2001 Volleyball Outlook

When you look at the 2001 Arizona State Volleyball team on paper, you are left thinking how this team is going to meet its expectations of advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the third year in a row.

How are they supposed to replace All-American outside hitter Amanda Burbridge and her 5.55 kills-per-game average?

How to you replace four seniors, three of which started?

How can you win with only one senior on a team that plays in talent laden Pacific-10 Conference?

But the expectations and demands of taking the Sun Devil volleyball program to the postseason for the third straight year is a goal the team carries to practice every day and one 12-year head coach **Patti Snyder-Park** views as realistic.

Forget about losing four seniors. Forget about the lack of older players. To erase any doubts or disbeliefs on the 2001 squad, all you need to do is walk into one of their preseason practices to see the determination, the dedication, the hustle and the scrappy play. The 2001 team is one without superstars and is ready to play shocker to the rest of the Pac-10. Picked to finish sixth in the conference, the Sun Devils are prepared to leave everything on the court in 2001 and make a third straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

"This is a team that isn't full of premier players, but from top to bottom we are going to out-hustle teams, play great defense and make other teams make errors," said Snyder-Park. "We are going to be versatile with a lot of players able to play different positions and I think we are going to have outstanding ball control... and that is what wins volleyball rally's. If you win a lot of rally's you are going to win a lot of games."

Added Snyder-Park on her 2001 squad, "we are happy we have had progress over the last two years, first making it back to the NCAA tournament in 1999 and then advancing in the tournament last year. But, it still leaves a bad taste in your mouth and leaves you hungrier knowing you had a team that could have achieved more. Even though we lost four seniors, we have gained a lot of experience and consistency. Our team is going to play extremely hard and leave everything out on the court. There is no doubt we will be a different team, but in my mind, we are much more defensive, have great ball control and are going to sneak up on some teams. We are going to force teams to play their very best in order to beat us. I don't think we are going to beat ourselves this year, and at times I really thought we would beat ourselves in some matches."

Leading the Sun Devils in 2001 will be lone senior Jami Coughlin. The senior outside hitter has been a mainstay on the court since her freshman year and will be ASU's go-to player this year. Coughlin is coming off a solid junior campaign in which she averaged 3.48 kills per

game and finished second in the Pac-10 with 4.00 digs per game.

"Jami is the rock and the glue of this team. She is such an outstanding leader by example, both on the court and in the classroom," said Snyder-Park on Coughlin. "I have never known a more determined, disciplined and consistent, humble person in my life. I've coached a lot of great athletes in my 12 years at ASU and Jami is right on the top of that list as far as the complete package goes. She is the perfect complement to have on this team and is a wonderful leader."

Possessing what Snyder-Park labels as the complete package with outstanding ball control, tenacious defense and a powerful swing, Coughlin will be asked to carry the team on her shoulders. As impressive as Burbridge's career statistics were (3rd in school history with 1,597 kills), Coughlin is actually ahead of her pace with 1,011 career kills entering her senior season. Burbridge reached 1,000 career kills in her first match of her senior season. Coughlin became only the 11th player in school history to reach 1,000 career kills and 1,000 career digs and is currently the Pac-10 active leader with 1,138 career digs.

Joining Coughlin as the other returning upperclassman is junior middle blocker **Julia Leddy**. While Coughlin and Leddy are the extent of the veteran leadership, a group of six talented sophomores make up the core of the team. Tabbed as the "Sensational Sophomores," setter **Cheryl Anglin**, middle blockers **Jodi Smith** and **Mandy Stephens**, outside hitter **Natalie Harris** and utility player **Kim Mehlhorn** all have a valuable year of experience in the Pac-10 and NCAA Tournament under their belt.

"Our freshman proved that they can play at a high level last year. The gained some awards and really lived up to the hype that they came in with. They were a good collection of young talent when they came out of high school and the four that came together from Valley Christian have a unique bond that is not teachable on the court. They all played together for several years before last year. We have an outstanding sophomore class with six of them who all had valuable time playing in the Pac-10 and in the NCAA Tournament last year."

New faces to the program in 2001 include transfers **Crystal Bluth** (OH, Auburn), **Fernanda Habiger** (S, Barton County CC) and **Brittany Ahlstrom** (OH/DS, Rick's College). Freshmen **Alicia Akporiaye** (OH/MB, Tucson, Ariz.) and **Melissa Stapley** (OH, Mesa, Ariz.) are highly-touted recruits who add a competitive fire and skill to the program.

With Snyder-Park entering her 13th season at the helm of the Sun Devils, she brings an added credential to the program when she became only the fourth coach in Pac-10 history to surpass 100 league wins. Snyder-Park possesses a career 191-153 (.555) record and has taken the Sun Devils to postseason play six times. Returning for his sixth season with the program and his first as associate head coach

is Scott Swanson. Former Sun Devil All-American outside hitter Christine Garner enters her second year as an assistant coach.

