UP NEXT

The Arizona State women's basketball team opens play in the 2011 NCAA Tournament on Saturday when it faces the Temple Owls out of the Atlantic 10 Conference. Tip-off is scheduled for 2:05 p.m. MT (1:05 p.m. in Arizona) at the Jon M. Huntsman Center in Salt Lake City.

The winner of ASU-Temple will meet the winner of Saturday's other first round contest between second-seeded Notre Dame and 15th-seeded Utah on Monday at 7:30 p.m. MT/6:30 p.m. PT.

After a one-year hiatus, the Sun Devils (20-10, 11-7 Pac-10) are making their sixth NCAA appearance in seven years (11th overall). ASU set a school record with five consecutive NCAA runs between 2005-09. That stretch included the program's only two Elite Eight appearances as ASU was one win away from the Final Four in 2007 (lost to Rutgers in the Greensboro Regional Final) and again in 2009 (lost to UConn in the Trenton Regional final).

After losing six seniors from the 2009 team, including two-time Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year Briann January, who was the Indiana Fever's top pick in the 2009 WNBA Draft, ASU just missed out on a sixth consecutive NCAA berth last season as it finished 18-14. The idea that ASU was even in NCAA contention last season was even more impressive given that in addition to the loss of the aforementioned senior class, ASU was also without All-Pac-10 guard Dymond Simon, who sat out last season to rehab a knee injury she suffered in the 2009 regular season finale.

This season a healthy Simon (2011 All-Pac-10) has teamed with senior forward Becca Tobin (2011 Pac-10 Honorable Mention), junior forward Kimberly Brandon (2011 Pac-10 Honorable Mention) and senior guard Tenaya Watson (2011 Pac-10 Defensive Honorable Mention) to once again make the Sun Devils a major player on the national scene. Still, the 2010-11 campaign hasn't been without its share of learning experiences along the way. Although eight of the 14 players on ASU's roster are 'upperclassmen,' the team was still young at the start of the season in terms of its experience (or lack thereof) playing with one another.

After beginning the season 3-2 the Sun Devils (No. 7 seed in the Dayton Region) went on a seven-game winning streak, which included a 79-66 win over current No. 10 [and the No. 3 seed in the Philadelphia Region] DePaul and a 2-0 start in Pac-10 play. ASU then traveled to the Bay Area for its first Pac-10 road trip where it fell to both Cal and Stanford. The Sun Devils would then alternate wins and losses in their next eight games (4-4) before finishing the Pac-10 season with victories in six of their final eight games to finish third in the league.

ASU's initial 2011 postseason foray netted a 1-1 record at last week's Pac-10 Tournament in Los Angeles. ASU defeated Oregon State (59-54) in the first round before dropping a 48-43 decision to Cal in the second round.

TV/RADIO

Saturday's contest can be seen live on ESPN2. Holly Rowe (play by play) and Sean Farnham (analysis) will be on hand to call the action.

The game can also be heard live on The Fan AM 1060. Coverage will begin at 12:30 p.m. in the Valley. Veteran broadcaster and the state of Arizona's 2010 Broadcaster of the Year Jeff Munn is in his seventh season as the voice of ASU women's basketball.

Arizona State Head Coach Charli Turner Thorne



- The winningest coach in Sun Devil history (289-178) and No. 3 in the Pac-10 in most career wins, Charli Turner Thorne has led the Arizona State women's basketball team to the NCAA Tournament eight times in the last 11 seasons, including a recent school record five consecutive appearances (2005-2009). The eight NCAA appearances are five more than what ASU had in the 15 years prior to Turner Thorne's arrival in Tempe.
 - In 2009 Turner Thorne guided the Sun Devils to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three seasons.
 - With 26 wins in 2008-09, Turner Thorne joined former Washington head coach Chris Gobrecht and current Stanford head coach Tara VanDerveer as the only other coaches in Pac-10 history (since the 1986-87 season) to have led their respective schools to five (or more) consecutive 20-win seasons.
 - In 2006-07 Turner Thorne guided the Sun Devils to a school record 31 wins, including a school record 16 Pac-10 wins, and led them to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history. The Sun Devils concluded the 2006-07 season ranked No. 8 in the final USA Today/ESPN coaches poll and No. 10 in the final Associated Press poll, their highest FINAL rankings in each of the respective polls in school history.
 - In 2005-06 Turner Thorne guided ASU to a 25-7 record and also led the Sun Devils to their seventh consecutive postseason berth. During the second half of that season Turner Thorne led ASU on a school record 10-game winning streak after leading the Sun Devils to a school record-tying nine-game winning streak earlier in the season (also led ASU to its first Top 10 ranking in 22 years).
 - In 2004-05 directed ASU to a 24-10 overall record and its first NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearance in 22 years.
 - Led her 2001-02 team to a 25-9 record, which at the time had tied the single-season school record for most wins.
 - Guided ASU to a share of the Pac-10 title in 2001 and the inaugural Pac-10 Tournament title in 2002, the first league championships in school history.
 - Led Northern Arizona University to consecutive winning seasons in 1994-95 and 1995-96, the first coach in school history to accomplish that feat.
 - As a player, lettered four years at Stanford where she played under Tara VanDerveer.
 - During the summer of 2009 Turner Thorne served as the head coach of the USA Women's World University Games Team which went undefeated (7-0) and captured the gold medal at the 2009 World University Games in Belgrade, Serbia. It was Turner Thorne's second time working with USA Basketball. In the summer of 2007 Turner Thorne served as an assistant coach on USA Basketball's U21 World Championship Team which won the gold medal at the FIBA U21 World Championship in Moscow, Russia.
 - Is currently vice president of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's (WBCA) Executive Committee.
 - Graduated from Stanford in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in psychology and later earned her master's degree in education from Washington in 1990.

ASU IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Arizona State is making its 11th all-time NCAA Tournament appearance and its eighth in the last 10 seasons.
- ASU's overall record in the NCAA Tournament is 13-10, including an 11-7 record under Charli Turner Thorne.
- The Sun Devils have won at least one NCAA Tournament game in their last six appearances (2002, '05, '06, '07, '08, '09).
- This is the first time that ASU has been a No. 7 seed.
- Since 2005, Sun Devils have had one NCAA Tournament meeting with each of the other three teams in the Salt Lake City subregional. ASU faced Notre Dame in 2005 (W), Utah in 2006 (L) and Temple in 2008 (W).
- ASU's highest NCAA seed in school history was a No. 3, which came in 2007 when it was placed in the Greensboro Regional.
- Prior to its Elite Eight berth in 2007, the furthest ASU had reached was the round of 16 (1982, 1983 and 2005). In both 1982 and '83, the fourth-seeded Sun Devils lost to the eventual national champion in the round of 16 (Louisiana Tech in 1982 and USC in 1983).
- As the No. 5 seed in the Tempe Regional in 2005 the Sun Devils advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time in 22 years after upsetting fourth-seeded Notre Dame, 70-61. In that game the Sun Devils overcame a 13-point first half deficit. In the Sweet 16 against UNC, the Sun Devils led by as many as 10 points and were within two points, 62-60, with 9:29 remaining before the Tar Heels closed out the game with a 17-12 run.
- As a No. 4 seed in 2006 ASU defeated Stephen F. Austin in the first round in Tucson (80-61) before falling to Utah in the second round (65-86).
- ASU earned a No. 3 seed in the Greensboro Region in 2007 and advanced to the Elite Eight for the first time in school history, earning a school record 31 wins along the way. The Sun Devils denied the upset bids of 14th-seeded UC Riverside (first round) and sixth-seeded Louisville (second round), overcoming double-digit deficits in the final 10 minutes of both games before going on to defeat Bowling Green (67-49) in the Sweet 16. ASU's season ended with a 64-45 loss to Rutgers in the Greensboro Regional Final.
- As a No. 6 seed in 2008, ASU defeated Temple 61-54 in the first round before bowing out with a 67-59 loss to Duke (No. 3 seed).
- In its most recent NCAA appearance in 2009, ASU (a No. 6 seed in the Trenton Region) earned its second Elite Eight berth in three years. ASU defeated No. 11 Georgia and No. 3 Florida State in Duluth, Ga., before knocking off the No. 2 seed Texas A&M in the regional semifinal. ASU was defeated by eventual national champion UConn in the Trenton Regional final.
- ASU's first NCAA appearance in the Turner Thorne era came in 2001. As the No. 11 seed in the Midwest Region, the Sun Devils fell to sixth-seeded LSU in the first round. Turner Thorne earned her first victory in the NCAA Tournament the following year after the ninth-seeded Sun Devils defeated eighth-seeded Wisconsin in the first round of the Midwest sub-regional, 73-70. ASU would fall to top-seeded Vanderbilt in the second round, 61-35.

