Not many expected the turnaround that Dirk Koetter has orchestrated in just two seasons at the helm of the Arizona State Football Program.

In 2001, his first Sun Devil team turned in a 4-7 overall record and a ninth-place finish in the Pac-10, leading preseason prognosticators to pick the Sun Devils ninth in last year's pre-season conference polls.

But the 2002 season, which started earlier than ever and had the most games in school history, exceeded all outside expectations as the Sun Devils

turned in an 8-6 overall record, finished third in the Pac-10 with a 5-3 league mark and earned a Holiday Bowl berth against Big XII Conference powerhouse Kansas State, the No. 6 team in the country.

The Holiday Bowl? In only two years?

Well, so far in that time span, people can be sure of three things about Koetter. One, he doesn't care about predictions; two, he likes to put points on the board to the tune of an average of 33.0 points per game over the last two seasons; and three, he hates to lose and is often his own harshest critic.

Throughout his young tenure at Arizona State, Koetter has turned a deaf ear to naysayers and his team has done the same. Taking over at a tradition-rich program with high expectations is never an easy task, but the team has already recorded ASU's first winning season in five years, creating a buzz around Sun Devil Stadium that hasn't been heard in a while.

The 8-6 overall record accomplished by the Sun Devils in 2002 is hardly indicative of the amount of success they had. Of ASU's six losses last year, four came against teams that were ranked in the nation's top 10. Furthermore, the loss in the Holiday Bowl was against the highest rated team in the land not go to a BCS Bowl Game.

The 2002 Sun Devil squad showed poise and competitiveness that belied their youth, as evidenced by their ability to erase a 21-point deficit at then sixth-ranked Oregon – one of the toughest places to play in the nation – to pull out a 45-42 victory and catapult the Devils into the top 25 for the first time in three years. By the 10th game of the season, ASU had climbed as high as No. 16 in the country and various ASU, Pac-10 and NCAA records were succumbing to Sun Devil exploits. Arizona State had not been ranked as high as 16th since the 1997 Sun Bowl-winning team finished the season ranked 14th.

Under Koetter's guidance, ASU vaulted into the country's top 10 in passing with 303.9 yards per game and the country's top 20 in scoring with 32.3 points per contest. His high-powered offense allowed sophomore quarterback Andrew Walter to flourish, as Walter shattered just about every single-season passing record in school history, while wide receiver Shaun McDonald also set several all-time bests.

Koetter accomplished all of this with only one senior regularly starting on offense and four starting on defense. His vision for the program has already started to take shape, and 2003 marks what is only his third recruiting class in Tempe. Koetter's progress through only his sophomore season enabled him and his staff to sign what is generally considered the top two or three recruiting class in the Pac-10 and a top 20 class nationally.

All of this points to a third year where Koetter can expect even more scrutiny from the Maroon and Gold faithful as the spotlight begins to refocus ever more intently on Tempe. And with the squad back rubbing shoulders with the best in the land, more predictions

from the pundits are sure to come.

Yet, with the Sun Devils firmly on his path to success, Koetter doesn't need to listen to that and you can be sure that he probably won't. He hasn't masterminded more than a few turnarounds in his career by bowing to expectations; he simply exceeds them.

The 2000 football season was hardly normal at Arizona State University. So when Dirk Koetter was named the 21st head football coach in ASU history Dec. 2, some had to be shaking their heads. Or maybe they were nodding along, because in a season where abnormality was commonplace, Koetter seemed to fit the mold.

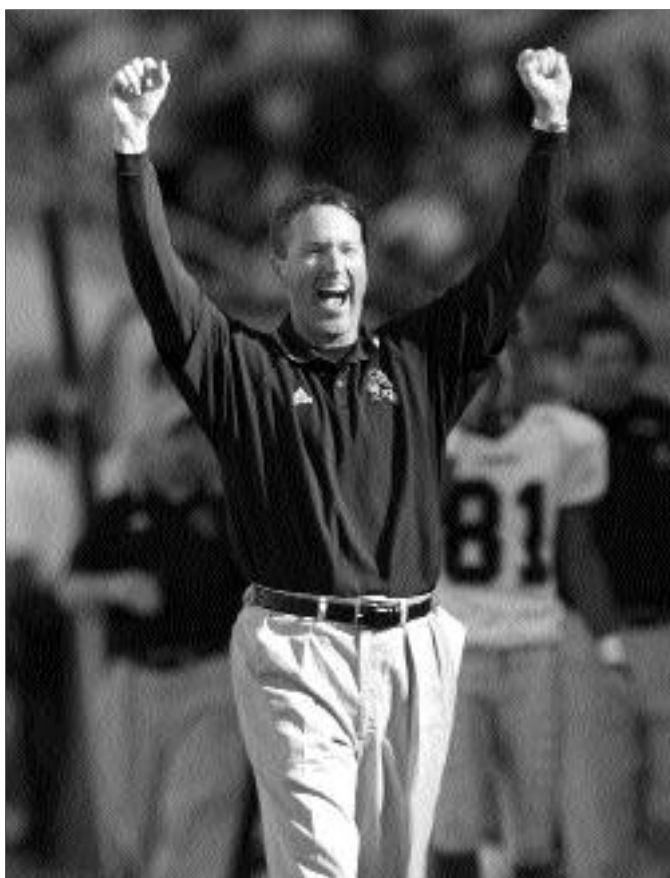
Who was this guy? The day after athletic director Gene Smith announced the heir to the Sun Devil throne, the media couldn't even agree on the pronunciation of the coach's surname (for the record, it's 'Cutter').

By the time the syllables fell into their proper order, the reports on Koetter seemed all the more confusing. How fitting it was that he'd take over in 2001, because if nothing else the season ahead seemed destined to be a space odyssey.

It was nice to learn that in just three seasons at Boise State University, Koetter was a two-time Big West Coach of the Year and two-time conference champion. It was great to find that before BSU, Koetter spent two years as the offensive coordinator at the University of Oregon, guiding the team to a school-record 32 touchdown passes in 1997. Yet the more one learned about Koetter, the more the mystery surrounding the man grew.

Who was this guy? He seemed so alien from ASU that he might as well have been from another planet.

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, coming off that three-year stint in Boise, Koetter was traveling from a land where the winters were



packed with cold and snow to a climate where f-words like frigid and freezing are absent from the lexicon.

Months away from his first home game on the lush green grass of Sun Devil Stadium, at Koetter's previous arena his army waged war on turf that was not only artificial, but blue as an ocean.

While the Sun Devils play to a major metropolitan area, Koetter was coming from a town with an environment more intimate than even the Boise population of 350,000 would suggest.

At ASU, Koetter was inheriting a program in which postseason invitations to Hawaii didn't always send the Sun Devil faithful rushing to call their travel agents, where Pasadena's Rose Bowl was always a dream destination. At Boise State, Koetter thrilled legions of fans by earning back-to-back bowl bids to the Humanitarian Bowl, berths that meant staying home in potato country for another game on the blue turf of Bronco Stadium.

Perhaps these were unimportant revelations regarding Koetter, but his identity seemed elusive and hard to grasp.

Some tales suggested Koetter was extremely hands-on, a coach who operated as his own offensive coordinator and called every play from the sidelines. But then there was evidence that he preferred the shadows, entrusting his assistants handle the pre-game speeches in all but two occasions: the first game of a season and the last.

