
## 2008 SUN DEVIL GYMNASTICS



# 2008 Outlook

There are three keys to a successful 2008 season for the Sun Devil gymnastics program, according to 28th year head Coach John Spini.

"Confidence, consistency and leadership" says Spini, "are the main goals for the season."

After a disappointing 2007 season that was plagued with injuries, the 2008 Sun Devils will look forward to a fresh start with a young team. Spini will look to his five returning juniors to lead the team to its 27th consecutive NCAA regional championships.

Nicole Harris (Long Beach, N.Y.) leads the group of talented juniors. Harris returns to the squad after a successful 2007 season in which she was named an All-Pac-10 gymnast and scored career-highs on vault, beam and floor. With expectations to become an All-American as she did in her freshman campaign, Coach Spini will depend on her to contribute the same drive and enthusiasm she has the past two years.

"Nicole is one of our top athletes and all-arounders," says Spini, "She was one of the few on the team last year that could consistently hit all four events."

Also returning to the squad after being out for the past year and a half due to injury is Tia Orlando (Philadelphia, Pa.). With her international competition

experience, Orlando could prove to be a strong allarounder and leader to the young Sun Devil squad.

"Tia is such a powerful athlete and much of our success this upcoming season is going to depend on how she can come back from injury," says Spini.

Ashlee Hinkle (Glendale, Ariz.) is yet another junior Spini is expecting a lot from this season. A former Most Improved Gymnast award recipient, Hinkle will again compete in three events for the Sun Devils. With her strength being on beam, she also provides undoubted consistency on vault and floor.

"We want Ashlee to come back stronger than ever," says Spini, "she is one of our most consistent gymnasts and we look forward to her bringing that back this year."

Tiana Jean (Puyallup, Wash.) returns to the Sun Devil squad after having a very successful sophomore

campaign. In the 2007 season, Jean was arguably the most improved and one of the most consistent members of her team. With the excitement she brings on bars, as well as her talent and consistency on beam and floor, Jean is expected to pick up where she left off and keep improving.

"Tiana is one our most athletic and talented gymnasts," says Spini, "We love the competitive spirit she brings to the team; it makes her a natural leader."

Carrie Finley (Doylestown, Penn.) rounds out the junior class. She stepped into the lineup on vault and floor last season, when the team needed her most and will continue to do the same this season.

"Carrie is the definition of a team player," says Spini, "Her work ethic and positive attitude constantly pushes the team to new heights."

The Sun Devils return just one sophomore to their team for the upcoming 2008 season. Kaitlynn Bormann (Long Island, N.Y.) rejoins the team to improve on her efforts in her freshman season. She is expected to compete on vault, bars and beam.

"Kaitlynn is a very talented athlete," says Spini, "I do not feel she came even close to reaching her full potential last season and I hope she can do so this season. She has so much to offer this team."

The Sun Devils welcome six new faces to their team. Mary Atkinson, Skye Gentile, Beaté Jones, Francesca Mercucio, Stephannie Moore and Brittany Schuett join the Sun Devil squad for the 2008 season. Full of talent and enthusiasm, Spini is very excited to see what the freshmen can bring to the team.

"Much of our squad depends on how well our freshmen can perform; both under pressure and on a consistent basis" says Spini, "They are a dynamic group of girls and I am excited to see how they compete."

Coming to Tempe from Chesapeake, Va., Atkinson joins the squad as a potential all-arounder. Strong in all four events, she brings enthusiasm and leadership to the team. As a member of the prestigious Barrett Honors College, Atkinson brings excellence not only in the gym but in the classroom as well.

"Mary is a great athlete and great student," says Spini, "We hope she is everything she is capable of being and are very excited to see what she will bring to the team in competition."

Gentile arrives to Tempe from Southern California. After battling an injury her senior year of high school, the Newport Beach native trained hard over the summer and has the potential to compete on bars, beam and floor.

"Skye has improved a great deal on bars over the summer before coming to Tempe," says Spini, "She could also help us out on beam and floor."

A late signee, Jones comes from Red Bank, N.J., to bring power to the Sun Devils. A standout athlete on vault, Jones is capable of being not only one of the best vaulters on the team but also in the nation. Jones is also solid on bars, beam and floor making her a potential all-arounder for the Sun Devils.

"Beaté is one of the most exciting gymnasts to watch," says Spini. "Her power and never-ending smile make her a spark plug for the team. She's got the attitude and energy to change the atmosphere around her."