SCOUTING TEMPLE

Temple (23-8, 13-1 Atlantic 10) is making its eighth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Owls had a trio of players earn A-10 Conference honors in the form of junior guard Shey Peddy (A-10 First Team and All-Defensive Team), junior forward Kristen McCarthy (A-10 Second Team) and senior guard Qwedra Wallace (A-10 Third Team). Peddy led the Owls in scoring (14.0 ppg), assists (4.2 apg) and steals (3.1 spg); McCarthy was third on the team in scoring (13.2 ppg) and second in both rebounds (4.9 rpg) and steals (1.7 spg) and Wallace was second on the team in scoring (13.8 ppg) and third in both assists (2.7 apg) and steals (1.5 spg). Temple (No. 10 seed in the Dayton Region) is led by third-year head coach Tonya Cardoza, who was named the 2010-11 Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year.

LOOKING AHEAD

If the Sun Devils are victorious on Saturday, they would meet either Notre Dame or Utah in Monday's second round. ASU has won two of the three all-time meetings with the Fighting Irish, including the most recent contest, a 70-61 triumph in the second round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament in Fresno, Calif. The Sun Devils have won only three of nine all-time meetings with Utah. The two schools have met only once in the last 23 years. That meeting occurred in the second round of the 2006 NCAA Tournament in Tucson where the Utes (seeded fifth) overcame a 15-point deficit to defeat the fourth-seeded Sun Devils 86-65. Next season ASU and Utah will begin meeting on a regular basis as members of the Pac-12 Conference.

WHAT ELSE TO LOOK FOR

- With this year's 11-7 record in Pac-10 play, ASU has now won 73 percent of its regular season league contests (79-29) going back to the 2005-06 season. ASU has also finished among the top three teams in the Pac-10 nine times in the last 11 years.
- ASU leads the all-time series with Temple 3-0. The most recent meeting took place in the first round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament where the Sun Devils were victorious 61-54 in College Park, Md. ASU also defeated Temple in 1982 (66-65) and in 1987 (87-68).
- ASU is 4-0 this season in games decided by three points or less. In those contests ASU has shown a trend of stepping up when it matters most as it has shot 56 pct. in the last five minutes of those games while limiting the opposition to 34 pct.
- ASU is currently second in the Pac-10 in free throw shooting pct (.732) while Tenaya Watson (.814) and Dymond Simon (.808) are Nos. 3 and 4, respectively, in the league.
- ASU has held the opposition to 56 or fewer points 15 times this season. The Sun Devils improved their scoring defense by four points during the last 10 games of the season (55.5 ppg) compared with the first 20 games of the season (59.6). Since the 2005-06 season ASU is 46-1 when it holds the opponent to 50 or fewer points.
- Although Dymond Simon was the only Sun Devil to average double figures in scoring for the season (13.5 ppg), other Sun Devils came on during the stretch run. Along with Simon (12.1 ppg), also averaging double figures in scoring the last 10 games of the season were Kimberly Brandon (10.7 ppg) and Becca Tobin (10.1 ppg). Tobin also led the team in rebounding (6.0 rpg) and blocks (1.3 bpg) during that stretch while hitting 52 percent of her shots.
- Currently with 98 career blocks, Tobin needs two more rejections to pass former Sun Devil Fran Ciak (1987-90) for second place on ASU's all-time list.
- Did you know? Six of ASU's 10 losses this season were to teams who were among the Top 15 of the final NCAA RPI standings -- Tennessee (No. 2), Stanford (2x - No. 5), UCLA (2x - No. 9) and Florida State (No. 15).
- Since 2004 the Sun Devils have won 84 percent (88-18) of their home games. In the last two-plus seasons ASU is 17-1 (.944) at home in non-conference games. The Sun Devils outscored the opposition by an average of 8.8 points in 14 home games this season.

COMING THROUGH IN CRUNCH TIME

With wins in six of their last eight regular season games the Sun Devils put themselves in position to earn their sixth NCAA Tournament berth in seven years. To say they earned each of those six wins would be an understatement. With nine minutes remaining in each of those wins the Sun Devils were either behind (trailing Cal by 8 and Washington State by 6), tied (at Oregon) or ahead by five or fewer points (4 at Washington, 3 vs. USC and 5 at Oregon State). They closed out those contests by outscoring the opposition by an average of 21.2-13.3 while shooting 51 percent from the field (33-65), including 44 percent from 3-point range (8-18), and nearly 87 percent (53-61) from the free throw line. Equally impressive was ASU's effort on defense over that same span as its opponents shot 33 percent (26-78), including 16 percent from beyond the arc (3-19).

SUN DEVILS BOOSTED BY RETURN OF SIMON

Rewind back to the first week of March in 2009. At that time ASU was in the midst of a school record 15-game winning streak and was preparing to challenge the Stanford Cardinal for a share of the Pac-10 title in the regular-season finale. It was in that game that fate would deal the Sun Devils a terrible blow as All-Pac-10 guard Dymond Simon went down with a season-ending knee injury for the second time in three years. With the loss of such an incredible talent ASU's outlook not only for the 2009 postseason, but also the 2009-10 season suddenly became unclear.

While the 2008-09 Sun Devils would end up making a dramatic run which concluded with the program's second Elite Eight appearance in three seasons, the 2009-10 squad was greatly affected by the loss of Simon's leadership and abilities on the floor.

At the time of her injury in 2009, Simon was seventh in the Pac-10 in scoring (13.8 ppg), second in free throw percentage (.882), sixth in 3-point field goal percentage (.381), eighth in assists (3.3 apg) and assist-to-turnover ratio and 14th in 3-point field goals per game (1.3). The aforementioned 88.2 percent mark in accuracy from the free throw line set the school's single-season record.

Simon's play has been a major factor in ASU's success this season as she has led or tied for the team lead in scoring 15 times. Earlier this season she was named to the Junkanoo Jam's All-Tournament Team after averaging 11.5 points, 3.0 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 2.5 assists in ASU's contests against Providence and Florida State. She was named the MVP of the ASU Classic after averaging 15.5 points 2.0 assists and 2.0 steals in ASU's wins over Cal Poly (Dec. 3) and New Mexico (Dec. 4). Simon was named the Pac-10 Player of the Week after tying her career highs in scoring (24 points), rebounds (5) and minutes (34) and setting a new career high in assists (7) in ASU's 79-66 upset of No. 16/18 DePaul (Dec. 21).

Simon's aggressiveness on the offensive end has also helped her get to the line on a consistent basis as she leads the Sun Devils in both free throw attempts (120) and makes (97) and is No. 4 in the Pac-10 in free throw shooting percentage (.808). Defensively speaking, Simon set a career high with six steals in ASU's win vs. NAU and is currently second on the team in steals per game (1.4).

Simon, who was named to the 15-member All-Pac-10 Team earlier this month, is currently ninth on ASU's all-time list with 104 career 3-point field goals and seventh in career free throw percentage (.802) and 11th in career scoring.