While Koetter made it clear that his high-octane offense was reliant upon calculated vertical attacks, he was surprisingly flexible in formation, willing to try almost any scheme he felt put the 11 best athletes on the field.

Even off the field, it was hard to get a reading on ASU's new general. While at Boise State, some – including himself – had called him cocky and distant. Others – including himself – described him as confident and determined.

Who was this guy?

It was a question that everyone knew couldn't be answered at his opening press conference. Not completely. Not in the ways that count.

To those involved with ASU, Koetter's character will be determined by his years in the Valley of the Sun. How his Sun Devils get into the end zone will be as important as how they get into the community. How they compete inside the classroom will be as crucial as how they succeed inside the margins of the field.

It may take time for the ASU community to come to understand Koetter, but where he's come from became irrelevant with the 2001 season's first kickoff. From then on, it has only mattered where Koetter and ASU football are headed.

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December was just beginning. Yet with the Sun Devils' second consecutive Aloha Bowl appearance only weeks away, so much had already been decided. The opponent was Boston College. The regular season record was 6-5. And the result of ASU's postseason affair would have little to no impact on the season to follow.

ASU was looking for a new head football coach. It was a search that began in mid-November when athletic director Gene Smith announced that Bruce Snyder's nine-year reign in the Valley of the Sun would end in unison with the 2000 season.

It was a search that ended Dec 2, 2000, when Smith named Koetter ASU's 21st head football coach – 23 days before ASU would fall to Boston College in Hawaii, 26 days before Koetter's Boise State Broncos would defeat Texas-El Paso in the Humanitarian Bowl and one day after Koetter's verbal commitment to coach Oklahoma State was announced by nation-wide media.

The questions were obvious. How had this happened? How had Koetter shifted from OSU to ASU, seemingly in less than 24

hours?

The answer was automatic. With Smith to his right, his wife to his left and his four children – just being children – scattered about in front of the attentive media that packed the press box at Sun Devil Stadium, Koetter explained it all in eight monosyllabic words: "I am in the job of my dreams."

It's tough to pinpoint quite when those dreams began, but there are certainly road signs along the way.

Growing up the son of a high school football coach in Pocatello, Idaho, Koetter was born into the sport. He has been quoted as saying that he started coaching at age 6, a by-product of an environment where football was the daily topic at the dinner table.

At the age of eight, he was scribbling down offensive plays. By the time he was in college, helping Idaho State to a Division I-AA national championship, he was referred to as "the offensive coordinator on the field."

By 23, he had his first head coaching job, guiding his alma mater Highland High to an 8-3 season in Pocatello. When he was 24, Highland went 11-1 to win the 1984 Idaho state championship.

In 1985, he was coaching in the college ranks as San Francisco State's offensive coordinator. In 1986, he made the leap to the Division I ranks, landing a job as quarterbacks coach and passing-game coordinator at Texas-El Paso.

And it was then that a 26-year-old Koetter's dreams took on a whole new light, as he described in his first ASU press conference.

"It was 15 years ago I became a Division I coach for the first time at Texas-El Paso," Koetter explained. "Head coach Bob Stull told me, your recruiting area is Phoenix, Ariz. They put me on a plane. I landed at Sky Harbor after dark and had no idea where I was going.

"I stayed at the Fiesta Inn and my first stop the next morning was McClintock High School. Right after I left McClintock High School, I drove up the street a little bit and I saw Sun Devil Stadium and the Arizona State campus.

"And this is true, 15 years ago I said, someday I'm going to be the head coach at that school. So today is certainly my dream come true. In the end, make no mistake, this is where I want to be, because Arizona State has the ability to win a national championship."

To properly recognize the magnificence of Boise State football at Koetter's departure, one must understand the state of the program upon his arrival.

Two years removed from BSU's induction into the Division-I ranks, one year after a Bronco Stadium renovation produced 7,400 additional seats and earned the right to host the annual Humanitarian Bowl, the Broncos were coming off their fourth losing season in six years and their second in a row.

Enter Dirk Koetter as the seventh coach head coach in BSU history. Welcome, winning season.

Sure, it was only a 6-5 finish, but there was reason to be excited. In his first head coaching job at that level, Koetter had just



guided BSU to its first winning season in D-I.

You could see the improvement in the numbers. While the 2-10 team of 1996 averaged a mere 20 points per game, and the 5-6 team of 1997 improved to 25.9, Koetter's offensive wizardry made the Broncos a team that averaged nearly 30 points per game (settling for 29.9) and finished the season ranked 24th in the nation in total offense.

One game over .500 or not, the Broncos were one play away from winning the Big West Championship in a season that had already extended past its scheduled hours. At home against Idaho in the final game of the '98 season, Koetter endured pain that cannot be matched outside a rivalry game as the Vandals faked an extra point try and came up with a two-point conversion to claim the conference crown in overtime, 36-35.

As sour as that moment had been, as much as it may have defined that game or that season, it would serve as a point of motivation in the future. It was Koetter's Alamo, a tragic loss that ultimately led to wins in the future. Over the next two seasons, few teams that played BSU would be able to say that the game came down to one play.

The 1999 season that began at 1-2, including a loss to UCLA, saw the Broncos rally to win nine of their final 10 games and finish at 10-3. Clearly getting stronger with the season, BSU won its last six, not by one play, not by an extra point or a field goal, but by an average of 24.5 points per contest.

Included in that span was a 63-10 trouncing of Arkansas State, a 45-14 slaying of Idaho and a 34-31 Humanitarian Bowl victory over Louisville in front of the Boise faithful.

Twenty-eight years of D-II football had netted only six conference championships for BSU. All it took for one title at the D-I level was four years and two under Koetter. And yet Koetter's third season was without question BSU's finest.

After two winning seasons, including BSU's first D-I bowl appearance and victory, the Broncos' football program certainly bore the signature of their head coach, but for the first time in many years they were also shouldered with expectations.

If that was supposed to be a burden, the Broncos didn't appear to notice. Instead they took to the field in 2000 like a championship act, turning in spectacular performances week after week the way legendary bands deliver encores.

In the second week of the season, BSU defeated its opponent by 25 points. In the fourth week it was 27. In the seventh week 59. In the final two games of the regular season, the Broncos first sent Utah State home at 66-38 and then dismissed Idaho 66-24.

Once again Koetter was named Big West Coach of the Year. Once again, his Broncos were conference champions. Once again they were all staying home to party in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Meanwhile, like never before, the Broncos were invading the national football scene at the sport's highest amateur level.

At the end of the regular season, that was BSU ranked No.1 in scoring offense – not in the Big West, not on the West Coast, but in the nation. That was BSU at No. 2 in total offense and No. 4 in passing offense.

At the helm of Koetter's big-play attack, that was quarterback Bart Hendricks leading the nation in passing efficiency and touchdown passes. Producing 330.27 yards per game, that was Hendricks ranking fourth in total offense.

That was Hendricks, too, leading the Broncos in BSU's second straight Humanitarian Bowl win, toppling Texas El-Paso 38-23. As if demonstrating the versatility of Koetter's offense to ASU fans eagerly watching on ESPN-2, Hendricks threw two touchdown passes, ran for one and caught another.

