### NATIONAL RANKINGS

**Arizona State** (32-19, 12-9) kept its streak alive by staying in the national polls for the 55th straight week with a No. 17 ranking from Baseball Weekly/ESPN. The Devils also reappeared in both the Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball polls at No. 24 with the impressive 4-1 week. Oregon State is not ranked in any of the polls and have lost five of its last six games overall.

### MEDIA EXPOSURE

All three games vs. the Oregon State Beavers can be heard over the airwaves on XTRA 910 in the Phoenix area with Tim Healey and Bob Eger calling all of the action from Hohokam Park. ASU Baseball fans can also listen around the world via the internet webcast at www.TheSunDevils.com. The LiveStats feature will once again be available this weekend with live scoring updated after every play. All postseason games should ASU qualify this year will be broadcast on XTRA 910 AM with Healey and Eger calling the action.

### SETTING UP THE SERIES

The Sun Devils (32-19, 12-9) finish the 2002 regular season this weekend with a three-game series against Oregon State. ASU has played well down the stretch, going 5-3 in May and is fresh off a 4-1 week that saw the Devils take two games from Portland and earn a 2-1 series win over Pac-10 leading USC. Four teams are in the hunt for the Pac-10 title, with ASU trailing second-place Washington and Stanford by one game and first-place USC by two games. The Beavers currently stand in fifth place in the conference two games back of the Sun Devils and are coming off a rough stretch in which they went 1-5 against Cal and Washington. The Beavers are 31-20 overall and 10-11 in Pac-10 play.

### What's On Tap:

The Sun Devils (32-19, 12-9 Pac-10) conclude the 2002 regular season this weekend with the same team they opened the campaign with, Oregon State. ASU and the Beavers will clash in a key three-game series starting Friday at 6 p.m. at Hohokam Park in Mesa. ASU is 19-9 all-time against the Beavers and 6-3 since the old Pac-10 North and Six-Pac joined in 1999. ASU is still within striking distance of the Pac-10 championship, needing a sweep of the Beavers and some help from other teams to win its second league title in the last three years. The Devils are currently two games out of first place and one game behind second place Washington (at home vs. Arizona) and Stanford (at home against WSU).

### Quick Hits:

- Pat Murphy recorded wins No. 300 and 301 in his ASU career this past weekend against USC.
- The Sun Devils are 17-7 when not hitting a home run this year, while just 15-12 when at least one player connects for a homer.
- Dustin Pedroia has only two errors in the field in 189 total chances (.989 FLD %). He also has 22 multi-hit games.
- With his 5-for-5 performance vs. USC, Sergio Garcia raised his batting average 39 points from .321 to .360.
- Dustin Pedroia is the only Sun Devil to play and start in all 51 games this year. He has also started three positions.
- Jeremy West is hitting .562 (9x16) with four extra base hits and 11 RBI in his last five games.
- Senior catcher Cesar Castillo is hitting .290 (18x62) since taking over the starting catcher job and is hitting .268 overall.
- Of ASU's 399 runs scored this year, 205 (51%) have come with two outs. ASU also has 116 1-out runs and 78 0-out runs.
- ASU's 4.40 team ERA is second in the Pac-10 behind Stanford and currently the best in the Pat Murphy era.
- Through 51 games, ASU has four complete games. The Devils had only one all of last year (Jon Switzer).
- The Devils have scored in the first inning in 28 of their 51 games (55%). ASU is 22-6 when scoring in the first.
- The Sun Devils have used 40 different lineups this year, including a string of 32 different lineups in the last 35 games.
- ASU has scored in a NCAA record 426 consecutive games dating back to April 7, 1995. The old record was 349.
- In his 17 appearances out of the bullpen (29.2 IP), sophomore Ryan Schroyer has struck out 40 batters (1.52 ERA).
- ASU returned only 39.5% of hits, 38.7% of RBI, 38.6% of runs, 24.3% of pitching wins and 37.9% of K's from last year.

### More Quick Hits:

- Andre Ethier is third on the team in hitting at .362 and has 16 multi-hit games. He is currently out with a broken left thumb.
- Sophomore RHP Mike Esposito notched his third 10-plus strikeout performance of the year vs. NMSU (4/30).
- Esposito is 8-5 with a 3.66 ERA and is ranked third in the Pac-10 with 89 strikeouts in 91.0 innings pitched.
- Freshman Nick Cadena has five home runs and is hitting .333 (12x36) with five home runs and 15 RBI in his last 9 games.
- ASU is ranked second in the Pac-10 with a .967 fielding percentage and has made only five errors in the last nine games.
- ASU's 34 home runs is already three more than the entire total from last year. West leads the team with 12 home runs.
- The Sun Devils have given up 12 home runs in the last 11 games after allowing only 15 in the first 35 games of 2002.
- West's eight RBI vs. Portland (5/15) were the most by a Sun Devil since 1999 and second most in the ASU record books.
- Bryce Kartler made his first career start at DH vs. Portland (5/15) and went 2-for-3 with a double and two RBI.
- ASU is 8-8 against ranked opponents this year and have played 25 of their 51 games against teams appearing in the polls.
- ASU has already had five players earn Pac-10 Player of the Week honors and two players earn National Pitcher of the Week.
- Cesar Castillo has started 19 of the last 22 games at catcher, adding to his two previous career starts.
- Ryan Schroyer leads the Pac-10 with a 2.55 ERA. He is 4-1 overall with three wins and three saves in his last seven appearances.
- Relief pitcher Carlos Arguello was 2-0 last week with a 1.00 ERA in 9.0 IP. He is 3-1 overall with a team-leading 2.03 ERA.
- Jered Liebeck struck out a career-high eight batters in a career-long seven-inning outing against USC Friday night.
- ASU is 24-8 in home games this year and 21-8 at Hohokam Park. The Devils are hitting .324 at home and pitching for a 3.66 ERA.
- Redshirt freshman walk-on Garrett Schoenberger recorded his first hit as a Sun Devil with a single vs. Portland (5/14).
- Steve Garrabrants is hitting .355 overall and is tied for the Pac-10 lead with six triples and is ranked 4th with 15 stolen bases.