BRANDON'S PLAY INSTRUMENTAL IN ASU'S SUCCESS

Without question one of the biggest reasons for ASU's earlier seven-game winning streak and its recent run of five wins in six games has been the emergence of Sun Devil junior forward Kimberly Brandon. After the first month of the season Sun Devil head coach Charli Turner Thorne made the decision to move Brandon inside after the Chatsworth, Calif., product spent the first five games of the season out on the wing. After the move Brandon's production improved dramatically as she went from averaging 5.6 ppg and 4.2 rpg in the first five games to 12.0 ppg and 9.4 rpg during the winning streak. Brandon recorded three double-doubles during the winning streak, including a pair of in back-to-back wins over Oregon State (19 points, 11 rebounds) and Oregon (19 points, 12 rebounds) as she established a (then) single-game career high in scoring against the Beavers before duplicating the feat two days later against the Ducks.

Brandon, who is averaged 11.3 points and 6.7 rebounds in Pac-10 play, added her fourth double-double (13 points, 10 rebounds) in ASU's win over Arizona (Jan. 16). She scored 18 points in ASU's loss to No. 4 Stanford (Feb. 3). She then scored 15 of her career-high 21 points in the second half of ASU's 55-47 win at Washington State (Feb. 19). Brandon also recorded her fifth double-double of the season against the Cougars as she added 10 rebounds to go along with four steals.

In the last weekend of the regular season Brandon, who earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention honors earlier this month, averaged 17.5 points, 7.0 rebounds and 2.5 steals while shooting 54 percent from the field, including 60 percent from 3-point range, and 86 percent from the line in ASU's wins at Oregon and at Oregon State. She scored 22 of her 35 points in the second half of both games – 12 at Oregon and 10 at Oregon State – while shooting 60 percent from the field (9-15).

Kimberly Brandon's Double-Doubles

Junior F Kimberly Brandon has recorded all five of her career double-doubles this season. The Sun Devils were victorious in each of those games.

Career-high 21 points and 10 rebounds. Scored 15 of her 21 points in the second half and also had a season-high four steals in ASU's come-from-behind 55-47 win.

GETTING THE JOB DONE

As ASU's most productive returning starter from last season, senior forward Becca Tobin has been looked to for her solid contributions on both ends of the floor in addition to combining with fellow seniors Simon and Tenaya Watson to provide strong leadership for the team. Last season Tobin led the team in rebounding (6.4 rpg) and free throw percentage (.848), was second in scoring (9.7 ppg) and blocks per game (1.2) and third in field goal percentage (.491). A starter in 28 of 32 games, Tobin scored in double figures 15 times, including a career-high 20 points (8-10 FGs, 4-4 FTs) at Oregon (Feb. 13). In addition, Tobin concluded the 2009-10 campaign by making 37 of her last 40 free throws (.925).

Tobin, who missed ASU's contest against Cal Poly on Dec. 3 because of a foot injury, averaged 18.0 points and shot 62 percent (16-26) from the field in back-to-back games vs. Oregon (Jan. 2) and at Cal (Jan. 6), where she scored a career-high 24 points.

Tobin scored 10 of her 12 points in the second half of ASU's 62-61 win at USC (Jan. 29). She scored ASU's last six points of the game, including what turned out to be the game-winning basket with 24 seconds left. She recorded her first double-double of the season as she scored 21 points and grabbed 10 rebounds in ASU's win at Washington (Feb. 17). Tobin, who was 9-of-11 from the field, scored 13 points and made all six of her field goal attempts in the second half.

Tobin, who scored 15 points (7-8 FGs) in ASU's win at Oregon (Mar. 3), has tallied double figures in scoring 12 times this season, including 10 times in ASU's last 19 games. Earlier this month Tobin, who needs two more rejections to pass former Sun Devil Fran Ciak (1987-90 - 99 blocks) for second place on ASU's all-time list, earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention honors as voted on by the league's coaches.

THIS FEELS FAMILIAR

With Dymond Simon injured last season, the responsibilities for running the Sun Devil offense fell largely on the shoulders of junior college transfer Tenaya Watson. As part of NJCAA national runner-up (2008) and NJCAA champion (2009) teams during her two seasons at Central Arizona, Watson, operating primarily from the shooting guard position, putting together an impressive offensive resume as she averaged 16.6 points as a freshman and 13.8 points as a sophomore.

Fast forward to the beginning of 2009-10 season and Watson was inserted into the point position. Despite being out of her usual position, Watson would go on to display several flashes of brilliance during the season as she tied for first on the team in assists per game (2.5 apg), was second in steals (1.4 spg), third in scoring average (8.0 ppg) and fifth in field goal pct. (.477).

ASU's attempt at a sixth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance last season was affected by a foot injury Watson suffered which forced her to miss three games during the second half of the Pac-10 season.

With the return of Simon and the addition of freshman guard Adrienne Thomas, Watson has been an stronger contributor this season as she operates from her more familiar position.

"I am excited about Tenaya," Sun Devil head coach Charli Turner Thorne said prior to the start of the 2010-11 season. "Last she had a phenomenal season despite having to play out of position and this year she gets to play her true position. Also with a year of experience now I think she gets what it take to play at our level."

Watson is the only Sun Devil who has started every game this season. ASU's leader in steals averaging 1.9 spg, Watson was recognized by the league's coaches earlier this month in being named Pac-10 Defensive honorable mention. Watson is also 2nd in assists (2.3 apg) and 3-point field goals (24) and 4th in scoring (7.5 ppg) and rebounding (4.2 rpg - most among ASU's guards).

Watson was named to the ASU Classic All-Tournament Team (Dec. 3-4) after averaging 7.5 points, 3.5 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 6.5 steals vs. Cal Poly and New Mexico. In the contest against Cal Poly, Watson scored 10 points, dished out a season-best 5 assists and had 9 steals (one short of tying the school's single-game record) in ASU's win over Cal Poly (Dec. 3).

Earlier this season Watson turned in the best game of her career in ASU's upset of then No. 16/18 DePaul (Dec. 21) as she posted career bests in points (25), field goals (9) and 3-point field goals (4), tied her career high in rebounds (8) and added 4 steals.

NEW FACES

The Sun Devils have three new additions to their roster in 2010-11 -- freshman guard Adrienne Thomas, freshman forward Olivia Simmons, and junior college transfer Olivia Major.

Thomas has played in every game this season. She grabbed a season-best six rebounds in ASU's win vs. Colorado State (Dec 11). She scored a season-best seven points (7-10 FTs) in ASU's loss at No. 11/10 UCLA (Jan. 27).

Major, who missed the first three games of the season recovering from offseason shoulder surgery, provides the Sun Devils with help in their perimeter game as she led the nation last season among the junior college ranks, making 142 3-point field goals for her Central Arizona squad. Major scored a career-high 11 points in ASU's win over Oregon (Jan. 2). Major was forced to miss ASU's contests vs. Washington State (Jan. 20) and Washington (Jan. 22) with a foot injury. She returned to the floor at UCLA (Jan. 27).

Simmons missed the first five games due to injury and made her debut in ASU's win over Colorado State (Dec. 11) and has since seen action vs. Oregon (Jan. 2) and vs. Arizona (Jan. 16).

While she is not new to ASU's 2010-11 roster, redshirt junior Markisha Patterson is also making her debut this season. Patterson, who sat out last season as she recovered from a knee injury, has played in 21 games (seven starts). She recorded career bests in points (9) and rebounds (8) in ASU's win at South Dakota State (Dec. 16) and has consistently provided the Sun Devils will solid play on the defensive end. Patterson has missed ASU's last nine games with a broken nose/eye injury and is currently out indefinitely.

NCAA EXPERIENCE

The Sun Devils have four players on their roster with previous NCAA Tournament experience. Of the four, Becca Tobin has played in the most games (6). Dymond Simon played a big role in ASU's overall success in 2007 (31-5, Elite Eight) and 2009 (26-9, Elite Eight), however suffered season ending knee injuries during the regular season both years.