Koetter's career record at BSU wrapped at 26-10, including wins in 20 of his last 25 games. To his incumbent staff, he not only left winning streaks of seven overall and 14 at home (including the two bowl wins) upon which to build. More importantly, he left proof that BSU could not only compete, it could excel.

Born February 5, 1959, in Pocatello, Idaho, Dirk Koetter's collegiate coaching career saw six stops before ASU.

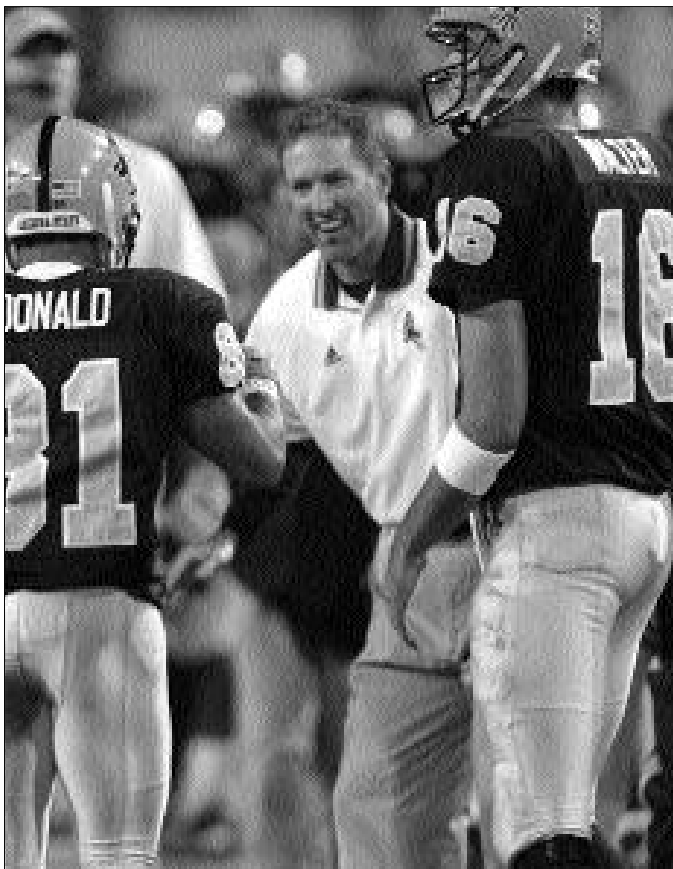
Koetter's first stop was at San Francisco State, where he spent 1985 as the offensive coordinator. At Texas-El Paso from 1986-1988, Koetter served his first of four straight stints as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, later moving on to Missouri (1989-1993), Boston College (1994-1995) and Oregon (1996-1997).

Boise State gave Koetter his first head coaching job (1998-2000), and Koetter returned the favor with three winning seasons, two conference titles, two Humanitarian Bowl victories and two Big West Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Koetter was named the 21st football coach in ASU history, December 2, 2000.

A 1981 graduate of Idaho State University with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Koetter was a four-year letterwinner. During his playing career at ISU, Koetter achieved Big Sky Conference and NCAA Region 7 all-academic honors. He earned a master's degree in athletic administration from Idaho State in 1982.

Dirk and his wife, Kim, are parents to two daughters, Kaylee (10) and Kendra (6), and two sons, Derek (9) and Davis (4).



For most college football coaches in their second year at the helm, an 8-6 season capped by an appearance in a major bowl game is considered a remarkable accomplishment.

But if you know anything about ASU's Dirk Koetter, you know he's not like most head coaches.

Koetter, who serves as his own offensive coordinator, likes to throw deep or run flea flickers when a situation calls for a conservative play. He runs double reverses to wide receivers, giving them rare touches behind the line of scrimmage.

So it comes as no surprise that a year after a trip to the Holiday Bowl, Koetter is envisioning much bigger things.

"A lot of people have said to me, 'Congratulations on a great season,' and my standing is that it was not a great season," Koetter said. "It was a successful season, successful in that we exceeded people's expectations. Now, a great season is playing in the Rose Bowl, or in last year's case, playing in the Fiesta Bowl. That's the next step."

The Sun Devils hope to take that next step this fall when they return the nucleus of a team that finished third in the Pac-10 after being tabbed to finish ninth in the preseason polls. They lost their share of stars in defensive end Terrell Suggs and wide receiver Shaun McDonald, both of whom left early for the NFL, but the Sun Devils return more than enough depth on both sides of the ball to head back to the promised land.

"Our players have high expectations," Koetter said. "It's one thing if you are talking about being competitive for a conference championship if you really don't think you can back it up. Our players believe we can back it up, and I believe it too. I believe we can be in the hunt."

Koetter sets countless goals for his team, many of which are achieved at various stages throughout the season. ASU's primary long-term goal for the upcoming season is to get to the Rose Bowl.

"We haven't arrived at the bus stop yet, but we have definitely turned the corner," Koetter said. "Make no mistake that our goal is the Rose Bowl."

In Koetter's offensive system, the quarterback is the spearhead of the operation. With more than a handful of competent signal-callers, Koetter can rest easily at night.

Coming off a sensational sophomore season in which he established himself as one of the premier quarterbacks in the Pac-10, junior Andrew Walter is in search of more big things. Walter not only enters the season as the hands-down starter, but he also carries a nice feather in his cap. Several media outlets have him among a group of candidates for the Heisman Trophy.

Walter, who has been selected by his teammates as a team co-captain with safety Riccardo Stewart for 2003, hopes to back up that honor by posting numbers similar to those he put up in 2002. Last year, Walter completed 56.7 percent of his passes for a school-record 3,877 yards. He threw 28 touchdowns, which ranked second on the ASU single-season charts and just one touchdown shy of the school record. He became the first Sun Devil quarterback in school history to reach the 3,000-yard plateau in a single season and almost hit the 4,000-yard mark.

"Andrew was a big reason we were able to be competitive in every game last year, and we will continue as long as he is able to play at that level," Koetter said. "Any time you have a quarterback like

Andrew Walter in the game, you have a chance to be pretty good."

After starting four games to open the 2002 season, sophomore Chad Christensen will compete for the No. 2 spot this spring/fall with redshirt freshman Kellen Bradley. Christensen completed 27 of 64 passes in eight games last season. He also threw three touchdowns.

Bradley was listed by *SuperPrep Magazine* as the state's 16th-best prospect after his senior year at Scottsdale's Saguaro High School. In his final season, he led the state with 3,085 yards passing and 38 touchdowns.

Christensen (knee) and Bradley (left shoulder) have both recovered from minor surgery in the off-season. Koetter says either quarterback could claim the backup role.

"This will be Kellen's first chance to compete and Chad's chance to reinvent himself in a different role than he was in at this time last spring," Koetter said.

Freshman Mike Affleck heads to Tempe rated as the 11th-best quarterback in the nation by *SuperPrep*. He threw 22 touchdowns and only nine interceptions during his senior season at Timpview High School in Provo, Utah.

Freshman Sam Keller has a build similar to that of Affleck, and his numbers at San Ramon Valley High School in Danville, Calif., were just as impressive. Keller threw for 3,282 yards in his senior campaign with 38 touchdowns and only five interceptions.

ASU's tailback situation includes senior Mike Williams and sophomore Cornell Canidate. The top spot belongs to Williams this fall after neither of the rushers solidified themselves as the primary back last season.