The Outside Hitters:


The Devils have plenty of talent and athleticism at the outside hitter position. While Coughlin provides leadership, power and proven success, **Natalie Harris** has tremendous athletic ability and will provide a true talent on the outside to complement Coughlin.

Said Snyder-Park on her outside hitters, "we are going to play Natalie Harris and Jami Coughlin at the outside hitter position with Jami playing the L1 position. Natalie will be able to learn a lot from Jami and has grown a lot in one year. Jami brings the complete package to the outside hitter position and is healthy after off-season shoulder surgery. Natalie has a lot of athletic ability and will be a premier player in the Pac-10 before her career is over."

Transfer Crystal Bluth (Auburn) brings a wealth of division I experience to the program and will be able to add depth behind Coughlin and Harris. Freshman Melissa Stapley is likely to spend a year in the program learning at the division I level, but has tons of athletic ability and a strong build that will prove valuable in the future. Freshman Alicia Akporiaye and sophomore Kim Mehlhorn are locked in a battle for the opposite hitter position, while defensive specialists Brittany Ahlstrom and Courtney Blocher have both played on the outside before and although small in size provide a powerful punch at the net.

In the Middle:

After having two middle blockers hit over .300 for the first time in school history (Julia Leddy and Michelle Mortensen) last year, things

are promising in the middle for ASU in 2001. With Leddy returning after hitting .328 and adding 2.86 kills per game last year, there is a returning veteran presence in the middle for the Devils.

With Leddy slated to start at one of the middle blocker positions, redshirt sophomore Jodi Smith has quickly inched up the depth chart to fill in the other position. Labeled by the coaching staff as the strongest and most athletic player on the team, Smith, ASU's only female two-sport athlete (also high jumps on the track team) has turned her raw ability on the court into a polished final product.

Redshirt sophomore Mandy Stephens, ASU's tallest player at 6-3, got stronger in the offseason and stepped in at times last year showing promising talents. Also in the mix at the middle blocker position will be utility player Mehlhorn and freshman Akporiaye.

On the Setter Position:

A year after setting the freshman and school record for assists in a season with 1,452, sophomore setter Cheryl Anglin is set to run the Sun Devil offense. Logging eight matches with over 60 assists last year, Anglin was named to the Pac-10 all-freshman team and has a top billing by her head coach heading into the 2001 season.

"Cheryl is coming off a great freshman season in which she was our most prolific setter in school history and she is coming in here in 2001 on a mission," said Snyder-Park. "She is our starting setter and really knows how to take control of this team out on the court. She knows how to run our offense from top to bottom and I have no doubt that she is one of the smartest setters in the nation."

Providing added depth and size to the setter position is junior college transfer Fernanda Habiger. At 5-11, the transfer from Barton County CC has not found a defined role entering the season as she is still learning the fast-paced ASU offense, but after averaging 14.07 assists and 1.30 kills per game last year at the junior college level, brings a very versatile game to the court for the Devils.


On Defense:

Coming off a year in which ASU led the Pac-10 with 18.89 digs per game, defense will be the cornerstone of ASU's multi-dimensional attack in 2001. Sophomore Courtney Blocher is coming off a solid freshman campaign in which she averaged 2.58 digs per game and is ASU's returning leading server with 0.24 aces per game. Junior Brittany Ahlstrom will also provide depth at the defensive specialist position, and Mehlhorn can also play DS in a utility role.

On the 2001 Schedule:

Once again, if the Sun Devils will make a run at their season goal of making a third straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, they will have to get past a tough schedule. The Devils will face seven teams in the USA Today/AVCA Top 25 poll, including non-conference opponents Santa Clara (#22), South Carolina (#23) and Loyola Marymount (#24) who ASU plays in three of its first five matches to open the season. The tough non-conference slate will precede a tough Pac-10 schedule, with USC, Arizona, UCLA and Stanford all ranked in the top 10.

"Just like the old adage, if you want to play your best, you have to play the best," said Snyder-Park on the 2001 schedule.



From the sunlit beauty of the campus, to the breathtaking landscapes that surround it, Arizona State University has one of the most awe-inspiring locations of any college on earth: The Valley of the Sun. In addition to its prestigious academic institutions, ASU is located in a cultural and recreational mecca. All who visit will be inspired by the exquisite architecture of campus buildings, including the Frank Lloyd Wright designed Grady Gammage Auditorium; they'll be rejuvenated by the electricity of downtown Mill Avenue; they'll be thrilled by multiple professional teams that perform in ASU's backyard. ASU offers not only an education, but an experience.





Academics

Arizona State University's approximately 500 student-athletes are guided through their academic careers by the Intercollegiate Athletic Department's Academic Services Office. Support services include "student-athlete centered" orientation programs, academic planning and organizing toward graduation, advising, registration, tutoring, study habits, study halls and use of the ICA computer site and laptop computers.