### Consecutive Games Scoring Streak Reaches 426:

The Arizona State baseball program has scored in 426 consecutive games dating back to the 1995 season and has not endured a shutout in seven years and 47 days heading into this weekend. The Devils made history on April 7, 2001 when they scored at least one run in their 350th consecutive game. The Devils broke the 12-year-old NCAA record in a 5-1 loss to USC exactly six years to the day when they were last shut out. ASU was shut out 9-0 in that game on April 7, 1995 at Dedeaux Field. The one run scored in the 3-1 loss to Stanford (4/12) marked only the 13th time during the streak that ASU has scored only one run. The streak continues at 426 consecutive games with ASU scoring in each of the 51 games this year. The Devils have extended the streak early in a majority of its games, with a run in the first inning 28 times in 2002. ASU was neck-in-neck for the record with Wichita State, which had not been shutout in 332 games, but had its streak ended with a 1-0 loss to Louisiana-Lafayette in the middle of the 2001 season. Coastal Carolina previously held the NCAA record at 349 games set from 1983-1989. ASU also had a stretch of 278 games without being shut out from 1990 to 1994, meaning the program has only been shutout in three games dating back to the 1990 season. ASU celebrated its 7th anniversary of the streak with a 22-4 win over WSU on Apr. 7, 2002. ASU is a combined 272-150-1 during the streak.

### Schroyer + Bullpen = Dominating:

Arizona State sophomore pitcher Ryan Schroyer opened his 2002 season in style by being named the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association and *Collegiate Baseball* National Pitcher of the Week after his 11-strikeout performance against Southern Utah on Feb. 1. After three more starts, Schroyer moved into the closer role where he has recorded an amazing 40 strikeouts in 29.2 innings of work as a reliever. For the season he is 4-1 with six saves and a Pac-10 best 2.55 ERA. Overall he has struck out 65 batters in 49.1 innings of work. The All-American nominee would rank in the top 10 in the NCAA with 11.9 strikeouts per nine innings and 41st in ERA if he qualified under the grounds of one inning pitcher per team game (51.0). In 29.2 total bullpen innings, Schroyer is 3-0 with six saves and a nearly impeccable 1.52 ERA. He has allowed only five earned runs and 19 hits over that span. Schroyer has picked three wins and three saves in his last seven outings. He picked up his last save with a two innings pitched to seal ASU's 3-1 series opening win over USC.

# Sun Devil Baseball 2002

## Devils Take Two of Three From Pac-10 Leading USC:

The Sun Devils picked up an impressive 2-1 series victory over Pac-10 leading USC last weekend at Hohokam Park. ASU opened with a 3-1 win behind a Jered Liebeck pitching gem, lost Saturday's game 9-5, then rebounded with its best offensive performance in Pac-10 play this year in a 17-8 victory. Senior infielder Sergio Garcia hit .583 (7x12) in the series, including a 5-for-5 performance Sunday. The Sun Devils out-scored the Trojans 25-18 in the series and hit .340 in the series. Steve Garrabrants also had a good weekend going 5-for-11 (.455) and Dustin Pedroia was 5-for-12 (.417). Liebeck had a career-high eight strikeouts in seven innings to help get the Devils off to a fast start in the series.

## The Last Five:

ASU has been impressive in its last five games, notching three games with 10 or more runs. The Devils are 4-1 during the stretch of the last five games and have out-scored their opponents 55-27 in those games. Jeremy West earned Pac-10 Player of the Week honors for his performance last week, going 9-for-16 (.562) in four games last week with 11 RBI and eight runs scored. Senior Sergio Garcia was also 9-for-16 and played stellar defense with starts at second base and shortstop. Pitchers Jered Liebeck and Carlos Arguello each picked up a pair of wins in the five games last week, combining to allow only one earned run in 18.0 combined innings pitched. Liebeck threw nine scoreless innings, while Arguello improved to 3-1 while giving up only one earned run in nine frames.

## Pedroia and Schroyer Selected For Team USA:

Arizona State players Ryan Schroyer and Dustin Pedroia were selected for the 2002 Team USA National team trials to be held at Hi-Corbett Field in Tucson in June. Pedroia has started a three different infield positions this year and made only two errors in 189 total chances (.989 FLD %). He is also having a great rookie campaign at the plate with a .332 overall batting average and is hitting at a .385 clip in Pac-10 play. Schroyer leads the team with six saves and has a nearly impeccable 1.52 ERA and 40 strikeouts in 29.2 innings as a relief pitcher. ASU has had at least one player represented on Team USA in three of the past four years. Schroyer was a member of the 2000 Team USA Junior National Team.

## And Then There Were Three:

The Sun Devils have only three games remaining in the 2002 regular season... and they couldn't be more important. Standing at fourth place in the Pac-10 only one game back of second place Washington and Stanford, and two games back of conference leader USC. ASU finishes up with three this weekend against Oregon State and then will wait for the NCAA Tournament selection show Monday morning at 9:30 a.m. to see if they will make a third straight appearance in the NCAA regionals. A sweep by ASU and some help from Washington, USC and Stanford could put ASU in contention for the Pac-10 Championship.

## Suspended Players:

Seniors Jon Sheaffer (CF) and Doug Schutt (CF), and junior third baseman Dennis Wyrick have been indefinitely suspended from the team for breaking team rules on a recent road trip to South Bend, Ind. The trio of players were suspended prior to the New Mexico State game (4/30) and it is not known if they will return this year. Sheaffer was ASU's leading hitter at .364 and started 31 games. Wyrick was hitting .315 in 25 games this year and was a career .371 hitter in Pac-10 play. Schutt was a reserve outfielder who had 12 hits in 30 games (14 starts).

## Devils Prove To Be Clutch With Two Outs:

In the 15-2 win over UCLA (4/14), Arizona State scored 12 of its 15 runs with two outs, a trend that has been with the Devils all year. ASU also had a big night with two outs in a 16-7 win over Portland (5/13), scoring 12 of the 16 runs with two outs. Looking back at all 51 games this year, ASU has maintained the recent two-out phenomenon, scoring over half of their runs with two outs. The Sun Devils have tabbed 78 runs with no outs, 116 with one out and a remarkable 205 of 399 total runs with two outs (51%). As a team the Sun Devils are hitting .309 (173x560) with two outs and have recorded 142 total two-out RBI.