"Tailback might be the most competitive and deepest position on our team right now," Koetter said. "Cornell has worked very hard in the off-season, and I am sure he will give Mike a run for his money."

Despite missing some action late in the season due to a series of ankle injuries, Canidate still got the most touches last year. He carried the ball 130 times for 493 yards, scoring seven TDs in 11 games.

Williams also found the end zone seven times. He played in all 14 games, rushing for 482 yards. Williams was ASU's Player of the Game in the 2002 regular-season finale vs. Arizona with 162 yards and four touchdowns on 40 carries in the second 100-yard game of his career.

"Mike is the most complete running back we have. He is also a leader who is versatile and he knows our system very well," Koetter said. "One of the things the coaching staff has come to appreciate is Mike Williams' style of running. We as a staff need to incorporate that into how we are going to use him."

Senior Jermaine McKinney appeared in six games last season, rushing 13 times for 24 yards. Redshirt freshmen Randy Hill and Loren Wade are expected to make an immediate impact. Wade was ranked as the sixth-best running back in the West by PrepStar after his senior season at Serra High School in Gardena, Calif., and Hill, a local product from Tempe's McClintock High School, was tabbed at the No. 8 spot by the same publication.

"Both Randy and Loren did a great job on our scout team last year," Koetter said. "Randy Hill has a unique style of running, but he was very productive. Loren Wade came into camp last year in horrible condition and he had to play his way into shape, but he was really playing well at the end of the year. We like the future of both of those young men. They are hard workers and very coachable."

Although senior Mike Karney didn't touch the ball much last season in

Koetter's pass-filled offense, he is still considered by many as one of the nation's best fullbacks. He possesses both the size and speed to protect the quarterback in pass-rushing situations.

Karney appeared in all 14 games last year, carrying the ball eight times for 20 yards. He also had 13 catches for 121 yards.

"We would like to see Mike take more of an active role in coverage teams within the special teams units," Koetter said. "That is one of the things we have asked Mike to take more of a personal interest in, in addition to his other duties."

Sophomore Mike Talbot emerged as a viable backup to Karney, playing in 11 games last season. He had 11 yards on four carries.

"Mike will be in a backup role again this year, but he is a very capable one and he's also an excellent special teams player," Koetter said. "He is exactly what we are looking for at fullback. He is just playing a position right now where he has a really good guy in front of him."

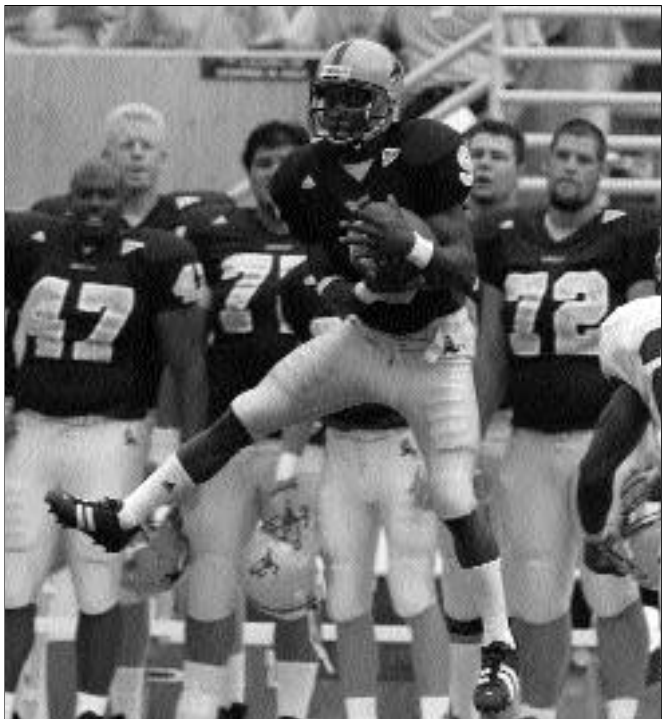
After spending all of last season on the scout team, sophomore Joseph Aboussie hopes to make more of an impact this year.

"Joseph Aboussie is a guy that continues to make progress," Koetter said. "It's slow progress at times, but he's a guy who is still only a sophomore. Joseph is a great weight lifter, and I would never count him out."

The Sun Devils return several explosive wide receivers, even with the departure of Shaun McDonald, a two-time All-Pac-10 performer who left early for the NFL. They return three of their top four wide-outs from a year ago in junior Daryl Lightfoot, sophomore Derek Hagan and senior Skyler Fulton.

Fulton looks to do more in his final year in Tempe after averaging 26.4 yards receiving per game (on 30 receptions) as a junior. He is capable of playing all of the different wide receiver spots and seems to be a favorite target of Walter's.

"Skyler has a certain chemistry with Andrew Walter that you can't buy and he is a quiet leader on our team," Koetter said.

Last season, Lightfoot caught 40 passes for 552 yards, an average of 13.8 yards per catch. He also scored two touchdowns, one of which came on an 85-yard reception in ASU's 55-38 home loss to California.

Hagan marked 32 receptions for 405 yards in his first year removed from Palmdale (Calif.) High School. He figures to carry an increased load this fall. His 32 catches broke the ASU freshman record of 30 set by College Football Hall of Famer John Jefferson in 1974.

Koetter is also high on Matt Miller, a sophomore from Mesa Mountain View High School who shined during winter practices in preparation for the Holiday Bowl. Last season, Miller made six catches, two of which went for 68 yards in ASU's dramatic win at Oregon.

"With the departure of Shaun McDonald, I don't think I have seen any player that has had the light come on and recognizes this as an opportunity to step up more so than Matt Miller," Koetter said.

Perhaps the most underrated player in the Sun Devil receiving corps is redshirt freshman Terry Richardson, last year's offensive scout team player of the year. Coming out of Centennial High School in Corona, Calif., Richardson earned All-America status from PrepStar and was rated as the third-best wide receiver in the West.

"This is his first time to do it where Terry is not working off cards but doing the real thing," Koetter said. "He is an explosive player and as good an athlete as you will find at that position."

Sophomore Moey Mutz and true freshman Rudy Burgess, a versatile player who saw time at both wide receiver and defensive back for four years at Desert High School in Edwards, Calif., will vie for playing time in 2003.

The Sun Devils have a big gap to fill at tight end due to the graduation of Mike Pinkard.

"Lee Burghgraef was our second tight end this past year and Frank Maddox was our second tight end two years ago," Koetter said. "They don't possess the vertical threat of a Mike Pinkard, but they're very solid players who are hard-working, blue-collared guys that have played a fair amount of football in the Pac-10. There is not a harder working guy on our team than Lee Burghgraef."

Burghgraef saw more playing time than Maddox last year, however, he didn't get involved offensively when stuck behind Pinkard. He caught one pass in 13 games in 2002.

Maddox appeared in 13 games last season, but was rarely used as a target and had only two catches for 37 yards.

ASU's most highly-touted incoming tight end is junior Aaron Austin, who signed with the team for the second consecutive year. After completing a productive sophomore season at Fresno (Calif.) Community College in which he scored nine touchdowns in 10 regu-

lar-season games, Austin enrolled in classes during the spring semester at ASU while participating in workouts with the Sun Devils.

"Aaron was the No. 1 junior college player in the nation at his position," Koetter said. "The key for him is learning and seeing how quickly he can assimilate himself into the system. He is a very talented player and we are just excited about the prospects."

