
"I can't tell you how many times he's been on campus and he'll just go up to a group of kids and start talking to them," says Corinne Corte, who is technically Keegan's academic advisor, but as you'll soon learn, is so much more than that. "He's been asked to go on site at different schools and talk to kids, because he just connects with them. It can be one kid, or a group of 80, and he will hold their attention and have a lasting impact. I get e-mails from school administrators months after he has been there saying that the kids are still talking about Keegan, and they still remember everything he said. He's just terrific with kids."

By now, we all know kids are smarter than you'd think, observant beyond their years. We've learned that you can't hide from a child's eyes, because they're bloodhounds for insincerity. And more than anything, we know that kids always tell the truth. And the most truthful thing they've done on this day is effortlessly gravitate to Keegan. Like just about everyone else who is naturally drawn to Keegan — the big kid who Corinne says "always has a smile and a hug for you" – they can sense his sincerity.

"I love to be around kids. They make you feel more important than you thought you could be," Keegan told *POST*. "The more kids you're surrounded by, the more love you have. I think that's why I love to be around kids so much, because they bring all that out in you."

Corinne can't even say Keegan's name without breaking into the kind of glowing smile that can only come from within. When her cell phone rings and she sees that it's him, she smiles even wider and says to herself, "Oh, here he is now." The two have developed a relationship that resembles nothing of the typical student/advisor dynamic. Minus the blood, they're family.

my freshman year," Keegan says. "We are very, very close. She knows my family, and I know hers. I try to treat her with as much respect that I can, and if she needs anything from me, she knows that I am there for her. And she is always there for me."

Never more than last year, when Keegan's father, Freeman, his sister, Denisha, and his aunt and a close friend all passed away within the span of a few months. Obviously, words

are powerless to describe what the young man was going through, and continues to cope with. And as Keegan reflects, it was a familiar face standing by his side during a period when he easily could have spiraled downhill.

"Corinne helped me a whole lot going through that time," he says. "She went through the same thing, her mom and her dad died and she was all alone. I was going through a hard time and wasn't focusing on school and all that kind of stuff. She just told me to stay strong. I really appreciate Corinne and my mom because they got me through that."

And so here he is, on the brink of a senior season that stands to be quite memorable. Despite losing five players to the NFL, ASU returns a roster that expects to once again be in contention for the Pac-10 championship, and if things go well, maybe even the national championship. And whatever heights the Sun Devils reach in '08, Keegan — who sits 10<sup>th</sup> on ASU's all-time career rushing yards list — will undoubtedly play a vital role.

Although his senior campaign remain unwritten, with credentials like that and speed that is considered world-class, the NFL is certainly within Keegan's scope. Within the halls of the Carson Student-Athlete Center, Keegan takes in a daily dose of inspiration when he passes by a wall decorated with plaques of former ASU players and their current NFL helmets. It's a dream that still sits just beyond the reach of his fingertips, but one that he's inching closer to by the day. And not a soul who knows anything about Keegan isn't rooting for that to happen.

For right now, however, Keegan continues to soak in the once-in-a-lifetime experience of being a big-time college football player — the crowds, the nationally televised games, the spotlight. But as you might guess about a grounded kid like Keegan, his perspective runs much deeper than what fans see on the surface, and allows him to appreciate the fact that when this is all said and done, he'll recall the relationships and camaraderie with as much fondness as the touchdowns.

And if the NFL doesn't come to fruition and this turns out to be Keegan's final season in uniform, there's no need to worry. And he says that he would teach them that if they work hard, in school as well as everything else, that they can do anything they want.

"I'm always telling Keegan that he's so much more than a football player," says Corinne. "Keegan is a special, special human being. He really is."
