2000-2001 Review

SUN DEVILS FINISH TIED FOR SIXTH IN PAC-10

Four Starters Expected To Return Along With Redshirted Shell And Allen

SEASON IN REVIEW: The Arizona State men's basketball team (13-16; 5-13 in Pac-10), under third-year head coach Rob Evans, tied for sixth place in the Pac-10 in 2000-2001 after being picked to finish eighth in the preseason media poll. After starting the Pac-10 season 0-7, the Sun Devils went 5-6 since February 1, when junior center Chad Prewitt was back at full strength. ASU will lose just one senior (Alton Mason) from last year's team. The Sun Devils played 15 games against NCAA Tournament teams and were 5-0 against non-conference NCAA teams, beating Charlotte, Winthrop, BYU, Kent State and Southern Utah.

A LOOK BACK AT THE OPPONENTS: A look back at ASU's 11 non-conference opponents shows that five of them made the NCAA Tournament, and ASU was 5-0 against those teams. Kent State (24-10) won the MAC East title and MAC Tournament and advanced to the second round of the NAACs after beating Indiana in the first round; BYU (24-9) tied for the Mountain West title with a 10-4 mark and won the MWC Tournament; Southern Utah (25-6) went to the NCAA Tournament after beating Valparaiso in the Mid-Continent finals; Charlotte (22-11), which played in ASU's holiday tournament, won the Conference USA Tournament and Winthrop (18-13) and went to the NAACs for the third straight season after winning the Big South Tournament. Tulsa finished 26-11 and won the NIT championship and ASU's other opponent in its holiday tournament was Ohio (19-11) while San Diego State finished 14-14. Only Colgate, Mercer and Belmont were under .500 as they all finished with 13-15 marks. Counting the five Pac-10 teams that made the tournament, ASU played 15 of its 29 games against NCAA Tournament teams and was 5-10.

MORE ON THAT SCHEDULE: What Pac-10 team played the most games against NCAA Tournament teams during the regular season? The Sun Devils 15 games against NCAA teams not only led the Pac-10 but was tied for 11th in the nation. Ten teams played more than 15 games against NCAA teams while seven, including ASU played 15. SHELL AND ALLEN REDSHIRTED: Two Sun Devils who played solid roles as freshman last year redshirted this season due to injuries. Tanner Shell, who averaged 9.1 points per game in Pac-10 games including a 24-point effort at USC, broke his left hand in practice in late December and missed the remainder of the year. Shell had played in just the season opener due to a bulging disc in his back but was practicing for ASU's holiday tournament and was expected to return to the rotation. Last year he had six double-figure scoring games and averaged seven points per game. His 9.1 points per game in Pac-10 play was third on the team. Also, sophomore Justin Allen redshirted after being diagnosed with Hodgkin's Disease in late September. Allen's treatments have been going well and he is expected to return to the court next season.

GOOD STOREY: Awvee Storey, a 6-6 junior who led the Pac-10 in offensive rebounds last year, averaged 9.1 rebounds per game overall and 9.7 per game in Pac-10 play and led the league in both categories this year. He was named Pac-10 Player of the Week (Feb. 1-4) after averaging 20 points and 9.5 rebounds during the Oregon road sweep. Storey also grabbed a career-high 16 rebounds at WSU and had 16 again vs. UCLA. The 16 boards is the most by a Sun Devil since Mike Batiste had 18 in triple-overtime at Texas A & M on Dec. 19, 1998. His 9.1 rebounds per game is the best by a Sun Devil since Alton Lister averaged 9.7 rebounds in 1980-81. Lester Neal, the only other Sun Devil to lead the league in boards, had 9.0 boards per game in 1992-93. Storey also posted 11 double-doubles, tied with Dan Gadzuric of UCLA for the Pac-10 lead.

IN THE CLASSROOM: The Sun Devil men's hoops team had one of its best semesters in the fall of 2000 as seven Sun Devils posted at least a 3.0 grade point average. One player's academic effort that is worth noting is sophomore Justin Allen, who passed all nine hours with a 3.33 grade point average. Sophomore Shawn Redhage, a construction science major, earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors with a 3.28 cumulative GPA. Overall, the 14 players on the team had a 2.7 GPA.