Associate Director of Athletics Sandy Hatfield Clubb oversees student and academic services. Academic Services are coordinated by a staff of managers and coordinators, dedicated to guiding and supporting student-athletes. That staff is divided into three areas designed to address the needs and identify resources to help student-athletes succeed in the classroom. A group of four staff members advise students, helping them identify majors, register for classes and progress toward graduation, including manager Mike McBride and coordinators Kari Sivesind, Gary Montoya and Todd Williamson. Another part of the staff is the first-year experience team which specializes in the transition needs of new students. The group, made of up manager Brian Richardson, and two coordinators including Kiersten Lockie and Marla Schmidt, helps student-athletes develop as students, teaching study skills such as test preparation, time management, note-taking and organization. They also address the area of learning disabilities and coordinate the tutorial program.

Nine volleyball student-athletes were 2001 Maroon and Gold Scholar-Athletes at the annual recognition event hosted by University President Lattie F. Coor. These student-athletes (out of 13 possible on the 2000 roster) earned a 3.0 or higher GPA in the previous fall or spring semesters or had a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. ASU honored 321 student-athletes representing all sports teams, including 54 with a perfect 4.0 semester GPA. Three volleyball student-athletes turned in a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring 2001 semester.

Jami Coughlin will be finishing her education degree this year, putting the finishing touches on what has been a stellar academic career. Coughlin was a 2000 Academic All-American and has a perfect 4.0 GPA in the classroom. Twice a year, graduates, their families and ASU faculty and staff are invited to celebrate at a special Athletic Department Graduation Luncheon. Former Sun Devil Amanda Burbridge (1997-2000) was also an Academic All-American last year and graduated with a degree in sociology in three and a half years. Burbridge, Coughlin and junior Julia Leddy were all named to the Pac-10 All-Academic Team last year.

In addition to the strong academic efforts of the 2000 team, the 1999 ASU volleyball team featured four players who were honored for their outstanding academic performances in the classroom. Amanda Burbridge and Jami Coughlin were first team selections to the Pac-10 all-academic team and departing senior Laura Hiberman was a second team pick. Robyn Mattingly was picked to the honorable mention team.

Coughlin received special recognition for her perfect 4.0 GPA in the classroom.

From the time a freshman student-athlete comes to the ASU campus, services are available to keep the student on a steady course of academic progress toward graduation. Freshman also participate with other student-athletes in UNI 194, the University's academic success course especially designed by ICA's Student Services Department to help student-athletes adjust to college.

All volleyball freshmen and transfer student-athletes are required to participate in a program called the Academic Gameplan which provides an opportunity for the student-athletes to maximize their time and develop good study habits. Coordinated by student services manager Mike McBride, the Academic Gameplan is an accountability program that places the responsibility for academic success upon the student-athletes themselves with the support of coaches and academic staff. It teaches study skills and involves daily study sessions attended by players and coaches. In the program, coaches also serve as academic coaches, monitoring the academic progress of their position players. ASU first implemented the Academic Gameplan in the middle of the spring semester 2000, and 26 of the 27 participants earned the highest semester GPA of their careers.

The ICA Building in Sun Devil Stadium houses the Academic and Student Services department. It also houses an academic computer lab which allows student-athletes to use word processing or spreadsheet software, complete academic assignments on the internet and use email. Student-athletes may check out laptop computers to use on campus, and coaches can check out laptops for student-athletes to use on road trips. Study hall rooms provide space for studying and working with tutors.


Throughout their academic careers, ASU football student-athletes consult with academic advisors in the athletic department and on campus. The strict academic and NCAA demands placed on a

student-athlete differ from all other students; therefore the athletics department staff maintains regular communication with student-athletes to assist them with course selection and plans or programs of study. They only work with student-athletes and are specialized in complying with the NCAA requirements placed on student-athletes.

A student-athlete needing additional help in a specific subject may request a tutor. Tutors assist student-athletes on an individual or group basis, as well as run mentor and study cluster groups throughout each semester. Grades and attendance are also closely monitored through an academic progress report filled out by classroom instructors two times per semester.

Success in the classroom provides the student-athletes with a number of opportunities. The Summer School Enrichment Program, which allows student-athletes to attend summer school on scholarship, helps student-athletes move toward our goal of graduation in a shorter period of time. Student-athletes who have not graduated after their last season and are eligible for a fifth year of aid can qualify for ASU's post-eligibility program, sponsored by the Board of Regents and the Sun Angel Foundation Endowment. This program provides the student-athletes with athletic scholarships to finish their degrees at ASU.

Throughout their academic careers, ASU student-athletes are expected to take responsibility for their education and developing their career goals. This includes realizing that dedication and self-discipline are as important in the classroom and their careers as on the playing field. Maintaining a positive attitude toward academics and the privilege of being an ASU student-athlete is emphasized, as well as developing the desire to succeed semester after semester. ASU recruits student-athletes with academic and athletic goals and the personal discipline to achieve them in the "student-athlete centered" environment of ASU Athletics.