Current Sun Devils Kali Bennett, Janae Fulcher and Haley Parsons redshirted during the 2009 season.

SEASON SUMMARY/KEY MOMENTS

- After double-digit wins vs. Northern Arizona and at UC Riverside to start the season the Sun Devils went on the road to face the No.4 Tennessee Lady Vols. After ASU went up 18-17 the Lady Vols went on a 16-0 run to close out the first half. That scoring burst turned out to be the deciding factor in the Lady Vols' 80-64 win.
- Playing No. 14 Florida State in the Bahamas on Nov. 27 the Sun Devils are in control for most of the game and lead by as many as seven in the second half. The Seminoles would eventually tie the game at 55-55 with 2:08 remaining and then would go on to score the final 10 points of the game to win 65-55. ASU shoots an uncharacteristically high number of three pointers (30) and makes only three for the game.
- Following the loss to Florida State, the Sun Devils would go on to win their next seven games. The signature victory of the winning streak came on Dec. 21 in Tempe as the Sun Devils upset [then No. 16] DePaul 79-66. The Blue Demons came into the game on a 10-game winning streak and were coming off a 20-point win over Stanford in their previous game. Dymond Simon would go on to be named the Pac-10 Player of the Week after she had a season-best 24 points while setting a career high with seven assists. Tenaya Watson would come through with her best game as a Sun Devil as she scored a career-high 25 points.
- After being swept in the Bay Area by Cal (67-55 on Jan. 6) and Stanford (82-35 on Jan. 8) the Sun Devils rebounded with an impressive 75-43 win over Arizona. Unfortunately another winning streak was not to be as the Sun Devils were upset in their very next game by Washington State, 70-65 at home (Jan. 20). The hot shooting Cougars connected on 65 percent (11-17 FGs) of their 3-pointers for the game.
- In their very next contest (Jan. 22) the Sun Devils staved off Washington's upset bid. With ASU down 44-40, Dymond Simon would take over as she accounted for three straight baskets and one steal in a 67-second span to put ASU on top 46-44. Simon would then have a hand in putting the Sun Devils up for good as she penetrated into the lane before finding teammate Alex Earl for a wide open three to give the Sun Devils a 49-46 lead. Kali Bennett's third and final block of the game came on a potential game-tying attempt in the final seconds and the Sun Devils won 52-49.
- Following a 70-60 loss at UCLA on Jan. 27 the Sun Devils headed to the Galen Center on Jan. 29 where they encountered a USC squad which was not only unbeaten at home (8-0), but had won its last 11 regular season home games going back to the 2009-10 season. After leading by as many as 14 points in the second half the Sun Devils would eventually find themselves down 56-53 with just over five minutes remaining and without their leading scorer, Simon, who left the game with a concussion. Deja Mann, who replaced Simon at point guard, stepped up to hit a three (only her sixth of the season) and tie the game at 56-56 with 4:05 left. That would then set the stage for Becca Tobin, who scored ASU's last six points of the game. Tobin's layup with 24 seconds remaining turned out to be the winning points for the Sun Devils, who escaped with 62-61 victory.
- After being beaten at home by Stanford on Feb. 3 the Sun Devils would next entertain California, which had earlier snapped ASU's season-best seven-game winning streak. The Bears had come in winners of three straight and four of their previous five. Making ASU's assignment even tougher was having to face Cal without Simon, who was missing her second consecutive game after not being medically cleared from the concussion she suffered at USC one week earlier. Other Sun Devils would step up in Simon's absence as Becca Tobin (12 points, 6-8 FGs), Mann (8 points, 3-5 FGs) and Bennett (7 points, 2-2 FGs, 2-2 FTs) combined to score 27 of ASU's 32 second half points while shooting an aggregate 73 percent (11-15 FGs) to help ASU overcome a 12-point deficit and beat the Golden Bears 45-44. Mann, who scored all eight of her points in the second half, would provide the theatrics in the win as she hit a 3-pointer while under duress as time expired to give ASU a dramatic 45-44 win. After shooting 17 percent and scoring 13 points in the first half, the Sun Devils came back to shoot 54 percent in the second half, including 80 percent (4-5) from beyond the arc. Behind 36-26, the Sun Devils would outscore Cal 19-8 over the last 9:01 of the game. They would shoot 67 percent (8-12) during that span while limiting the Golden Bears to 30 percent (3-10).
- After a 73-61 loss at Arizona (Feb. 13), which brought an end to ASU's 11-game winning streak in the series, the Sun Devils found themselves in fourth place in the Pac-10 standings. ASU trailed third-place USC by one game and led California and Washington State, who were tied for fifth place, by one-half game. In the even bigger picture the Sun Devils' hopes for an NCAA Tournament bid were suddenly up in the air after splitting their previous eight games, alternating wins and losses in the eight contests. Staring at tough road in which they would play four of their final six games away from home, the Sun Devils would respond by going 5-1. While all the wins were 'big' in the grand scheme of things, it could be argued that ASU's most important win down the stretch came on Feb. 24 when they defeated USC 69-55 at home. Both teams came in tied for third place in the Pac-10 and they both played with postseason-like intensity. A 17-7 run in the final 4:03 helped the Sun Devils turn a four-point advantage into a 14-point win. Dymond Simon (22 points) and Kimberly Brandon (15 points) combined for 37 points in ASU's win over USC, which was ASU's third consecutive victory.
- Without question one of ASU's top performers down the stretch, Brandon would help push the Sun Devils to wins in their final two regular season games at Oregon (75-66) and at Oregon State (59-54). For the two games, Brandon averaged 17.5 points, 7.0 rebounds and 2.5 steals while shooting 54 percent from the field, including 60 percent from 3-point range, and 86 percent from the line. She scored 22 of her 35 points in the second half of both games – 12 at Oregon and 10 at Oregon State – while shooting 60 percent from the field (9-15). In both games Brandon's contributions over the final 20 minutes were vital to the outcome as ASU had to overcome a six-point deficit at Oregon and had to stave off a rally in the final minutes at Oregon State.

ASU women's basketball looks to rebound from down season

Arizona State's returning women's basketball players took last season's 18-14 record the right way: They didn't like it.

After averaging 25.6 wins over the previous five seasons and twice making the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight, 18 wins and the WNIT second round didn't cut it.

"We want to get back to being one of the best teams in the country," ASU coach Charli Turner Thorne said. "We made that very clear in the spring."

Now in the second week of fall practice, the Sun Devils already are showing signs of rebounding.

The perimeter, buoyed by the return of All Pac-10 point guard Dymond Simon, is deeper and better balanced. Simon alone should help the posts to finish better by delivering passes at the right time to the right place.

"We're kind of like the Suns," said Turner Thorne, going into her 15th season. "Lots of wings, lots of options, lots of competition."

Junior Kimberly Brandon is expected to continue at small forward although she could swing some into the post. Tenaya Watson, forced to play point last season, will be her natural off guard spot. Others at the shooting spots include Alex Earl, Deja Mann

and Markisha Patterson, like Simon returning from knee surgery.

Freshman Adrianne Thomas will back up Simon and already is showing enough that Turner Thorne said, "I'm liking her a lot."

Transfer guard Olivia Major, who averaged 20.4 points last season for Central Arizona, is coming off knee surgery but could be ready to play in December.

Becca Tobin, 6-foot-5 power forward, is hoping to play her senior season at 180 pounds to maintain her strength in a bruising Pac-10.

Other returning posts are Kali Bennett and Joy Burke, both 6-5, and 6-3 Janae Fulcher. All are going into their second season playing for ASU.

"The posts have had great offseason and personal bests in conditioning," Turner Thorne said. "They're all better skill-wise and making great progress."

ASU plays an exhibition game against Fort Lewis on Nov. 7 before opening against Northern Arizona on Nov. 12. Non-conference opponents include Tennessee, Florida State (or Alabama in a Bahamas tournament), DePaul, Marist, South Dakota State and probably New Mexico (in the ASU Classic).