ROB EVANS: Rob Evans ([132-126/512](#)) finished his third season in 2000-2001 (ninth overall) as the head basketball coach at Arizona State after being hired on April 7, 1998. The 1997 SEC Coach of the Year spent six seasons at Ole Miss, compiling an 86-81 (.515) record. He led the Rebels to a 42-16 record in his final two seasons, winning two SEC West titles, and led Ole Miss to back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time since 1937-38. The 54-year old Evans is a 1968 graduate of New Mexico State, where he captained two NCAA Tournament teams, is a 1989 inductee of the NMSU Athletic Hall of Fame and was named to the school's All-Time Basketball team. He is [46-45 \(.505\)](#) at ASU. Evans' Ole Miss squads were known as a tough man-to-man teams which ranked 13th in the nation and second in the SEC in 1997-98 in rebounding at +6.6, despite no player was in the top 30 in rebounding. Ole Miss held opponents to just 30 percent from the three-point stripe, best in the SEC, and to just 40.6 percent from the field. [He is 88-61 \(.591\) in the past five seasons.](#)

HISTORY LESSON: ASU had an opportunity to play the No. 1 team in the nation when it played Pac-10 champion and No. 1 Stanford on March 10. It marked the fifth time ASU had played against the top-ranked team. ASU is 1-4, with the win coming 20 years ago (March 7, 1981) in one of the greatest wins in Sun Devil history. ASU, coached by Ned Wulk, travelled to Corvallis and led 40-20 at the half against top ranked Oregon State and won 87-67 on the final day of the regular season. All five ASU starters (Sam Williams, Paul Williams, Alton Lister, Byron Scott and Fat Lever) in that game were future NBA first- or second-round draft picks. A look at ASU vs. No. 1:

HE KEEPS GETTING BETTER: Tommy Smith, voted the Most Improved Player at the team's banquet, matched a Pac-10 record for field goal percentage by making all 11 shots against Washington on Feb. 10, and played well from mid-January through the season. Smith, a 6-9 sophomore, averaged 12.5 points in the final 15 games and had a career-high 24 points vs. the Huskies and had 21 points and 12 boards at California on March 8. His 11-of-11 effort put him in the Pac-10 record book with Steve Johnson of OSU (13-of-13 vs. Hawaii-Hilo on Dec. 5, 1979), Marques Johnson of UCLA (11-of-11 vs. Cal on Feb. 27, 1976) and Bryan Bracey of Oregon (10-of-10 vs. UW on Jan. 20, 2000). Smith scored in double-digits in 12 of the final 15 games after posting double digits in just five games last season (just two Pac-10 games). He had 15 points at UO on Feb. 4, then had his first double-double with 11 points and 12 boards vs. WSU on Feb. 8 before his 24-point, seven-rebound and five-assist effort against UW. In his final 10 games, Smith was 52-of-78 (.670) from the field and averaged 12.9 points.

AT THE LINE: Sophomore Shawn Redhage has established himself as one of the best free throw shooters in ASU history 61 games into his young career. Redhage shot 80-of-98 (.816) this year, the fourth-best mark in the Pac-10, and is 139-of-169 (.820) in his career. A look at Redhage on ASU career FT list as he now stands first on the list:

NABC CLASSIC: ASU played in the NABC Classic on Nov. 10-11 at the Smith Center in Chapel Hill, N.C. ASU fell to eventual NIT champion Tulsa 69-67 in the first round but topped eventual Big South Tournament Champion Winthrop. **Shawn Redhage** had 19 points vs. Tulsa and 17 points vs. Winthrop to earn All-Classic honors. The Nov. 10 starting date was the earliest in school history.

SCHOLARSHIP HONORS EVANS: New Mexico State's African American Alumni Association presents a scholarship in the name of Hall of Famer Rob Evans. The Rob Evans Scholarship Fund is given to the university to assist with the recruitment and retention of African American students. Evans, a native of Hobbs, N.M., is a 1968 graduate of NMSU with a bachelors degree in Education.