## West Continues Season Trend By Being Named Pac-10 Player of the Week:

Jeremy West became the fourth and fifth selections for an ASU player to be named Pac-10 Player of the Week honor this year. West, a native of Las Vegas, helped lead ASU to a 4-1 record last week while hitting .562 (9x16) with 11 RBI in four games vs. Portland and USC. The Player of the Week honor was the second for West this year and he became only one of two Pac-10 players this year (Conor Jackson - Cal) to earn the honor twice. It is the 66th selection all-time for Arizona State. ASU has now had three Pac-10 Player of the Week awards this year in addition to two Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week awards. Andre Ethier has also been named the Pac-10 Player of the Week this year (Mar. 26), while Mike Esposito (Apr. 1) and Robbie McClellan (Mar. 12) have been named Pac-10 Pitcher's of the Week.

## Hail Cesar:

The Sun Devils have been through four catchers this year, but seems as if they have found their match in former walk-on Cesar Castillo. The senior backstop from Yuma, Ariz., has started 19 of the last 22 games and now has a total of 121 career starts under his belt. While hitting .268 (19x71) on the year with eight doubles and 15 RBI, Castillo has been exceptionally hot as of late. He is hitting .290 (18x62) since taking over the starting catcher role. He recently notched his fifth multi-hit game of the year vs. Portland (5/14), going 2-for-2 with two doubles and tying a career-high with three RBI. He has also been very solid behind the plate, throwing out 30% of would-be base stealers (11-of-37). Sunday's game against Oregon State could almost be titled "Cesar Castillo Day", as he is the only senior on the team with more than one year spent in the program.

## ASU HEAD COACH

### Pat Murphy



Since inheriting the Sun Devil program in August of 1994, Arizona State Baseball Head Coach Pat Murphy has carefully nurtured the tradition of excellence in Tempe, at the same time establishing himself as one of the top collegiate head coaches in the nation. He has guided Arizona State to top-12 national rankings in three of the past five years, including an appearance in the 1998 College World Series national championship game. Murphy is 301-162-1 in his eight seasons in Tempe and posts an all-time 22-16 record in NCAA Tournament action. With a career 674-333-4 record in 17 seasons as a head coach, Murphy is the winningest active baseball coach under the age of 43 at any collegiate level. He also became the youngest collegiate coach to reach 500 career victories (with 75 percent of the wins at the Division I level) on March 22, 1998, with a 7-6 victory over California. Murphy recently recorded his 600th career Division I victory.

## 40 Flavors:

Looking to find the perfect starting lineup as the Sun Devils play their final six regular season games, head coach Pat Murphy has used a different starting lineup in 32 of the last 35 games and 40 different lineup combinations during the 2002 season. Mixing and matching with a number of players earning starts, only three starting batting orders have remained the same since back-to-back games vs. Loyola Marymount (3/3) and New Mexico State (3/5). ASU has also mixed and matched for 27 different starting lineups by position.

## A Team Effort

With the three suspensions and injury/dismissal of freshman pitcher Miguel Sanchez, several Sun Devils have been forced into playing time in a year that would have otherwise been a learning experience from the bench. Of the 33 players that were on the roster when the 2002 season began, 28 players have played a significant role on the team. Four of the remaining players are using their redshirt season (Matt Leaf, Bret Berglund, Josh Smith, Mike Guerrero) and walk-on catcher Garrett Schoenberger has made two Pac-10 road trips as a backup catcher.

## Earlier This Year vs. Oregon State:

In a rare occasion, ASU will close the regular season with the team they opened with. Arizona State and Oregon State met in the desert in the first contest of the year for both teams. ASU won the match-up 13-5 in the inaugural Bill Kajikawa Baseball Classic. ASU starter Mike Esposito picked up the win giving up six hits and four runs in five innings, while the Sun Devil bullpen of J.J. Jackson and Mark Sopko combined to allow only one hit and one unearned run over the final four innings. At the plate leadoff hitter Steve Garrabrants was a perfect 3-for-3 with three runs scored and right fielder Andre Ethier was 3-for-4 with four RBI in his Sun Devil debut.

## Last Year in Corvallis vs. Oregon State:

The Sun Devils lost two of three games last year to the Beavers in rainy and extremely damp conditions at Goss Stadium at Coleman Field. The Devils won the opener 10-2 behind a strong complete-game (ASU's only in 2001) pitching performance from eventual second-round draft pick Jon Switzer. Switzer struck out 10 and scattered eight hits and two runs while lasting a marathon 161 pitches. The Beavers bounced back to win the next two games by scores of 4-1 and 12-2 to take the series from ASU. The Devils were out-hit .310 to .260 in the series and out-scored 18-13 in the three games. Jeremy West is ASU's leading returning hitter from that series, going 3-for-7 in the series. An oddity in the three games was that both teams did not hit a home run.

## The All-Time Series vs. Oregon State:

Arizona State leads the all-time series against the Beavers 19-9 and have won six of the last 10 overall in the series. ASU is 6-3 in Pac-10 games against Oregon State since the old Pac-10 North and Six-Pac joined for the 1999 season. In the only meeting between the two schools in Pac-10 play in the state of Arizona, ASU took two of three from the Beavers during the 2000 Pac-10 Championship season (Apr. 7-9).

## The Streak Stops at Eight:

The Sun Devils had their impressive streak of eight straight Pac-10 series wins come to an end with the 2-1 series loss vs. Cal. Starting in Apr. 12-14, 2001 with a 2-1 series win over Washington State, the Devils had not lost since with series wins against Arizona (2-1), Washington (3-0), UCLA (2-1), at Arizona (2-1), Washington (2-1), at Washington State (2-1) and at UCLA (2-1).

## Where They Compare To Past Years:

After 51 games, the Sun Devils are currently 13 games over .500 at 32-19 overall with three regular season games to be played. The Sun Devils were 34-16-1 last year at this same point in the season. Here is a look at how the Devils have fared after their 51st, 52nd, 53rd and 54th games (games coming up this weekend) since Pat Murphy took over the program in 1995.