Mercucio hails from San Mateo, Calif., to join the Sun Devils. Coming from one of the premier gyms in the country, Francesca joins the Sun Devils as a potential all arounder.

"Francesca is a very intelligent, strong athlete who I think is only going to get better in college," says Spini, "She has impeccable form and long lines making her a beautiful gymnast to watch."

Although coming off an injury, Moore joins the Sun Devils as yet another strong all-arounder. A native of Las Vegas, Moore brings routines packed with a high level of difficulty to the Sun Devil squad.

"Stephannie was one of the first ones to commit to us," says Spini, "She is a very talented gymnast."



Schuett joins the team at the start of the spring semester, hailing from Ontario, Canada. Schuett comes to Tempe as one of the most highly-touted athletes on floor. She is also gifted on beam and vault.

"We are so happy to have Brittany on our team," says Spini, "She will bring so much excitement to our floor and beam teams. She is extremely talented in three events and has some international experience."

#### <u> Vault:</u>

What had been one of the Sun Devils thinner and weaker events of the 2007 season is expected to be much stronger

for the 2008 season. The Sun Devils have eight capable 10.0 vaulters this season.

"Our vault team has tremendously improved from last season," says Spini.

Four of the incoming freshmen have strong vaults and could very likely make the lineup. Harris and Hinkle will be the backbone of the vault team. Jones is also expected to make an immediate impact on vault.

"Beate is an outstanding vaulter," says Spini.

Atkinson, Mercurio and Moore will also be major contributors on vault. Bormann, Finley and Schuett will compete for action on vault as well.

## 2008 Outlook



#### Bars:

With one of the most difficult routines in the country, Harris leads the bar lineup for the Devils and is expected to anchor the event. Orlando is also expected to come back strong on bars. Jean, who had been one of the most consistent bar performers last season, returns to the lineup bringing NCAA experience to the team. Bormann will also be looked upon to help on bars.

Freshmen Atkinson, Gentile, Jones, Mercurio and Moore are expected to challenge for a spot in the bar lineup. Spini expects the most out of Mercucio and Atkinson.

"Nicole and Tia are both extremely talented on bars," says Spini, "Mary and Francesca also have very clean and strong routines."

#### **Beam:**

The ASU gymnastics team has had some of the highest beam scores across the country for the past few years, including a perfect 10 from April Boone last season. This year's squad looks to be no different. Led by Harris, who was a 2005 All-American on balance beam, the team brings both veteran talent and new faces to the 2008 rotation.

Orlando will likely be another standout on beam. Hinkle and Jean also return to the lineup bringing more experience and a great deal of consistency to the team.

The last two spots in the beam lineup will be a battle as Atkinson, Bormann, Gentile, Jones, Mercurio, Moore and Schuett are all valid competitors. All will likely see some time in the lineup.

"Nicole and Tia both have very strong routines," says Spini, "I feel gymnastics meets are won on balance beam. We're excited to put together what could be one of our strongest beam teams yet."

#### Floor:

With the recruitment of three outstanding floor workers in Atkinson, Moore and Schuett, the Sun Devils look forward to the floor exercise as a bright spot in the 2008 season.

Much of how the Sun Devils are expected to do on floor in the upcoming season depends on how Orlando and Moore come back from injury.

"Tia and Stephannie are our best performers on floor," says Spini, "How we do in the event really depends on how they return from injury."

Harris, Hinkle and Jean are also expected to come back to the floor lineup, with freshmen Atkinson, Moore and Schuett to join them. Finley, Gentile, Jones and Mercurio are all expected to try for spots on the floor team as well.

#### **All Around:**

Five athletes could potentially compete in the all-around in the 2008 season. Harris, who was named All-Pac-10 in the all-around last season, comes back as the top performer.

Spini sees four of the six freshmen consistently competing in the all-around competition. Atkinson, Jones, Mercurio and Moore are all capable in all four events and are expected to participate in the all-around.

#### **Coaches:**

Spini returns his coaching staff from the previous season and expects more out of them this upcoming season. Maggie Germaine Ethier and Bob Peterson both return as assistant coaches to Spini.

"Bob and Maggie both now have more experience coaching at the college level," says Spini, "I am expecting them to continue to produce strong routines but to monitor them more. They are very capable coaches."

