ASU NOTES: The Sun Devils won national championships in 1990 and 1996. ASU is led by 17th-year coach Randy Lein, the 1996 National Coach of the Year and a seven-time winner of Pac-10 Coach of the Year (five times at ASU and twice at USC)... ASU averaged a 4.1 finish at the NCAA Championships in the 1990s, best in the nation. Only Oklahoma State (4.5) averaged higher than an eighth-place finish in the 1990s.

LEAGUE IS GOOD: There are seven Pac-10 teams in the 30-team field, the most of any conference. ASU is the top-seeded Pac-10 team, as it is seeded fourth and will play with fifth-seeded UCLA and sixth-seeded Georgia out of the SEC. The other Pac-10 seeds are No. 7 Washington (Pac-10 champion), No. 13 Stanford, Nov. 15 USC, No. 18 Oregon and No. 21 Arizona.

HOLY TOLEDO: The Arizona State University men's golf team (#14 Golfweek/#23 Golfstat/#14 Golf Coaches) competes in the NCAA Championships held May 26-30 at the Inverness Club (par-71, 7,255 yards) and hosted by the University of Toledo. It will be the second time the Rockets have served as the tournament host with the previous occurrence coming 65 years ago in 1944. The Inverness Club was founded in 1903 and has hosted four U.S. Opens, one U.S. Amateur, one U.S. Senior Open and two PGA Championships. The Rockets' men's golf program has also hosted the Inverness Intercollegiate there since 2000.

SUN DEVILS LOOKING FOR THREE: The Sun Devils have won two NCAA titles, in 1990 under coach and 2002 ASU Hall of Fame inductee Steve Loy, and in 1996 under current head coach and 2009 National Golf Coaches Hall of Fame inductee Randy Lein.

THE NEW FORMAT: The 2009 NCAA Championships will feature a new twist with the team champion determined via match play, the first time the winner hasn't been awarded by total strokes since 1965. The top eight teams after 54 holes of stroke play will advance to match play with the quarterfinals and semifinals being held on Friday, May 29 and the championship match set for Saturday, May 30. During the match-play portion, each match will be worth one point with all five players participating. The first team to win three points within the team match will win the match.

SUN DEVILS PROGRAM CHATTER: In the past 16 seasons (since Lein took over the ASU duties) 11 different team champions have been crowned and Lein is the only coach to have two individual champions in that time (freshman Alejandro Canizares in 2003 and Todd Demsey in 1993). ASU also has finished in the top six eight times in those 16 years and has qualified for the NCAA Championships in 25 of the past 26 seasons, missing only in 2002, including each of the past seven seasons, tied for the fourth-best mark in the nation in that time.

THE HEAD COACH: Randy Lein, who was inducted into the NGCA Hall of Fame this January, notched the top team accolade in collegiate golf in 1995-96 - the NCAA title - to his collection as the Sun Devils won the title in Chattanooga, Tenn., with a three-stroke victory over UNLV at the Honors Course. In his 17th season as ASU's coach, Lein has guided ASU to 43 tournament victories (including a school record six in 1995-96), eight Pac-10 titles, five NCAA West Regional wins and eight top-10 finishes at the NCAAs including the 1996 title. In addition, Lein has tutored NCAA medalists Todd Demsey (1994) and Alejandro Canizares (2003) and 15 All-Americans (35 occasions): Todd Demsey (3), Chris Hanell (3), Paul Casey (3), Cade Stone, Chris Stutts, Joey Snyder (2), Scott Johnson (2), Darren Angel (2), Jeff Quinney (3), Matt Jones (2), Chez Reavie (3), Alejandro Canizares (4), Niklas Lemke (3), Benjamin Alvarado Holley (2) and Jesper Kennegard (1). He has won Pac-10 Coach-of-the-Year five times (1993, 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000) while at ASU and twice at USC (1980 and 1986). Lein (pronounced "Line") is a 1975 graduate of Cal State Northridge.

IT ISN'T EASY: ASU has made the NCAA Championship in the past seven seasons and in 16 of 17 seasons under Randy Lein, but it sure isn't getting easier with the 30-team, three-round regional format. Using Golfweek's rankings through the regionals, nine top 30 teams are not going to Toledo, a list that includes seventh-ranked Clemson, No. 18 LSU, No. 21 Indiana, No. 23 UNLV, No. 24 NC State, No. 25 San Diego State, No. 28 Ole Miss, No. 29 Colorado State and No. 30 Florida State.

IT ISN'T EASY, PART TWO: Of the 30 teams that made the NCAA Championships this season, only 15 played in the 2008 championship: UCLA, Stanford, USC, Oklahoma State, Washington, Georgia, Florida, Texas A&M, Alabama, Arizona State, Illinois, Texas, Wake Forest and Oregon.

ASU IN THE REGIONALS: With the May 14-16 victories by both the team and Jesper Kennegard at the West Regional, ASU has won or tied for the title in a NCAA Regional six times. ASU tied with Arizona in 1991 and tied with New Mexico in 1998. It won the title outright in 1995, 1999, 2001 and now 2009. Sun Devil Paul Casey won the 1998 individual title outright followed by Jeff Quinney (1999), Benjamin Alvarado Holley (2007) and then Jesper Kennegard this season. Matt Jones shared medalist honors in 2001.

**ASU'S BEST FRESHMEN:** ASU's freshman Chan Kim has a chance to finish in the top five for best scoring average by an ASU freshmen. His 72.23 stroke average is just .58 off Alejandro Canizares' 2002-03 mark of 71.65 when he won the NCAA title.

IMPRESSIVE: Randy Lein has recruited a European Amateur champion (Stephan Gross in 2008), a NCAA champion (Alejandro Canizares in 2003), a U.S. Amateur champion (Jeff Quinney in 2000), a U.S. Public Links champion (Chez Reavie in 2001), an Arizona Amateur champion (Jesse Mueller, 2001) and an English Amateur champion (Paul Casey, 1998 and 1999) to ASU.

START IT OVER: Back in 2002, Randy Lein saw ASU's 18-year NCAA championship consecutive streak snapped in a season that had injuries and bad luck. ASU is back in the saddle with seven straight, and to show you how competitive the NCAA men's golf champioships is, that streak already is tied for the sixth-best active streak, as Arizona (1987-2007) had a 21-year streak snapped in 2008 after failing to post a .500 record and not make regionals, while Georgia Tech did not qualify out of regional action in 2008 after making the NCAAs for 10 straight years (1998-2007). Only six teams have made the NCAAs in each of the past five seasons.

NCAA CHAMPS FROM ASU/PAC-10: ASU has had four NCAA medalists on six occasions: Jim Carter (1983), Phil Mickelson (1989, 1990, 1992), Todd Demsey (1993) and Alejandro Canizares (2003). Other Pac-10 winners include: Frank Tatum Jr. of Stanford (1942), Scott Simpson of USC (1976 and 1977), Ron Commans of USC (1981), Tiger Woods of Stanford (1996), James Lepp of Washington (2005), Jamie Lovemark of USC (2007) and Kevin Chappell of UCLA (2008).

**TOP 10:** Lein's nine top-10 NCAA finishes in his 16 years is second only to Clemson and Oklahoma State for the most in that span. In that time, there have been 11 different NCAA team champions, while ASU and Oklahoma State are the only schools to have two NCAA medalists in his 16 years. ASU has finished in the top six eight times under Randy Lein.