## Pat Murphy Notches ASU Wins No. 300 and No. 301 vs. USC:

With a convincing 10-0 win over UNLV in seven innings March 8, Sun Devil Head Coach Pat Murphy reached the 600 plateau for Division I victories in his 15 years of coaching at the top level of collegiate baseball. Murphy has now fashioned a career 674-333-4 record in the 1,011 career games of his 18 seasons as a head coach, with 55 of those wins coming at Maryville (Tenn.) College and Claremont-Mudd Scripps. In his 15 years at the D1 level, Murphy has averaged nearly 40 wins per year and with a pair of wins vs. USC, is now 301-162-1 in his eight-year ASU career. He recently coached in his 1,000th career game April 21, 2002 in the series finale against Cal.



# Sun Devil Baseball 2002

## The Wild, Wild West:

After enduring a month-long slump that resulted in a 6-for-33 (.182) slump, sophomore Jeremy West caught fire in a big way this past week. While playing in only four of the five games (dnp Sunday due to flu virus), West hit .562 (9x16) with eight runs scored, two doubles, a triple, one home run and 11 RBI. For the season the *Baseball America* Midseason All-American is leading the team in several categories, including batting average (.365), runs scored (50), doubles (18), home runs (12), RBI (63), slugging percentage (.707) and extra base hits (34). He has recorded a hit in 36 of 49 games this year and at least one RBI in 28 games. He also leads the team with 23 multi-hit games and 15 multi-RBI games. He also needs just three RBI to reach 100 for his ASU career. The *Baseball America* Midseason All-American recently put his name into the ASU record books with his eight-RBI game against Portland (5/15). The eight RBI, which included a grand slam home run, are the second most in single-game school history and the most by an ASU player since Andrew Beinbrink (the ASU career RBI leader) had eight in a game vs. Boston College in 1999. West currently has a six-game hitting streak in which he is batting .565 (13x23) with 14 RBI, 10 runs scored and five extra base hits. Below is a look at how West's 18 career home runs stack up in ASU history for players in their freshman and sophomore years.

## Three-Position Pedroia:

Freshman Dustin Pedroia (Woodland, Calif.) has been impressive in the field and at the plate in his rookie campaign. Hitting .332 overall on the season and .385 in Pac-10 play, the Freshman All-America candidate has been one of ASU's most potent offensive weapons this year. He has started the last 28 of the last 29 games at shortstop (his third position started at this year) and has played nearly flawless defense this year with only two errors in 189 total chances (.989 FLD %). He has managed at least one hit in 39 of his 51 games played and is the only Devil to start every game this year. He also has one home run, is fifth on the team with 16 extra base hits and has recorded 22 multi-hit games. He has also been invited to the 2002 Team USA National Baseball Trials.

## Sun Devil Baseball Successful in May:

With a 5-3 start to the month of May, the Sun Devil baseball program now has an all-time 294-129 record in the month dating back to the 1959 season when varsity baseball started. ASU was 7-5 last year in May, including a 1-2 record in the NCAA Regional in Fullerton, Calif. ASU is 24-13 in the month of May over the last three years. ASU head coach Pat Murphy is a combined 41-27 in the month of May in his eight years in Tempe.

## Devils Finally Hit The Grand Slam (Home Run Update):

The Sun Devils recently went through a home run draught that put the team through a stretch of seven games without a home run. Freshman Nick Cadena ended that run with two home runs vs. New Mexico State (4/30). While ASU equaled its entire home run total from 2001 with Sergio Garcia's home run vs. Stanford (the 31st of the year for ASU), the Devils had not hit a grand slam. Sophomore Jeremy West ended the streak by hitting a grand slam in the sixth inning of ASU's 48th game of the year. The squad now has 17 solo home runs, six two-run homers and 10 three-run home runs. Ranked last in the Pac-10 in round trippers, ASU has a better winning percentage when not hitting a home run. In fact, the Devils are 17-7 when not hitting a home run, while 15-12 when the team hits at least one home run. Jeremy West leads the team and is 7th in the Pac-10 with 12 home runs. Cadena, who is second on the team with six homers, also leads the Devils with two multi-homer games.

## Why Not #9 Murphy:

Most who are close to the ASU Baseball program know what the No. 9 means to head coach Pat Murphy. Often his slogan to "Play all 9 Innings", Murphy and No. 9 are synonymous with each other... until this year. In a preseason meeting with team, Murphy gave a speech on how you have to be able to give up anything for the team. In this case, he even offered up his prize No. 9, knowing no one would take it. That is, until ASU's sophomore Steve Garrabrants raised his hand and said, I'll take it, and with that, the leader of the Devils is willing to give up *anything* for the team and will wear No. 7 this year.

## Cadena Gets Hot Just In Time:

Freshman Nick Cadena was hitting just .097 after going 0-for-2 at Notre Dame (4/26), but has since caught fire after being inserted into the starting lineup for the injured Andre Ethier. The former high school All-American from Apollo High School, Cadena has made the switch from infielder to the outfield and has started the last nine games in right field. Over that stretch of games Cadena is hitting .333 (12x36) with five home runs and 15 RBI. Cadena is now hitting .224 overall with six home runs and 22 RBI. His six home runs are tied for the fifth most by a freshman in ASU school history, with Jeremy West and Rod Allen also belting six in 2001.

## Just Like The Golfer, This Sergio Garcia is on a Roll:

Senior infielder Sergio Garcia has a familiar name, but this Sergio Garcia is not a golfer. Garcia, a solid infielder who can play shortstop, second base or third base, transferred in the offseason from Oklahoma where he hit .311 for the Sooners last year and was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection. Garcia has started 25 games this year for the Sun Devils and has provided veteran leadership to an otherwise young ASU team. He has started 18 games at second base and seven games at shortstop this year. He is coming of a career-best game Sunday vs. USC in which he went 5-for-5 with three RBI in ASU's 17-8 win over the Trojans. With the five hits, he became the first Sun Devils since Brooks Conrad in 2000 to record five hits in a game. Further more, the five hits improved his batting average 39 points from .321 to .360 in just one game. He is now fourth on the team in batting. Since being inserted into the No. 2 spot, Garcia has been especially hot with a .452 (14x31) batting average when hitting in that spot in the lineup. Garcia has also lived up to his golf surname, going 8-for-10 (.800) with four RBI in his last two Sunday's as if it were the final round of a major golf tournament. His 15 stolen base are tied for fourth in the Pac-10 with teammate Steve Garrabrants.