A VOTER: Rob Evans is one of the 31 coaches on The USA TODAY/ESPN Board which voted on the Coaches Top 25. The 31-member 2000-01 panel also included Jim Boeheim (Syracuse), Bob Huggins (Cincinnati), Gene Keady (Purdue), Rick Majerus (Utah), Dave Odom (Wake Forest) and Oliver Purnell (Dayton).

BAD LUCK: Since 1990, 43 of 44 Pac-10 teams who have won at least 11 conference games have been selected to the NCAA Tourney. The exception? ASU in 1992-93, when it was 11-7 and tied for third. Also, 47 of 49 teams since 1990 who have posted 18 overall wins and 10 Pac-10 wins have qualified for the NCAA. Again, the odd teams out were ASU in 1992-93 and 1999-2000.

ON MISSIONS: Kenny Crandall, who was a freshman in 1998-99 and started in 23 games, went on a two-year Mormon Mission to Eugene, Ore., and will return to the Sun Devils in 2001-2002. Crandall, a native of Mesa, Ariz., and a 6-4 swingman who prepped at Mountain View High School, averaged 5.9 points and 28.4 minutes per game in his initial season. He will have three years of eligibility. Also, Dewy DeWitt, a walk-on from Show Low, Ariz., who redshirted last year and received a full academic scholarship, left for his mission Aug. 30 to Trujillo, Peru. He returns July 30, 2002 and will have four years of eligibility.

BALANCE: ASU had seven players lead in scoring and Awvee Storey and Alton Mason had six 20-point games. The only Sun Devils to post 20-point games last year were Storey (3), Eddie House (17) and Tanner Shell (1). Including Storey, five Sun Devils posted 20-point games this past season.

VS. BYU: ASU held Mountain West Conference Champion BYU to just 15-of-59 (.254) from the field on Dec. 2, the second-best defensive effort by a Rob Evans-coached team.

VS. KENT STATE: ASU held MAC Tournament Champion Kent State to just 15-of-55 (.273) from the field on Nov. 25, the fifth-best defensive effort by an Evans-coached team.

HOME OPENER: ASU placed all five starters in double figures in the home opener against eventual Mid-Continent Tournament Champion Southern Utah on Nov. 17, 2000, in a 94-72 win. It marked the first time all five starters notched double-digit points since an 87-66 win over Oregon State on Feb. 20, 1999. ASU has now won 11 straight home openers. The last time ASU lost a home opener was Dec. 5, 1989, when it fell to BYU 65-64.

BACK IN ACTION: The Sun Devils received a boost on Jan. 24 at Arizona when 6-9 junior Chad Prewitt (10.1 ppg. and 4.9 rpg.), who badly sprained his right ankle on Jan. 9, returned to the lineup after playing just 16 minutes the previous four contests. Prewitt missed the Washington (Jan. 11) and USC (Jan. 20) games and played just 12 minutes at Washington State (Jan. 13) and just four minutes vs. UCLA (Jan. 18). At Arizona, Prewitt had 18 points on 7-of-11 (.636) shooting, including two three-pointers. He added six rebounds in 31 minutes. Prewitt averaged 10.2 points in Pac-10 play in 1999-2000, second on the team, and had started 45 straight games before missing the Washington game. A look at ASU stats with and without Prewitt.

GREAT SHOOTING NIGHTS: Arizona State has had two of the top five shooting nights by a Rob Evans-coached team at Oregon (Feb. 4) and vs. Washington (Feb. 10). Against Oregon, ASU was 39-of-63 (.619) from the field, including 20-of-31 (.645) in the second half. Against Washington, ASU was 38-of-62 (.613) from the field, including 20-of-30 (.667) in the second half. Those games are the second and fourth-best shooting nights by an Evans-coached team in his 258 games as a head coach dating to his first season at Ole Miss (1992-93). The best shooting night was on Feb. 15, 1995, when Ole Miss shot 62.5 percent (35-of-56) in a 102-90 victory over LSU. A look at the top five shooting nights by an Evans-coached team:

