STANFORD TO HOST THE 2011 PAC-10 CONFERENCE MEN'S GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

WHO: Men's golf teams from all 10 institutions will compete for bragging rights at the 2011 Pac-10 Men's Golf Championship.

GOLFERS TO WATCH

The UCLA Bruins, ranked No. 3 by Golfweek/Sagarin, enter the Pac-10 Championship as the hottest team as they are coming off a victory at the Western Intercollegiate. Sophomore **Pontus Widegren**, currently ranked No. 23 by Golfweek/Sagarin, was the team's top performer, finishing fifth with an even par 210. However, it's been the play of freshman **Patrick Cantlay** that's kept the Bruins near the top of the nationally rankings this season. Cantlay was named the Pac-10 Golfer of the Month for February and currently is ranked No. 3 among college individuals by Golfweek/Sagarin. Cantlay currently leads the Bruins with three tournament victories and six top-10 finishes on the season.

WASHINGTON looks to make it three in a row. Only USC (1964-67; 1971-73) and Arizona State (1995-2000) have won three or more consecutive Pac-10 titles. The Huskies are led by sophomore **Chris Williams**, currently ranked No. 27 in the Golfweek/Sagarin rankings. Williams was named the Pac-10 Golfer of the Month for March.

Should CALIFORNIA senior **Eric Mina** successfully defend his individual title, he'd be the first Pac-10 golfer to do so since Arizona State's Paul Casey claimed three straight titles from 1998-2000.

STANFORD sophomore **Andrew Yun**, the nation's No. 2 ranked golfer, joins junior teammate **David Chung**, in hopes to lead the Cardinal to the team title on their home course. Chung recently competed at the Masters. While he did not make the cut, Chung was the top American amateur after shooting a 4-over 148 through two days.

OREGON junior **Daniel Miernicki** has two tournament victories for the Ducks this season and tied the school record with a career-low round of 62 during the Amer Ari Invitational in Hawaii in February. He is a four-time medalist in NCAA competitions and ranks first in career scoring average at Oregon at 71.56.

NCAA SUCCESS... The Pac-10 has won 14 NCAA team titles, while 11 different individuals have garnered medalist honors 14 times. . . The Pac-10 has produced six (Arizona State, Oregon, Stanford, UCLA, USC, Washington) of the dozen teams to have played in each of the past three NCAA Championships.

TEAM USA... The United States and European teams were recently announced for the 2011 Palmer Cup at The Stanwich Club outside Greenwich, Conn. The annual Ryder Cup-style competition will be played June 9-11. Four Pac-10 student-athletes are among the eight selected for the United States - UCLA's Patrick Cantlay, Oregon's Daniel Miernicki, Washington's Chris Williams, and Stanford's Andrew Yun. A fifth Pac-10 golfer, UCLA's Pontus Widegren will represent Europe.

LAST YEAR IN PAC-10 MEN'S GOLF

WASHINGTON claimed the 2010 Pac-10 Men's Golf Championship, winning its second-straight title. The Huskies shot a four-round total of 37-under 1383 (338-352-340-353). STANFORD finished in second at 34-under 1386 and USC rounded out the top three at 24-under 1396.

Individually, CALIFORNIA's Eric Mina took home the honors, finishing 16-under 268. ARIZONA STATE'S Jesper Kennegard was second at 15-under 269 and WASHING-TON's Richard Lee took third, 14-under 270. Washington's Nick Taylor, who finished tied for eighth with a score of nine-under 275, was the recipient of the 2010 Ben Hogan Award, given to the best men's collegiate golfer.

The Pac-10 had nine teams earn bids to compete at the 2010 NCAA Men's Golf Championships. After the first three-rounds of competition, the Pac-10 had three teams advance to the NCAA's match-play final-round. OREGON, WASHINGTON and STANFORD finished in the top-eight to qualify for match-play. Stanford dropped its quarterfinal match to Oklahoma State, and Oregon defeated Washington to move onto the semifinals, where they lost to Oklahoma State.

WASHINGTON's Taylor and OREGON's Eugene Wong were named Pac-10 Co-Golfers of the Year, while USC's T.J. Vogel and WASHINGTON's Chris Williams were named Pac-10 Co-Freshman of the Year. OREGON head coach Casey Martin was named Pac-10 Coach of the Year.

NEXT...

NCAA REGIONALS: May 19-21, 2011. The NCAA Men's Golf Committee will select 81 teams and 45 individuals for regional competition including automatic qualifers (28) and at-large teams (53). Three of the six regionals will have 13 teams and ten individuals while the other three regionals will have 14 teams and five individuals. Five teams and the low individual not on an advancing team from each regional shall advance to the finals. The regional sites are as follows:

Golden Ocala Golf Club, Ocala, Florida (University of Florida, host) Pete Dye River Course, Blacksburg, Virginia (Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, host) Wolf Run Golf Club, Zionsville, Indiana (Indiana University, Bloomington, host) Colorado National Golf Club, Erie, Colorado (University of Colorado, host) The Farm Golf Club, San Diego, Calif. (University of San Diego, host) Omni Tucson National Resort, Tucson, Arizona (University of Arizona, host)

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: May 31-June 5, 2011. All 30 teams and six individuals will complete 54 holes of stroke play. Following 54 holes of competition, an individual champion will be declared along with finishers 2-15. The top eight teams after 54 holes of play will be placed into a bracket with the number one seed playing the number eight seed, the number two seed versus the number seven seed, the number three seed versus the number six seed, and the number four seed versus the number five seed competing in match play. A total of five points will be available with one point being awarded for each individual match. Winning teams will advance to the semifinals and subsequently the finals. The first team to win three points within a match will advance, or in the case of the final match be declared the national champion. The site for the national championships is as follows:
