# YOUNG DEFENSE STANDS OUT DESPITE SUN DEVIL LOSS IN SEASON OPENER

The No. 15/16 Arizona State University football team was held to 291 total yards of offense as the team dropped the season opener, 38-17, to Texas A&M on Saturday in the AdvoCare Texas Kickoff in Houston, Texas.

The Aggies sacked Mike Bercovici nine times in the contest, keeping the senior quarterback from getting into a rhythm as he finished 24-for-38 on the day for 186 yards and a touchdown.

Demario Richard rushed
16 times for 73 yards while
Bercovici added the first rushing
touchdown of his career. D.J.
Foster also extended his

active FBS-leading streak of consecutive games with a pass reception, which now stands at 41 – every game he has played as a Sun Devil.

Armand Perry led all players with a career-high 11 tackles and Christian Sam had a career-best 10 tackles in the game. The Sun Devil defense had eight tackles for a loss in the game and forced three turnovers in a gritty effort.

The final score isn't necessarily an indictment of how well ASU's defense played as that side of the ball made numerous plays throughout the game to keep the Sun Devils alive. The defense showed such resolve following Richard's fumble inside his own

10-yard line as it held firm with a goal line stand to hold the Aggies to a field goal with 5:19 left in the third quarter and a manageable 17-7 deficit.

A&M's Kyle Allen finished 15-for-26 for 198 yards and two touchdowns with an interception, but it was his final pass of a the game – a 66-yard catch-and-run by Christian Kirk that would put the game away.

# BIG FOURTH QUARTER CARRIES SUN DEVILS OVER MUSTANGS

The Arizona State football team scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to emphasize its 35-21 home-opening win against Cal Poly Mustangs on Saturday at Sun Devil Stadium.

Arizona State took a 14-0 lead less than two minutes into the second quarter and quarterback Mike Bercovici tossed a pair of touchdowns in the final frame to push the Devils to a 14-point victory in front of the Double Inferno and reinvented Sun Devil Stadium.

Sophomore tailback Demario Richard tallied a career-high 121 rushing yards on 25 carries and scored a pair of touchdown to pace the Sun Devils' 531 yards of total offense. Senior wide receiver D.J. Foster finished with 134 all-purpose yards, including 76 rushing and 58 receiving, and added a 14-yard touchdown catch in the opening quarter.

The Sun Devils defense held Cal Poly scoreless in the first and fourth quarters as four linebackers notched double-digit tackles, including sophomore linebacker Christian Sam, who co-led the Devils in tackles for the second consecutive game with 12 and added a team-high two sacks.

Redshirt senior safety Jordan Simone also added 12 solo tackles, including three of them for a loss, and redshirt junior Laiu Moeakiola set career highs with 11 tackles and three tackles for loss, respectively.

Bercovici spread the wealth among his receivers as he completed 23 of 35 passes for 283 yards and three touchdowns. ASU's aerial attack involved four Sun Devils with three or more catches, including seven by first-year Sun Devil Devin Lucien and six from Foster.

### RICHARD'S CAREER NIGHT LEADS SUN DEVILS OVER LOBOS

The Arizona State football team's 385 yards of offense paved the way for a 31-10 win over the New Mexico Lobos at Sun Devil Stadium's first White Out game on Saturday night.

Arizona State sophomore tailback Demario Richard had a record-breaking performance, as he was responsible for two touchdowns and 255 all-purpose yards. His 151 yards receiving set a school record for a running back and included a fourth-quarter catch he took 93 yards to the end zone, tying the third-longest pass school history.

Richard became just the fourth FBS player since 1996 to eclipse 150 receiving and

100 rushing yards in a game and is just the second player in Pac-12 history to do so.

Redshirt senior quarterback Mike Bercovici completed 22 of 37 passes for 317 yards and three touchdowns, and also scrambled for an eight-yard score with more than five minutes remaining in the third quarter. Wide receivers Devin Lucien, Tim White, and D.J. Foster, as well as Richard, each caught four balls to contribute to ASU's attack.