MILEAGE: The ASU program has logged some serious air miles within the past year. It started last year with a trip to the Puerto Rico Shootout, as ASU travelled 6,032 miles for its first road trip with its six freshmen. Then came trips to BYU (1,016), Bay Area (1,292), Los Angeles (750), North Carolina St. (3,776), Seattle/Pullman (2,216), Oregon/Oregon St. (2,020) and NCSU again (3,776). Add this year's Nov. 9-12 trip to the NABC Classic in Chapel Hill (3,776), the Dec. 16 game at San Diego State (750) and the trips to Seattle/Pullman (2,216), UO/Oregon State (2,020), USC/UCLA (750) and the Bay Area (1,292) and ASU has flown 31,682 miles since the beginning of last season.

QUICKLY ABOUT 1999-2000: The ASU men's basketball team (19-13; 10-8 in Pac-10) posted its best season since 1994-95 in Rob Evans second year at the helm of the program in 1999-2000. The young ASU team, with six true freshmen combining for nearly 96 minutes per game and at least one freshman starting in every game, posted a Pac-10 road sweep for the first time since 1996 to begin the second half at WSU/UW and notched a home sweep of the LA schools for the first time since 1986 a week later. It was ASU's first four-game Pac-10 win streak since 1995. ASU also was 3-1 in overtime (all Pac-10 road contests). The Sun Devils posted 19 wins for just the fourth time in the past 17 seasons, as ASU was picked to finish eighth in the Pac-10 media poll but finished in a tie for fourth with NCAA-bound UCLA (a team ASU beat 104-75 on Feb. 17 to end a 22-game losing streak to the Bruins) at 10-8, sweeping four teams along the way (Cal, WSU, UW and OSU).

SOLID DEFENSE: ASU held BYU (Dec. 2) and Kent State (Nov. 25) to just 30-of-114 (.263) from the floor. The defensive efforts were among the best by a Rob Evans-coached team. Dating to when he took over Ole Miss in 1992-93, those two games rank second and fifth for field goal percentage defense. A look at the top five defensive efforts by an Evans' squad in his nine years, six at Ole Miss and three at Arizona State.

DOUBLE FIGURES: ASU placed all five starters in double digits in the home opener against Southern Utah, a 94-72 win. It marked the first time all five starters notched double-digit points since an 87-66 win over Oregon St. on Feb. 20, 1999. ASU also had five players reached double-digits in its 91-78 win over Charlotte on Dec. 30. Last season, ASU had five players reach double digits just twice (at American-P.R. and vs. Cal). ASU also had six players (and all five starters) reach double digits in the 99-72 win at Oregon on Feb. 4.

CAREER HIGHS FOR ALTON MASON

SWEEPS OF DUCKS AND BEAVERS: ASU won all four games against the Oregon schools for just the second time in its 23 Pac-10 seasons. The other time was in 1992-93. The Sun Devils swept Oregon State for the second straight year and for the fifth year overall. ASU has now won eight of the past nine against the Beavers and is 14-4 in the past nine years vs. OSU overall.

ASU swept Oregon for the first time since 1992-93 season and for the eighth time in its 23 Pac-10 seasons. In the two games against the Ducks ASU shot 67-of-110 (.609) from the field, including an amazing 35-52 (.673) in the second half.

ASU swept the Oregon road trip, ASU's second Pac-10 road sweep in its past 20 attempts. ASU swept the Washington road trip in 1999-2000 under Evans, but before that had not posted a road sweep since the 1996 Oregon trip. ASU has now swept the Oregon road trip four times in its 23 seasons of Pac-10 play, with the others occurring in 1980-81, 1992-93 and 1995-96.

When ASU beat Oregon 99-72 at McArthur Court on February 4, it was one of the more impressive road games in school history. ASU shot 61.9 percent (39-of-63), the best mark since Jan. 14, 1995, when ASU shot 62 percent at California (31-of-50). The 27-point victory margin was the biggest in a road game since a 90-62 win at Washington on Jan. 10, 1981 and the biggest in the past 227 road game. It also was the biggest home defeat for Oregon since it fell to Arizona 92-60 on Jan. 28, 1993. ASU is now 4-3 at McArthur Court in the past seven games.