## Liebeck Lights Them Up:

Junior right-handed pitcher Jered Liebeck has been a nice surprise for the Devils down the stretch. Little used in the first three months of the season as a reliever, Liebeck has come on strong as of late to assume the role as the team's Friday night starter. Liebeck had a strong showing vs. No. 7 Stanford, giving up three runs to record the no-decision while matching up against All-American Jeremy Guthrie. He then took to the mound in the first game against Pac-10 leader USC and gave the Devils a career-best outing to help get ASU off to a 1-0 series lead. Liebeck struck out eight in seven innings against the Trojans to improve to 2-0 on the week. He also picked up the win in relief vs. Portland in a midweek game. For the season the Glendale, Ariz., native is 2-1 with one save and a 4.50 ERA. He did not allow a run and struck out 11 in his nine innings of work last week.

## You're The Best, Mike Esposito:

While not claiming to be the best, sophomore Mike Esposito comes out to the song from the Karate Kid sound track labeled, "You're the Best," before each of his home starts. A song held special to his heart because the man singing the song is his father, Joe Esposito, who is popular lounge singer at Paris Casino in Las Vegas as part of a group called Cat Daddy. "Espo", as known by his teammates, has been solid for ASU on the mound this year with an 8-5 record is ranked fourth in the Pac-10 with a 3.66 ERA. He is currently third in the Pac-10 with 89 strikeouts in 91.0 innings. The redshirt sophomore had a string of 11 consecutive scoreless innings ended in Sunday's start vs. USC and has been battling elbow soreness over the last two weeks. He has turned in three 10-plus strikeout performances this year, last being a 11 strikeout effort vs. New Mexico State (4/30) in six innings. Esposito had one of the best pitching performances in Sun Devil baseball history when he struck out 17 batters in a complete-game victory over the University of Washington (3/29) at Hohokam Stadium. He allowed only three runs (two earned) and eight hits in his second complete-game of the year. Esposito, a redshirt sophomore from Las Vegas, Nev. (Cimarron-Memorial High School) registered the sixth most K's in a single game in ASU history and the most since 1997. The preseason All-American (*Baseball America third team*) and 2001 Team USA member is now 14-7 in his two-years at ASU. Esposito was a fifth-round draft choice in June 1999 by the Cincinnati Reds. After undergoing Tommy John surgery in March 2000, Esposito has not missed a start this year or in his career since coming back from the arm injury.

## A Night to Remember; Esposito Strikes Out 17 vs. Washington:

Here is how Esposito's 17-strikeout game ranks among the top performances in ASU school history. It is the most by a Sun Devil pitcher since Ryan Mills struck out 17 vs. Southern Illinois in 1997 and no one has had more in a Sun Devil uniform since the 1973 season.

## One, Two and Three-Run Misery:

Playing one of the nation's toughest schedules this year, Arizona State has had a handful of close games that haven't gone their way. In fact, of the squad's 19 losses this year, 10 have come by three or less runs. ASU is 4-2 in one-run games and 4-6 in two run games this year. Most recently ASU dropped a pair of two-run contests vs. Stanford two weekends ago (3-5, 1-3).

## Tough Luck McClellan Is Still 5-3 As A Starter:

Robbie McClellan is second on the team with his 7-5 record despite going 0-3 in his last four starts. He has not picked up a win since April 14 at UCLA, but has pitched three straight good games against Notre Dame, Stanford and USC to no avail. The junior pitched well on a cold night at Notre Dame and gave up only three runs in 7.1 innings at No. Stanford. Both performances yielded a tough loss. He also gave up only two runs (one earned) in a no-decision against USC. McClellan is now 5-3 as a starter this year with a 4.17 ERA in those games. He is currently ranked fourth in the Pac-10 with 84 strikeouts and is second with opposing batters hitting only .239 off him. McClellan, from Liberal, Kan., became the first Sun Devil to notch back-to-back complete games since 1999, striking out a career-high 10 batters in a seven-inning win against UNLV (3/8). He allowed just four hits and did not allow a run in the 10-0 win over the Rebels. He also went all nine innings in a 7-2 win over Loyola Marymount (3/2). McClellan has an overall 4.22 ERA (9th best in the Pac-10) in 89.2 innings pitched. He became the 43rd selection all-time for Arizona State as Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week after his performance vs. UNLV. McClellan is nicknamed "The Child" by his teammates for his boyish looks. He transferred to ASU from Seward County CC in Liberal, Kan., where he set school records for strikeouts in a career and season, and was 16-4 in his two years.

## Home Sweet Home:

The Sun Devils couldn't be happier they are playing the last eight games of the 2002 season at Hohokam Park. ASU is 22-7 this year at home, while only 8-11 on the road. The offense has been drastically improved at spacious Hohokam Park with a .322 batting average and 244 of the 374 total runs. ASU is averaging 10.7 hits and 8.41 runs per game in home contests. The Sun Devils have gone 19-7 at Hohokam Park and were a perfect 3-0 at Packard Stadium this year. The pitching has also been better at home with ASU's hurlers posting a very impressive 3.49 ERA in the 29 home games. In ASU's 18 road games, the pitcher's have been hit for a 5.91 ERA, giving up 101 earned runs in 153.2 innings.

## Allen's Production Down, But Not Far Off:

Preseason All-American Rod Allen has lived up to the term 'Sophomore Jinx,' but, overall his season statistics are not all that far off from his remarkable freshman campaign in which he hit .389. Allen is hitting .262 overall (48x183), but the rest of his statistics are very comparable to 2001. He is second on the team with 45 RBI (only eight off last year's total of 53), has six more stolen bases (12 compared to six), has one less home runs (five compared to six) and is only two doubles short of his 14 from last year. The main difference is in the hit column with 48 this year and 70 last year. The sophomore has had quiet a power outage though, now not hitting a home run in over two months since Mar. 24 at Arizona (79 at-bats).