Patti Snyder-Park



Patti Snyder-Park begins her 13th season as Arizona State's head volleyball coach in 2001 coming off six NCAA tournament appearances in the last nine years. She has guided the Sun Devils to post-season competition in seven of her 12 seasons at the helm, and has posted a winning record in eight of the last 11 seasons.

In 2000 the Sun Devils finished with an 18-12 record and advanced to the NCAA tournament in Minneapolis, Minn., for the second straight year. The Sun Devils lost four seniors off the 2000 team, but return three starters and a total of eight letter-winners for the 2001 campaign.

The Sun Devils also earned kudos in the classroom last year under Snyder-Park, landing Amanda Burbridge and Coughlin on the Academic All-American team.

Snyder-Park's hard work and dedication have earned her a place among the nation's most respected collegiate coaches. She has a career 191-153 record in her 12 seasons and recently became only the fifth coach in Pac-10 history to record 100 or more league wins.

Her 1992 squad ended a four-year NCAA tournament drought by posting a 23-8 record and finishing fourth in the Pac-10 with an 11-7 conference ledger. The Sun Devils topped New Mexico in the first round of the NCAA tournament before falling to UCLA in the second round, marking the school's furthest NCAA advancement since 1986. Snyder-Park was recognized by the Pac-10 for her role in the team's success, garnering conference Coach of the Year honors for the



second time in three seasons.

Snyder-Park's previous Coach of the Year honor came in 1990, her second season, when Arizona State posted a 19-16 record in route to a fifth-place finish in the Pac-10. The Devils

were one of only three Pac-10 teams to reach post-season play. Despite a series of crippling injuries, the Sun Devils made their debut at the Women's Invitational Volleyball Championship (WIVC).

Recruiting has been paramount in Snyder-Park's success. Most of her recruiting classes have been ranked among the best in the country, raising the stature of Sun Devil volleyball on the national level, and contributing to increased expectations. 2000 was no exception as Snyder-Park landed a highly acclaimed class of four freshman that all hail from local volleyball powerhouse Chandler Valley Christian. Her 2001 class includes three standout transfers and three freshmen.

Prior to her tenure at ASU, Coach Snyder-Park spent five seasons as head assistant coach at the University of California, where she helped the Golden Bears to a pair of NCAA Championship appearances. Cal posted a 19-15 mark in 1988, following an 18-15 campaign in 1987.

For the past 16 years, Snyder-Park has

served as associate director of the National Volleyball Festival in Davis, Calif., the world's largest junior tournament.

She began her coaching career in 1982, serving as an assistant coach at Portland State University for one season. The following year (1983-84), Snyder-Park was the head coach at Tigard (Ore.) High School and taught physical education, health and English as a Second Language (ESL) before moving on to California.

During her illustrious playing career, Snyder-Park garnered all-region accolades three times and led Portland State to four post-season appearances. The Vikings finished second at the 1981 AIAW Championship. She also played softball at PSU and was a member of the AIAW fourth-place team in 1980.

In addition, she played professionally for the New York Liberties of Major League Volleyball (MLV) in 1988 and coached the Liberties the following season.

Snyder-Park returns as a member of the West Region team selection committee as she took a leave of absence after having her third child last January. She is also an AVCA top-25 poll member for the past seven years.

Snyder-Park and husband John Park have two daughters, Sydney Charlysse (7 yrs.) and Sophia Rae (8 months) and one son, Samuel Lysle Jackson (5 yrs.).

Assistant Coaches

Scott Swanson begins his sixth year as an assistant coach on Patti Snyder-Park's staff, and his first as the associate head coach. Swanson is primarily responsible for teaching the technical aspects of the game, as well as coordinating all of the recruiting aspects for Sun Devil volleyball.

Swanson was the head coach of Arizona East Valley Jrs. volleyball club. His 16-1's played for a National Championship and took second among the top 32 in the nation, which is the best finish by an Arizona club team ever. He coached 18-1's for the East Valley Juniors. He was named 1995 Cactus Region Male Coach of the Year. He played for and captained the Arizona State men's volleyball team for four years. Swanson coached the ASU men's volleyball team in 1995 and assisted with the team in 1996. As a club coach over the past few years, Swanson coached Cheryl Anglin, Courtney Blocher, Kim Mehlhorn and Natalie Harris when they were juniors at the club level. Currently Swanson is coaching a USA Volleyball High Performance Team in Arizona. The team will compete at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

A graduate of Mountain View High School in 1991, Swanson has





also had coaching stints at Mountain View and Camelback High Schools.

Swanson is a 1997 graduate from Arizona State with a degree in Family Studies.

"Scott has a complete knowledge of the game," said head coach Patti Snyder-Park, "and has an outstanding work ethic. He is a true-blue Sun Devil and will do everything we ask and more to keep us in the top echelon of college volleyball."

A native of Mesa, Swanson is single and resides in Mesa.