Dymond Simon ready to shine again for Arizona State

Dymond Simon is alternately pushing away and embracing professional basketball.

She needs a healthy, productive senior season at Arizona State to cement an opportunity in the WNBA. Yet she said, "I kind of think of it as my rookie year," because under normal circumstances Simon already would have one pro season in the books.

Any semblance of normal evaporated for Simon in the 2008-09 regular season finale when she crumpled at Stanford in a fall that broke the lateral parts of her left knee in half. It is the same knee in which Simon needed to have anterior cruciate ligament repair in early 2007, her freshman season at ASU.

"I went months without an actual ACL in my knee" between surgeries in March 2009 and a cadaver graft that August, Simon said. Then she began the long road back, redshirting last season as ASU dropped to its lowest win total (18) in six years and failed to make the NCAA Tournament. She finally received full medical clearance last month and will be back at the Sun Devils' helm in an exhibition game Nov. 7 and the season opener five days later.

Simon spent her down time studying film - "I can't imagine she won't coach," said ASU coach Charli Turner Thorne - and breaking down zone offense. "She's almost thinking too much now. She's an instinctive player and sometimes she has a hard time shutting her mind off."

Overanalyzing, Simon admits, can bog her down, but sees only positives from her coaches' view of last season. Not that she wasn't dying to jump off the bench and run an offense that without her and Briann January, now in the WNBA, sputtered at best.

ASU plunged from top 10 nationally in 3-point and field goal percentages and assists in 2008-09 to unranked (due to too few made per game), No. 88 and No. 131 in those categories.

"It just wasn't my time last year," said Simon, whose injuries prevented her from playing on teams that reached the Elite Eight in 2007 and '09. "I definitely had some down days, I'm not going to lie about that. But I didn't allow those doubts to control my mind.

"You always think, man, if I have another one (ACL tear), I'm done. But I go on the court fearless. I feel like there's nothing I can't do, and I'm definitely excited for the season."

Simon has only played previously with three of her teammates - senior Becca Tobin, juniors Kimberly Brandon and Alex Earl - so there is a learning curve to go along with expectations that aren't weighing heavy on the 5-foot-5 point guard.

"She's the best point guard I've ever had," Tobin said. "We play off each other and have each other's back. She's such a good leader and tells people where to go but is respectful when she does it. Dymond will be passing us the ball before we even know we're open. It's crazy for her to see the floor as good as she does."

Simon also is the school single-season leader in free throw percentage (88.2) and shot 38.1 percent from 3-point, both in 2008-09. "If they need me to put the ball in the basket, I'll do it," she said. "If they need me to pass the ball, I'll do it. I can't wait for the first night when the announcer calls my name. It's going to be like ha, I'm finally back."

Arizona State signs top 15 women's basketball class

Arizona State women's basketball signed a four-player recruiting class Wednesday that coach **Charli Turner Thorne** said "should prove to be one of the best."



has point guard skills at 6-foot."

ESPN HoopGurlz gives ASU's class a preliminary national ranking of No. 12 based on two players among its top 30: 6-foot wings **Karina "Kiki" Alofaituli** (No. 26) and **Eliza Normen** (No. 28). Also signing with ASU are 6-1 forward **Jada Blackwell** and 5-8 guard **Promise Amukamara**.

"We absolutely needed to sign two impact players," Turner Thorne said. "We believe all four could be ready to contribute their freshman year."

"They truly fit well with the [Sun Devil](#) family and are going to be so good with what we want to do. It's fantastic that all four are good students, that's a direct reflection of their work ethic and ability to learn. There will be some expectations for them. I keep telling them you'd better be ready."

ASU will be losing three seniors after this season: guards **Dymond Simon** and **Tenaya Watson** and forward **Becca Tobin**. The Sun Devils also have five juniors and one commitment so far for the 2012 class, guard **Arnecia Hawkins**.

For the 2011 class, Normen of Louisville, Colo., and Monarch High School was the first to commit in May. "She's special," said Turner Thorne, comparing her to Stanford's **Jeanette Pohlen**. "She can play all three guard spots and

Normen said: "I couldn't be more excited. I feel so lucky to have this opportunity to be a Sun Devil. I'm happy with my decision. I've always dreamed about this since I was little and now all of a sudden it's almost here. It's a little shocking."

Alofaituli gave her commitment in late June. She is from Newbury Park, Calif., and will play this season for the first time at Mater Dei High School, ranked at the end of last season as the nation's No. 1 team by USA Today. Her prep teammates include No. 1 **Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis**, bound for Connecticut, and No. 14 **Alexyz Vaoietama**, going to USC.

"It's going to push her being surrounded by great players," Turner Thorne said. "She reminds me of **Cian Carvalho**," who played at ASU in 2001-02. "She's very intense and hard working. She's a 4/3 player who is working on extending her range, a slasher with a good pull-up shot. She plays bigger than she is around the basket. She brings a lot of energy and is fun to watch."



Blackwell is from Etiwanda (Calif.) High School, also home to former ASU men's basketball star **Jeff Pendergraph**, and Amukamara plays at Glendale Apollo. Amukamara's brother **Prince**, a cornerback at Nebraska, is projected to be among the top 10 picks in the 2011 [NFL draft](#).

"Jada is versatile, very skilled and can really shoot the ball," Turner Thorne said. "She reminds you of **Lauren Lacey** (at ASU in 2008-09), a little shorter and a little better guard skills. She'll get a rebound and run the break. She's going to be a tough matchup."

Amukamara is a combination guard who is blossoming in [basketball](#) since devoting more time to that sport than track. "She's a scorer and a defensive dynamo," said Turner Thorne, who puts a high priority on defensive play. I followed her around (to watch her in club tournaments) in the summer, and I'm really glad I did."

Normen, Alofaituli and Blackwell will be in metro Phoenix to compete in the Nike Tournament of Champions, Dec. 17-23, and probably will get to watch the Sun Devils against DePaul on Dec. 21.

Jobs still up for grabs as ASU women's basketball opens its season

Charli Turner Thorne isn't certain about her entire starting lineup going into her 15th season as Arizona State women's basketball coach, which isn't a bad thing.

Competition is strong for at least two of the starting jobs, something Turner Thorne is encouraging as ASU looks to bounce back into the NCAA Tournament after dropping into the WNIT last season.

The Sun Devils are on an 11-year streak of postseason appearances including five consecutive NCAA berths from 2005-09, two of those ending in the Elite Eight.

Guards Dymond Simon and Tenaya Watson and forward Becca Tobin, all seniors, will be mainstays, Turner Thorne said. After that starting jobs are "up for grabs and may rotate around quite a bit. Based on performance and health, we have a number of people who are capable of starting for us. We're looking more like a group (of 10 or more) again."

ASU opens at 6:30 Friday at home against Northern Arizona and plays Sunday at UC-Riverside. Then there's a week to prepare for the first major test, at No. 4 Tennessee on Nov. 21.

Turner Thorne, who coached at NAU for three seasons, is not about to skip ahead to the Lady Vols. And the Sun Devils were

pushed in the 2007 postseason by Riverside winning 57-50.

"Half those players (at NAU) are from Phoenix," Turner Thorne said. "They're playing for bragging rights. You'd better be on for all the things that game brings. And you know Riverside plays that motion (offense) like nobody's business.

"They'll have a great game plan to take things away from us."

Kali Bennett, 6-foot-5 junior center, had 14 points and eight rebounds in ASU's 89-56 exhibition win over Fort Lewis. She and 6-5 Tobin figure to be a tough post combination when on the floor together. Janae Fulcher and Joy Burke are the other posts.

Perimeter players include Deja Mann, Kimberly Brandon, Alex Earl, Markisha Patterson, who was a redshirt last season, and freshman Adrienne Thomas. Olivia Major also will be a factor when she returns later this month or in December from labrum surgery.