## Arguello Gets It Done:

Like teammate Jered Liebeck, junior Carlos Arguello was 2-0 last week and maintained a stellar 1.00 ERA in nine innings of work vs. Portland and USC. He started and gave four string innings against the Pilots (5/14) and then came out of the bullpen with five innings of one-run ball to seal ASU's 17-8 victory over USC (5/19). For the season the Albuquerque, N.M., native is 3-1 with a team-best 2.03 ERA in 26.2 innings pitched. The Cochise College (Douglas, Ariz.) transfer has a 1.86 ERA in his 19.1 innings as a reliever and is 2-0 with a 2.45 ERA in his two starts.

## Home Sweet Home:

The Sun Devils couldn't be happier they ending the 2002 season with the final eight games at Hohokam Park. ASU improved to 24-8 this year at home with the two wins against USC last weekend. ASU was only 8-11 on the road this year, but had a winning mark in Pac-10 play on the road (7-5). The offense has especially enjoyed playing at spacious Hohokam Park with a .324 batting average and 269 of the 399 total runs. ASU is averaging 10.75 hits and 8.41 runs per game in home contests. ## Ethier On The Mend With Broken Left Thumb:

Sophomore Andre Ethier, ASU's second leading hitter at .362, is currently sidelined with a broken left thumb. He is listed as questionable for this weekend's series against Oregon State. He broke his right thumb when diving for a fly ball in ASU's 9-4 loss to Notre Dame (4/26). Despite being without one of their top hitters in Ethier, the Sun Devils have gone 6-3 with out their normal starting right fielder. Ethier had an interesting journey en route to becoming ASU's leading hitter this year. He came to ASU in the fall of 2000, left ASU to play at Chandler-Gilbert CC, and now is back as the starting right fielder for the Sun Devils. The sweet-swinging Ethier is currently second on the team in hitting through 43 games with a .362 (58x160) batting average. Ethier has 16 multi-hit games on the year, six of which have been three-hit affairs and one a four-hit game. He also has recorded at least one hit in 32 of his 42 games played this year and is second on the team with 19 extra base hits. After earning All-State honors at St. Mary's High School as a senior in 2000, Ethier followed his dreams and came to Arizona State University to play baseball. With playing time not working out, Ethier decided to play his freshman year at Chandler-Gilbert CC. Making a name for himself by hitting .468 at the JC level last year, Ethier spurned an offer from the Oakland Athletics after being drafted in the 37th round and came back to Arizona State.

## Jeff Larish Makes Strong Sun Devil Debut:

Freshman infielder Jeff Larish had not dressed for a game this year and was in the stands as a redshirt candidate before finding out he would be the starting third baseman in ASU's Mar. 16 game vs. Oklahoma. Larish made the most of the opportunity, going 3-for-4 with a triple and run scored in his ASU debut vs. the Sooners. Larish has since heated up to become one of the team offensive leaders with a .330 (33x100) batting average with 21 RBI. He was 4-for-5 with a big two-run home run vs. UCLA (4/12) to help lead the Devils to a 4-3 win in 11 innings. He also hit a big three-run home run vs. Stanford (5/10). He recently had a career-high 10-game hitting streak in which he was 14-for-36 (.389) with two doubles and 12 RBI. The freshman starred at Tempe McClintock High School last year and was a 32nd-round draft choice of the Chicago Cubs last June.

## Garrabrants Proves To Be a Sparkplug:

Sophomore Steve Garrabrants has been a sparkplug for ASU all year with the team going 25-13 when he hits in the leadoff spot. Garrabrants missed seven games with an injury that occurred Mar. 9 (neck/shoulder) and it proved key as ASU went 3-4 in those games. For the season Garrabrants is fifth on the team with a .355 batting average (61x172). He is second on the team with 22 extra base hits (14 2B, six 3B, 2 HR) and has recorded at least one hit in 35 of his 44 games (80%). Garrabrants is tied for second on the team with Dustin Pedroia with 22 multi-hit games and also has contributed 10 multi-RBI contests. He heads into the weekend tied for the Pac-10 lead with six triples and his 15 stolen bases rank fourth.

## Devils Better Score Early and Often:

The Sun Devils have had good success this year when scoring before their opponent, going 23-9 in those games. ASU has scored in the first inning in 28 of its 51 games this year (55%) and is 22-6 in those games when scoring in their first at-bat. Five runs or more seem to be the magic number for the Devils, as ASU is 31-7 in games when scoring five or more runs. The Devils are also 25-4 when leading after six innings and 28-1 when leading after eight innings. ASU is also 17-1 when scoring 10 or more runs and have scored 10 or ore in three of its last five games.

## Murphy's Teams Know How To Score:

A true icon of the Pat Murphy system is scoring runs. The Sun Devils have done plenty of that since he arrived in 1995. ASU has led the NCAA in scoring in two of the last three years, averaging 11.32 runs per game in 1999 and 10.97 runs per game in 2000. The Devils paced the Pac-10 in 2001, hitting at a .327 clip and averaging 8.26 runs per game to rank 17th in the nation. ASU also led the nation in batting average with a team total of .356 in 1999 and fell just percentage points shy of matching that feat a second year in a row in 2000 with a .346 mark, trailing Stony Brook by one point. During Pat Murphy's eight seasons at ASU, the Sun Devils have been a scoring machine with 4,248 runs, averaging 9.16 runs per game and hitting at an overall .329 clip. ## Hohokam is ASU's Home Away From Home in 2002:

While a \$2 million renovation will begin in late March to Packard Stadium, the Sun Devils will call Hohokam Stadium in Mesa home for the 2002 season for all but three home games. Hohokam Park is also the spring training home of the Chicago Cubs and the Arizona Fall League home of the Mesa Solar Sox. The facility will provide ASU with a first-class facility while Packard Stadium undergoes renovation. Hohokam Park, which opened in 1997, has a seating capacity of 12,623, with 8,000 theater-style seats.