The three TD passes came in a stretch when Bercovici completed 17 of 19 for 271 yards. Arizona State (2-1) beat New Mexico (1-2) for the 19th time

in a row. New Mexico's last win in the series was in 1947. The Lobos won in Tempe once, in 1934. A year ago, the Sun Devils won in Albuquerque 58-23, the teams' first meeting since 1976.

Redshirt senior safety Jordan Simone and redshirt junior linebacker Salamo Fiso led ASU's defense as they each recorded 10 tackles in an effort that held the Lobos scoreless in the first half. Simone also snagged an end-zone interception in the fourth quarter.

### **COSTLY FUMBLES UNDO SUN DEVILS IN PAC-12 OPENER AS FOSTER REACHES MILESTONE**

The Arizona State football team was bested by the No. 19 USC Trojans, 42-14, on Saturday night at Sun Devil Stadium in Arizona State's Pac-12 opener and fourth annual Maroon Monsoon game.

ASU gained 454 yards of total offense, sophomore running back Demario Richard notched his third consecutive 100-vard rushing game and senior wide receiver D. J. Foster became just the fourth player in NCAA history to reach 2,000-plus career rushing and receiving yards, but costly mistakes put the Devils in an early deficit they were unable to overcome. A back-and-forth opening five minutes set the tone

for a tumultuous first half for ASU that included three fumbles, an interception and two missed field goals.

USC opened the game with a 52-yard reception from guarterback Cody Kessler to wide receiver JuJu Smith-Schuster, but freshman safety Kareem Orr intercepted Kessler on the 2-vard line to stall the Trojans' attack.

The Sun Devils defense held USC to just seven points in the second half, including a scoreless third quarter, and kept the Trojans to just 80 yards rushing for the game. Redshirt senior safety Jordan Simone co-led ASU in tackles with eight

along redshirt junior linebacker Salamo Fiso, who had four of his tackles for loss, and a pair of freshmen each recorded turnovers as defensive end lo lo Wicker notched a sack and forced fumble, and Orr made his first career interception in his second career start.

### SUN DEVILS BOUNCE BACK, UPSET NO. 7 UCLA AT THE ROSE BOWL

The Arizona State University football team held the No. 7 UCLA Bruins to a season low 342 total yards of offense, squashing an attempt at a late rally in a 38-23 victory on the road at the Rose Bowl on Saturday evening in Pasadena.

Mike Bercovici threw for two touchdowns and rushed for another while the ASU defense logged two safeties in an allaround effort that helped the Sun Devils defeat a top-10 team on the road for the first time since defeating No. 6 Oregon in 2002.

The defense added an interception by Laiu Moeakiola while forcing the Bruins to eight three-and-outs in

the contest, despite averaging just over 4.0 per game and the Bruins coming in having eight total all season.

That defense limited Heisman candidate Paul Perkins to just 63 total rushing yards after he entered the game averaging 128.5 yards per game. The Bruins (4-1, 1-1 Pac-12), as team, finished with a season low 62 total rushing yards despite being ranked 22nd nationally at 236.0 yards per game on the ground. It was the second consecutive game ASU (3-2, 1-1 Pac-12) has held an opponent under 100 rushing yards.

UCLA freshman quarterback Josh Rosen was 22-for-40 with two touchdowns and an interception.

Demario Richard had his fourth game with over 100 all-purpose yards, leading the team with 23 rushes for 79 yards while adding 55 receiving yards on a career-high eight receptions.

Bercovici finished 27-for-44 with two touchdowns and an interception while rushing for a career high 37 yards and a touchdown. D.J. Foster was on the receiving end of one of those touchdowns in a game where he set the school record for consecutive games with a reception at 45 while moving into second all-time in career receptions with 189.

### SUN DEVILS ROUT BUFFALOES, WIN SECOND STRAIGHT

The Arizona State football team tallied 491 yards of total offense and 12 tackles for loss as they defeated Pac-12 South Division opponent Colorado Buffaloes 48-23 in the fifth annual Black Out Game at Sun Devil Stadium on Saturday night.

Arizona State (4-2, 2-1) scored 14 points off turnovers as the defense secured two takeaways and eight sacks against the Buffaloes (3-3, 0-2). Redshirt senior devil backer Antonio Longino led the way with a season-high 2.5 sacks and eight tackles, including 4.5 for loss, and redshirt junior linebacker Salamo Fiso added six solo tackles to bring his career total to 204.