OVERTIME: How impressive was ASU's 3-1 record in road overtime games in 1999-2000? ASU just missed matching the NCAA record for road OT wins, which is four. Four schools notched 4-0 marks in road OT games in one season, including ASU in 1980-81. Others were Delaware (1972-73), Cal St. Fullerton (1988-89) and New Mexico St. (1993-94). ASU won road overtime games at California, Washington State and Oregon State and fell at USC.

With many Sun Devils fans inquiring if they could help financially, Arizona State has been given clearance by the NCAA to set up a benefit fund for sophomore men's basketball player Justin Allen (Malta, Ill.) as he continues his battle against Hodgkin's disease.

"We basically asked the NCAA to help us in this situation and they did just that," Arizona State Assistant Athletic Director Foti Mellis said. "It's a case-by-case basis, and you have to petition the Administrative Review Subcommittee. Many fans of the basketball program and others close to the university have been asking about helping Justin for quite a while, but we had to find a legal way to do it, and now we have a way."

"The staff, his teammates and people here have already treated us wonderfully," said Faye Allen, Justin's mother. "People have no idea how much it means."

Allen has said that his tumor has shrunk, and he has two more chemotherapy treatments, followed by six weeks of radiation.

"We all want to put our energies towards helping him and his family," said ASU third-year head coach Rob Evans. "The team, the coaching staff, the entire athletic department and university will continue to do everything possible to help and encourage Justin and his family as he fights this battle. We take pride in being a family in our program. We appreciate all the energy and thought put in by the NCAA and our own compliance office."

"Justin's attitude has been tremendous," added Evans. "He's a tough kid who is handling this in a great way, which is a great inspiration to us all."

FALL SIGNEE JASON BRAXTON: The Arizona State men's basketball program signed **Jason Braxton (Moreno Valley, Calif./Canyon Springs High School)** in the fall signing period. Braxton, a 6-3 guard who can play both the point and the wing, will join the Sun Devil roster in 2001-2002.

"Jason is a very versatile and smart player who can help us immediately next year," says Rob Evans. "This is a great signee for us. Our staff searched the country this past year and after watching Jason numerous times, we felt he was the best point guard prospect for our system. His toughness and leadership ability is tremendous. He pushes the ball in transition and is very smart. He committed to us early, so it was obvious that he wanted to be a Sun Devil. We only have two scholarships available because of the youth on the team so we had to be very selective. He is another piece of the puzzle that we now have in building this program into a great one. He joins freshmen and sophomores that were rated very highly in all the scouting services."

The Sporting News ranks Braxton as the 16th-best point guard prospect, calling him "probably the most athletic point guard in the class" and he was rated by ESPN.com as the 41st-best overall prospect in the nation and by The HoopScoop as the 44th best player. He averaged 15 points, nine assists and eight rebounds in his junior season. CNNSI.com also rates him as the 22nd-best point guard in the nation and Bob Gibbons has him as a top-100 player. Canyon Springs also is where current ASU linebacker Solomon Bates graduated from in 1999.

SPRING OF 2001 SIGNEES: The Arizona State men's basketball program has signed **Curtis Millage (Los Angeles, Calif./Los Angeles Southwest College)** and **Chris Osborne (Los Angeles, Calif./Compton College)** in the spring signing period. Both are expected to join the squad in the fall of 2001 and they each will have two years of eligibility.

"Both of these players are physical and tough players who we expect to help us immediately," says Rob Evans, who finished his third year at ASU in 2000-2001. "We really helped ourselves in the backcourt with the addition of Curtis and Chris will help our frontcourt with size. Also, they are junior college players who have some experience on the collegiate level. We have a nice nucleus returning, including three players who sat out this year, so we feel we are putting together a solid program with a lot of depth at various positions."

Millage is a high-scoring 6-2 southpaw guard who led Los Angeles Southwest College to the state championship and a 29-7 record. He averaged 23 points, 3.5 assists and 3.5 steals per game earning him the Southern California Community College Player of the Year. He averaged 18.3 points and shot 53 percent in the three-game playoffs as Los Angeles Southwest finished ninth in the state poll. In 1999-2000, Millage averaged 19.8 points, 4.3 steals and shot 51 percent from the field, including a 41-point effort in one contest.