## Is it HoHoKam or Hohokam... Stadium... or Park:

While it can be up for debate on the actual spelling of Hohokam Stadium, the City of Mesa has recognized the official spelling of Hohokam Park to be without the capital H and capital K in the middle of the word. The group that call themselves the HoHoKam's use the capital letters, but the actual group of Native Americans that the park is named after is spelled 'Hohokam.' To extend the debate, is it Hohokam Park or Hohokam Stadium. While both are acceptable, the games are played in Hohokam Stadium, which is located in Hohokam Park.

## Hitting For The Cycle... in the First Inning:

In what may be one of the rarest feats of Arizona State baseball history, the Devils led off the Feb. 9 game vs. Tennessee in grand fashion with the first four hitters combining to hit for the cycle in the first inning. Leadoff hitter Steve Garabrants led off the game with a first-pitch home run, then Dustin Pedroia followed with a double, then Rod Allen singled and to cap off the amazing event, Jeremy West tripled to give ASU the early 2-0 lead.

## The Apollo Connection:

Arizona State and Apollo High School in Glendale has formed quiet a relationship. Former Sun Devil All-American and Major Leaguer Bob Horner started the tradition back in the late 1970's and still holds the ASU career record for home runs with 56. Current Los Angeles Dodger Paul Lo Duca, who was the *Sporting News* College Player of the Year in 1993 and holds the ASU single-season batting average record at .446 was also a prep standout at Apollo High School. The latest in the line of ASU players to come from Apollo High School is freshman infielder Nick Cadena. Cadena broke the school and state home run records for a career set by Horner and also bettered several of Lo Duca's long-standing records. Cadena belted his first career home run (3-Run HR) vs. Washington State (4/7). He leads the Devils with two multi-homer games this year, last being Sunday vs. USC. To add to the connection, ASU Baseball beat writer Paul Coro of the Arizona Republic is also an Apollo graduate.

## ASU And Team USA Connections:

Arizona State baseball has had a long-standing tradition of sending players to play for the USA National team during the summers. ASU has had six players don the Red, White and Blue for Team USA since 1984, with the first being Oddibe McDowell in the 1984 Olympics played at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles. Jim Austin played for Team USA in 1990 and ASU has had four players play with Team USA in the last four years. 1999 Pac-10 Player of the Year Willie Bloomquist played in the summer of 1998, 2000-2001 Pac-10 Player of the Year Casey Myers played in the summer of 2000 and was also a member of the Team USA Junior National Team before arriving at ASU in 1998. Current Tampa Bay Devil Ray prospect Jon Switzer was also a member of the 2000 National Team and current pitcher Mike Esposito was 3-1 with a 1.56 ERA last summer. Current Sun Devils Dennis Wyrick and Ryan Schroyer also played for the Team USA Junior teams during their respective prep careers. Schroyer and freshman shortstop Dustin Pedroia have a chance to join this elite list, as they have both been invited to the 2002 Team USA National Trials to be held in June in Tucson, Ariz.

## Homegrown Devils:

A total of 20 of ASU's 32 players hail from the state of Arizona. Rod Allen (Phoenix), Joel Bocchi (Phoenix), Nick Cadena (Glendale), Cesar Castillo (Yuma), Andre Ethier (Phoenix), Steve Garabrants (Phoenix), Tuffy Gosewisch (Scottsdale), Mike Guerrero (Mesa), J.J. Jackson (Chandler), Bryce Kartler (Phoenix), Ian Kinsler (Tucson), Aaron Klusman (Phoenix), Jeff Larish (Tempe), Matt Leaf (Peoria), Jered Liebeck (Glendale), Josh Perrault (Mesa), Ryan Schroyer (Casa Grande), Doug Schutt (Gilbert) and Josh Smith (Lake Havasu) are all native Arizonans. The team is also represented by players from Alaska (1), California (4), Colorado (1), Illinois (2), Kansas (1), Nevada (2) and New Mexico (1).

## Allen and Esposito Named Summer All-Americans:

Sun Devil sophomores Rod Allen and Mike Esposito were named to *Baseball America's* second-team Summer All-America team. Allen was ranked as the No. 8 prospect out of the Alaskan League after hitting .314 with 24 stolen bases to help lead the Anchorage Glacier Pilots to the National Baseball Congress (NBC) World Series Championship in Wichita, Kan. Esposito was 3-1 with a 1.56 ERA for Team USA. Junior pitcher Robbie McClellan also had great summer success, helping lead the Liberal BeeJays (Kansas) to the NBC World Series. McClellan was named an NBC All-American after going 2-0 with a 0.52 ERA in the 2001 World Series.

## A Tribute To Joe Black:

The Sun Devils wore black socks and their black hat two games this year in the series against USC, honoring the late Joe Black. Black, who starred in the Negro and Major Leagues, talked to the team during the pre-season on various topic about baseball and life.

## Frequent Flyers... and Drivers:

With the three-game series at Florida State in Tallahassee, ASU embarked on its first of many roadtrips this season. The Devils traveled a total of 3,572 miles last weekend, flying from Phoenix to Atlanta and then on to Tallahassee. For the season ASU will log 10,192 miles in the air, with flights to Oklahoma City, Chicago, Spokane, Wash., Las Vegas and San Jose, Calif. In addition, ASU plans to make two big bus trips this year to Las Cruces, N.M. (770 miles round trip) for the Mar. 12 game at New Mexico State and to UCLA (792 miles round trip) for the three-game Pac-10 series in April. In all, ASU will drive 2,136 miles on a bus this year to get to games.

## Calling All Lettermen

Prior to the 2002 baseball season, the Arizona State Baseball Media Guide, the official source of ASU Baseball information, only referred to records and lettermen dating back to 1959. Although 1959 is the year Bobby Winkles officially took over the program, making the sport have varsity recognition at ASU, baseball in Tempe dates back to 1907. Integrating the research of Barry Sollenberger from his book, "Bulldog Baseball," lettermen and records prior to 1959 have been added to the ASU Baseball Media Guide. The list of letterman is ever evolving, so if you know of any name that should be on the list of a player that played in at least one *VARSITY* game, please contact the ASU Media Relations office at jeff.evans@asu.edu.