The Sun Devils' defense entered the game aggressively

as redshirt senior defensive lineman Demetrius Cherry and Longino sacked Colorado quarterback Sefo Liufau for a three-yard loss on first play from scrimmage, and they didn't let up for all four quarters as they held their third consecutive Pac-12 opponent to less than 100 yards rushing.

On the offensive side, redshirt junior wide receiver Tim White logged a career-best 144 yards on seven catches and two touchdowns, including a 38-yard pass during ASU's opening possession that set up the first touchdown of the game. Redshirt senior quarterback Mike Bercovici completed 20-of-31 pass attempts for 260 yards, five touchdowns and one

interception, and also added a season-high 40 rushing yards. His five touchdown tosses matched his career record, first accomplished against USC in 2014. His performance against CU also put him over the benchmark of 3,000-yards passing.

Senior wide receiver D.J.
Foster led the ground attack with 80 yards rushing on five attempts, including a 63-yard run in the fourth quarter to set himself up for a 12-yard touchdown catch three plays later. Sophomore running back Kalen Ballage also added 45 rushing yards on 15 carries, and fellow sophomore tailback Demario Richard's 21 yards on the ground pushed him past the 1,000-yard mark for his career.

# SPECIAL TEAMS SHINE, BUT SUN DEVILS DROP HARD-FOUGHT CONTEST AT UTAH

The Arizona State University football team put up a gritty effort on the road against a top-five opponent but came up short in a 34-18 loss to No. 4 Utah on Saturday in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The ASU special teams accounted for all 18 of ASU's points on a night where the offense managed just 236 total yards. This came despite the defense holding Utah offense under 300 yards until its final game-clinching drive with under two minutes remaining in the game.

The Sun Devils held Heisman candidate Devontae Booker largely in check for about 58

minutes prior to his 62-yard touchdown to seal the game with 1:11 remaining. All told, the ASU defense had 13 tackles for loss in the contest against a Utah team that had only allowed 5.0 per game entering the evening. ASU had five sacks as well despite Utah having given up just two all season coming in to tonight.

Tim White had another stellar game, returning a kick for a touchdown and finishing with 194 all-purpose yards while Devin Lucien had the best game of his career with 118 receiving yards.

ASU was unable to overcome a catastrophic fourth quarter, however, where it

was outscored 20-0 after entering the frame with an 18-14 advantage.

Jordan Simone finished with 12 tackles and a career-best two sacks in the game to lead the team and Salamo Fiso continued to be a force with nine tackles and a team-leading three tackles for loss.

# SUN DEVILS COME UP SHORT IN TRIPLE OVERTIME THRILLER AT HOME

Sun Devil Football dominated the offensive stat column with 742 total yards, 37 first downs and 108 total plays, yet came up short in the end as they lost in triple overtime to the Oregon Ducks, 61-55, Thursday night at Sun Devil Stadium.

Both teams scored 17 points each in the third quarter, and a combined 17 in the fourth, to send a 41-41 tie into overtime. After matching scores in the first two extra periods, the Sun Devils fell three yards shy when quarterback Mike Bercovici's final pass of the game was intercepted in the endzone with a six-point deficit.

ASU's ground game found its groove as sophomores

Demario Richard and Kalen Ballage combined for 162 rushing yards, including 135 yards on 19 carries for Richard and 127 yards on 12 attempts for Ballage.

Bercovici powered the Sun Devils' passing attack as he completed 32 of 53 pass attempts for 398 yards, five touchdowns and two interceptions, and also added 58 yards rushing and a touchdown. White led the Sun Devils in receiving with nine catches, 97 yards and one touchdown, and wide receiver D.J. Foster added six receptions for 87 yards. The Sun Devils defense recorded eight tackles for

loss, including five sacks, behind 10 tackles and a sack from safety Jordan Simone and nine tackles and 1.5 sacks from linebacker Salamo Fiso.

# SUN DEVILS CAN'T HOLD ON DESPITE STRONG START AT WASHINGTON STATE

The Arizona State University football team was outscored 28-10 in the second half and dropped its third consecutive Pac-12 decision in a 38-24 loss at Washington State on Saturday afternoon in Pullman. Wash.