Ethier moves up to associate head coach this season after serving two years as an assistant coach. She is expected to continue coaching beam and floor. She choreographs routines for both events, as well as has a huge hand in recruiting.

In his second full year, Peterson's primary responsibilities continue to be vault and bars. He is also in charge of preseason conditioning for the team.

#### **Facilities:**

The Sun Devils enjoy their practices in a new state-of-the-art gym. With the new facility, they are able to condition more thoroughly and are able to train harder earlier, due to the softer landing surfaces.

"While we will always be grateful to Desert Lights for providing us with facilities for years," says Spini, "we are so excited to have a gym that is designed just the way we want it."

Some of the gym's amenities include in ground pits and resi's to save ankles, cameras and TV's for the gymnasts to record and view their routines, luxurious locker rooms and brand new equipment.

#### **Schedule:**

The Sun Devils look forward to a tough and full schedule, highlighted by six home meets. The Sun Devils kickoff the 2008 campaign shortly after the New Year in Las Vegas on Jan. 4. UCLA and Oregon State join the Sun Devils in Las Vegas for the Lady Luck Invitational. Following their trip to Las Vegas, the Sun Devils travel to the Midwest to compete against Nebraska on Sunday January 13. The Sun Devils travel to the Bay Area to compete against California in a Pac-10 meet on Jan 18.

The Sun Devils return to Tempe for a three-meet homestand. They kickoff their home season against long-time rival Utah on Jan. 25. Five days later they play host again to Pac-10 rival Oregon State on Wednesday Jan 30. On Feb. 15, the Sun Devils take on in-state rival Arizona at home.

Following their meet with Arizona, the Sun Devils take a trip to the Pacific Northwest to compete against Washington.

The Sun Devils then return home for three consecutive home meets. Beginning with the UNO's Flip for the Cure, the Sun Devils play host to Stanford, San Jose

St. and UW Oshkosh on Feb. 29 in a breast cancer awareness meet. On March 7, the Sun Devils will compete against Boise St. and Penn St. in a trimeet. The following week marks the final home meet of the 2008 season for the Sun Devils as Ohio State makes the trip to the Valley of the Sun on March 14.

The Sun Devils travel to Missouri for their last dual meet of the season on March 21. They then head back to the state of Washington for the Pac-10 championships on the March 29. The Sun Devils will then travel to an NCAA Regional and end the season at the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga.

# HISTORY OF SUN DEVIL GYMNASTICS



# Program History

In its long history, Arizona State women's gymnastics has compiled numbers so impressive that they alone illustrate the prestige of the program. Represented at 24 of 26 NCAA Championships, the Sun Devils have sent a team to the nation's elite collegiate meet 19 times. There, ASU has accumulated 10 NCAA individual event titles to stand as one of the top-five schools in the country in that category. Thriving as much today as in years past, the Sun Devils have produced 29 All-Americans, including 13 in the past decade, and have finished among the nation's top-six teams three of the last eleven seasons.

Almost all of ASU's extraordinary success has come under the watchful eye of head coach John Spini, who enters his 28th season at Arizona State as one of the winningest coaches in the history Sun Devil athletics. However, ASU didn't wait for Spini to gain notoriety.

In the Sun Devils' inaugural season of 1976, Monique Sublette guided ASU to a 9-2 regular season record and a sixth-place finish at the AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women) Championships in what would be her only season as head coach. Replacing Sublette was Marie Bilski, who over four seasons (1977-1980) led ASU to a 68-30-1 regular season record and three top-10 AIAW finishes. She also became the first ASU gymnastics coach to mentor an All-American, as Pam Godward earned national honors on balance beam first in 1979, then again in 1980.

Building upon what had already been a successful first five years for the program, Spini immediately took ASU to new heights in his first season, as the Sun Devils went 19-4 during the regular season before finishing fifth at the AIAW

Championships. Leading the way for Spini's first team was Jeri Cameron, who earned All-America honors on vault and uneven bars, to become Spini's first athlete to achieve that recognition.

Cameron was even more magnificent a year later when she captured four event titles at the WCAA (Western Collegiate Athletic Association) Championships as a junior, pacing the Sun Devils to their first of what would be four straight conference championships. Also in 1982, Cameron added two more All-America honors to her list of accomplishments (bars, all-around), this time as ASU finished fifth at the inaugural NCAA Championships.