Having bulked up since entering camp last fall, redshirt freshman Jamaal Lewis wants to have an impact this season. Lewis still isn't as big as some of ASU's other tight ends, but his contributions might be just as meaningful.

"Jamaal Lewis is one of the most improved players on our team," Koetter said. "He can really run and he is that vertical threat at tight end that we are looking for. This is his first real chance to shine."

Of all 21 signees, true freshman Brent Miller is, perhaps, the most versatile in the bunch. During his days at Phoenix's Desert Vista High School, Miller played linebacker, quarterback, fullback, tight end and wide receiver.

Heading into last season, the Sun Devils had to replace five seniors along the offensive line, four of whom were drafted in the NFL. This year, the Sun Devils won't have to worry about experienced depth being a problem.

ASU returns all five starters up front, including senior right guard Regis Crawford, senior left guard Tim Fa'aita, senior center Tony Aguilar, junior right guard Drew Hodgdon and sophomore left tackle Chaz White.

"We try to find our five best on the field," Koetter said. "You end up with about eight guys who are really going to play the bulk of the minutes. Within that eight, you have to have guys who can play various spots, and we have several of those guys."

A year after moving from center and guard to left tackle, Crawford will head back to his old spot at right guard this season. He is backed up by Hodgdon, who may also see time at center in place of Aguilar and Zach Krula, who is coming off of a redshirt season. Aguilar might also play guard.

Fa'aita remains at left guard, having solidified himself as one of ASU's most consistent forces on the offensive line during the second half of last season. Playing behind him is Adrian Ayala, who started five games at right tackle and is still recovering from a severe ankle injury suffered at Washington State and aggravated during spring workouts.

Koetter decided to move White from right tackle to left tackle, a position he hopes White will occupy for the next three years. White will compete with redshirt freshman Andrew Carnahan at left tackle.

Redshirt freshman Stephen Berg and sophomore Grayling Love will compete for the starting right tackle position. Berg doesn't have game experience, but Koetter calls him a "prototype of what you are looking for at that spot." Love filled in at right tackle last season, however, he came to ASU as a center and can play any spot on the line. Sophomore Chad Rosson will provide back-up at right tackle.

Four freshman offensive linemen signed with ASU in February, including Robert Gustavis, Julius Oriekwu, Mike Pollak and Brandon Rodd.

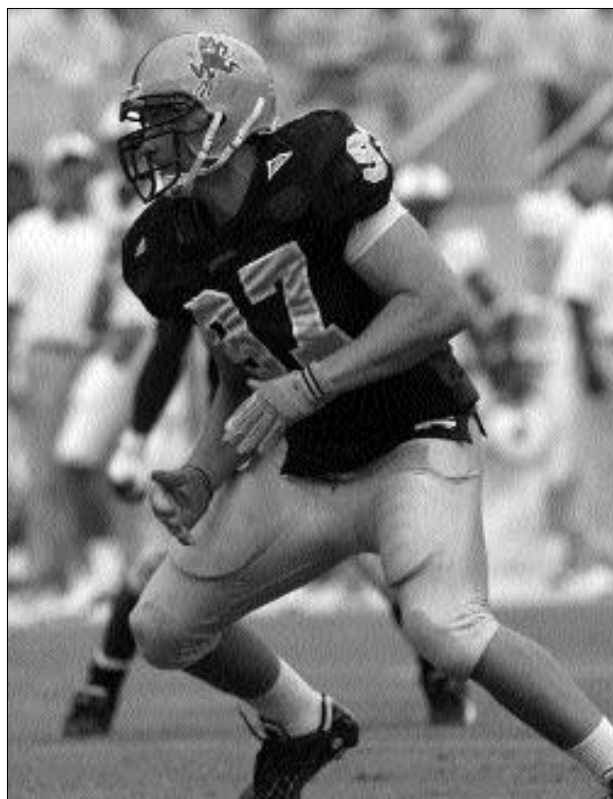

It's impossible for the Sun Devils to replace Suggs, a unanimous All-American and the most decorated player in school history, but they've got a number of players that will try to fill his shoes. Senior tackles Brian Montesanto and Shane Jones and junior end Jimmy Verdon anchor a defensive line that is a key component to ASU's success.

Last year, Verdon, an honorable-mention All-Pac-10 selection, acted as the understudy to Suggs, who recorded an NCAA-record 24 sacks in 14 games. Verdon will line up at either end and can also move inside to defensive tackle during obvious pass (Cobra) situations.

Sophomore defensive end Nick Johnson is penciled in opposite Verdon. He will be used as an every down player this season after playing extensively in the Cobra pass rush unit last year.

Junior Connor Banks, a converted linebacker who has speed off the edge, will be asked to contribute on the line this season. Although he has played primarily as a defensive end, he is also good on special teams.

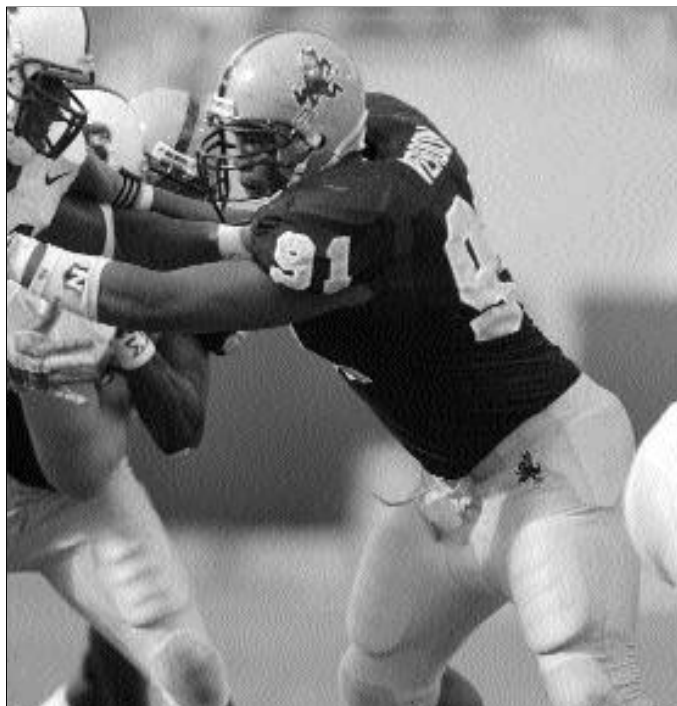
Montesanto, who has started 29 games over the last three years, made the successful switch from end to tackle and was one of the main reasons ASU improved its overall team speed a year ago.

"Brian Montesanto is one of the strongest, fastest and toughest players on our team," Koetter said.

After tallying 44 tackles in 14 games last year, Jones will be looked upon to help stop the run again this season.

Sophomore defensive tackle Josh Kirkwood could find himself somewhere on the depth chart, along with junior Gabe Reininger, a transfer from Moorpark (Calif.) College who resembles Jones. Senior Matt Mason figures to continue pushing for playing time at both the tackle and end positions.

Also providing depth along the defensive line is redshirt freshman

Rickey Parker, who can play either end or tackle. He excelled on the scout team last season. At 309 pounds, redshirt freshman Ali Likio has few problems stopping the run. Junior Jared Wolfgramm, who appeared in six games last year, could be used as a replacement at defensive end.

