All-America Honors in 2001:

Seven Sun Devils earned freshman All-America honors during the 2001 season. Rod Allen and Jeremy West both earned first-team acclaim from Collegiate Baseball and Allen was also named to the Baseball America Freshman All-America team. Allen set an ASU freshman record with a .389 batting average and became the first Sun Devil freshman in school history to be named a first-team All-Pac-10 player. Mike Esposito, Aaron Klusman, Ryan Schroyer, Steve Garrabrants and Nick Walsh were all named to the Collegiate Baseball Freshman All-America team as honorable mention selections.

Putting A Recent Event In Perspective:

The University of Texas recently set a Big 12 record by recording a string of 41 consecutive shutout innings. The nationally ranked Longhorns set the record over the course of four full games and part of two others. The record drastically fails in comparison to the NCAA record of 64 consecutive shutout inning by the 1972 Arizona State pitching staff. ASU, behind wins from Sun Devil pitching legends Jim Otten, Craig Swan and Eddie Bain combined for seven straight shutouts. As part of one of the greatest teams in ASU history, the Devils went 64-6 that year, setting school records for ERA (1.76), strikeouts (732), complete games (43) and shutouts (24). Bane ended the year 14-1, Otten was 9-0 and Swan was 16-1.