Watson, Patterson and Major are transfers from Central Arizona. With Simon back from a redshirt season, Watson is playing her natural off guard position. Thomas from Fontana, Calif., is the backup point although she was slowed in the preseason by an ankle injury.

The 6-2 Brandon started 25 games last season, averaging 4.0 points and 3.3 rebounds.

"We're pushing her to improve taking care of the ball and playing great consistent defense," Turner Thorne said.

ASU women's basketball routs NAU in season opener

With Dymond Simon back at the helm and its familiar suffocating defense, the Arizona State women's basketball team blew out Northern Arizona 81-46 in its season opener Friday night in front of 3,589 at Wells Fargo Arena.

Senior point guard Simon, returning after a season off due to her second major knee surgery, had 18 points and six steals in 22 minutes.

ASU's 27-2 run in the first 10 minutes was one of the more-imposing starts in coach Charli Turner Thorne's 15-year tenure.

"Obviously we want to be the best team in the state, and we play both those teams this year," Turner Thorne said. "We did a great job of taking care of business. It was a great team win. The great news is with this type of margin, I know we could play a lot better. We're actually a very good free-throw shooting team."

The Sun Devils led 42-12 at halftime and eventually led by as many as 40 points, 73-33, despite making just 26 of 44 free throws and 1 of 10 3-pointers.

Turner Thorne said Simon was a "little rusty," shooting 7 of 16 from the field, missing her three 3-point tries and committing four turnovers. But she made an obvious difference from last season when ASU played without a true point guard.

"It was a big home opener for me," said Simon, playing for the first time in a game that counted since the 2008-09 regular-season finale. "It's a long process, but I think tonight definitely showed where I'm at. It definitely is like riding a bike. You fall off, but you get up and get back on."

"I've spent the last couple of months mentally preparing for this moment. You can't go out there in fear of getting injured. What's going to happen is going to happen. You can't really control that. All I can control is giving my best effort, being a senior leader for my team and taking us all the way."

Posts Joy Burke, Becca Tobin and Kali Bennett combined for 28 rebounds in ASU's 56-38 board advantage. Tobin also had 10 points and was one rebound shy of a double-double. Burke had nine of her 10 boards in the first half.

Kimberly Brandon also reached double-figure scoring with 10 points.

Amy Patton, sophomore guard from Tempe, led the Lumberjacks with 20 points. She committed six of her team's 26 turnovers.

Devils expect return to tourney

Charli Turner Thorne was talking about last season, the injuries that her Arizona State women's basketball team sustained, and how she was proud of what the Sun Devils accomplished, despite the circumstances.

Then she paused.

"We're trying not to really talk about last year," she said with a laugh.

The Sun Devils went 18-14 and 9-9 for fifth place in the Pac-10, the first time they have finished outside the top three in the standings in seven years. ASU qualified for the WNIT but missed the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2003-04.

"We expect to be in the NCAA tournament every year," Turner Thorne said. "To not go, we weren't even thinking that way at the beginning of the season. That's not our mentality, that we're not going to get in."

There's one big reason why the Sun Devils plan to return to the NCAA tournament: point guard Dymond Simon, who led the team in scoring with 13.8 points in 2008-09. She missed last season after tearing the ACL in her left knee and breaking the lateral parts that hold the ACL together.

"Words can't explain it. I'm just thrilled," Simon, a redshirt senior, said of her return. "My teammates and I this summer were working hard, building great chemistry. And that made me want to work even harder."

Without Simon, the Sun Devils staffed the point guard position by committee last season. Tenaya Watson played some point. Now the senior will be able to play her more natural position of shooting guard, Turner Thorne said.

"We were really lean at the point guard position," Turner Thorne said. "Being a former point guard, I have been known to say you're only as good as your point guard."

"They did an admirable job (at point guard), but it wasn't what we had and what we were used to, especially when you have post players like we have. It makes a huge difference when you have players in the backcourt who can really get them the ball at the right time and the right place. We didn't really do that last year."

Along with having Simon back, Turner Thorne said the Sun Devils have depth, size and shooters. ASU returns All-Pac-10 honorable mention selection Becca Tobin, a 6-foot-5-inch junior forward, as well as 6-5 post players Kali Bennett and Joy Burke, and 6-3 forward Janae Fulcher.

ASU's strength will "probably have to be our rebounding," Simon said. "Our post players are tough, and we have a few people back who can play their natural positions, and that will enable them to get on the boards more."

Before they enter Pac-10 play, the Sun Devils will tackle a rigorous schedule that includes Tennessee, South Dakota State, DePaul and Marist.

"It's definitely a schedule that will have us ready for conference play," Turner Thorne said. "It's always paid off for us."

ASU guard Simon adjusting to evolved women's hoops team

When ASU redshirt senior point guard Dymond Simon was cleared to practice before this season, she was ready to jump back into the swing of things after missing a year due to a knee injury.

There was just one problem: The ASU women's basketball team looked completely different.

At the end of the 2008-2009 regular season, the Sun Devil starting lineup included Simon, Kayli Murphy, Sybil Dosty, Danielle Orsillo, and Briann January. In ASU's victory against New Mexico on Saturday, the lineup consisted of Simon, redshirt junior guard Markisha Patterson, junior guard/forward Kimberly Brandon, senior forward Becca Tobin, and senior guard Tenaya Watson.

And with Simon coming off more than a year without playing, it was a team that looked experienced on paper, but had never really played together.

"The team is young right now, and I definitely have to learn to accept that," Simon said. "It's kind of hard, but I'm working with what I have."

The offense itself has also undergone some changes, with the new triangle offense playing a large role so far this season. But Simon said it's not so much learning the offense as it is learning to play with each other.

"They need to know where I'm going, and I need to know where they're going to be at the same time," Simon said. "It's just going to take some time for us — constantly keep working together in practice and in games."

Simon tore her anterior cruciate ligament in 2009 in the final regular season game against Stanford, missing the Sun Devils' run to the Elite Eight and then the entire 2009-2010 season, which Simon said was an extremely tough thing to do.

This season, Simon is already averaging over 14 points per game and has led ASU in scoring almost every contest.

"I'll admit it was hard in the first couple of games," Simon said. "Up to this point, I've only been playing basketball for about three months. That's pretty amazing for where I'm at right now."

Against UNM, Simon hit a few of her signature pull-up jumpers and a few clutch threes to help the Sun Devils pull away in the first half — a good sign that ASU's leading scorer from two years

The only area where Simon is lagging a bit is assists, where she is only averaging 2.1 per game. However, Turner Thorne said after Saturday's game that the low assists is something the whole team needs to work on.

"I think as we get more time together with this team, her assists are going to go up a lot," Turner Thorne said after Saturday's game. "But we're still kind of feeling all that out."

Six games into the season, however, and there are signs that the team is coming together. Tobin and Simon are fast establishing themselves as the leaders of the team.

A breakout game for Brandon on Friday (she secured her first career double-double) had Turner Thorne talking about Brandon's role as a solid power forward. And the Sun Devils have a whole host of defensive-minded guards who aren't afraid to shoot the ball.

In addition to the stifling defensive effort last weekend, ASU showed flashes of their offensive ability, going on several runs of 10 points or more against both teams, led by Simon.

"We can definitely keep this up," Simon said. "I think you'll see a different type of player for the next few games."

Brandon provides a physical post presence

When junior forward Kimberly Brandon was asked about the physicality of ASU's 75-43 victory over UA on Jan. 16, she broke into a smile.

"It was good," she said.

This season Brandon is second in scoring for ASU and already has four double-doubles, which is four more than her total from last season. She is 11th in the Pac-10 and leads the team in rebounding, and part of that success is an intensity and drive that has defined her season so far.

"I know I always say this, but I just go hard at everything I do," Brandon said. "Right now I'm trying not to take any positions off, on either offense or defense ... I'm just being aggressive and staying poised."