True freshman Kyle Caldwell comes to ASU after a star-studded senior season at Saguaro High School in Scottsdale in which he recorded 131 tackles, 34 tackles for loss, 30 sacks, 29 quarterback hurries, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

"Kyle has a chance to contribute at defensive end as a true freshman," Koetter said.

True freshman Brett Palmer will also compete as a defensive tackle. Another local product from Marcos de Niza High School in Tempe, he led his team in sacks and tackles for loss during his junior and senior seasons.

With the departure of three talented seniors, sophomore Jamar Williams will undoubtedly assume the leadership role among the linebacking corps. Williams made great strides last season not only on defense but also on special teams.

Sophomore Barton Hammit will be a key component in ASU's 4-2-5 defense, which looked much better last year as players became

familiar with it and developed a trust in it. Hammit, who played in seven games as a true freshman in 2001, returned from knee surgery last fall and looked impressive in winter conditioning.

After earning Most Valuable Player honors on ASU's defensive scout team last season, redshirt freshman Jordan Hill hopes to make his impact felt this year. Hill hails from Highland High School in Pocatello, Idaho, the same school Koetter attended.

Junior Justin Burks has taken a liking to life on the Tempe campus in his first year removed from Cerritos Community College in Norwalk, Calif. Koetter calls him "one of the best junior college linebackers in the country."

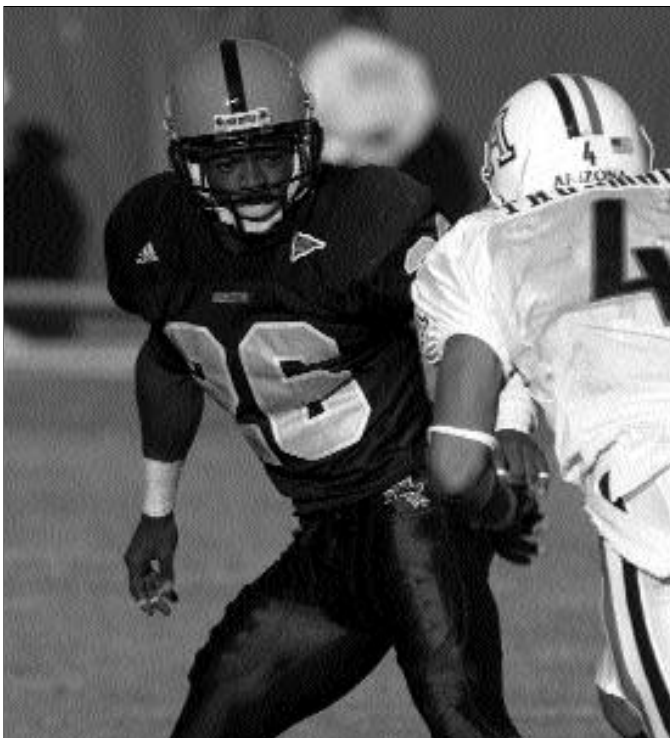
Freshman De'Andre Johnson could redshirt this season, providing opportunities for others to make some noise. 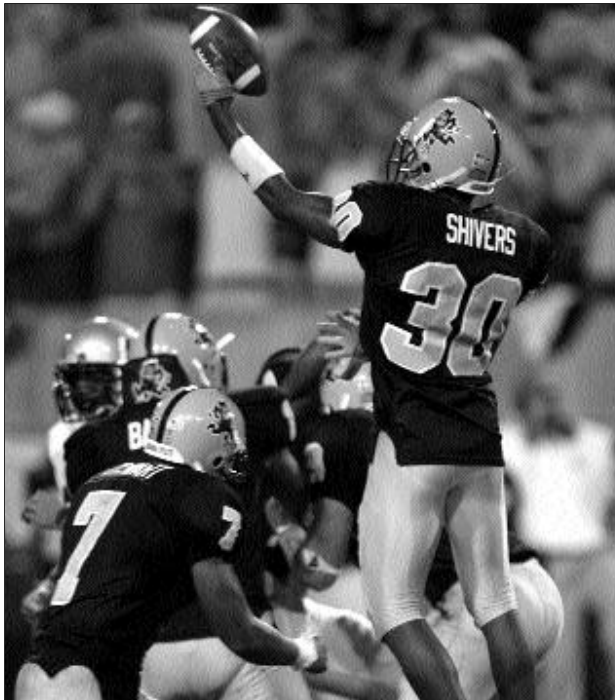

fastest players on the team, while junior Chris McKenzie has run the 40-yard dash in 4.3 seconds in junior college.

Junior Emmanuel Franklin and sophomores Josh Golden and Mike Davis Jr. will line up on the other side of Oliver. Franklin hopes to return to the team this fall after recovering from brain surgery, while Davis is a taller, physical corner who is vying for more playing time. Golden is looking to build upon a productive freshman campaign in which he had 33 tackles in 14 games. Golden will also return kickoffs.

ASU added depth to the cornerback position with the signing of McKenzie, a transfer from Glendale (Calif.) Community College who was rated as a first-team All-American by JNCAA last year. Freshman Chad Green, who collected 30 tackles and five interceptions as a senior at Birmingham High School in Van Nuys, Calif., also caught 48 passes for 1,141 yards and 17 touchdowns in 14 games as a wide receiver.

Despite the loss of Alfred Williams to graduation, the Sun Devils are well-stocked at safety with more than enough depth to last through the 12-game season. Juniors Jason Shivers and Riccardo Stewart, both

honorable-mention All-Pac-10 selections a year ago, combined for 204 tackles last year despite Stewart missing four games with a shoulder injury. Stewart will also serve as a team co-captain in 2003 along with quarterback Andrew Walter.

"Jason and Riccardo are two of the best safeties in the Pac-10," Koetter said. "They can run and hit with anybody."

Originally recruited as a safety out of Grossmont Junior College in El Cajon, Calif., senior Brett Hudson played cornerback last season after injuries depleted ASU's secondary. He will compete for one of the starting strong safety positions this fall after a successful junior campaign in which he made 52 tackles in 12 games and had the game-saving interception in ASU's upset at then sixth-ranked Oregon.

"Brett had a great off-season in which he ran 4.45 for the pro scouts," Koetter said. "We expect big things from him no matter what position he plays."

ASU also has plenty of depth in sophomores Joey Smith and Matt Fawley. Smith played well at the end of last season, while Fawley appeared in eight games as a true freshman, earning four starts before going down with a broken arm.

Koetter likes the versatility of sophomore Lamar Baker, who added muscle in the off-season to help ease his switch from cornerback to safety. Baker played in only two games last year before being sidelined with a season-ending injury and receiving a medical redshirt.

J.W. Lucas redshirted last season. He played quarterback at Cactus High School in Phoenix, but he worked out as a safety on the scout team last fall.

Daniel Varvel is one of ASU's three true freshman safeties. He comes to Tempe from Bakersfield (Calif.) High School with a reputation for being able to deliver big hits.

"When I saw Daniel Varvel's tape, he was sitting back there seven yards deep at tailback," Koetter said. "They were running between the tackles, and he was hitting it in there, really running hard with no fear. Then I meet him and I see his frame and his demeanor. This is the type of guy you have to project."

True freshmen Josh Barrett and Darnel Henderson aren't as highly billed as Varvel but have the potential to be just as good. Last season, Barrett made five interceptions as Reno (Nev.) High School amassed an unblemished 11-0 record before being defeated in the Northern 4A championship game. As a senior at McClymonds High School in Oakland, Henderson also collected five interceptions, two of which he returned for touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Don't think of the word "special" as meaning unimportant. Koetter regards his special teams units as being just as valuable as his offense and his defense. Without the special teams units, the offense wouldn't have good field position to start its drives and the defense would nearly always be on its heels. The next time you think of ASU's special teams, remember that Assistant Head Coach Tom Osborne mentors the units.

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Senior Tim Parker established himself as the Pac-10's most consistent punter last year, leading the conference with an average of 42.7 yards per punt. A second-team All-Pac-10 honoree last year, he stuck 27 balls inside the 20-yard line and had only 10 touchbacks in 79 punts.

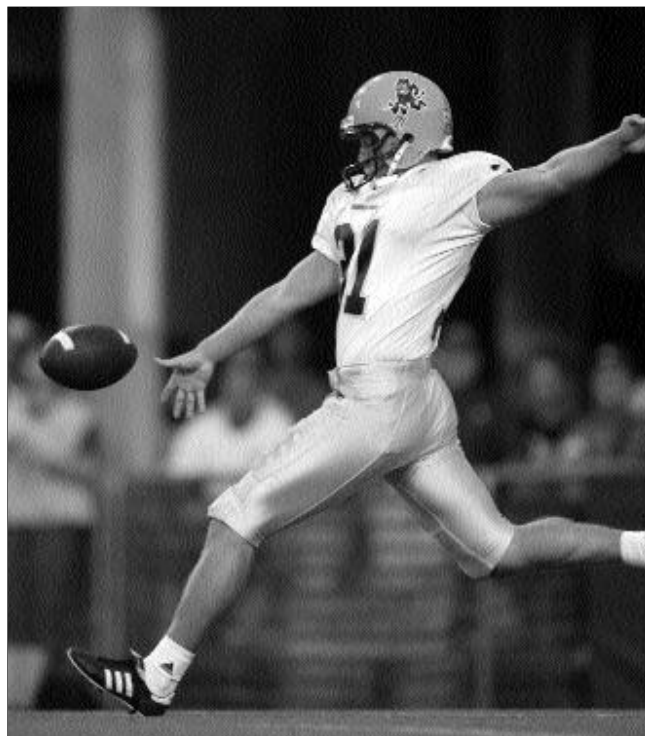

THE SCHEDULE

There are 12 games jammed into 13 weekends from early September through late November. ASU's only bye of the season is the traditional one before the game against rival Arizona. That means the Sun Devils won't get a single week off and will play on 12 consecutive Saturdays.

ASU will host Northern Arizona (Sept. 6) and Utah State (Sept. 13) at Sun Devil Stadium to begin its 2003 campaign. After winning four of their first five games out of the gates in 2002, the Division I-AA Lumberjacks dropped four of their final six to finish the season 6-5 overall. Utah State turned in a 4-7 mark last year.

The Sun Devils are scheduled to play their first road game Sept.

20 at Iowa, a Hawkeye team that fell to USC last season in the Orange Bowl. The Hawkeyes finished tied for first place in the Big 10 with national champion Ohio State.

ASU will open its Pac-10 season Sept. 27 at Oregon State before returning home to face USC (Oct. 4) and Oregon (Oct. 11). Dating back to 1994, the Sun Devils have won seven in a row against the Beavers, but they have lost four of their last five to both the Trojans and the Ducks.

ASU will wrap up the non-conference portion of its schedule Oct. 18 at North Carolina, looking to avenge a loss at Sun Devil Stadium last year.

The Sun Devils are slated to make their lone trip to Los Angeles on Oct. 25 when they play UCLA. ASU hasn't won at the Rose Bowl since 1996 when Jake Plummer guided a frenzied second-half comeback to preserve his team's perfect season.

On Nov. 1, the Sun Devils will return home to face California on Homecoming Weekend. They'll then hit the road again the following weeks for games at Stanford (Nov. 8) and Washington State (Nov. 15).

The annual rivalry game against Arizona is scheduled for Nov. 28 at Sun Devil Stadium. ASU has gotten the best of the series in recent years, winning three of the last four games between the intrastate schools.

ASU's Pac-10 "miss" in 2003 is Washington.

"I think we have a very favorable schedule," Koetter said. "I like the way our schedule lays out for us, but there are no weeks off in the Pac-10."

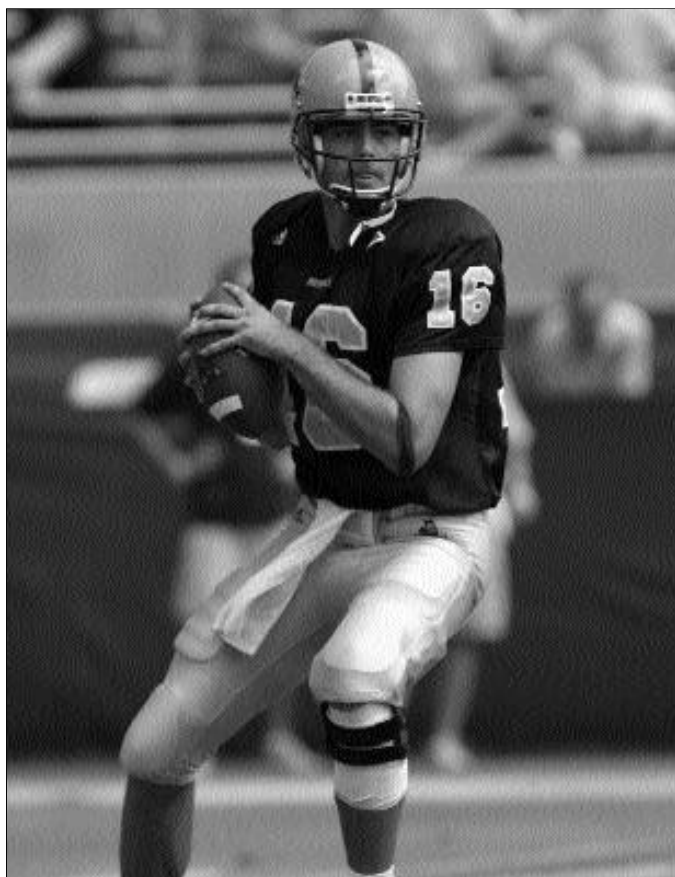

After being picked to finish ninth in the Pac-10, the 2002 Sun Devils exceeded all outside expectations, turning in an 8-6 record, finishing third in the league and earning a berth in the 2002 Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. After opening the longest season in school history, which began with the earliest game in ASU annals on Aug. 24 at then sixth-ranked Nebraska, ASU tallied the most wins since the 9-3 1997 Sun Bowl campaign and the best conference finish since that 1997 squad ended up third with a 6-2 league record.

Highlights of the season, Dirk Koetter's second at the helm in Tempe, included a record-setting 65-24 victory over Stanford, a 45-42 upset of then sixth-ranked Oregon in Eugene and a 34-20 victory over Arizona in Tucson in the battle for the Territorial Championship Cup. In the Holiday Bowl, which marked ASU's fifth bowl appearance in seven years and first under Koetter, the Sun Devils were edged by sixth-ranked Kansas State 34-27.