Christine Garner begins her second season as an assistant coach and her sixth season with the Sun Devil volleyball program. Garner will help with all aspects of the volleyball program, including recruiting and skill development. In her first year with ASU as a coach, Garner helped facilitate the record-breaking year of Amanda Burbridge in 2000.

Although only in her first year as a coach on the Sun Devil staff, Garner is no stranger to the Maroon and Gold of the ASU volleyball program. A standout for the Sun Devils from 1992-95, Garner still ranks No. 1 in the record books with 1,871 career kills, and led ASU volleyball to its two finest seasons in history. Her 1,871 career kills still ranks third in Pac-10 volleyball history. As one of the most illustrious players to ever take to the court for the Sun Devil volleyball program, Garner also ranks in the top 10 in career digs and service aces. She was a six-time Pac-10 Player of the Week and was also a recipient of a National Player of the Week honor. In addition to her numerous accolades at ASU, Garner was a two-time All-American and an all-Pac-10 performer. To cap off her stellar athletic career as a Sun Devil, Garner was also a star performer on the ASU softball team and captained the women's basketball squad.


After her ASU career ended in 1995, Garner played recurrently with

the U.S. National Team in tournaments including the 1995 Goodwill Games, 1997 Grand Prix and 1997 NORCECA tournament. While competing as a starter with the U.S. National team in the '95 Goodwill Games in St. Petersburg, Russia, Garner helped lead the Red, White and Blue to a silver medal. She left the national team in 1997 and played two seasons with the European Professional Volleyball League in Turkey and Italy.

Garner returns to Tempe after coaching last year at the University of Toledo. She has also been a successful coach at the club level with Glass City Club in Toledo and Arizona East Valley Juniors. Garner completed her bachelors of fine arts degree in 1997 from ASU. Garner is a native of Tustin, Calif.



Garner was on All-American at ASU (1992-95) and is the career leader in kills.

Entering the 2001-02 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions." Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 59 NCAA team titles over the past seven seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 59 team titles over the past seven seasons have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has now led the nation in NCAA Championships 36 of the last 41 years and finished second four times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 311 NCAA titles (238 men's, 73 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 185 titles.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual Sears Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run in the 2000-01 season, winning its seventh consecutive Sears Directors' Cup. In the 2000-01 final standings, five of the Top 10, and seven of the top 14 Division I programs, were Pac-10 members: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 2 UCLA, No. 4 ARIZONA, No. 8 USC, No. 9 ARIZONA STATE, No. 12 CALIFORNIA and No. 14 WASHINGTON.


The league led the nation in national championships once again with eight in 2000-01 and also laid claim to 39 individual titles. Five different Pac-10 members won at least one NCAA Championship, with UCLA leading the nation with four. NCAA team champions from the Pac-10 in 2000-01 came from ARIZONA (softball), STANFORD (women's tennis), UCLA (women's gymnastics, women's indoor track and field, men's water polo, women's water polo), USC (women's outdoor track and field) and WASHINGTON (women's rowing).

The Pac-10 also had runners-up in nine NCAA Championship events - ARIZONA in men's basketball, STANFORD in men's and women's swimming and diving, women's water polo and baseball, while UCLA finished second in women's outdoor track, women's soccer, softball and men's volleyball. Overall, the Conference had 25 teams finish in the top three at NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-10 in 2000-01. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Pac-10, 17 witnessed at least half its teams participating in the postseason. The men sent 59 of a possible 86 teams into the postseason (68.6 percent), while the women sent 72 of a possible 97 teams into NCAA Tournament action (74.2 percent). The Conference continued to enjoy success in softball as seven teams made it to the NCAA Regional Tournament, marking the third consecutive season the Pac-10 has sent at least seven teams to regionals. ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA, STANFORD and UCLA made it to the Women's College Series where the Wildcats and Bruins battled for the national title, the eighth time Conference teams have faced each other in the championship game, and the 18th time in 20 years the Pac-10 has sent at least one team to the title game. During the season, the Conference also added to its women's track and field history. In the indoor portion, UCLA took home its second consec-

utive NCAA title, while in the outdoor season, USC garnered its first ever outdoor track and field crown. The Trojans were followed by UCLA in second, and ARIZONA in third to round out a 1-2-3 finish.

In football, the Pac-10 had one of its best seasons in 2000-01, with five teams receiving bowl bids, including two New Year's Day games. WASHINGTON, OREGON STATE and OREGON all finished in the Top 10 in the final polls, the first time the Conference accomplished that feat since 1984. The Huskies and Beavers had resounding victories in the Rose Bowl Presented by AT&T and Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, respectively, while the Ducks ended their season on a high note as well, claiming victory in the Culligan Holiday Bowl. The Pac-10 also showed its worth on the basketball court, sending five teams to the NCAA Tournament. ARIZONA, STANFORD, UCLA and USC made it to the 'Sweet Sixteen' with the



Wildcats getting all the way to the national championship game.