Jackie Brummer, Kim Neal and Lisa Zeis arrived on the ASU campus in 1983, creating what was arguably the finest trio of freshman gymnasts ever assembled to that point. Together with Cameron, the Sun Devils were considered one of the most potent teams in the country and they responded to the hype, going 20-1 during the regular season, capturing their second consecutive conference title and then finishing runner-up to a national crown at the NCAA Championships.

While Cameron won the NCAA title on uneven bars, Neal -- one of several U.S. National team gymnasts to attend ASU -- won individual honors on floor exercise. Brummer (bars) and Zeis (floor and beam) added All-America honors.

In 1984, the fabulous freshmen were sensational sophomores, leading ASU to a 17-3 record and a fourth-place finish at NCAAs.

Following up on Cameron's previous performance, Brummer kept the national title on uneven bars in Sun Devil hands while Neil earned All-America honors on floor exercise and Zeis became the first Sun Devil to earn three All-America honors in one season with her achievements on floor, balance beam and in the all-around.

By 1985 and 1986, ASU was at yet another level of greatness, earning not one but two runner-up team finishes at the NCAA Champion-

ships, while bringing five national individual titles back to Tempe. Zeis -- who would later serve as a Sun Devil assistant coach -- won her first NCAA championship on balance beam in 1985, a year before the Sun Devils tied the NCAA record by winning four of the five individual medals. However, despite the phenomenal talents of Brummer (all-around, beam), Neal (vault) and Zeis (floor), ASU missed winning the national team title by a heartbreaking quarter of a point (186.95-186.70).



The trio of Brummer, Neal and Zeis left ASU with remarkable accomplishments: a

combined 75-7 regular season record, two Pacific-10 Conference team championships, three runner-up NCAA Championship team finishes (one fourth), seven NCAA individual titles and 22 All-America accolades. Yet the success of the Sun Devils extended beyond their collective impact.

A key contributor on both the 1985 and 1986 teams was Shari Mann, who picked up All-America honors on vault twice. Karli Urban made her debut in 1986, but it was in 1987 (beam) and 1989 (floor) when she earned All-America recognition.

Also of note in the late 80s was Tracy Butler's performance at the 1989 NCAA Championships, when she placed fourth on beam for an All-American freshman season. Tina Brinkman became another freshman All-American in 1992, finishing third in the floor exercise at the NCAA Championships to complete a season that saw her earn ASU's first perfect 10.0 score in any event (floor).



Like Brinkman, Jenny Ester not only earned All-America honors as a freshman, but also placed herself on the short list of athletes to score a perfect 10.0, doing both on the uneven bars during 1993 season.

Katie Freeland had her first of three All-American season in 1994, and together with Brinkman created what was perhaps ASU's most potent

one-two punch since the one-two-three assault of Brummer, Neal and Zeis. Then arrived Meagan Wright onto the scene, who picked up three All-America honors in 1996 in what was hint of things to come.

At the 1997 NCAA Championships, ASU entered without much fanfare as the No. 9 seed. Days later, the Sun Devils exited with the most championship hardware the program had seen in more than a decade. Finishing runner-up in the Super Six by three-tenths of a point (197.150-196.850), ASU had it's fourth second-place crown as a team. Individually, four athletes combined to earn 11 All-America honors, led by Wright who earned national rec-

ognition in all four events and in the all-around.

Elizabeth Reid provided ASU with yet another remarkable freshman performance, not only earning All-America honors in three events, but securing ASU's first NCAA individual event title since 1986, with a 9.9 on balance beam, while also finishing runner-up on uneven bars and

floor exercise. In addition, Carie Courtney took home a pair of All-America awards, while Lisa Vincijanovic, who was the 1996 Pac-10 balance beam champion, earned one award.

Vincijanovic and Reid continued to be a rock of stability for ASU in 1998, when they were joined as All-Americans by sophomores Elizabeth McNabb and Amy Shelton. As a team, the Sun Devils returned to the Super Six for the second straight year and finished sixth, making it

their best back-to-back effort at the NCAA's since 1986 and 1987, when they placed second and fifth, respectively.

Making a habit of appearing in the Super Six, ASU advanced to collegiate gymnastics' elite competition for the third consecutive year in 1999. Seeded 10th, the Sun Devils finished fourth, just a half-tenth (.05) of a point behind Alabama. Also, for the third straight year, the Sun Devils had four gymnasts earn All-America honors, as Reid and McNabb were joined by senior team captain Wendy Ellsberry and sophomore transfer Kelly Christensen (later, Kelly Cowley).