## Success in the Classroom As Well As On The Field:

ASU has long enjoyed much success on the diamond, and with 18 College World Series appearances, it is known as one of the gems of college baseball. But lately academics, as well as on-field talent, has shown its true colors in the storied program. Pat Murphy's Sun Devil squads have produced four Academic All-Americans over the past three years (Willie Bloomquist, Mark Ernster, Jeff Phelps, Casey Myers), including Myers being named the Academic All-American for college baseball in 2000 and 2001. The four players honored as National Academic All-Americans is the most by any college baseball program in the nation over the last three years.

## ASU Owns Pac-10 Player of the Year Award:

Since the old Pac-10 North (formerly Washington State, Washington, Oregon State, Portland State) and the Six-Pac joined to form the unified Pac-10 baseball conference in 1999, Arizona State has enjoyed much success with a combined 43-29 record in league play. Even more impressive is that no one other than an ASU player has won the annual Pac-10 Player of the Year award. Willie Bloomquist won the inaugural award in 1999, while Casey Myers took home the hardware in 2000 and 2001 to become only fourth player in Pac-10 history to win the award twice in a career. In all, ASU has won nine (9) Pac-10 Player of the Year Awards dating back to 1978 (Myers (2), Bloomquist, Jacob Cruz, Paul Lo Duca, Linty Ingram, Oddibe McDowell, Alvin Davis, Mike Sodders) and two Pac-10 Pitchers of the Year (Noah Perry and Marc Barcelo).

## Golden Spikes Common At Arizona State:

While Mark Prior of USC was the recipient of the 2001 Golden Spikes award as the nation's top amateur baseball player, it should be noted that three Arizona State players have won the award. Bob Horner, who was a standout at ASU from 1976-78, won the inaugural award in 1978. Oddibe McDowell, who was a member of the first Team USA baseball team to compete in an Olympics, won the award in 1984. Mike Kelly, who ranks second in ASU history with 46 home runs from 1989-91, won the award in 1991. In all, 13 players that have worn the Maroon and Gold have been named a Player of the Year for college baseball.

## ASU Leader of the Pac When It Comes to Player of the Week:

Arizona State has amassed 44 Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week and 66 Players of the Week since 1981. That total leads all Pac-10 member schools. The Sun Devils had two players honored as Pac-10 POW last year with Mike Esposito taking home the Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week honor on May 5 and Mike Lopez won the Pac-10 Player of the Week on April 28. The 2002 season has already seen five Sun Devils earn Pac-10 POW honors. Andre Ethier and Jeremy West (twice) have been named Pac-10 Players of the Week, while Robbie McClellan and Mike Esposito have been named Pac-10 Pitchers of the Week.

## Arizona State in Postseason Play:

The Sun Devil baseball program has created a dynasty in college baseball that has been matched by few. With 18 appearances in the College World Series, ASU ranks fifth for the most trips to Omaha. Arizona State has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 25 of the program's 42 varsity seasons (dating back to 1959), amassing an incredible 122-49 (.730) record. ASU's five National Championships rank as the second most of any NCAA school. In addition to ASU's five national championships, the Sun Devils have also turned in five second-place teams and three third-place finishes.

## Drafted Devils:

A total of 17 players on the 2001 Arizona State squad have been taken in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Since the inception of the draft in 1965, ASU has had more players chosen (303), more first-round draft picks (21) and more No. 1 picks (3) than any other school in the nation. Eight (8) players from the 2000 Pac-10 Championship team were drafted last June. ASU's three No. 1 picks were Rick Monday (1965), Floyd Bannister (1976) and Bob Horner (1978, Atlanta).

## Horner Ranks Second As Player of the Century:

Former Sun Devil greats Bob Horner and Eddie Bane were honored by *Baseball America* by being placed on the publication's "Team of the Century." Horner, an ASU great under Jim Brock from 1976-78, hit .383 for his career and belted a school record 56 home runs. Horner was listed second on the team behind Oklahoma State slugger Pete Incaviglia (1983-85). Bane, a top pitcher for the Sun Devils from 1971-72, posted a career 40-4 record and a 1.64 ERA. Bane was listed as the ninth best player of the 20th Century by *Baseball America*. The top 10 players of the century were voted on by fans, coaches and baseball writers and are listed below:

## 91 Years of Sun Devil Baseball Tradition:

While the history of baseball at Arizona State University goes back all the way to the early 1900's, the school officially began sponsoring varsity baseball in 1959. Prior to 2002, the ASU Baseball Media Guide referred only to those players that played from 1959 to present. ASU now officially recognizes those players, coaches and seasons from 1907-1950. In 90-plus years of baseball at Arizona State, the program has built a legacy matched by few in the college baseball world. With a 2,230-1,094-6 all-time record, Arizona State has advanced to the College World Series 18 times, won five national championships, won six Pac-10 titles, produced 12 Players of the Year and three Golden Spikes Award winners, and has gone to the NCAA Tournament 25 times. Under current head coach Pat Murphy, the Sun Devils have finished in the top 12 in three of the last five years and finished second in the nation in 1998. They have been ranked in the top 20 for 40 consecutive national polls.

## Seven Devils Earn Freshman All-America Honors in 2001:

Seven Sun Devils earned freshman All-America honors during the 2001 season. Rod Allen and Jeremy West both earned first-team acclaim from Collegiate Baseball and Allen was also named to the Baseball America Freshman All-America team. Allen set an ASU freshman record with a .389 batting average and became the first Sun Devil freshman in school history to be named a first-team All-Pac-10 player. Mike Esposito, Aaron Klusman, Ryan Schroyer, Steve Garabrants and Nick Walsh were all named to the Collegiate Baseball Freshman All-America team as honorable mention selections.

## Putting A Recent Event In Perspective:

The University of Texas recently set a Big 12 record by recording a string of 41 consecutive shutout innings. The nationally ranked Longhorns set the record over the course of four full games and part of two others. The record drastically fails in comparison to the NCAA record of 64 consecutive shutout inning by the 1972 Arizona State pitching staff. ASU, behind wins from Sun Devil pitching legends Jim Otten, Craig Swan and Eddie Bain combined for seven straight shutouts. As part of one of the greatest teams in ASU history, the Devils went 64-6 that year, setting school records for ERA (1.76), strikeouts (732), complete games (43) and shutouts (24). Bane ended the year 14-1, Otten was 9-0 and Swan was 16-1.