Senior Farewell

The 2002 Arizona State squad featured 19 seniors who played in their final season including linebacker Josh Amobi, placekicker Mike Barth, linebacker Solomon Bates, defensive tackle James Beal, punter Brian Biang, long snapper Jay Breckenridge, tight end Matt Cooper, cornerback O.J. Hackett, defensive tackles Dustin Hollins, Phil Howard and Khoa Nguyen, kicker Greg Pieratt, tight end Mike Pinkard, wide receiver Justin Taplin, cornerback Adrian Thomas, fullback Darrel Turner, linebacker Mason Unck and safeties Alfred Williams and Patrick Wilson.

All-Conference Selections

Ten Sun Devils earned All-Pac-10 Conference honors last season including first-teamers Shaun McDonald and Terrell Suggs. Suggs also became the third Sun Devil in school history to be named Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year. Eight Sun Devils earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors, including Mike Williams who was named to the all-academic first team for the second straight year, one of 10 student-athletes from around the conference to earn first-team honors for a multiple time.

Walter's World

In 2002, sophomore quarterback Andrew Walter turned in one of the finest seasons in school history, setting most school records for passing yards and total offense. Walter shattered the school record for passing yards in a single season, throwing for 3,877 yards to become the first passer in school history to top 3,000 yards and surpassing the previous school record of 2,878 by Danny White in 1973. Despite not earning his first start until the fifth game of the year, Walter, who finished third in the Pac-10 and 19th in the nation in passing efficiency at 137.10, turned in the third-best single-season performance in Pac-10 history and became the first quarterback in Pac-10 history to turn in four 400-yard passing games in a season. No Pac-10 quarterback had ever

thrown for more than three in a season and Washington's Cody Pickett and Walter are the only two to ever have four in a career. Walter completed 274 of 483 pass attempts, breaking ASU's single-season marks for attempts and completions – records previously held by Jake Plummer with 348 attempts in 1996 and Todd Hons with 199 completions in 1983 – while Walter's 28 touchdown passes marked the second-best effort in school history behind Mike Pagel who threw 29 TD passes in 1981.

With a 536-yard passing performance to upend No. 6 Oregon on Oct. 19, Walter set Pac-10 and Arizona State school records for single-game passing yards, surpassing the previous mark of 534 yards by fellow Sun Devil Paul Justin vs. Washington State in 1989. He was named the Oct. 20 *Sporting News*, *cnn.com* and *USAToday.com* National Player of the Week in addition to earning his first career Pac-10 Player-of-the-Week honor.

Walter also shattered the majority of ASU's total offense records, setting the marks for total yards (3,661 yards) and yards per game (261.5 ypg). He also tied Danny White (1973) with four games with at least 300 yards of total offense and turned in the third-best season in Pac-10 history. He finished third in the league and 18th in the nation in total offense.

Sacking the Quarterback

Arizona State's defense finished second in the Pac-10 in sacks last year with 51.0 for a loss of 386 yards. The team had just 28 sacks all of the 2001 season, while ASU also tallied 123 tackles for loss (574 yards) last year, including a season-high 17.0 for a loss of 89 yards Oct. 26 vs. Washington, compared to 82 for a loss of 304 yards in 2001. ASU's sack attack was led by junior Terrell Suggs, who led the nation and set the NCAA single-season record with 24.0 sacks for a loss of 171 yards. Suggs also finished his ASU career by setting ASU's career marks in both categories.

Suggs Most Decorated Player in ASU History

Junior defensive end Terrell Suggs, who decided to leave early for the NFL Draft, ended his ASU career as the most decorated player in school history. Suggs became the first Sun Devil to win a major national award, capturing three of the most prestigious awards in college football including the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which is given annually to the top defensive player in the country, the Rotary Lombardi Award, which is presented to the top lineman in the country (down linemen and defenders within five yards of the ball), and the inaugural Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award, which is given to the best defensive end in college football. Suggs was also one of three finalists for the Chuck Bednarik Defensive Player of the Year Award, which was won by Maryland linebacker E.J. Henderson.

Suggs also became the third player in school history to be named Pac-10 Conference Defensive Player of the Year and the

fifth Sun Devil to win the Pac-10's Morris Trophy, an honor bestowed upon the top defensive and offensive lineman in the conference, with the members of the opposing lines voting for the winner. It marked the second consecutive year that a Sun Devil won the Morris Trophy with offensive tackle Levi Jones being selected by the league's defensive linemen in 2001.

Suggs swept the All-America awards to become just the second unanimous All-American in school history and the first since Al Harris in 1978. Suggs also became the 12th Sun Devil to earn consensus All-America honors and the first since Juan Roque in 1996. He garnered All-America honors from the Football Writers' Association of America, the Associated Press, CBSSportsline.com and the *Sporting News*.

McDonald A Finalist for Biletnikoff Award

Junior wide receiver Shaun McDonald was one of three finalists for the 2002 Biletnikoff Award, which was won by Michigan State's Charles Rogers last season. McDonald, who earned third-team All-America honors from the *Sporting News* and left ASU early for the NFL Draft, became the first wide receiver in school history to be named a finalist for the prestigious award, annually presented to the top wide receiver in the country by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club.

Good Start

Arizona State opened the 2002 season with a 4-0 start in Pac-10 play, marking just the third time in school history that ASU has achieved that feat since joining the league in 1978. ASU's first 4-0 Pac-10 start came in 1982 (5-0 before losing to Washington 17-13 on Nov. 13). ASU played in the Fiesta Bowl that year. The other 4-0 start came in 1996 when ASU went undefeated in Pac-10 competition (8-0) and earned an appearance in the Rose Bowl. ASU finished 11-1 that season. The Sun Devils turned in a 5-3 league record last year and finished third in the Pac-10 standings, their best finish since 1997. Four of ASU's five Pac-10 wins last year came against each of the four previous conference champions. Stanford won the 1999 Pac-10 title, Oregon State, Oregon and Washington all tied for first in 2000 and Oregon won sole possession of the Pac-10 championship in 2001.

Interception Connection

Thirteen Sun Devils combined for ASU's Pac-10 leading 22 interceptions last year led by sophomore R.J. Oliver and junior Brett Hudson who each picked off four passes to finish tied for sixth in the Pac-10. Oliver also ended up leading the Pac-10 with a total of 22 passes defended. Their four interceptions mark the most for a Sun Devil since Nijrell Eason had five in 2000, while the team's 22 picks were the most for an ASU squad since the 1991 Sun Devils had nine players pick off 23 passes. The Sun Devils snagged four interceptions in the team's Sept. 28 win over Stanford, the most in a single game since ASU had five in a 1998 win over California.

Youth Movement

Arizona State's 2002 squad was a young one, featuring 27 players who saw the first action of their ASU careers (eight true freshmen, 12 redshirt freshmen and seven juniors). ASU's depth chart featured a total of 24 underclassmen (freshmen, redshirt freshmen and sophomores), including nine starters. A total of eight true freshmen saw action last year for the Sun Devils, which matched the most true freshmen to play in a season since 1994.

True freshman Chaz White started at right tackle Sept. 14 at San Diego State, becoming the first Sun Devil to start on the offensive line as a true freshman since Toby Mills started the last five games of the 1990 season at center. White is also just the fourth true freshman in school history to start on the offensive line with center Dan Mackie (the last 10 games of the 1979 season) and right guard Rick Torbert in 1974 being the other two.