In 2001 team earned the 14th top-10 NCAA Championships finish in school history, placing ninth. Leading the way, junior transfer Laura Moon and freshman Maggie Germaine became ASU's first All-Americans since 1999, earning second-team recognition in the all-around and on vault, respectively.

The 2001 season saw other highlights along the way, including two perfect-10.0 routines by Moon, a school-record 197.425 team total vs. Arizona, an upset of No. 1 UCLA and ASU record totals on uneven bars, floor exercise and in the all-around.

Spini led his record-setting 2003 squad to a 10-4 won-loss record and a 9th-place finish at the NCAA's with a score of 194.225. Senior Ashley Ellsberry earned second-team all-America accolades on beam, posting a 9.875 at NCAAs to finish fifth. Freshman Ashley Kelly won NCAA Northeast Regional Championships on beam (9.925) and bars (T-9.9). Spini won his 150th home meet at ASU, a 197.825-196.100 victory over California in the UNO's Classic. ASU defeated national power Utah in Salt Lake City, 197.450-197.150, on January 24, 2003, giving Spini his first victory over the Utes in Salt Lake City in his career. After being ranked 15th nationally by the coaches in the preseason, ASU climbed as high as No. 2 and remained there for two weeks and finished at No. 3 for four weeks. The squad recorded seven of the top 10 team scores of all-time in '03, including the top two (198.275 vs.

Kentucky and 198.150 vs. UCLA while Sun Devil gymnasts posted the top 11 all-around scores in school history, including 18 of the top 23.) The team set all-time event records on vault (49.650), bars (49.500), beam (49.875), floor (49.725) and all-around (39.875, Ashley Kelly vs. Kentucky). The beam score of 49.875 was a national high in 2003. The squad set a school record with eight perfect 10.0 scores in '03 (Maggie Germaine 4, Kelly 2, Ellsberry 1 and Cassidy Vreeke 1).



Spini coached sophomore Ashley Kelly to a national championship on the balance beam in 2004, ASU's 10th all-time and fourth that event.

Kelly tied the school record for consecutive all-around championships with five. The squad finished 9th for the second successive season and compiled a 10-6 regular season record. ASU was 6-1 at home. The Sun Devils placed second at the NCAA Central Regional, qualifying for its 23rd appearance at the NCAA meet. In 2004 ASU set school records for total score (198.450 vs. Eastern Michigan), vault (49.650 vs. Arizona), bars (49.600 vs. Eastern Michigan) and floor exercise (49.825 vs. Arizona). Sun Devil gymnasts scored a school record 12 perfect 10.0's in competition during the year, led by senior Maggie Germaine and Kelly with five each. Junior Kari Muth posted two (beam and floor).

The 2006 season was another strong year for the Sun Devils. Led by senior Ashley Kelly, the Devils made their way to the NCAA Championships. During the season they posted their seventh highest all-time team score while upsetting third-ranked Iowa State 197.750-197.000. After finishing fourth at the Pacific-10 Championships, the Sun Devils went on to win their first regional since 1987, posting a 196.625. At the NCAA Championships, the Sun Devils finished ninth. Ashley Kelly finished her successful career by achieving All-American status on the uneven bars. Freshman Nicole Harris was also named an All-American, collecting second-team accolades on the balance beam.

After an injury-plagued 2007 season, the Sun Devils look to spring back into the winning tradition of ASU. With a strong group of juniors to lead and an enthusiastic group of freshmen, the Sun Devils are sure to make the 2008 season a memorable one.



## President/Athletic Director



Michael Crow **ASU President** 

Michael Crow became the 16th president of Arizona State University on July 1, 2002. He is guiding the transformation of ASU into one of the nation's leading public metropolitan research universities, one that is directly engaged in the economic, social and cultural vitality of its region. Under his direction, the university pursues teaching, research and creative excellence focused on the major challenges and questions of our time, as well as those central to the building of a sustainable environment and economy for Arizona. He has committed the university to global engagement and to setting a new standard for public service.

Since he took office, ASU has marked a number

of important milestones, including the establishment of major interdisciplinary research initiatives such as the Biodesign Institute; the Global Institute for Sustainability; and MacroTechnology Works, a program integrating science and technology for large-scale applications that includes the Flexible Display Center, a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Army. Under his direction, ASU has initiated a dramatic research infrastructure expansion to create more than one-million square feet of new research space and has announced naming gifts endowing the Mary Lou Fulton College of Education, the W. P. Carey School of Business, the Ira A. Fulton School of Engineering and the Virginia G. Piper Center for Creative Writing.

