If you're wondering where the drive, seriousness and intensity come from, the answer is simple. Jeff has a plan. "I would definitely like to get to the NBA someday, and it is a goal. I am not letting it consume me, though, because I know I have to improve."

He knows he's been blessed with some natural talent, but it takes more than that to actually get a gig in the NBA. Make no mistake about it, Jeff has some dreams and goals that have him wearing a suit instead of shorts and high-tops. It's because he's majoring in finance, not phys ed. And it's because he is 100% committed to whatever he's doing, which includes riding the bus to class at 7:40 in the morning, which is what he did last year. "I am trying to get my degree in economics because I want to learn about business

and how it works, because someday I'd like to own my own business." And in case you're wondering what type of business it would be, well, it would involve one of Jeff's other true passions — cars. "I'd like to have my own car-customizing business, but only classic, nice, sexy, luxury cars. No Honda Civics. I'm talking about BMWs and Bentleys."