ASU coach Charli Turner Thorne highlighted Brandon's work ethic as a key factor after the win against UA.

"Kimberly Brandon has about as high a motor as anybody you're going to have to play against," Turner Thorne said. "She's a tough matchup."

The second part of Brandon's emergence this season is her transition from small forward and perimeter player to power forward, which is the position she's played most of her life and her true position, Turner Thorne said.

"This year, with loading up at the guard spot, we knew we wanted to work her both, and we started her at the three because a lot of those other guards weren't ready," Turner Thorne said. "As they developed and we kind of looked at what we had, we swung her over, and we maybe look stupid for not doing it sooner, but she's doing really well."

The 6-foot-2-inch Brandon has the size and athleticism to be a successful player down low. She also said that the position just feels a little more natural to her, but her advantage comes with her speed.

"It's really a mismatch down there, because I'm quick, quicker than the other post players," Brandon said. "I just try to use my skills to my advantage, and just try to take them off the dribble, and try to step out and shoot. They don't really like to come out of the paint sometimes, and I really try to take that advantage."

The California native was the No. 27 ranked forward when she came to ASU in fall 2008, and immediately saw time on the court, playing in 30 games her freshman season.

The Sun Devils made a run to the Elite Eight, but Brandon wasn't too much of a factor, only playing two minutes in their loss to UConn.

During her sophomore year, Brandon saw her minutes increase, and averaged four points and 3.3 rebounds a game.

But injuries took their toll on ASU last season, and that in turn hurt the team's overall mentality, Brandon said.

This season the team has really come a long way and is much closer than last year, she said, even in the face of adversity.

"At the Stanford game we were positive and we stayed together, and we didn't turn on each other," Brandon said. "As opposed to last year, sometimes we did."

Maturity helping Bennett find her role

While she doesn't tower over her opponents like teammates Becca Tobin or Joy Burke, redshirt junior forward Kali Bennett's presence inside has been key for the Sun Devils all season.

And against California on Sunday, it was that presence and Tobin's scoring that sparked the comeback that led to the last-second victory.

The Sun Devils were down by 10 with nine minutes left. Bennett and Tobin were paired up and proceeded to go on a tear on the inside, combining for eight points and pulling down a few key rebounds to help set up the game-winning shot from sophomore guard Deja Mann.

The chemistry with Tobin has been there since the start of the season, Turner Thorne said, and is part of what makes the 6-foot-5-inch Bennett so valuable to the team.

"They started this year playing together," Turner Thorne said. "I'm just really proud of Kali because she's really become a great decision maker for us. And on the flip side, she's finishing better than she ever has."

Since the start of the season, Bennett's role has become more and more pronounced, and she is currently averaging four points and 4.9 rebounds per game. She's only started five games this season, but consistently sees more than 14 minutes a game, and is the go-to option when play in the paint gets physical.

"Coming off last year, I didn't have that much confidence," Bennett said. "If they keep putting me in that role, I'm going to keep trying to step up for them. It feels good to know that they believe in me."

There are two big reasons why she has been such a factor this year, and the first comes from Bennett herself.

"I used to relate scoring and wanting the ball to being selfish," she said.

But now she's more comfortable with the ball, and is better at deciding when to shoot and when to pass.

"That's one thing I didn't have before was balance," Bennett said.

The other big reason is how much she's matured as a player, Turner Thorne said.

She's always played with a lot of emotion, but when she first came to ASU, that emotion would sometimes get her into foul trouble. Now it's streamlined and really helps her game.

"I think her mental game has grown," Turner Thorne said. "Last year she just got too emotional, and it impacted her ability to play, which was really hard, because you knew how good she was. But she's worked really hard in the offseason on her mental play, and she's continued to work on it this year."

It's been a long road for Bennett up to this point. She started her collegiate career at Washington in 2007, where she had a pretty solid freshman year, recording two double doubles and even scoring 17 points against the Sun Devils.

But Washington just wasn't the place for her, and in May 2008 she decided to transfer to ASU.

"I had that redshirt year to adjust, and that helped a little bit," Bennett said. "But it was still night and day compared to everything. High school was one experience, and then UW was another experience, and then I came here and it was completely different."

really affected the team's chemistry, Bennett said.

"It was a challenging year, I think for every single person on the team and then for the team as a whole," Bennett said. "There was a lot of adversity, and with the group of people we had, we weren't prepared for how to respond."

ASU finished the season with a winning record through sheer force of will, and came into this season as a team that was ready to deal with whatever was thrown at them.

"That's what's different from this year and the year before that," she said. "The team knows how to respond to adversity."

Looking ahead to the end of the season and her senior year, Bennett isn't worried about numbers.

"Every player wants to play to their potential, and I feel like I'm just starting to get there," Bennett said.

ASU women narrow focus going into stretch run

The Arizona State women's basketball team must narrow its focus, coach Charli Turner Thorne believes, to achieve its larger goal: an at-large NCAA Tournament berth.

ASU has not won consecutive games since early January and must begin stringing victories. Turner Thorne said that will happen only if the Sun Devils (14-8, 6-6 Pac-10

) focus on each possession.

"The biggest thing I want is stop throwing the ball to the other team," Turner Thorne said, referring to turnovers. "... These possessions where we have no chance to score or set up our defense have to stop."

Four of ASU's remaining six regular-season games are on the road, including Thursday at Washington and Saturday at Washington State. Neither will be an easy game judging by the first meetings and recent results.

Both Washington schools won at California last week. Washington only lost by 10 points at No. 3 Stanford, the Cardinal's closest call during their 16-game win streak.

"This is the strongest the Pac-10's been since I've coached here, one through 10," Turner Thorne said. "We've got a pretty good team yet we're inconsistent. But there's just no team that is that bad. We know this is going to be an extremely tough [roadtrip](#).

We've got to get tough, get gritty and find a way to get it done."

ASU is coming off a 73-61 loss Sunday at Arizona. [TheSunDevils](#)

have split their past eight games, including a loss to Washington State (70-65) on Jan. 20 and a narrow win over Washington (52-49) two days later.

Seniors Dymond Simon and Becca Tobin did their part to try to prevent a 73-61 loss at Arizona on Sunday, but they need help down the stretch. Players such as Kimberly Brandon, Tenaya Watson and Kali Bennett must improve consistency to help fuel ASU's sometimes-sputtering offense (61.7 ppg).

Brandon has a team high four double-doubles but a combined 11 points and six rebounds in the last two games. She played well against Stanford when Simon was out due to a concussion but can struggle at small forward when Turner Thorne puts 6-5 posts Tobin and Bennett on the floor together.

"I just need to get back to being more aggressive," said Brandon, who has a team-high four double-doubles but a combined 11 points and six rebounds in the past two games. "I don't think I've been doing that the past couple of games. And just staying more positive and encouraging my teammates more on the court. That will help if I'm more vocal. I just need to get everything out of my mind and go out there and play hard."

Watson scored 25 points against No. 10 DePaul on Dec. 21 but has been nowhere close since. She's averaging 4.6 points in the last six games while shooting 23.5 percent from the floor and 17.6 percent from 3-point. Bennett is playing better but has been limited in minutes to because of injuries and pleurisy.

ASU also has been down one post player for most of the last three games because of Joy Burke's shoulder injury.

ASU women's basketball hosts USC with third place in Pac-10 at stake

The winner Thursday between Arizona State and USC likely will finish third in Pac-10 women's basketball standings.

That's important, because the No. 3 team opens against the 10th-place club in the first round of the Pac-10 Tournament on March 9.

Also, Thursday's loser at Wells Fargo Arena will be scrambling for an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament presuming it doesn't win the Pac-10 tourney.

ASU (16-8, 8-6 Pac-10) has the marginally tougher road after Thursday, hosting No. 11 UCLA on Saturday then closing the regular season at the Oregon schools. USC (16-9, 8-6) is at Arizona on Saturday, then hosts the Washington schools.