For its outstanding efforts in football and men's basketball in 2000-01, the Pac-10 became just the second conference in history to have three teams ranked in the Top 10 in the final Associated Press Football Poll and three teams reach the 'Elite Eight' of the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament in the same season. The Southeastern Conference accomplished the same feat in 1986.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 238 NCAA Team Championships, far ahead of the the 177 claimed by the runner-up Big Ten. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-10 - 15 basketball titles by five schools (more than any other conference), 47 tennis titles, 45 outdoor track and field crowns, and 24 baseball titles. Pac-10 members have won 23 of the last 32 NCAA titles in volleyball, 27 of the last 42 in water polo, and 20 total swimming and diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions as well, claiming 1041 NCAA individual crowns. In fact, three of the top five schools nationally in producing men's NCAA individual titlists are from the Pac-10 - No. 1 USC (280), No. 3 STANFORD (217) and No. 5 UCLA (160).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 20 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 12 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 73 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 50. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 14 softball titles, 13 tennis crowns, six of the last 11 volleyball titles and nine of the last 12 trophies in golf and eight of the last 13 in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, capturing an unmatched 367 NCAA individual titles, an average of nearly 19 champions per season. The Pac-10 is home to three of the top seven schools in the country in terms of women's NCAA individual titlists - No. 1 STANFORD (143), No. 5 UCLA (62) and No. 7 ARIZONA (49).

The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference go back nearly 86 years to December 15, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. Original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916. One year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University), was accepted into the Conference, and Stanford University joined in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California and the University of Idaho. Montana joined the Conference in 1924, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-team league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45, when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and a new Conference was formed - the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Original AAUW membership consisted of California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State became a member in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. In 1968, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports.

Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two other women's sports. Edwin N. Atherton was named the Conference's first Commissioner in 1940. He has been succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt (1944), Thomas J. Hamilton (1959), Wiles Hallock (1971), and current Commissioner Thomas C. Hansen in 1983.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.





ASU History



Arizona State University's women's volleyball program enters its 29th campaign in 2001 with the accomplishments that have taken other programs many decades to achieve success and respect on the national level.

The Sun Devils initiated the program in fine style in 1973, when they captured the first-ever Intermountain Conference championship. ASU finished the season ranked 15th nationally under the guidance of head coach Mary Littlewood. At that time, Littlewood also handled head softball and basketball coaching duties. The following season saw the Sun Devils finish second in the conference en route to another top 20 national ranking (19th) in the final AIAW poll.

Throughout the 1970s, Arizona State played solid, fundamental volleyball and finished among the upper division in the Intermountain Conference on a regular basis.

Joanie Smith was ASU's first volleyball star, as she garnered all-conference honors in 1976. The likes of Nancy Corea, Sheri Lobb and Donna Stuhr further helped ASU establish itself on the national scene during the '70s.


Dale Flickinger, ASU's second volleyball coach (1979-82), elevated the program and developed it into one of the nation's up-and-coming programs. The 1979 season also marked the debut of a new conference for the Sun Devils — the Western Collegiate Athletic Association (WCAA).

The 1980 campaign saw the entrance of Lisa Stuck and Terri Edison, and the tandem helped ASU to its initial 20-win season (24-17). Stuck became Arizona State's first all-America performer due to her explosive and powerful offensive skills. She ranks among the career kill and service ace leaders, and still owns the school mark for most kills in a match (35).

Edison proved key towards ASU's blocking success, as her 6-3 frame allowed her to alter opponents' shots, and led the team in blocks during three different seasons.

The Debbie Brown Era (1983-88) allowed the Sun Devils to move into the nation's top 10 and produce such All-Americans as Tammy Webb, Regina Stahl and Christy Nore.

Brown, a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic

team and assistant coach on the '88 U.S. Olympic squad, made stellar defensive skills commonplace in the Sun Devil program.

Excellence in the setter position has been synonymous with ASU volleyball for most of the program's life. Joan Oakley began the trend of solid passing technique and earned all-conference accolades as a freshman in 1978. Heather Forbes then followed Oakley as the Sun Devils' playmaker.

Regina Stahl ranks among the nation's career assist leaders (5,180) and guided the Sun Devils to three NCAA berths and eventually received All-America honors in 1986. Stahl's replacement, Noelle Fridrich, continued the strong setting tradition at Arizona State to close out the 1980s. Jennifer Helfrich continued the tradition into the 90s. Sun Devil Tiffannie Johnson-Gates closed out her career by entering the ASU record books ranked fourth in career assists (2,698).

Offensively, the names of Christine Garner, Webb, Nore, Valentina Vega, Amanda Burbridge,

Tracey Barberie and Mindy Gowell (now Mindy Rich) are found throughout the record section. A valuable member on the '88, '92 and '96 U.S. Olympic teams, Webb, now Tammy Liley, was one of the most dominating figures on the collegiate scene. Her strength, leaping ability and general knowledge of the game allows her to remain a vital cog of the U.S. National team.