Jordan Simone had his third consecutive game with double-digit tackles, finishing with 13, while Demario Richard rushed for 111 yards and a touchdown to pace the Sun Devils.

Kalen Ballage added 84 yards on the ground as the Sun Devils (4-5, 2-4 Pac-12) eclipsed 200 rushing yards in consecutive games for the first time this season. Additionally, the defense held WSU to 15

rushing yards as the Cougars became the fifth conference opponent that ASU has held under 100 rushing yards in a game – the first time that has occurred since 2007.

The Sun Devil offense wasted no time getting things going, taking its first possession of the game 70 yards on eight plays in a brisk 2:13 to score on a six-yard Richard rush with 11:48 remaining in the first quarter. Richard ripped off 54 yards from scrimmage on the opening drive to pick up his 13th touchdown in his last nine games.

After forcing a second consecutive three-and-out, the Sun Devils put together

another methodical 10-play, 64-yard drive in 2:20 that ended on a nine-yard Ballage touchdown rush with 8:23 remaining in the frame to give the Devils an early 14-0 lead.

It was WSU quarterback
Luke Falk who came alive
in the second half, however,
throwing for 497 yards and five
touchdowns – four of which
came in the second half. Dom
Williams had two touchdown
grabs in the game and finished
with six catches for 123 yards.

# LATE FLURRY OF TAKEAWAYS PROPELS SUN DEVIL RALLY OVER WASHINGTON

Two interceptions and 24 unanswered points elevated the Arizona State Sun Devils over the Washington Huskies, 27-17, to snap a three-game losing streak Saturday afternoon at Sun Devil Stadium.

The Sun Devils (5-5, 3-4) win was solidified by three turnovers on UW's (4-6, 2-5) final three possessions, including interceptions by linebackers Christian Sam and Marcus Ball, and a forced fumble by safety James Johnson and a recovery by defensive lineman Edmond Boateng.

Sam led the Sun Devils defense with 12 tackles

and linebacker Antonio
Longino added two sacks and
four tackles for loss, while
cornerback Kweishi Brown
also added seven tackles and
forced a timely turnover.

Brown's 26-yard interception return in the fourth quarter led to a 48-yard touchdown rush for running back Kalen Ballage that increased ASU's lead for good, 27-17, with under six minutes to play.

ASU's rushing attack was led by Ballage's 92 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries, while fellow sophomore running back Demario Richard added 45 yards on 14 carries. Wide receiver Devin Lucien led ASU's receivers with four catches for 63 yards, and wide receiver D.J. Foster increased his streak to 50 consecutive games with a catch as he added five catches for 62 yards.

Quarterback Mike Bercovici ended the afternoon on 22-of-34 passing for 253 yards and one touchdown. He spread the ball around to eight different receivers, including four that finished with at least four catches on the day.

# SUN DEVIL FOOTBALL RECLAIMS TERRITORIAL CUP WITH VICTORY OVER ARIZONA

The Arizona State football team became bowl-eligible for the fifth straight season as they reclaimed the Territorial Cup with a 52-37 win against the Arizona Wildcats on Saturday afternoon. A sellout crowd of 64,855 was in attendance at Sun Devil Stadium to witness the win, sealed by two fourth-quarter interceptions returned for touchdowns.

ASU took a 21-point lead into halftime, but Arizona responded with 13 unanswered points in the third quarter to pull within one possession heading into the final frame. After both teams traded touchdowns to open the fourth, UA regained possession on their own six-yard

line with just over four minutes to play and a chance to tie.

However, redshirt senior cornerback Lloyd Carrington and freshman safety
Kareem Orr each recorded an interception returned for a touchdown on two of UA's (6-6, 3-6) final three possessions to put the Devils back ahead, 52-30. It marked Orr's fifth interception of the season, an ASU (6-5, 4-4) freshman record.

Wide receiver Devin Lucien won the Bob Moran Most Outstanding Player Award of the Territorial Cup as he led the offense with 190 receiving yards on nine catches and a touchdown.

Fellow wide receiver Tim White also contributed eight catches for 67 yards.