Based on caliber of opponent, the Sun Devils' second-best win was a 62-61 victory at USC on Jan. 29. They led 38-24 early in the second half before the Trojans rallied to lead 56-53 with 5:18 remaining. ASU played without scoring leader Dymond Simon for the final 5:34 after she suffered a concussion but won on a basket by Becca Tobin with 24 seconds left and a missed 3-pointer by USC's Ashley Corral at the buzzer.

"We had a good, balanced half (at USC)," ASU coach Charli Turner Thorne said. "The

challenge for our team is to do that for two halves. But there aren't too many teams in this conference that aren't going to make a real hard push at you. You've got to credit them, but a lot of it was us losing our aggressiveness and not doing the things we'd done in the first 30 minutes."

Simon sat out the next two games, then returned in a loss at Arizona, in which she played some at shooting guard. The senior was back mostly at point guard in last week's wins in Washington, the position where she feels most comfortable. She scored 16 points against Washington, then reduced her turnovers from eight to two helping ASU to a season-low 12 vs. Washington State.

"I love the one (point-guard) spot," Simon said. "That's where I've been playing predominantly my whole life. I'm great with the basketball, and that's what I want to stick to. If they want to put me at the two (shooting guard), I'll be fine with that, but I like running the show."

Turner Thorne said Simon is good at finding scoring opportunities from the point and added that the offense is not necessarily geared to getting shots for the off guard.

ASU women's basketball beats USC, takes third place in Pac-10

The ASU women's basketball team never blinked Thursday in its Pac-10 showdown with Southern California, pulling away in the final 4½ minutes for a 69-55 win at Wells Fargo Arena.

) won its third in a row to move into sole possession of third place in the Pac-10. No. 11 UCLA (23-3, 13-2), in second place, is at ASU at 8:30 p.m. Saturday. The Bruins edged Arizona 74-70 on Thursday.

TheSunDevils

trailed only once in the second half, 37-35, and led 52-48 with 4:36 remaining. They outscored the Trojans 17-7 the rest of the way to sweep the season series with USC (16-10, 8-7).

ASU guard Tenaya Watson hit her head on the floor going for an offensive rebound with 6:36 left and went to the bench. Her absence overlapped with the Sun Devils' clinching run.

"They just pulled together," ASU coach Charli Turner Thorne said, "They knew they needed

to help each other defensively. We stayed very aggressive on the offensive end. Even right when she got hurt, we just had a tremendous sense of urgency. The way Kimberly (Brandon) Tenaya went for that rebound kind of said it all, that we're winning this game, period.

"We showed really good determination and good toughness. You'd better this time of year if you want to be in the conversation come March, and we do."

Kali Bennett started the 17-7 run with a short turnaround. Dymond Simon made two free throws after being knocked to the floor on a drive by Briana Gilbreath.

After Watson returned at 3:00, Deja Mann made a 17-footer as the shot clock expired, then Watson fed Brandon, who converted a three-point play for 61-48 with 2:04 left.

Simon led all scorers with 22 points and helped to limit USC's Ashley Corral to six points on 2-of-12 shooting. Brandon added 15 points and six rebounds for ASU, which had a 39-32 edge on the boards.

Gilbreath led USC with 17 points and Cassie Harberts, limited to 20 minutes due to foul trouble, added 10 and eight rebounds.

The 5-5 Simon was defended primarily by 6-1 Gilbreath.

"I enjoy the challenge," Simon said. "She allowed me to take my game to a different level. I know she's taller than me, but I can use my quickness to get by her and if not get the layup or the shot find one of my teammates."

Simon made 11 of her 12 free throws, helping ASU to a 10-point advantage from the line. The Sun Devils made 21-of-23 free throws overall to 11-of-18 for USC.

ASU used a 7-0 run to take the largest lead of the first half, 28-21, with 3:31 remaining. Christina Marinacci answered with a three-point play and two free throws in a 7-0 USC run. Simon, who had 12 first-half points, hit a 17-footer for a 30-28 ASU lead at intermission.

The Trojans blocked 10 shots overall. ASU had six blocks, three by Becca Tobin who also had six points and eight boards.

Transferring to ASU the right choice for Watson

"I really thought probably of anybody on the team, Tenaya probably did about what she could do," Turner Thorne said. "She was trying to make plays, got some steals, and she did some good things."

This season Watson leads the team in steals and is third in rebounding, both examples of the hardworking player she is.

She hasn't had very long to adjust to Division I basketball, either. Watson played two seasons at Central Arizona, where she won a NJCAA championship in 2009.

But she was ready to move on, and Watson said transferring to ASU was a great choice.

"I'm very happy, because I got to meet some new people and basically they're now my family," Watson said.

No transition is easy, but she said the coaching staff and all the players really made it easy to adjust.

"I worked with them, and they helped me work with them and helped me learn through the process," Watson said.

She's not the only transfer, either. Redshirt junior guard Markisha Patterson and junior Olivia Major both came from Central Arizona as well.

"It helps having people who've been through what I've been through and are going through what we're going through right now," Watson said.

ASU women's basketball faces Temple in NCAA Tournament

Charli Turner Thorne preached all season that Pac-10

women's basketball, from top to bottom, is deserving of respect.

The NCAA Tournament selection committee agreed at least when it came to Turner Thorne's Arizona State team.

ASU (20-10), projected by some as a No. 10 seed, came away as a No. 7 Monday, its sixth NCAA berth in the past seven years. [TheSun Devils](#)

open against No. 10 seed Temple (23-8) at 1 p.m. Saturday at the Huntsman Center in Salt Lake City.

If ASU extends its NCAA first-round winning streak to seven, it will face the winner between No. 10-ranked Notre Dame (26-7) - a No. 2 seed - and No. 15 seed/host Utah (18-16) on Monday.

"It's a reflection of how they felt about the conference and hopefully our program," Turner Thorne said. "We schedule tough. I think we do things the right way."

Despite losing in the Pac-10 Tournament

quarterfinals, ASU was 7-3 in its final 10 games including four road wins and another on a neutral court. The Sun Devils also were 1-2 in non-conference games against No. 4-ranked Tennessee, No. 9 DePaul and No. 15 Florida State and won at South Dakota State, which made the 64-team field.

ASU against Temple is a rematch of a 2008 NCAA first-round game that the Sun Devils won 61-54. And in 2005, ASU upset Notre Dame 70-61 to make the Sweet 16.

Temple is coached by Tonya Cardoza, a former Connecticut assistant, and led by guards Shey Peddy and Qwedra Wallace. The Owls lost 71-61 to UCLA in late November while the No. 7-ranked Bruins beat ASU twice: 70-60 and 61-45.

"It's going to be fun to play teams that haven't seen us and our style and prepare for teams we haven't seen," Turner Thorne said.

ASU missed out on the NCAA Tournament last season - exiting instead in the WNIT second round. All Pac-10 senior guard Dymond Simon is returning to NCAA play for the first time since 2008 against Temple and Duke because a major knee injury in the regular-season finale kept her out of a 2009 run to the Elite Eight.

"We're on the national stage now so it's a great opportunity to show what we can do," Simon said. "We want make those (ASU) teams that came before us proud, and we also want to go out there and shock the world."

That's going to require improved ball handling from the Pac-10 Tournament when ASU committed a combined 41 turnovers and lost to California.

Simon, Adrienne Thomas and Deja Mann must do a better job deciding when the Sun Devils should run and when they must be content to play in the half court against opposing zones.

"Coach talked to me and Adrienne about being the leaders out there, getting us into our offense and making sure we're getting a good shot off," Simon said. "It's definitely fixable and that's going to be our focus."

Guard Markisha Patterson, out since suffering an eye/nose injury is cleared to play for the first time since Feb. 5. She could provide defensive help and some perimeter rebounding.

The winner in Salt Lake City will advance to a regional in Dayton, Ohio, in a bracket that includes Tennessee, No. 11-ranked Miami and No. 18 Ohio State.