Nore was perhaps the top 'athlete' to play volleyball at ASU, as quickness, power and precise passing made her a feared opponent. She led the country in digs and ranked among the top 20 in kills in 1988, while tallying nearly 1,600 kills and digs during her tenure.

Labeled as one of Arizona State's first prized recruits, Vega finished her career with more than 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs, while playing in three NCAAAs. Like Vega, Barberie provided the Sun Devils with a solid offensive and defensive threat throughout her four-year career. The outside hitter/middle blocker registered 1,032 kills and 1,104 digs, one of only seven players to surpass the 1,000 mark in both categories.

Players like Sue Nord, Tammy Motyka and Suzy Boggess also proved instrumental towards Arizona State's success during the 1980s. During that decade, the Sun Devils averaged better than 20 victories per season and qualified for the NCAAAs seven times in nine tries.

During the 1990's, Christine Garner set herself apart by becoming ASU's all-time kills leader, pounding out an incredible 1,871 kills in her four years. Garner also notched over 1,000 digs and 100 service aces during her career. For her accomplishments, she was named a second-team AVCA All-America in '95. Garner also won a silver medal at the 1994 Goodwill Games.

Amanda Burbridge (1997-2000) is the latest in the line of great Sun Devil volleyball players. Burbridge set the single-season record for kills with 599 in 2000 and was a second-team AVCA All-American. She finished her career with 1,597 career kills, ranking third in ASU history. In addition to being a second-team All-American in 2000, Burbridge was a two-time All-Pac-10 selection and was the AVCA National Player of the Week in 2000 after setting the school single-match record for kills (39) vs. Washington.

Patti Snyder-Park inherited a quality program in 1989, and has taken the Sun Devils even higher in her first 10 seasons at the helm. Snyder-Park, the Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year in 1990 and Coach of the Year in '92, has been instrumental in elevating Arizona State volleyball to an elite level, thanks in large part to her great recruiting classes. She is confident that appearances at the NCAA Championships will continue to be commonplace as this talented group of student-athletes grows and matures together.







A transformation of Arizona State University has taken place under the leadership of Dr. Lattie F. Coor, who became the university's 15th president on January 1, 1990. The university has grown to serve the Valley through multiple campuses and the College of Extended Education, an architecture that positions ASU to meet future enrollment growth.

The quality of undergraduate students and programs has improved substantially over the past decade. In 2001, ASU had its best year in history in prestigious national scholarship competitions. Students brought home the Rhodes, Truman, Marshall, Goldwater and Udall awards, making ASU one of only two public universities in the nation to be represented in all five top scholarship awards. Enrollment in ASU's Barrett Honors College has more than tripled since 1988, from 800 to more than 2,600 students majoring in all disciplines throughout the university.

Coor's strong commitment to increased diversity is reflected in ASU's faculty and student body. During the last decade the university's minority enrollment has more than doubled. This fall, minorities represent 30 percent of the university's freshman class and nearly 20 percent of the entire enrollment.

With regard to ASU faculty, the percentage of minorities has increased to 15.3 percent - up from 10.3 percent five years ago. ASU has the highest numbers and highest proportion of Hispanic faculty of any major research university in the U.S.

Over the past decade, ASU has become one of the leading research universities in America. ASU has devel-

oped nationally-recognized programs in a number of fields, including accounting; design science; ecology and evolutionary biology; electron microscopy; exercise science; music; nanotechnology; psychology; solid state science; and engineering. As part of Coor's vision for the economic vitality of the state of Arizona, ASU is committing to a strategic focus on four critical research areas that are essential in the New Economy. The four areas are Materials; Biomedicine and Biotechnology; Information Science and Technology; and Manufacturing. These initiatives already have a significant impact on the economy in Arizona, representing more than 207,000 jobs, 2,000 businesses, and \$1.5 billion in exports in the 1st quarter of 2000.

Part of Coor's legacy to the university as he enters his final year before retiring at the end of the 2002 academic year is a successful fundraising campaign. Through private donations, primarily from the local community, \$500 million in private donations are being invested in targeted areas that most significantly impact the future of ASU. Among the campaign's achievements are the naming and endowing of the Barrett Honors College, the Katherine K. Herberger College of Fine Arts, and the Morrison School of Agribusiness and Resource Management at ASU East; the creation of many new endowed faculty positions and hundreds of new scholarships and fellowships.

Coor served 14 years as president of the University of Vermont (UVM) before he succeeded J. Russell Nelson at the helm of ASU, the nation's sixth largest university.