Quarterback Mike Bercovici compiled 315 passing yards on 21-of-32 pass attempts for two touchdowns and an interception. Running back Kalen Ballage led the Sun Devils on the ground with 110 yards on 18 carries, and tailback Demario Richard notched 14 rushing attempts for 105 yards before leaving the game with an injury.

### DESPITE CAREER DAY FROM GONZALEZ, SUN DEVILS FALL AT CAL

In a game where Zane Gonzalez set the Arizona State single game school record with six field goals, it was the final field goal of the game that undid the Sun Devils on Saturday in Berkeley, Calif.

Matt Anderson kicked a 26-yard field goal as time expired and the California Golden Bears came back from a 24-3 deficit to stun the Sun Devils, 48-46, in the 2015 regular season finale.

In a game that featured 1,266 total vards of offense, the Sun Devils (6-6, 4-5 Pac-12) struggled to score touchdowns in the red zone – instead settling for six field goals on nine red zone appearances

- while Cal's Jared Goff set the Golden Bear single game record with 542 passing vards and five touchdowns with no interceptions.

ASU's Mike Bercovici was 27-of-43 for 395 vards and four touchdowns with no picks while Devin Lucien blitzed the Bear secondary for a career best 200 receiving vards on eight catches and three touchdowns. Unfortunately. those monumental efforts were not enough.

Cal (7-5, 4-5 Pac-12) scored a touchdown on five straight drives in the second half before kicking the game-winning field goal on its final drive of

the game. ASU closed the game scoring on five straight possessions to end the game, but at a ratio of four field goals to one touchdown – a disparity that would prove to be the difference in the game as Cal outscored ASU 38-19 in the second half.

Gonzalez was the star of the game, going 6-for-6 on field goals and adding four extra points to make up 22 of ASU's 46 total points. The iunior placekicker became the first Sun Devil in history to score over 100 points in three different seasons (114) and the only player in school history to kick 20 or more field goals in three different years (22).

### 2005 INSIGHT BOWL

ASU 45, RUTGERS 40

DEC. 27, 2005 | CHASE FIELD | ATTENDANCE: 43,536



Quarterback Rudy Carpenter threw for 467 yards and four touchdowns as ASU rolled up an Insight Bowl-record 678 yards of total offense on its way to a 45-40 win against Rutgers. Carpenter, a redshirt freshman that took over for injured Sam Keller eight games into the season, completed 23-of-35 passes with no interceptions to earn Most Valuable Offensive Players honors. Linebacker Jamar Williams recorded seven solo tackles, including a tackle for loss, and a forced fumble to pick up Most Valuable Defensive Player recognition. The Devils took their first lead of the game, 31-27, with 6:37 left in the third quarter, before the Scarlett Knights recaptured the lead, 33-31, two minutes into the final frame. However, a 42-yard touchdown pass from Carpenter to Matt Miller with 10 minutes to play gave ASU the advantage for good. Running back Rudy Burgess added 103 rushing yards and two touchdowns on 16 carries and Miller finished with a pair of scores.



## REIMAGINING SUN DEVIL ATHLETICS WITH RAY ANDERSON



A member of the academically and athletically gifted Pac-12 Conference, Arizona State has 10 intercollegiate sports for men and 15 for women at the Division I level. The university has produced excellence in both team and individual sports while mentoring some of the nation's best and well-known athletes, including college football Hall of Famer and Silver Star recipient Pat Tillman, NCAA wrestling champion Anthony Robles and United States women's national soccer team member Amy Lepeilbet.

At the helm of Sun Devil Athletics is Ray Anderson, who was named Arizona State University's Vice President for University Athletics and Athletics Director on Jan. 9, 2014. Anderson has successfully blended the athletics department mission of the 'Sun Devil Way' with Arizona State University's charge to become the 'New American University,' and in the process he has positioned Sun Devil Athletics to excel on the field, in the classroom and around the community.

The 'Sun Devil Way,' which incorporates the duties that Sun Devils Win, Sun Devils Graduate, Sun Devils Serve, Sun Devils are Family, Sun Devils are for Life, and Sun Devils Compete with Passion and Character, has blossomed from a vision to a plan of action under Anderson's watch.