"Curtis is very strong and powerful guard who was recruited by several schools at the major conference level. We like the fact he led his team to a championship and that he is strong enough to defend a number of positions. He has shown the ability to score and score quickly. The aspect of his game that can help us the most is that he can create his own shot. He is very energetic and competitive, and that can be very contagious, especially with younger players."

Osborne, at 6-9 and 240 pounds, is expected to be a physical presence underneath. An extremely intense player and a very hard worker, Osborne played in the Dada All-Star Classic at Pauley Pavilion in April of 1999 and was one of California's 34 players listed in *USA Today's* preseason state-by-state listing. A *Street & Smith's* honorable mention All-American, he is a strong, physical player who is a solid rebounder. He garnered 73 points in the *Orange County Register's* "Fabulous 15" rating system, putting him as a second-team selection and the 29th-best prospect on the west coast. He played one year at Mesa Community College and also played at Compton College this past season. He originally signed with ASU in the fall of 1998 signing period.

"Chris will give us depth in the frontcourt and can help Chad (Prewitt), Tommy (Smith) and Awvee (Storey) in rebounding and defending some of the better post players in the league. We did not have a lot of depth this year and as a result our frontcourt players were in foul trouble a lot. Chris will give us depth and size along with toughness. You need size underneath to combat some of the better front lines in the Pac-10 and Chris can help us right away in that regard."

DEVIL THREE-DOT DATA: ASU outrebounded Pac-10 foes by 5.4 boards per game and outrebounded 21 of its 29 opponents...**Alton Mason** made 17-of-19 (.890) free throws against Oregon on March 1, which was one make shy of the school record set by Eddie House last year when he made 18-of-19 en route to his 61 points at California on Jan. 8...ASU shot .613 (38-of-62) from the field against Washington on Feb. 10, the fourth-best mark by any Rob Evans-coached team in his 258 games as a head coach. The 61.3 percent was two games removed from the 61.9 percent effort at Oregon on Feb. 4, which is the second-best effort by any Evans squad...ASU is averaged 14.83 offensive rebounds this year, the best mark in the league. ASU led the Pac-10 last year at 15.78 per game...ASU had its flight cancelled from Seattle to Spokane in between the UW-WSU games and as a result arrived in Moscow at its hotel at 1:45 a.m. ASU took a 10 p.m. flight to Spokane and then took a two-hour bus trip to Pullman for its 3 p.m. game. The Sun Devil "layover" for its 35-minute flight was close to 10 hours...ASU is 25-8 (.758) in its past two seasons when it leads at the half compared to 10-9 in 1998-99, Rob Evans' first year in Tempe...the last ASU opponent to score 100 points in Tempe was third-ranked Arizona on Feb. 27, 1988 (101-73). The current streak of an ASU opponent not scoring 100 points in Tempe stands at 221 games...the 27-point defeat at Oregon on Feb. 4 (99-72) was the largest at McArthur Court since Arizona beat Oregon 92-60 in 1993...ASU is now 4-3 vs. Oregon at McArthur Court in the past seven years...ASU held Belmont to just 17 first-half points on Dec. 22, the fewest points in a half by an ASU opponent since Jan. 7, 1995, when it was leading Old Dominion 36-12 at intermission...ASU held Mercer to just 42 points in a 59-42 win on Dec. 20, the fewest points by an ASU opponent since it defeated Washington 53-41 on Jan. 30, 1991, a span of 314 games.

ROAD OPENERS: In its 23 Pac-10 seasons, ASU is 6-17 in its first Pac-10 road game. ASU has not won its first Pac-10 road game since it beat Washington State 95-86 on Jan. 16, 1992, a streak of nine straight defeats including this year's 70-68 overtime loss at Washington. ASU has won Pac-10 road openers in 1992-93, 1987-88, 1984-85, 1980-81, 1979-80 and 1978-79.