An Arizona native, Coor is a graduate of Northern Arizona University, and he is the son of a member of the 1928 Arizona State College Bulldog football team. Coor's mother, also an ASU graduate, has never missed an ASU home football game. Coor has said that the ASU presidency allows him to combine his greatest loves in life:

Arizona and education. Both his parents were educators, so he grew up valuing education, and he has been on college campuses since he arrived at what was then Arizona State College in Flagstaff in 1954 as a Phelps Dodge Scholar. He has never lost his love of Arizona. He visited his parents here regularly after leaving the state in 1958 to get his master's and doctoral degrees at Washington University in St. Louis. Coor joined the political science faculty at Washington University after earning his doctorate in 1964. He had already become involved in university administration as assistant to the chancellor in 1963. In 1969, Coor was named vice chancellor of Washington University, a post he held until going to UVM in 1976, where, at age 39, he became one of the youngest university presidents in the country.

He was a charter member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Presidents Commission and served as chairman of Division I. He is a strong supporter of quality athletic programs as a part of campus life. Coor was instrumental in the battle to approve NCAA Proposition 30, which shortened basketball seasons and football spring training sessions in order to give student-athletes more time to pursue their degrees



and was elevated to the position permanently on June 25, 1986.

While at Eastern Michigan, Smith guided EMU to unprecedented athletic success. In 1987-88, Eastern won its first Mid-American Conference football and basketball championships, while also winning the California Bowl in football and making its initial appearance in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Twice during his tenure as athletic director, Eastern Michigan won the Reese Trophy, emblematic of the MAC men's all-sports championship.

Under his direction, Eastern Michigan made great strides in facility improvements. New football, basketball, and administrative offices were built with other coaches' offices renovated at that time. Smith oversaw major renovations at Rynearson Football Stadium.

Smith earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Notre Dame in 1977. He earned three varsity football letters as a defensive end at Notre Dame and was a member of the Associated Press 1973 national championship team.

Smith also served as an assistant football coach at Notre Dame from 1977-81, helping the squad to its 1977 undisputed national championship. He then spent two years as a marketing representative for IBM prior to joining the Eastern Michigan staff in April 1983.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Smith earned eight letters in football, basketball and track while attending Chanel High School and was the football squad's MVP as a senior. Smith, who was born Dec. 18, 1955, has three daughters: Nicole (23), Lindsey (19) and Summer (18). Smith's wife, Sheila, is the President of the Mercy Foundation in Des Moines. He serves on the boards of R&R Investors and the Iowa Games.

SUN ANGEL FOUNDATION

The Sun Angel Foundation is a support group that has served Arizona State University since 1947. It was officially incorporated as a non-profit agency for the purpose of promoting Sun Devil athletic programs and recently came under the direction of Arizona State's intercollegiate athletics department.

Gene Smith

Gene Smith was appointed as Arizona State University's 18th director of athletics on July 27, 2000. Smith arrived at ASU as no stranger to collegiate athletics, serving as athletics director at Iowa State University for seven years prior to coming to ASU. Smith was also previously the athletics director at Eastern Michigan University (1986-93).

Smith engineered unprecedented financial and competitive performance that propelled the Cyclone athletic department to the forefront

of the Big 12 Conference and diligently prepared it for the 21st century. Promising to make Iowa State "one of the premier athletic programs in the nation," Gene Smith began his tenure as Iowa State's 12th athletic director on July 1, 1993. Smith is a past president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) who oversaw an athletic department transformation during his tenure in Ames. The construction of new facilities, record-breaking fund raising, exemplary athletic-academic achievement and the recruitment of staff whose performance has affirmed his choices underscore Smith's legacy at Iowa State. ISU's student-athletes were community leaders, participating in a variety of local and national initiatives that demonstrate the athletics cative outreach under Smith's leadership. of his accomplishments as the AD at Iowa


State, Smith conceptualized and in 1997 dedicated the \$6.1 million three-story football press tower at Jack Trice Stadium with skybox suites. Smith also completed fund raising and oversaw construction of the \$2.3 million Johnny Majors Football Practice Facility, which features two natural grass and one artificial practice field on the west side of Jack Trice Stadium. He created and helped lead a marketing unit that annually generated \$1 million in corporate commitments to Iowa State athletics, funding state-of-the-art improvements to Jack Trice Stadium and addressing other departmental needs. ISU's marketing promotion of the Cyclones' nationally ranked women's basketball program produced record crowds during the regular season with crowds in excess of 10,000 becoming the rule for women's basketball at Hilton Coliseum.

Smith's strong reputation among his peers was affirmed in June 1994 when the Notre Dame graduate was named president of NACDA. In 1991, Smith was appointed to a four-year term on NACDA's 32-member executive committee. In 1992, he was elected third vice president of the organization and was named to the Division I-A Executive Committee. He was elected first vice president of NACDA in 1993. Smith also served on the NCAA President's Commission Liaison Committee. A member of the NCAA Executive Committee, he was named to the NCAA's Management Council in May of 1996. Smith was named to the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee in February 1999 and currently serves on the NCAA Working Committee to Study Basketball Issues.

Prior to his arrival at Iowa State, Smith served as athletic director at Eastern Michigan University for seven years. Smith joined the EMU staff in 1983 as assistant athletic director for non-revenue sports. He was named interim executive athletic director in 1985