Bucking the national trend of downsizing athletics departments, Anderson has added

three varsity sports since he arrived in Tempe, including men's ice hockey, women's lacrosse and women's triathlon. These additions are designed to expand competitive and educational opportunities that reflect the diversity of ASU for prospective college students across the country, and are indicative of the revolutionary collegiate athletics model Anderson is creating in the Valley of the Sun.

His innovative business model also includes a pair of groundbreaking revenue-generating projects. Anderson has set the template for future apparel negotiations at the collegiate level with an eight-year partnership with adidas he negotiated in December 2014. Aside from wholesale apparel provisions, the contract also provides money for marketing and facilities improvements, as well as dedicated funds to the marching band and spirit squad. Sun Devil Athletics also became the first school to partner with the Pac-12 to bring the school's multimedia rights inhouse, a move that has quickly resulted in unprecedented success.

Regular fixtures in the Directors' Cup, Sun Devil teams have achieved success in all varsity sports for more than 70 years. With 23 NCAA Championships, over 1,900 All-Americans, and more than 120 individual national champions and 50 Pac-10/12 titles, ASU has been historically competitive in football, baseball, softball, swimming and track and

field, among others. Anderson has masterfully parlayed these achievements into a number of world-class head-coaching hires unseen at the collegiate level. He brought in Bob Bowman, a hall of fame coach and mentor of the world's most decorated Olympian, to head up the men and women's swimming program, Zeke Jones, USA Wrestling's National Freestyle Coach, to take over the wrestling program, and Bobby Hurley, one of the most decorated college basketball players in history, to be the leader of the men's basketball program.

A perennial contender for Pac-12 Conference championships, ASU also excels academically. With the second-most Academic All-Americans in the Pac-12 over the last 10 years, ASU has successfully integrated the New American University model into its varsity sports programs. Under Anderson, Sun Devil Athletics recently reached an all-time high 84-percent graduation success rate, the seventh consecutive year it has increased. In addition, SDA recorded a 986 Academic Progress Rate, an all-time high and among the tops in the Pac-12, as seven varsity programs ranked in the nation's top 10-percent in their respective sports.

Serving the community is also an integral part of ASU and its student-athletes. Whether it is visiting local elementary schools and children's hospitals, teaming up with nonprofit organizations in the community or volunteering at events across the Valley, ASU has been at the forefront in increasing ASU's prominence and influence in not only the Phoenix area, but also the state as a whole. Understanding an involved community is a common denominator shared by successful programs, community service reached an all-time high as student-athletes, coaches and staff members logged more than 6,800 hours on 105 projects in Anderson's first

full year at ASU. He has also embraced
Sun Devil Nation in a variety of initiatives,
including an increase in the range and scope
of the annual Sun Devil Caravan Tour, and the
implementation of the Honor Row, a dedicated
section for military veterans and their families, at
a number of athletics venues. Sun Devil Athletics
has a rich history of service to the United States
that spans from Theodore Roosevelt's "Rough
Riders" in 1898 to World War II to the war in Iraq
and Afghanistan.

Anderson has also spearheaded a number of facilities projects in his nearly two years at ASU, including the three-phase Sun Devil Stadium Reinvention, the baseball program's celebrated move to Phoenix Municipal Stadium, and the initial stages of the Athletics District and the subsequent relocation of the men and women's golf programs to Papago Golf Course.

Anderson joined the Sun Devil Family after serving as the executive vice president of football operations for the National Football League (NFL) since August 2006. He was recognized during the week of Super Bowl XLIX by the National Football League for his outstanding leadership with a desire to improving his community as he was presented with both the 2015 Paul J. Tagliabue Award and the John Wooten Lifetime Achievement Award, two of the NFL's most prestigious honors.

From three-sport athletes such as Tom Futch in the 1950s or three-time Olympians like diver Joona Puhakka in the 2000s, Sun Devil student-athletes not only excel during their time at ASU, but after graduation as well. Evidenced by its representation at the Olympics, Women's World Cup, NBA Finals, Super Bowl and The Master's, among others, ASU has proven to be a training ground for those looking to shine on the world's brightest athletic stages.