Prior to joining ASU, Michael was executive vice provost of Columbia University, where he also was professor of science and technology policy in the School of International and Public Affairs, Michael oversaw Columbia's research enterprise, technology and innovation transfer operations, strategic initiative program and interdisciplinary program development. He played the lead role in the creation of the Columbia Earth Institute and helped found the Center for Science, Policy and Outcomes (CSPO) in Washington, D.C., a think tank dedicated to linking science and technology to desired social, economic and environmental outcomes. In 2003, CSPO was re-established at ASU as the Consortium for Science, Policy and Outcomes.



Lisa Love Vice President -**University Athletics** 

On Saturday, April 23, 2005, Arizona State University President Michael Crow selected Lisa Love of the University of Southern California to serve as the new Vice President for University Athletics. She began in that capacity July 1, 2005.

In June, prior to her ASU arrival, Love had planned to climb 14,162-foot Mount Shasta in northern California, adding yet another accomplishment to an already impressive personal resume. But the opportunity to assume the athletic director's chair at ASU postponed those plans, perhaps to another year. A trailblazer her entire career, Love is now poised for the most challenging and fulfilling climb of her professional life.

Love became ASU's 21st athletic director (17th full-time) after taking over for Christine Wilkinson, who is a senior vice president for the university and had been serving as interim athletic director since April 8. Former athletic director Gene Smith left the university April 8 for a similar post at The Ohio State University.

Love moved part-time into administration in 1991, then full-time after the 1998 season. She became a Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2002.

At USC she handled the day-to-day supervision of eight sports - including women's basketball, volleyball, tennis and men's and women's swimming and diving - and monitored all women's sports at the university. She was active in the department's strategic planning, gender equity, civil rights and NCAA certification issues and she served on the NCAA Management Council. She also served two stints (1992 - 1993 and 2001 - 2002) as vice president of the Pacific-10 Conference.

As a coach, Love was a master teacher at the pinnacle of her profession. She compiled an impressive 404-171 as a college head coach for 17 seasons at Texas Arlington (199-78 from 1982-88) and USC (205-93 from 1989-98). At USC, she led the Trojans to nine NCAA tournament berths and eight finishes in the national Top 15. She was selected as the Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year in 1997.

She was national Coach of the Year in 1988 when Arlington went 30-4 and fell one win shy of the Final Four.

A tremendous athlete as volleyball player in her own right, Love is also a member of the Texas Tech University and Texas Arlington athletic Halls of Fame. As a student-athlete, Love was a four-year volleyball starter and an all-region performer at Texas Tech. She earned a bachelor's degree (1978) in physical education from Texas Tech and a master's degree (1985) in education administration from the University of North Texas.

Love also compiled a 79-40 record as head coach at Bowie High School (1978-82) in Arlington, Texas.

Love also mentored some of the finest volleyball coaching talent in the nation. Among her proteges are head volleyball coaches at Texas (Jerritt Elliott), South Carolina (Nancy Somera), New Mexico (Kelley KcKee), Indiana (Katie Weismiller) and Idaho (Debbie Buchanan).

ASU President Michael Crow said Love brings qualities and experience that will carry ASU's Athletic Department to championships and excellence.

Love said her experience and President Crow's vision for the university will serve as her foundation as she steps into her new role at ASU.

Love plans to establish model programs at ASU by embracing the traditions of ASU and aggressively pursuing championships.

Community members and university representatives applauded the selection of Love as ASU's new Vice President of University Athletics.

At ASU, Love serves as the senior administrative officer of the university's athletic program and reports directly to Crow. The program features 12 women's and 10 men's sports, including men's and women's basketball, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, track/field and cross country; women's gymnastics, soccer, softball, volleyball, and water polo; baseball, football and wrestling.

Love is responsible for the management and development on one of the finest and most comprehensive athletic physical plants in the nation at ASU, playing host to nearly 1 million patrons each year. ASU's athletic staff includes more than 180 full and part-time coaches and administrative and support personnel who provide services to about 500 student-athletes.

Love has two sisters, Shannon Goddard and Debbi Dalton. Her parents are Tom and Jeanne Love of Arlington, Texas.






